BLOOM DISCUSSES BIOLOGICAL BASIS OF MENTAL ILLNESS

Research into the biochemistry of the nervous system has led to a better understanding of mental illness and to help for many afflicted with mental disorders. At this same time, it has resulted in a polarization in the psychiatric profession. Dr. Floyd E.

Bloom will discuss these issues and their implications in his lecture "Biological Basis of Mental Illness" which will be given in Ramsey Auditorium on November 18, Friday at 8 p.m. Bloom will also relate what these findings tell us about normal behavior and mental health.

Dr. Bloom has a long and distinguished career in this area of research. Since

been he has 1975 Director of the Arthur V. Davis Center for Behavioral Neurobiology of the Salk Institute in San Diego. Prior to that he had spent nine years at the National Institute of Mental Health, St. Elizabeth Hospital in Washington,



D. C. and four years on Dr. Floyd E. Bloom the faculty of the Yale University School of Medicine. Bloom received his MD degree, cum laude, from Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis. He has over 140 publications to his credit and is the recipient of numerous honors and awards, including international recognition of his work.


