

## PROGRESS REPORT

The NAL Main Accelerator reached an intensity of  $5.22 \times 10^{12}$  protons per pulse at 12:16 a.m. on August 8, 1973. An important contribution to this milestone was the successful two-turn injection into the Booster. The event was an intermediate goal in the on-going program to achieve design intensity of  $5 \times 10^{13}$  protons per pulse in the Main Accelerator. It was an occasion to pause briefly before continuing on, to celebrate the success of many months' efforts.

# ENERGY CONSERVATION AT NAL

In a message June 29, President Nixon called attention to the magnitude of the energy crisis facing the nation. He suggested that overall energy consumption in the nation should be reduced by 5% next year. As a step toward this goal, he has asked agencies of the federal government to seek every reasonable means of bringing about a 7% reduction in consumption of energy resources by the agencies. A number of steps are being taken to meet this end at NAL. It is recognized that the NAL accelerator system while a very large user of electrical energy, is an important tool of the research that may lead to new insights on sources of energy. It is not planned to curtail the use of energy at NAL toward this purpose.


There are many ways in which NAL employees can <u>individually</u> begin immediately to contribute to the conservation of energy:

CAR POOLS - The Village Crier Office, 35 Blackhawk, Ext. 3351, will maintain a list of employees' home addresses and will serve as clearing house for inquiries about car pools. If you live in Joliet, for instance, and want to know who else lives in Joliet, with whom you might want to make a car pool arrangement, this information is now available to you. If you prefer, you may place an ad (no charge) in THE VILLAGE CRIER indicating your needs. Five passengers in one car, instead of each in a separate car, means an 80% reduction in the gasoline used by those people to get to work. It might

also be possible to hitch-hike a ride from the commuter train station in West Chicago with fellow employees who live there.

RIDE SHARING ON-SITE - To help cut down on the gasoline consumed in on-site errands, the Laboratory has established three personnel pick-up points. The idea is that instead of each person using a personal car for an errand, an effort should be made to hitch-hike a ride by going to one of the pick-up points where another person-on-an-errand could stop and determine if anyone waiting at the pick-up point wants to go in the same direction the driver of the car is going. If even one-half of the duplicated gas consumption is eliminated, Laboratory personnel will be helping the gasoline shortage.

Pick-up points are identified by the signs shown in the photos below. They are presently located: 1) 28 Shabbona Street, in front of the Curia; 2) at the northeast corner of the intersection of Sauk Blvd. and Batavia Road; 3) at the north end of the Transfer Hall.

SHUTTLE BUS ON ROAD "A" - A shuttle bus is now operating on Road "A" between the Cross Gallery and the Bubble Chamber area at about 30-minute intervals to transport anyone working in this area. The bus also makes side trips to the experimental areas.

GOOD DRIVING PRACTICES - Limit driving speed to 50 m.p.h. Shut off engine when not in use. Keep tires properly inflated. (A tire gauge and air pump is located on the west side of the vehicle maintenance garage at 28 Sauk in the Village available for the use of NAL motorists.)

PERSONAL HABITS - Light, loose clothing worn in hot weather cuts down on the need for air conditioning, one of the largest users of electrical energy. Remember to turn off lights, air conditioners, xerox machines, and other equipment when leaving an area for an extended time.

The Laboratory plans to mark strips along the present roads on site, to facilitate the safe use of bicycles. Further details of this plan will be announced later.

The VILLAGE CRIER would be interested to hear of employees' successes and failures in conservation efforts in order that help could be given to make the plans more successful.
