

This will be the third time he will have taught the course. ultimately will be hooked into the satellite refrigerators. The transfer line has been hooked up (welded together) to the Central Helium Liquefier Facility through Sector A.

OUTSTANDING PERFORMANCES HIGHLIGHT PICNIC FUN RUN

Although the Fermilab 1981 family picnic is over, the accolades will continue for the Fermilab runners who competed in the combined Batavia Windmill Whirl and Fermilab picnic fun run. Twenty-five Fermilab runners "toed off" in Batavia at 8 a.m. July 25, the morning of the picnic.

Seven of them ran the two-mile distance; the others competed in the 10-kilometer (6.2-mile) run. According to Marv Warner of the Fermilab Running Club, the turnout was well balanced, with seven women running and an age span for all runners of 16 to 63. Winners in their respective categories were each awarded a Fermilab T-shirt at the picnic that afternoon.

Rick Warner, Marv's son, was the overall winner for Fermilab. He finished the 10-kilometer distance in 33 minutes, 46 seconds, placing sixth in the field. "Sterling performances also were turned in by Peter Koehler, head of the Research Division, who ran his first 10-kilometer race, by Capt. John Lill of our Fire Department and by Dick Nelson of the Meson Department," said Marv. (The following results are for runners in the Fermilab contingent only. Their times were compared to one another.)

Those who achieved outstanding performances in the two-mile run for women were Anita Cumalat (her husband is John Cumalat, Physics Section), first place; and Ann Shafer (husband is Bob, Energy Saver Division), second place. Finishing first in the men's category was Ed LaVallie, Proton Department, and second, Mel Magnuson, Architectural Services.

Outstanding women runners in the 10-kilometer race were Pat Yost. Laboratory Services Section, first place for women under 30: and Suzanne Gronemeyer, Meson Department, first place for women over 30, and Barb Perington, Meson Department, second place for women over 30.

In the men's category of the 10-kilometer race, Brian Meadowcroft (his father Dick is with the Accelerator Division) took first place for men under 16; Rick Warner captured top honors for men age 16-30; and Bob Hubbard of Warrenville took first place for men older than 30.

BILL ROSS: PERPETUAL CHEF

Bill Ross has a problem, and a pretty nice one at that. He can't seem to retire. This personable, outgoing gentleman recently retired as head chef at Fermilab, but that's only one more transition in his many-faceted life.

He's going to be cooking for the River Forest Golf Club in Elmhurst, adding another dimension to his relatively late career as a chef. As he tells it, he's been working professionally in kitchens for only 11 years, the last seven at Fermilab. He had come back to Illinois from Iowa, one of the many stops around the country that his career as a manager for a food service company and then chef had taken him. He answered an ad in the Chicago Tribune...and that's how he ended up here. It quickly became a happy blend for the Laboratory and for Bill as well.

Bill found an outlet for his creativity with food, meeting the variety and many demands expected from people eating in a cafeteria as well as those less frequent opportunities to prepare special dishes--like, for example, grand marnier souffle, "which I stayed up most of the night making," he said. 
This was Hampton's second Rockford marathon. Nearly 400 runners competed in it. He ran his first in 3 hours, 44 minutes.
