SOLUTIONS SOUGHT FOR NAL TRAFFIC PROBLEMS

A suggestion has been made on how traffic tie-ups during the rush hours (especially during the evening period) might be alleviated in the NAL Village. Here it is:

1. If you are bound toward Warrenville, etc., employees should use Blackhawk Boulevard, which runs along the eastern edge of the Village, in leaving the Village.

2. If you are bound toward Batavia or Eola road, then employees should use Sauk Boulevard as an exit. Sauk runs along the west side of the Village.

Employees are asked to try this arrangement voluntarily in the hope that it will relieve the congestion at the Village exits during the 5 p.m. goinghome period.

The intersection of Route 59 and Batavia Road is like Times Square during rush hours. The Director's office has asked the state highway department to conduct a study of the traffic situation at the intersection, especially during the morning and evening rush hours.

Other traffic information: The traffic islands at either end of Wilson and Batavia are going to be removed. It has not been possible to control traffic with these islands, as had been hoped, and therefore some other system must be devised.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION

Plans for improvements of segments of highways in the NAL area are included in an announcement made by Gov. Ogilvie's office. The following non-interstate highways in DuPage and Kane counties have been earmarked for improvement in 1970.

***Widening, resurfacing and channelization of 8.03 miles of Route 59 from south of North Avenue, north of West Chicago, to the East-West Tollway, near Warrenville, at a cost of \$5,025,000.

***Resurfacing of 14.67 miles of Route 59 south from Roosevelt Road, West Chicago, at a cost of \$656,000.

***Pavement work on 2.57 miles of Averill Road from Kirk Road to Roosevelt Road, west of West Chicago, \$545,000

NAL LIBRARY RECEIVES GIFT COLLECTION

Employees are invited to ride the shuttle to the site during lunch periods to see just how we are progressing.

ON THE CONSERVATION FRONT

Thanks to the sharp eyes and quick action of <u>Ralph Mataya</u>, of the Farm Management group, a Christmas tree theft was discovered on the NAL site. Two days before Christmas, on December 23, Ralph observed a man cutting about three feet out of the top of an ornamental spruce tree on one of the farms on the site. Through a check of the man's automobile license number, it was determined that the car was leased to a firm doing business with NAL on the main site.

A thorough investigation, by the NAL staff, revealed that a high-ranking official of this company was involved in the incident. The individual has agreed to make restitution to the Laboratory in the form of replacing the damaged tree. <u>Rudy Dorner</u>, site manager, notes that he has instructed guards and others that the Laboratory is vitally interested in following through on incidents involving damage to nature on the site.

A NEW UNIVERSITY NEAR NAL?

A special sub-committee studying the need and feasibility of building a new state university at one of several locations in Illinois will make its report public at 10 a.m. Tuesday, February 3, 1970. The committee will report then to the Illinois Board of Higher Education at a meeting to be held at the LaSalle hotel, Chicago. The committee has been studying presentations made to the Board by Robert R. Wilson, Edwin L. Goldwasser and Donald R. Getz, both in person and by letter, in support of a proposal that a major university be developed near NAL. Several consultants from the Illinois Board of Higher Education have visited the site. In addition, members of the Kane County Board of Supervisors have been in communication with the Board's staff members. Last week, The Trib quoted Paul J. Ronske, chairman of the DuPage County board of Supervisors, as saying that "I'm all for it" and noting that DuPage was a home of two major Atomic Energy Commission research centers---Argonne National Laboratory and NAL.

USERS MEETING

The annual meeting of the NAL Users Organization will be held at NAL on April 10 and 11. It is tentatively expected that from 200 to 300 persons will attend. The Users group includes nearly 1000 physicists from throughout the United States. Dr. Harold K. Ticho, professor of physics at the University of California-Los Angeles, is chairman.
