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#### SUMMARY

The California Department of Social Services' (CDSS) Child and Youth Permanency Branch issued All County Information Notice I-63-04, dated September 7, 2004, to administer the annual Resource Family Recruitment, Training and Retention Survey. The survey asked for information on county accomplishments in State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2003/2004, July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004. Information is summarized in this report and, for some survey questions, comparisons to last year's data are provided. The data are displayed statewide and regionally.

Data was reported by 50 counties that conducted recruitment, training and retention activities for resource families in SFY 2003/2004. Seven counties utilized Foster Family Agencies (FFA) to conduct activities related to resource families and therefore did not submit data. A FFA is an organization engaged in recruiting, certifying, training and providing professional support to foster parents or finding homes or other locations for temporary or permanent placement of children who require that level of care as an alternative to group home care. One county did not return a survey, but all eight counties are located in one region; the North/Mountain Region (see Appendix A for a description of the regions and statewide data disposition).

#### EXPENDITURES/FUNDING SOURCES

- During SFY 2003/2004, expenditures of \$16,106,276 were reported by the 50 counties that conducted recruitment, training and retention of resource families. This fiscal data was reported by these counties and are not vetted by CDSS. This represents a decrease of 15.2 percent from the previous year's expenditures of \$18,982,629 for 51 counties conducting recruitment, training and retention activities.
- The types of funding sources most utilized by counties were Specialized Care Incentive and Assistance Program (SCIAP) at 28.1 percent of the total funds expended, Assembly Bill (AB) 2129 at 21.1 percent, and Options for Recovery (OFR) at 19.2 percent. These three funds remain the most utilized funds as cited last year.
- A total of \$629,485 in Kinship Emergency Funds was expended in 41 counties for 1,226 resource families. This is a 26.0 percent increase over the \$499,579 expended by 31 counties for 1,057 families reported last year.

 Thirty-five counties financially sponsored 18,109 resource families to attend resource family recruitment, training and retention events. This represents an 11.3 percent increase over the number of families financially sponsored last year by 37 counties.

#### **RESOURCE FAMILY RECRUITMENT**

#### **Staff Resources**

- Statewide 352 staff were designated to the recruitment of resource families. County Staff comprised 76.4 percent, Volunteer Staff 12.5 percent, and Contract Staff 11.1 percent. This is a 10.9 percent decrease from last year's staff total of 395.
- The most frequently utilized job types represented by the staff were Management/Supervisor (13.3 percent), Licensing Social Worker (12.9 percent), and Clerical Worker (11.9 percent). These three job types remain the same as those most frequently utilized last year.
- Forty-three counties had bilingual staff dedicated to resource family recruitment. All these counties had staff fluent in Spanish.

#### **Recruitment Efforts**

- The one common method utilized by all 50 counties to recruit resource families was Other Resource Families and/or Friends. This recruitment method was considered effective by 94.0 percent of these counties.
- Additional recruitment methods most frequently utilized by counties to recruit resource families were Word of Mouth and Brochures. The Word of Mouth method was utilized by 98.0 percent of the counties and was considered effective by 91.8 percent of these counties. Brochures were utilized by 94.0 percent of the counties and were considered effective by 74.5 percent of these counties.
- The recruitment method considered least effective was Event Booths. Event booths were utilized by 88.0 percent of the counties and were considered least effective by 50.0 percent of these counties.
- Twenty counties operated a toll-free telephone line to receive calls from prospective resource families.

#### **Specialized Recruitment**

 Of the 50 counties, 36 conducted specialized recruitment for potential resource families for placement of children of specific age groups and/or needs (e.g., physical, psychological or learning disabilities or substance abuse).

#### PLACEMENT AVAILABILITY

- Youth, ages 16 to 18, were considered by 96.0 percent of the counties to be the most difficult age group to place with resource families. This was followed by adolescents, ages 13 to 15, cited by 92.0 percent of the counties.
- Infants, birth to 5 years of age, were considered by 93.9 percent of the counties to be the least difficult to place with resource families. This was followed by children, ages 6 to 12, cited by 66.0 percent of the counties.
- Adolescents and youth with psychological/mental disabilities or substance abuse were considered the most difficult children with specific needs to place with resource families by 98.0 percent of the counties.
- Infants born substance exposed were considered to be the least difficult children with specific needs to place with resource families by 62.5 percent of the counties.
- Statewide there were 1,885 licensed resource families that no longer accepted placements.
- The counties indicated the most frequently cited reasons licensed resource families were no longer available for placements were Adoption of a Child (30.9 percent), No Longer Interested/Personal Reasons (19.6 percent), and Moved out of County/State (17.5 percent).
- There were 663 licensed resource families statewide that did not receive placements from the county based on the county's decision not to place any children with the family.
- The most frequently cited (66.2 percent) reason licensed resource families statewide did not receive placements based on county determination was Administrative Decision, which includes child safety and well being issues.

#### **RESOURCE FAMILY TRAINING AND SUPPORT**

- Twenty-five counties provided training hours above the statutorily-required 12 hours of pre-service training to resource families. The statewide median number of pre-service hours provided above that statutorily-required was 15 hours.
- Thirty-four counties provided training hours above the statutorily-required 8 hours of post-service training to resource families. The statewide median number of post-service hours provided above that statutorily-required was 12 hours.
- Twenty-one counties designated 64 staff, representing 4,764 total staff hours, to recruit providers to conduct pre-service and/or post-service training for resource families. This is a 42.4 percent decrease in designated staff hours from last year, with 21 counties and 68 staff reporting 8,271 hours.
- Child care was available to resource families attending pre-service and post-service training in 25 counties. A total of 1,119 families received services.
- The most frequently utilized funding sources for child care were County Only Funds at 24.0 percent and County Welfare Services Allocation and Resource Family Volunteers, both at 20.0 percent.
- Respite care was provided to 2,139 resource families in 34 counties. SCIAP continues to be the major funding source for respite care.

#### **COUNTY GOALS FOR RESOURCE FAMILY RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION**

- Goals were in place in 45 counties to measure the success of resource family recruitment efforts. These goals resulted in increased recruitment in 32 of these counties.
- The most frequently cited activities or goals to improve recruitment were Expand Community Outreach and Media Usage, Establish Recruitment Campaigns, and Create Resource Family Database. These recruitment activities/goals remain the same as those most frequently cited last year.
- Goals were in place in 46 counties to measure the success of resource family retention efforts. These goals resulted in increased retention in 38 of these counties.


 The most frequently cited activities or goals to improve retention were Establish Resource Family Appreciation Events, Establish Resource Family Support Groups, Conduct Advisory Board Meetings to Resolve Issues, and Create Resource Family Centers. In general, these retention activities/goals remain the same as those most frequently cited last year.

### RESOURCES TO ENHANCE RESOURCE FAMILY RECRUITMENT, TRAINING AND RETENTION

- Twenty-three counties had a resource family mentoring program, with 181 resource family mentors.
- All 50 counties collaborated with resource family organizations and colleges to improve recruitment, training and retention. Conduct Advisory Meetings with Community Colleges was the most frequently cited method of collaboration reported by 84.0 percent of the counties. This method was also cited as most frequently utilized last year.



# Funding Sources for Resource Family Recruitment, Training and Retention





#### Resource Family Recruitment, Training and Retention Annual Report State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2003/2004






# **Placement Availability**





# County Goals for Resource Family Recruitment and Retention


