NAL SPONSORS SECOND TAT PROJECT

Twelve young men of various ethnic backgrounds have been selected by NAL to take part in the Laboratory's continuing program to train unemployed and under-employed minority group members to fill skilled jobs on the site.

The new group is comprised of four American Indians, four Spanish-Americans and four Negroes. This National Accelerator Laboratory group of recruits was augmented by eight members of the Argonne National Laboratory staff -- six Negroes and two American Indians.

In an earlier program in 1969, 22 young men were graduated from a similar program which led to their employment at NAL in various technical sections. The trainees in the first group were Negro men between the ages of 18 and 30. Nearly all were from the inner-city of Chicago and virtually all were natives of the Chicago metropolitan area.

The second group is being supported through an inter-agency agreement between the Atomic Energy Commission and the U.S. Department of Labor under the Manpower Development and Training Act. Under the agreement, the National Accelerator Laboratory has recruited the young men for skilled jobs upon completion of their training. The

men will be trained for these positions through the Training and Technology Project (TAT) conducted at the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission facilities in Oak Ridge, Tenn.

The new group departed Sunday by plane for Oak Ridge. Each of the trainees will have a job waiting for him at NAL after he completes the course prescribed for him by NAL and the TAT staff at Oak Ridge. The trainees are to be trained in various disciplines required for the staffing of NAL -- as mechanical technicians, electronics technicians, draftsmen, etc. The TAT project is operated by Oak Ridge Associated Universities in cooperation with Union Carbide Corporation. Training will be conducted in an industrial setting at AEC's Y-12 plant in Oak Ridge.

The trainees reported at NAL March 23, and took part in an orientation program directed by Charles F. Marofske, NAL personnel manager, and Kennard Williams, Head of Equal Employment and Community Relations.

The trainees are: Andrew Begay, 25, Chicago, mechanical technician for the Main Ring Section; Nicolas Cadena, 19, Aurora, draftsman for Beam Transfer; Steven Cooper, 19, Chicago, electronics technician for Radiation Physics; Avelardo Cortez, 19, Aurora, mechanical technician for Beam Transfer; Wilbert Edmondson, 21 Aurora, draftsman for Beam Transfer; Edward Fuentes, 17, Aurora, electronics technician for Experimental Facilities; Maurice Harland, 19, Aurora, electronics technician for Experimental Facilities; Percy Herbert, 23, Chicago, electronics technician for Booster; Ernest Matt, 25, Chicago, draftsman for Booster; Benjamin Nelson, 19, Chicago, draftsman for Main Ring; Herminio Rosario, 28, Aurora, mechanical technician for Main Ring; and Larry Tofpi, 22, Chicago, mechanical technician for Radio Frequency.

BURGLARY

The National Accelerator Laboratory site is a federal reservation -- and all of the property on it generally belongs to the United States government. Exceptions, of course, are personal effects and autos, as well as equipment belonging to contractors, etc.

The NAL Director's office has urged NAL employees and guards to be continually vigilant about the protection of Laboratory property, regardless of its size or value. In recent weeks, there have been several incidents of thefts and burglary on the site.

On Easter week-end, a man in his late 20's from Naperville was found by NAL guards removing cabinets from the wall in the kitchen of a farmhouse on the NAL site on Wilson Road. A bit later, a lady friend drove into the farm yard with a pick-up truck in which they apparently had planned to remove the cabinets. John Barry, of the Director's office, signed a warrant at the Kane County sheriff's office charging the pair with burglary, a felony offense. Bond was set at \$2,500. It was the second time in the New Year that complaints have been signed against persons accused of illegally entering homes on the NAL site.
