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SUMMER PROGRAM BRINGS STUDENT GROUP TO NAL

For the third year, a group of students from colleges and universities in the southern, southeastern, and southwestern U.S. has come to work at the National Accelerator Laboratory for the summer months. The 37 men and women represent a continued effort by NAL and the high energy physics community to achieve wider participation by minority students in the field of physics and related subjects. NAL's EEO office carried out an extensive interview schedule for the 1973 candidates for this program, following the purposes and goals originally set forth by the Committee for Minority Participation in Physics when it was organized in 1970.

The students come from 19 different colleges. Most of them are majoring in physics or closely-related fields such as mathematics or engineering (two, in forestry). They have completed at least 30 semester credit hours toward a baccalaureate degree. They are living in the

dormitories at Aurora College during their stay at NAL and commute by bus to NAL each day. Eight of the group are at NAL for their second summer.

Their jobs at NAL are intended to give them working knowledge of aspects of electronic instrumentation, computer programming, component fabrication, data reduction and analysis and other technical skills used in construction and in NAL's operations.

Eight of the students are women. Three of the eight have completed four years in physics studies; one, three years; four, two years.

Dr. James C. Davenport, Chairman of the Department of Physics, Virginia State College, visited the Laboratory recently as a consultant on the program, to assist the Laboratory in its continued effort to make the program more effective. He spoke highly of the caliber of the students. "This is an outstanding selection of students," he observed. "Their scholastic aptitude and their interest in science is very high. It was a real experience for me to attend the seminar given by your Ron Walker and to hear these young people respond with questions and genuine interest in the material being presented to them. It is sometimes hard to motivate students to arouse this kind of exchange, and it is a credit to the students as well as to the atmosphere they have found at your Laboratory."

Dr. Davenport visited with the students and will make suggestions for future improvements in the program. "I would especially like to see the program take more advantage of the depth of talent at NAL. The informal person-to-person interaction of these students with people of the caliber you have at NAL would be of inestimable value to them. You have an opportunity to help close the gap they often find in the education offered to them. Their schools and their backgrounds are sometimes limited and contact with people who have the knowledge they are missing is extremely valuable."

"You should remember, too," he said, "that what the students take back to their schools from your Laboratory is also of great importance. They will share with other minority students the knowledge of your facility and all of the technological superiority you have. The program then has double strength."

This special offer will last for one month only - <u>July, 1973</u>. In October, the single Bronze Medal and a Silver Bicentennial Commemorative Medal will be sold as individual offers. They will be identical to the PNC medal in design, but will bear the date "1973" on the obverse.

Revenues derived from the sales of the PNC and medals are non-profit and will be used to provide matching grants to State, local and non-profit groups to finance special Bicentennial projects.
