NAL BUS SERVICE BRINGS NEW PHASE IN ENERGY CONSERVATION

NAL employees this week responded to another opportunity to adapt to the new lifestyle that having less gasoline has brought about. For several weeks, those who have begun to car pool at NAL have found it increasingly difficult to hitch a ride down the beam lines or to get to the Central Laboratory for lunch, or to accomplish the work errands that for many are part of the day at NAL. The need for a solution reached the attention of the NAL Business Office, and as a result, at 8 a.m., Monday morning, February 4, Support Services began operation of the first continuous bus service on the NAL Site. Two routes have been scheduled to enable employees and visitors to travel to major stopping points in the Laboratory's work areas. The two routes are:

THE VILLAGE-CROSS GALLERY ROUTE. This route starts at the Cross Gallery. It also stops at the entrances to the Central Laboratory Building nearest the Auditorium (on the west side when going from the Cross Gallery area, returning on the east side, to give easy access to the loading door of the bus). It travels then to the Magnet Facility and to Support Services-Plant Management. It then goes to the Village, stopping at (1) Personnel-Cafeteria, (2) Purchasing-Stock Room, 18 Potawatomi, and (3) at the Curia, 28 Shabbona. The bus then returns to the Cross Gallery, in reverse order of the forward route. It takes about 20 minutes in each direction.

THE BUBBLE CHAMBER-CROSS GALLERY ROUTE. This route leaves the Curia in the Village, 28 Shabbona, at 8:10 a.m. and travels straight to the Cross Gallery, beginning its regular route at 8:20 a.m. (This is to accommodate those employees who car pool to the Village, but work at the Cross Gallery area.) During the rest of the day, the route begins at the west side entrance of the Central Laboratory Building nearest the Auditorium. It then goes to the Meson Detector Building, crosses over the Neutrino line to the Proton experimental area, and then proceeds to the Bubble Chamber Area. The route returns in reverse order to the Cross Gallery. Timing for this route is 15 minutes in each direction.

Copies of the daily schedule for the bus runs have been distributed widely throughout the Laboratory by the Business Office. The schedule lists the time that buses make each of the

stops mentioned above, during the whole day. It is also easy to transfer between the two runs at the Cross Gallery. Copies of the schedule are available from Jim Finks' office in the Business Office, Ext. 3227. If demand warrants, one or more additional routes may be possible in the future. Suggestions about the bus service should be made to Mr. Finks.

ELMHURST COLLEGE ACCELERATOR COMPLETED

Elmhurst College, Elmhurst, Illinois, now operates a linear accelerator in its physics department, the college announced recently. Six years and 32,000 man-hours were devoted to the project of re-assembling portions of an accelerator from the University of Chicago and materials from many other sources purchased with grants from the Sloan Foundation and the National Science Foundation. Students supplied most of the manpower. The college states, "The accelerator will be used primarily to give students the opportunity to become intimately involved in using the ideas they meet in the classroom...through their work on this and other equipment in the department they will gain invaluable experience and understanding which could not be obtained through normal classroom work." Dr. William H. Sawyer, chairman of the Elmhurst physics department, headed the project. The accelerator is similar to the NAL Cockcroft Walton accelerator.
