DARLENE BLACKBURN AT FERMILAB AUGUST 16

The dances and drums of the African Congo will be presented by the Darlene Blackburn Dance Troupe at the Fermilab Auditorium on Saturday, August 16, at 8:00 p.m. The program is in response to the highly successful performance which the troupe gave at an international meeting held at Fermilab in 1972. The evening is open to the public.

In addition to the African section of the program, <u>Darlene Blackburn</u> will present a portion of "Survival Is" A work for which she received a choreographer's grant from the National Endowment for the Arts in 1973. "Survival Is" shows the influence of African dance and drums on American dance and jazz.

Four men and four women will wear the authentic costumes, the beaded neckwear, and the corn row hair style which are all part of the age-old ceremonial traditions and rituals of Africa.

The dancers are accompanied by six drummers, all skilled performers. Their rhythmus are the voice of African culture where communication by drum-beat has reflected community life for centuries.

Miss Blackburn is well-known as a dancer, choreographer, producer, and educator. She has studied with Thelma Hill at the New York Clark Center and at the Katherine Dunham School of Dance in New York and has performed with the Ghana Dance Company, West Africa, the Nigerian Traditional Dancers in Lagos, Nigeria, and Titos Sompa's Congolese Dance Company. Since 1967, she has performed at colleges throughout Illinois

as well as in concerts at Cornell University; Purdue University, where she was artist in residence; and at Madison, Wisconsin. She lectures, teaches, and has studied widely in Africa and in the U.S.

She is the only Chicago choreographer to have received a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts in 1975.

Following the performance you can view a small but choice exhibit of African sculpture in the coffee lounge on the second floor. These pieces are on loan from a Chicago collection and have been shown previously at the Museum of African Art in Washington, D.C.

...ANOTHER MILESTONE...On Thursday, August 7, 30 minutes after midnight, beam was accelerated in the Main Ring to 450 BeV. Stable operation was observed at an intensity of approximately 7×10^{11} protons per pulse with two beam bunches injected from the booster. Further tests at higher machine energies will be made after several necessary operational improvements have been innovated on the capacitor bank of the Main Ring power supply system.
