U.S., U.S.S.R. PLAN HEP EXCHANGE

Representatives of the Soviet Union's State Committee for the Utilization of Atomic Energy and the United States Atomic Energy Commission have signed a Protocol in Washington, D.C. It provides a basis for joint experiments to be carried out at the Institute of High Energy Physics at Serpukhov and at NAL.

The Protocol, signed on November 30, was negotiated for the USAEC by Dr. Abraham S. Friedman, Deputy Director of the USAEC's Division of International Affairs; Dr. Gerald F. Tape, President of the Associated Universities, Inc., and former Atomic Energy Commissioner; Dr. Robert R. Wilson, Director, and Dr. Edwin L. Goldwasser, Deputy Director, National Accelerator Laboratory, Batavia; Dr. Wolfgang K.H. Panofsky, Director, Stanford Linear Accelerator Center, Palo Alto, California; Dr. Paul W. McDaniel, Director, and Dr. William A. Wallenmeyer, Assistant Director for High Energy Physics, of the USAEC's Division of Research.

The Soviet negotiators were Mr. I. Smolin, Deputy Chief, Department of International Relations and Scientific Technical Information, SCAE; Dr. I.V. Chuvilo, Director, Institute of Theoretical and Experimental Physics, Moscow; Dr. Yu D. Prokoshkin, Section Chief, Institute of High Energy Physics, Serpukhov, and Mrs. D.F. Khoklova, Staff Member, Department of International Relations and Scientific Technical Information.

At the present time, six U.S. nuclear scientists are conducting research in the peaceful uses of atomic energy in U.S.S.R. laboratories. All assignments are for periods of six months. Five from the University of California, Los Angeles, are conducting high energy physics experiments at Serpukhov and the sixth, from Princeton University in New Jersey, started an assignment at the Kharkov Physical Technical Institute in October in the field of controlled thermonuclear reactions.

SOCIAL SECURITY GOES TO 5.2% JANUARY 1

Effective January 1, 1971, the contribution rate for federal social security will be increased to 5.2% from the existing 4.8%. The maximum amount of yearly earnings on which social security is paid remains constant at \$7,800. This means that \$5.2 of each \$100 earnings is withheld for payment to the Federal Government for social security coverage. These deductions continue until earnings exceed \$7,800 in a calendar year. The new rate of deductions will commence with the first pay period of 1971. The amount paid into your account is matched by an equal payment from the Laboratory.
