TRAFFIC SAFETY PROGRAM CONTINUES HERE

In the last year, several major improvements in the parking facilities at Fermilab have been completed by Site Services and Architectural Services. Paving of the East and West parking lots at the Central Laboratory Building made last winter a lot easier for both employees' parking, and the snow removal crews. This year the Meson Area parking lot and the Central Laboratory Courtyard have been paved and marked for safer and more efficient parking. It is expected that the Proton Area roads and parking areas will be completed before winter.

During these construction times Fermilab's Site Patrol has made allowances for the severe strain on available parking space; parking regulations around the Central Laboratory have not been strictly enforced. Now that the areas are complete, and with the approach of winter, it will become necessary for motorists to follow parking regulations more closely. These regulations are intended to make parking, driving and walking safer for all concerned. Observing marked or posted "no parking" areas and speed limits is important. Also good common sense should be used in connection with parking anywhere on site.

Fermilab traffic regulations conform to those of the State of Illinois, as set forth in the publication Rules of the Road. The placement of stop signs and speed limits reflects the recommendations of a consulting Traffic Engineer coupled with changing traffic conditions. The Fermilab Site Patrol has the responsibility for monitoring compliance with traffic regulations on the site and for the issuance of citations to violators. The Traffic Safety Subcommittee plays a major role in the enforcement program. Current membership of this committee is: John Barry, Chairman, Art Greene, Chuck Marofske, Dug Pinyan, Gene Plant, Claudia Slater, Rudy Dorner (ex officio).

It is the Laboratory's policy that willful or flagrant disregard of safety regulations and procedures (including traffic regulations) is subject to disciplinary action. The enforcement procedures that have been developed include disciplinary action as follows:

Warning Citations (issued by the Site Patrol) will be reviewed by the Traffic Safety Subcommittee. Most first offense moving violations will result in a warning letter from the Chairman of the Traffic Safety Subcommittee with copies forwarded to the driver's immediate supervisor and personnel file. Second violations, and serious or flagrant first violations, will require the driver's appearance before the Traffic Safety Subcommittee. In such cases, some form of disciplinary action may be imposed.

Disciplinary actions for traffic violations will be graduated and may include the following:

(1) A warning letter; (2) Required attendance at the Defensive Driving Course; (3) Denial of driving privileges on site or suspension of Government Vehicle Operator's Permit for an appropriate period; (4) Suspension without pay for an appropriate period; (5) In extreme cases, termination of employment or denial of the use of Laboratory facilities.

SELECT FILM FESTIVAL WINNERS

A jury of six distinguished science educators has selected winners from among the 24 physical science films entered in the 11th Chicago Film Festival. A selection of these winning films will be announced at the opening of the mini festival to be held in the Fermilab Auditorium November 13-16.

Heading the jury is William B. Fowler, physicist-head of the Fermilab Superconductor group.

Other jury members are Josia Nyirenda, Science coordinator for McCosh Elementary School, Chicago; Ion Siotos, visiting physicist from Imperial College, University of London; Michael Sloan, teacher of advanced science, Glenbard West High School; Alvin Tollestrup, visiting physicist from the California Institute of Technology; Charles Vladika, art director for video, Arthur Anderson and Company, St. Charles.

The science category of this year's Chicago Festival included physics, space science, and mathematics entries. A film on weather observation, a mathematics film, two metric education films, are among the award winners on the Fermilab program on Thursday, November 13 at 8 p.m. The program is free of charge for Permilab people and for the general public.

On Friday, November 14, the Fermilab festival program will consist of student-produced films, starting at 7 p.m. Since the Chicago Festival is the largest of its kind in the U.S. it attracts a high caliber of these innovative student films.

Saturday morning, November 15, 10 a.m. will see a repeat of the Thursday night program for the benefit of students, again without admission charge.

At 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, a short subjects program will include a prize-winning Yugoslavian film and NASA's "New View of Mars." At 9:30 p.m. the British film, "A Private Enterprise," an award winner at this year's Chicago Festival, will show. The drama explores the timeless problem of immigrants who come to work in affluent countries. An ambitious young engineer from Bombay is frustrated in attempts to start a small factory, angered by an arranged engagement, with many obstacles to be overcome.

On Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. a collection of children's films from such countries as France and Iran will be offered.

The four-day film show offers a bargain in entertainment at lower prices and transporation costs than attending the Festival in Chicago.
