Discussion for Recommendation b:

At the July 18, 2014 Board Meeting an inquiry arose regarding the FY 12-13 Revenue Budget Line "9779 Other Grant Revenue" presented on the comparative columns of the FY 14-15 Adopted Budget. Staff were instructed to research the various grants that composed the \$10,000 Revenue Budget Line and to present the results to the Board.

Staff has identified that there were two grants that composed Revenue Budget Line 9779, both grants were for the exclusive use of the Bag Ban Environmental Impact Report (EIR). A \$5,000 grant from Orfalea Fund provided by the Orfalea Foundation, and a \$5,000 grant from the Coastal Fund provided by UC Santa Barbara Associated Students.

Both grants were one-time grants and therefore do not appear on any subsequent fiscal budgets.

BACKGROUND:

The Rincon Parkway coastline has excellent public access but suffers from a high rate of beach erosion due to infrastructure encroachment. Most of the encroachment took place during the late 1960's when a section of US Highway 101 was relocated into the nearshore zone near Sea Cliff Beach. This interrupted the longshore sand transport resulting in widespread erosion of downcoast beaches. Over time, an extensive system of seawalls and revetments were built to combat storm wave damage so that today Rincon Parkway is one of the most heavily fortified sections of coastline in California.

As has been reported previously to the Board, BEACON has requested funding from the California Division of Boating and Waterways for a beach nourishment project to help mitigate impacts of infrastructure encroachment along Rincon Parkway beaches. The Rincon Parkway Nourishment Project would place approximately 400,000 CY of beach quality sand at Hobson Beach, located just down coast from Sea Cliff. Nourishment sand would come from the Ventura Harbor sand trap, and it was anticipated that excavation of the sand would be accomplished by the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) by incorporating the project within the Port District's annual federal maintenance dredging program.

Initial funding in the amount of \$2.1 M for the Rincon Parkway Nourishment Project was included in the approved State Budget for FY2014/15. It is the intent of the Division of Boating and Waterways to include an additional \$2.7M in the State Budget for FY2015/16. An agreement between The California Division of Boating and Waterways and BEACON is under preparation The Division of Boating and Waterways requires a local match of 15%. BEACON does not currently have the funds for the match, so staff is pursuing grant opportunities.

BEACON have met with representatives of Ventura Harbor to discuss the proposed project and to seek their support in coordinating the effort with the USCOE's annual harbor dredging. They indicated they were generally supportive of the effort provided it didn't reduce the total amount of sand removed from the harbor or interfere with normal timing of the annual dredging. In addition, in December 2014 BEACON staff met with USACE staff at their LA District offices to discuss the concept of a joint dredging effort to support the proposed BEACON project. During the meeting, various options were discussed and potential obstacles to proceed identified. Following the meeting, BEACON staff and the Executive Director met and the following options were formulated along with their associated benefits and risks.

DISCUSSION:

Background

BEACON's Coastal Regional Sediment Management Plan (CRSMP) was adopted by the Board in January 2009. The CRSMP identifies policy, strategy and capital projects between Point Conception and Point Mugu. The Plan's recommendations at the time of preparation were comprehensive and established the foundation of a BEACON implementation plan for the next twenty years. However, due to the uncertainty of data at the time, the Plan did not take into account Sea Level Rise and Storm inundation. In 2010 BEACON approved a Programmatic Environmental Impact Report (EIR) on the recommended capital projects in the CRSMP. The approved Programmatic EIR will help BEACON secure future grant funding for capital projects and establishes a basis for future project specific environmental reviews. BEACON staff has also been preparing a BEACON Strategic Plan. The Strategic Plan takes the recommendations of the CRSMP, expands on the scope, duration and cost of each activity or project, evaluates funding options, prioritizes the activities and projects and ultimately defines an implementation strategy in terms of schedule, funding and alliances. Finalization of the Strategic Plan and presentation to the Board has been delayed while the issues of Seal Level Rise and Coastal Resilience are considered.

Seal Level Rise and Coastal Resilience

Ventura County sponsored the preparation of a Sea Level Rise and Storm Inundation Model in 2013 and the County of Santa Barbara anticipates completion of a similar model for its southern coastline by spring 2015. Once the Santa Barbara model is complete, coastal and storm impact flooding inundation data available for use from Point Conception to Point Mugu.

I. SCOPE OF WORK.

- A. SCOPE OF WORK: Contractor shall review the adopted BEACON Coastal Regional Sediment Management Plan (CRSMP) and recommend strategies on how to amend the Plan to address Coastal Resilience and Sea Level Rise and ensure maximum and achievable benefit; and, prepare a Project Description for use in securing grant funding for the technical and management effort required for the Amendment. ("Services").
- B. Contractor will be responsible for all aspects of this assignment, including collecting, organizing and presenting the data. Contractor shall produce one hardcopy summary spreadsheet, an electronic file copy, and attend one meeting to present the data and information.
 - C. CONTRACT PERIOD: December 1, 2014 March 1, 2015.

II. COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES

- A. FEES: As compensation for Contractor's work as defined in I.A. above, Client shall pay Contractor \$3,500.00 for Contractor's time and expenses related to completing this Agreement. The Contractor shall not exceed this amount and these funds shall cover all direct and indirect expenses and Contractor's time during the Contract Period. Client shall pay Contractor a retainer of \$1,750.00 upon execution of this Agreement, which shall be credited toward the completion of this project.
- B. EXPENSES: Client shall reimburse Contractor for expenses related to the performance of services described in this Agreement. The Client shall approve any changes to the approved budget.
- C. BILLING: Contractor will submit an invoice to Client not more than monthly and will be reimbursed within 30 days of Client's receipt.

III. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR; TAXES

A. NOT AN EMPLOYEE: Regardless of any functional title or work description, Contractor is an independent contractor and not an employee of Client. If Client decides to hire the Contractor as an employee at some future date, the fee set forth in this Agreement does not set a precedent for a regular salary figure. If applicable, any regular future salary would be negotiated upon date of hire.

- B. NO BENEFITS: Contractor shall not be eligible for any of the benefits paid to employees of Client, including but not limited to workers' compensation and health insurance. Contractor shall provide evidence of insurance prior to starting this assignment.
- C. TAXES: Contractor agrees to be responsible for any and all filing of payment of taxes applicable to its performance of services under this Contract, including the Services, and for compliance with any and all provisions requirements arising under the tax law(s) of the State of California. No federal, state or local income tax, or any payroll tax of any kind shall be withheld or paid by Client on behalf of Contractor.

IV. LIABILITY; INDEMNIFICATION

- A. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY: Neither Client nor any of its agents, employees, representatives, directors or officers shall be liable for any personal injury to or death of Contractor or Contractor's agents, representatives or subcontractors, however caused, or any damage to or loss of property of Contractor, however caused.
- B. PERMISSION TO USE INFORMATION: Client represents and warrants that to its knowledge, all data, information and documents furnished by it or its partners to Contractor for purposes of performing the Services ("Information") are accurate, and Client grants Contractor and its representatives permission to use the Information as is necessary to the performance of the Services.
- C. INDEMNIFICATION: Client agrees to indemnify, protect, defend and hold Contractor and its representatives harmless from all claims, demands, suits or actions which may be asserted by any third party against Contractor for any kind of liability, including without limitation, damage or injury to property or persons, and incidental and consequential damages sustained by any third party because of the use by Contractor of Information for purposes of performing the Services, provided that Contractor promptly notifies Client of any such claim, demand, suit or action in writing and tenders to Client the opportunity to settle such claim, demand, suit or action at Client's expense and cooperates with Client in settling such claim, demand, suit or action. Client agrees to indemnify Contractor for any reasonable attorney's fees or other costs incurs in defending against such actions.

V. <u>CANCELLATION</u>

Either party may terminate this Agreement upon 15 days written notification to the address listed above without penalty.

VI. <u>OTHER</u>

- A. ASSIGNMENT: Contractor shall not assign, encumber or otherwise transfer this Agreement or any rights granted hereunder without the prior written consent of Client, which consent Client may withhold for any reason.
- B. ENTIRE AGREEMENT: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and shall insure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the parties, their respective successors and permitted assigns.

- C. AMENDMENT; WAIVER: This Agreement may be amended, modified or supplemented only written instrument signed by both parties. The failure of any party to exercise any right or option given to it by this Agreement or to insist upon strict adherence to the terms of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any terms or conditions of this Agreement with respect to any other or subsequent breach.
- D. ARBITRATION: The parties agree that any dispute regarding the terms of this Agreement, the performance of any party hereunder, or any other matter related hereto shall be resolved by binding arbitration to be held in San Francisco, California under the auspices and pursuant to the applicable rules of the American Arbitration Association.

With the available Seal Level Rise and Storm Inundation Models for the two counties, BEACON staff is recommending a full assessment and ultimately an Amendment of the approved BEACON CRSMP. The main objectives of this effort will be to:
