ISSUE:

APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF CAPITOL RACING LLC AT CAL EXPO MARCH 5, 2004 THROUGH JULY 31, 2004.

Capitol Racing LLC filed its application to conduct a harness horse racing meeting at Cal Expo:

 March 5 through July 31, 2004. The association proposes to race 82 nights with 1,032 races, or 12.6 races per night.

- Track safety requirements have been fulfilled.
- Wagering program will use CHRB rules and the ARCI daily double.
 - Early wagering 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. before each night of racing.
 - Request a \$1 select four to begin on races 2 and 6 and race 10 if at least 13 races are carded, and a \$1 superfecta in any race that meets CHRB requirements.

- Simulcasting conducted with out-of-state racing jurisdictions pursuant to Business and Professions Code Section 19602; and with authorized locations throughout California.
- Inspection of backstretch worker housing completed.
- On May 12, 2003, the Board issued Statement of Issues (Nos: L-20000070187 & L-20000070190) dealing with the simulcast signals between Los Alamitos and Capitol Racing. Among other matters, the decision settled the issue of the payment of impact fees for the reciprocal simulcasts between the two racing associations. Essentially, the decision provided a formula for determining the impact fees that each association would pay each other for the simulcast signal. When the appropriate calculations were made the net result was that Capitol Racing owed Los Alamitos \$3.3 million dollars for the period April 2000 through July 2003. As evidenced by the attached letters, Capitol Racing has not complied with the Board's order as of this date.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff does not recommend approval of the application at this time.

STAFF ANALYSIS JOCKEYS' HEALTH AND WELFARE PROGRAM

REGULAR BOARD MEETING JANUARY 22, 2004

Background:

Section 19612.9 of the Horse Racing Law provides for a health and welfare program for California jockeys and their dependents funded by uncashed refund tickets. The Jockeys' Guild was certified by the Board as the organization to provide those services because it was determined that they represented the majority of the licensed California jockeys as required by the law.

The Jockeys' Guild established a trust account to administer the health and welfare funds pursuant to their agreement with the TOC. In 2002 the Guild began a self-insurance program for health, dental, and vision for all jockeys nationwide. The California jockeys were included in this national program. The audited costs for the program relative to the California jockeys is included in this package. The program began in 1997 with an initial transfer of \$450,000 in unclaimed refunds to the trust and has continued each year with an inflation-adjusted contribution to the program. In 2002, the Board approved a transfer of \$884,235 in uncashed refunds to the trust account. The latest data from the Guild indicates that approximately 100 California jockeys and their dependents are included in the Guild's current insurance program.

As indicated above, the law allows the Board to determine if an inflation adjustment is appropriate with each year's transfer. Since the program's inception, the Board has used the State of California's CalPERS premiums increases as the benchmark for annual adjustment to the Jockey's health care costs. In 2003, CalPERS costs increased an average of 12% (prior years have seen increases of 6.5%, 9.5%, 12.5%, 15%, and 25% in that order). The Guild has experienced similar increases and is requesting an inflation adjustment of 15% this year.

An increase of 15% over last year's allocation would mean that \$1,016,870 would be transferred to the Trust this year. If the Board approves this amount (or other amount deemed appropriate by the Board), then staff will notify the racing associations to transfer their prorata share of the funds to the trust account.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board hear from the representatives of the Guild and other interested parties with regard to the health and welfare program for California jockeys.

JOCKEYS' GUILD, INC. NOTES TO THE SCHEDULE OF CALIFORNIA JOCKEYS' HEALTH AND WELFARE COSTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2002

Note 1-Organization and General

The Schedule of California Jockeys' Health and Welfare Costs has been prepared pursuant to the three-year agreement dated January 2000 (the Agreement) between the Jockeys' Guild, Inc. (the Guild) and the Thoroughbred Owners of California, Inc. (the TOC) effective July 1, 2000 to implement the provisions of California Business and Professions Code 19612.9 (the Statute). The Statute was adopted to provide health and welfare benefits to California-licensed jockeys, former California-licensed jockeys and their dependents (California Jockeys). The California Horse Racing Board is responsible for overseeing the Statute and has approved the Agreement and certified TOC and the Guild as the appropriate responsible parties as described below.

Pursuant to the Statute, certain amounts shall be distributed to the organization that is responsible for negotiating purse agreements on behalf of the horsemen participating in the racing meeting (the TOC) for the purpose of negotiating an agreement with the responsible jockeys' organization (the Guild) to provide health and welfare benefits to California Jockeys. The amount of money distributed annually to the Guild, shall be held in trust and shall not exceed \$ 450,000, adjusted annually for inflation. Effective July 1, 2000, the Guild entered into a new agreement with TOC which increases the amount of money distributed annually to \$ 525,740, adjusted annually for inflation. This agreement shall be in effect through June 30, 2003. The Guild has established a trust known as the Jockeys' Guild, Inc. Health and Welfare Fund (the Trust) for the purpose of holding and expending all monies distributed pursuant to the Statute.

The Guild has developed reasonable and nondiscriminatory criteria for eligibility for the health and welfare benefits. California Jockeys who are not members of the Guild shall become and remain eligible for health and welfare benefits available for California Jockeys who are members of the Guild. To be eligible (Eligible California Jockey) for benefits, a California Jockey must ride at least 100 mounts in legal pari-mutuel races per year and at least 50 of said mounts must be in the State of California. Non-Guild members are required to pay a premium to be eligible to participate in the Guild's health and welfare benefit plans, which is equivalent to the minimum required to be paid by California Guild members to participate in these plans. The premiums paid by non-Guild members are used by the Guild to offset the costs of providing health and welfare benefits. The Guild has determined that for the year ended December 31, 2002, there were 99 Eligible California Jockeys. This amount was used to calculate health and welfare costs for the year ended December 31, 2002.

Note 2-Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Use of Estimates

The preparation of this schedule in conformity with the terms of the Agreement requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported costs and disclosures during the reporting period of the schedule. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Note 2-Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Basis of Accounting

The costs included on the Schedule of California Jockeys' Health and Welfare Costs were recorded using the accrual basis of accounting.

Health, Dental and Vision Self Insurance Costs

These costs include the respective amount of health insurance premiums and costs from the insurance policy administered through P5 E. Health Services Inc. These costs also include eligible costs to be reimbursed to eligible participants participating in the Guild self insurance program. The amount for eligible health care benefit costs has been computed for the Eligible California Jockeys.

Life Insurance Costs

These costs include life insurance premiums to Metropolitan Life Insurance Company for the Eligible California Jockeys.

Disabled, Injured and Other Health and Welfare Costs

These costs include special charges for aid provided to temporarily injured Eligible California Jockeys and jockeys injured in the state of California. Additionally, financial and medical aid costs for permanently disabled jockeys have been included.

Administrative Costs

The Guild staff performs various tasks to administer the benefits available to Eligible California Jockeys and the costs charged to the Trust include various direct and allocated overhead and administrative expenses of the health and welfare program costs incurred by the Guild. The allocations are based on the percentage of Eligible California Jockeys to total active Guild members and participating non-members, as well as specific fees and expenses, where applicable. The Guild has limited its request for reimbursement for administration costs to 10% of the applicable insurance costs less participants' contribution. This is less than the 20% allowed.

Health and Welfare Contributions from Participants

Represents the reimbursement of the cost of health insurance premiums incurred by eligible participants who participate in the Guild self insurance program. The Guild estimates the monthly cost of health insurance premiums for eligible participants as follows:

With dependent	\$696.34 per month
Family	\$925.65 per month


Background:




