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CHINESE AND FERMILAB SIGN MEMORANDUM

Leon Lederman, Fermilab director, and Ji Cheng, director of the Chinese business office here, signed a memorandum May 5, 1980, that formalizes procedures that Fermilab and Chinese scientists had been following for more than a year.

The document was signed at 10:50 a.m. in Lederman's office. Its official title is "Memorandum of Understanding Between Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory and Beijing Proton Synchrotron Business Office of the People's Republic of China Concerning the Participation in and Conducting of Experiments and Projects."

Observing the signing were Phil Livdahl, acting deputy director of Fermilab, and Bruce Chrisman, business manager. The memorandum, for example, describes the technical exchange between Fermilab and Chinese scientists, but overall is a broad and flexible document.

"It's another step in cementing the relationships" between the two groups of scientists, said Chrisman.

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PART OF ROAD D TO BE CLOSED

A portion of one of the most heavily traveled roads at Fermilab will be closed for about three months beginning around May 20.

The segment is Road D between its intersection with Road B and Road A-1. The closing is to allow modifications to Enclosure C in the Switchyard.

The detour path will be clearly marked.

At the same time, the bicycle path along Road D will be closed. Bicyclists will have to use the same detour.

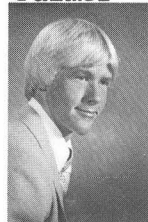

Vehicle Maintenance and five of Site Services shops have moved to Site 38.

The lock and key, carpenter, paint, mechanical and electrical shops moved on March 15 from Site 43 to make way for Industrial Building 4, now being constructed. Six weeks later, Vehicle Maintenance had completed its relocation from the Fermilab Village. The shops moved into the large, white barn at Site 38 and Vehicle Maintenance occupies the building attached to the south side of the barn.

The relocation puts many of the Laboratory's major services together and provides them with improved facilities, said John Paulk, head of Site Services.

The phone number for Vehicle Maintenance remains the same--Ext. 3307. However, anyone who needs shop service should call Work Control at Ext. 3434, said Don Fichtel, manager of Work Control. Work will be coordinated through Fichtel's office.

Virgil Sutcliff is the shop foreman for the carpenter, paint and lock shops, and Bill Byrd is foreman of the mechanical and electrical shops. George Davidson is manager of Vehicle Maintenance.

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CHINESE COLLABORATION ON TV SUNDAY

Interviews with the Chinese scientists working at Fermilab and with their families in the People's Republic of China will be shown on Channel 5 TV (NBC, Chicago) at 10 p.m. this Sunday (May 18).

She taped the families' responses, then showed those tapes to the Chinese here. Yu's first visit to Fermilab was pictured in the April 3rd issue of Ferminews.

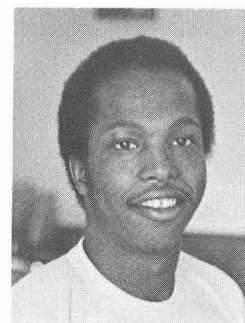
The pool will open May 24 and will observe the following schedule:
