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PROCEEDINGS of the Regular meeting of the **California Horse Racing Board** held at the **Golden Gate Fields Race Track**, 1100 Eastshore Highway, Albany, California, on **March 25, 2004**

MINUTES

Chairman Harris asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Board Meeting of February 19, 2004. Commissioner Moretti **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Bianco **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**. Chairman Harris asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Board meeting of January 22, 2004. Commissioner Bianco **motioned** to approve the minutes of the Regular Board meeting of January 22, 2004. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE **REQUEST OF THE CALIFORNIA THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN'S FOUNDATION, INC., TO APPROVE THE NOMINATION OF TWO NEW DIRECTORS TO ITS BOARD**.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said under Board Rule 2049, Designation and Approval of Horsemen's Welfare Fund, the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation (CTHF) was required to seek Board approval of persons nominated to its board. Mr. Reagan stated the CTHF was asking approval of two nominees to its board: Robert Bean, a licensed thoroughbred trainer, and Jerry Forrester, a licensed thoroughbred owner. Approval of the prospective board members would bring the CTHF board to the minimum number required under Rule 2049, plus one. Mr. Reagan stated staff recommended approval of the request. Chairman Harris asked if there was a process to select and nominate qualified CTHF board members. Mr. Reagan said the primary qualification was that one was willing to volunteer and give their time. He stated it was difficult to find persons who would devote a significant amount of their time to the duties of a CTHF board member. Existing CTHF board members, who were familiar with the nominee, usually made nominations. Commissioner Moretti **motioned** to approve the nomination of two new board members as requested by the CTHF. Commissioner Bianco **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

REPORT ON THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) HANDLE FOR 2003 WITH UPDATES FOR RACING MEETINGS IN 2004.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said there were dramatic increases in advance deposit wagering (ADW) during its second year. He stated that by the end of 2004 the total ADW handle could reach \$350 to \$400 million. Mr. Reagan said in 2003 ADW generated \$14 million for purses; \$14 million in commissions; and \$14 million in hub fees. The ADW market share increased for TVG and YouBet, while XpressBet lost some ground. Vice-Chairman Licht said YouBet offered high quality California product, so its market share increase was understandable. He commented XpressBet wanted to increase its television access, but was not succeeding. Chairman Harris asked if some of the ADW fees went to fairs with satellite wagering. Mr. Reagan said

within the total distribution of the ADW handle there was a 2 percent deduction that went into a fund which was shared with all the California satellite wagering locations on a pro rata basis. The prior year's handle was used to calculate each satellite facilities pro rata share. Mr. Reagan said the shares were recalculated every year to account for changes simulcast operations. Ron Luniewski of XpressBet said outside of California, his organization was doing well. Mr. Luniewski said one of the reasons XpressBet was not doing well in California was that YouBet had all the content. That provided little incentive for racing fans to switch ADW services. Mr. Luniewski said he did not believe the statistics had much to do with Internet product functionality, as the four major national competitors had solid products. Vice-Chairman Licht asked why a fan that had to replenish his account would not instead move to a different ADW provider if they found their original provider no longer had first class races. Mr. Luniewski said he believed there was a trend where fans wagered on television content rather than quality. What ever was on television was what the fan would wager on. He stated there was a possibility California fans could end up wagering on New York races to the detriment their home state, however, he was stating a hypothesis rather fact. Chairman Harris asked if there were any studies done regarding ADW customer habits and preferences. Mr. Luniewski said he was sure the other ADW providers had conducted group and market studies. He stated XpressBet was going to conduct a study during the summer of 2004 to determine customer preferences. Chairman Harris said one issue was money transfer. He asked if XpressBet offered a feature that allowed transfer of money directly from a customer's checking account. Mr. Luniewski said XpressBet had an electronic fund transfer function that allowed transfers to and from a customer's checking account. He added the service was well publicized and was free. Vice Chairman Licht asked what XpressBet was doing to expand its television coverage. Mr. Luniewski said Horse Racing Television (HRTV) was launched in 2002. Since its inception, XpressBet spent a lot of money on the HRTV studio at Santa Anita and was currently attempting to sell distribution of its product. Mr. Luniewski stated achieving distribution was a complicated issue. Within the last two years the cable and satellite industry experienced a lot of upheaval. There were complications with mergers and direct purchases and some companies were in bankruptcy with executives facing criminal charges. Under such circumstances it was difficult to hold the industry's attention. Mr. Luniewski said an additional person had been added to the sales staff. The XpressBet sales staff spent all their time selling the service to regional cable companies, and one person worked on national sales. Chairman Harris asked if XpressBet could determine how many homes with HRTV access also had XpressBet accounts. Mr. Luniewski said there was no direct link, but XpressBet could look at HRTV distribution within a given market, and make comparisons with XpressBet accounts and wagering patterns within the same market. To make an exact determination, XpressBet would have to survey individuals within a given market to see

if they were watching HRTV and wagering. Commissioner Moss asked if XpressBet had a time limit regarding it efforts to expand its television distribution. Mr. Luniewski said XpressBet would take as much time as needed to increase its television distribution and grow the sport of horse racing. Tony Allevato, representing TVG, said his organization's ratings on the Fox Network were very high. The TVG production was often Fox's highest rated show for a given day in the Los Angeles market. Mr. Allevato stated if TVG did a "one" rating in Los Angeles, there were approximately a hundred thousand homes watching the program. He said TVG knew only 5,000 of those homes were wagering through TVG; however, TVG looked at that number as a positive due to the tremendous growth potential. TVG's goal was to induce those watching its production to wager, or go to the racetrack. TVG's programming was designed to create horse racing fans through entertainment and education. Mr. Allevato commented the creation of fans was one of the goals of ADW from its inception. Vice-Chairman Licht said TVG was successful in creating fans. He stated TVG had more Californians wagering on "third-class" racing than were wagering on XpressBet. He asked if TVG was showing growth in its Los Alamitos evening product. Mr. Allevato said there was a 30 percent growth with Los Alamitos. He agreed the power of television was one of the reasons TVG had its numbers. Fans were familiar with TVG; they liked TVG's announcers and style; and they were used to watching TVG, so they were loval. Mr. Allevato said to a large degree the product did control the gaming, but horse racing was a regional sport, and fans liked to wager on what they knew. Chairman Harris asked how TVG was doing with cable television. Mr. Allevato said TVG just announced a deal with Comcast that placed it in another 7 million homes by the end of 2004. TVG would also be introduced in some Los Angeles areas before the running of the Kentucky Derby. Chairman Harris asked what roadblocks TVG experienced when it approached a cable provider. Mr. Allevato said there were several obstacles, including educating cable providers regarding the gambling side of horse racing. He commented TVG had the advantage of working with TV Guide to achieve distribution. In addition, TVG's success with the Fox Network gave it something to show prospective distributors. Jeff True of Youbet.com (Youbet) said his organization believed fans were staying with the platform they knew and were comfortable with. Mr. True said Youbet operated in 39 states, so it had an understanding of how fans wagered - with or without content. If there was a change in content, Youbet was able to incite fans to wager at other racetracks that were either more profitable, or that fit the fan's wagering profile. This was accomplished with promotions, contests, events and advertising. Vice-Chairman Licht asked if Youbet knew what happened to its biggest players at Gulfstream. Mr. True said Youbet could only track its handle, and due to the comparable numbers, he was able to state Youbet moved many of those persons to Tampa Bay, Aqueduct and other eastern racetracks. Mr. True said Youbet found new customers primarily online by concentrating on persons who indulged in activities compatible with ADW. Over 40 percent of new clients were in the 21 to 39 year old age group, which meant Youbet was finding new fans. Chairman Harris asked what online venues gave Youbet its greatest success in attracting new clients. Mr. True said the online Daily Racing Form (DRF) was currently the most successful. He stated there were also a dozen other sites where Youbet advertised to attract a younger clientele. In addition, Youbet was starting to advertise in the financial arena to attract day traders. Mr. True stated Youbet was the primer online ADW service in the United States. Its customers wagered more, and had a higher per capita wager. Youbet was Ì.

constantly revising and updating its website to appeal to its customers. It had a breath of content, easy access to information, and ease of wagering. Mr. True added the issue of losing specific racetracks like Gulfstream did not result in many lost customers because Youbet had a quality product. Commissioner Moretti asked if the new, younger, patrons were interested in horse racing, or were they persons who liked to wager regardless of the product. Mr. True said some customers were new to horse racing; some came from other gambling locations. Ron Liccardo of the Pari-Mutuel Employees' Guild (Guild) said ADW promised more jobs in California, but had - so far- produced none. Vice-Chairman Licht asked how long Guild jobs were protected under the enabling legislation. Mr. Liccardo said the jobs were protected until July 2005, when the provision would be subject to a sunset clause. By July 2005, the Guild estimated it would lose around 20 jobs at Santa Anita; five or ten jobs at Hollywood Park, and seven to eight jobs at Golden Gate Fields. Mr. Allevato said TVG studios were based in Los Angeles and had almost 150 persons working at the network. Mr. Liccardo said when the Guild lent its support to ADW it was told jobs would be created at the racetrack for racetrack employees. Chairman Harris said ADW helped maintain a lot of jobs in the industry that might not have remained. Organized labor was an issue that was to be watched, but it was not to be the only beneficiary of ADW. Mr. True said Youbet did meet with organized labor regarding a call center; however, the costs associated with such an enterprise were prohibitive. Legislation to address the costs did not succeed, so Youbet proposed the three California ADWs create a call center were they all could employ mutual clerks. He said the idea had not yet come to fruition.

REPORT FROM XPRESSBET AND TOC ON THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) ISSUE.

Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated there was a dispute between TOC and XpressBet regarding rebate activities. Mr. Couto said TOC held meetings with XpressBet and Magna Entertainment Corporation to discuss the issues. The discussions included information regarding handle practices and wagering trends – without exposing client confidentiality or certain terms of contracts. Mr. Couto said the discussions were continuing. He hoped there would be an understanding for the future, and compensation for past activities. Mr. Couto stated the parties did not wish to discuss each of the issues in a public forum, as they were sensitive and subject to ongoing talks. He said XpressBet understood the seriousness of the conduct and the failure to disclose the facts.

DISCUSSION ON THE CURRENT RULE ON REBATES.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said Rule 1950.1, Rebates on Wagers, was adopted in 1996 due to concern in California regarding rebating in Nevada. Under Rule 1950.1, California racetracks and simulcast organizations were prohibited from entering into agreements with off-track wagering facilities that did not contain anti-rebate language. Mr. Reagan said staff reviewed contracts to ensure such prohibitions were included,

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and that both parties signed the documents. Every association conducting a meeting would contract with many off-track wagering facilities, so there were large numbers of contracts to monitor. Mr. Reagan said he had one staff person who spent as much as half his time working with simulcast coordinators, and double-checking the lists. Chairman Harris commented that despite the process, it seemed the result was an unworkable "do not ask, do not tell" situation as it was difficult to determine who was giving rebates, or to enforce infractions. Vice-Chairman Licht said the discussion regarding rebates was important. It looked like rebating was not going away, and the industry needed the players. He stated it was commonly believed wagering was content driven, but after testimony from the ADW providers, it appeared the quality of the Internet site, or the television production, combined with advertising and promotions, could move fans from one track to another or towards a breed they were not previously playing. Vice-Chairman Licht stated he was reluctant to lose the rebate handle and suggested such sites provided a needed service to the industry. He said when rebate facilities' rates were raised during the Santa Anita meeting, the offshore handle dropped dramatically. That indicated the big players were no longer wagering on California product. Chairman Harris said the industry was debating the value of rebates, and there were arguments for both sides. He stated he was concerned that rebates were like a narcotic that made one feel good at first, but would ultimately have an adverse effect. Rebates did not provide a level playing field for California fans, and though they were a fact of life that helped make the game work, there would be a price to pay. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said he agreed there was a debate

about rebating and whether it was fundamentally fair to the nature of the pari-mutuel racing industry. Regarding the impact of the Santa Anita meeting: Mr. Couto stated he did not know if the numbers reflected price, or a concerted action not to wager. He said the industry had rebaters who used the economic model in a way that withheld large components of handle to the detriment of the tracks and horsemen. Mr. Couto said the National Thoroughbred Racing Association (NTRA) formed a committee of horsemen and racetracks to investigate the impact of rebating on the industry. Rebating benefited some people, but it also allowed those who were simply machine players to move money from traditional players into and out of the system. Such players did not care about horse racing; they only wished to calculate where they could make money. Mr. Couto stated the industry's economic model would have to change, but there was currently not enough information to separate fact from fiction regarding proper pricing. Vice-Chairman Licht said his conclusions were not made without looking at the issue, or solely on the representations of rebaters. The rebate shops were not making wagers; it was fans, and they were wagering where they got a better rate. Chairman Harris said it appeared that the horsemen did, in effect, approve of industry practices, and there was obviously a lot of controversy regarding the benefit of rebating. However, at some point the industry needed to come to an agreement. Mr. Couto said previous experience demonstrated unilateral action was detrimental. He stated the TOC was not talking about a coordinated boycott or actions that would violate anti-trust laws, rather, an exchange of information that would educate fans regarding the impact of rebating. Mr. Couto said within the NTRA group there was a consensus that rebating was an economic model that, in the long term, did not work for the industry. He added the TOC board requested a study to assess the impact of rebating. The board was concerned rebating was not good for the industry, but it had not reached an official position. Chairman Harris commented the TOC could stop rebating if it wished. Mr. Couto agreed and added the tracks could stop the practice as well. He stated the industry complained to rebaters and tried to hold an open discussion, but learned that to cut them off unilaterally was detrimental to California horse racing. Sherwood Chillingworth of Oak Tree Racing Association (OTRA) said he attended a Thoroughbred Racing Associations meeting wherein a debate regarding rebates was conducted. He stated there was almost a unanimous agreement among the members that rebating had to stop. Mr. Chillingworth said a pragmatic example was when Tampa Bay Downs (TBD) shut out rebaters. Their handle dropped by 40 percent, but gradually returned to its average within one month, and within three months was up 18 percent. He stated TBD was an example of how tracks might show a temporary loss of handle. Chairman Harris asked if it was a misstatement to say that once racing fans were aware of rebating, they would be less like to wager in California. He said the NTRA determined there was approximately a 2 percent increase in takeout for fans that wagered in California because they were absorbing monies that were going offshore and not returning. If it became widespread knowledge, would tracks have to start rebating, or lower the takeout? Mr. Chillingworth said lowering the takeout would be difficult as California had one of the lowest takeouts in the nation. He stated the issue would have to be resolved in the near future as there were strong opinions on both

sides. California had to meet the competition, or eliminate it. John Van de Kamp of TOC said the issue of rebating and the rule that required contracts to preclude the practice had a little of the "emperor who had no clothes" about it, as rebating occured, and there were three major rebaters who were included in contracts before the Board. If one looked at the numbers, rebaters took a greater percentage of the handle than ADW providers, which made them an important part of the industry. Mr. Van de Kamp said most of the large wagers that change the odds at the last second were from rebaters. Meanwhile, there was a national debate regarding rebating, so there would be a lot of discussion in the near future. Vice-Chairman Licht commented the Board had not waived the rule. It required every contract to contain language that precluded rebates. Mr. Van de Kamp agreed the rule talked about contracts, however, the industry was aware rebates were occurring - despite the rule. Kirk Brooks of Racing and Gaming Services, Inc. (RGS) said he wondered how TOC came to its conclusions regarding rebates if it did not have all the information. He stated RGS attempted to contact TOC on many occasions to request information on the subject and had not received a response. Mr. Brooks said RGS would engage in dialogue any time with anyone regarding rebates, but it believed the facts needed to be authentic. He stated he would dispute the earlier anecdote regarding TBD as none of the rebating organizations mentioned had take its signal for five years. Vice-Chairman Licht asked what happened to Oaklawn Park's (OP) handle when it shut off rebate facilities. Mr. Brooks said OP did not shut out rebate facilities. It shut off so-called "cash receivers". He stated OP's handle was down 11.65 percent. Mr. Brooks said the industry needed to

look at its past to see the effect of cutting off rebate facilities. In each instance such actions resulted in lower handles and purses. He stated he did not see how the loss of income benefited California horsemen, and he would like to know how providing incentives for players to wager on California races was detrimental. Vice-Chairman Licht asked how Mr. Brooks would respond to the idea that rebating was bad for the industry because it took dollars out of the small on-track player's hands and put them into the pockets of the larger off-track players. Mr. Brooks said he did not think those with more skill should be prevented from wagering. If such persons were taking money from small on track players, it was because they were better handicappers. Mr. Brooks stated the horsemen and racetracks were in the business to get as much money as possible wagered. He added the seller did not dictate the price of the product; the consumer decided whether the price was right. Mr. Brooks said ADW providers claimed customers wagered more dollars because it was more convenient. If a fan was wagering \$100 once a week at the track, but ADW meant the same fan would wager \$500 a week at home, then more revenue was realized by the fan staving home. Would anyone in the industry not want that to happen? Mr. Brooks said the industry was revenue driven, and when discussing rebates, one should look at income and facts, not just rebates are rebates. He added rebates existed for a reason and were used in other industries. Mr. Chillingworth said the TBD anecdote was reported by the racetrack's general manager and was not disputed by representatives of rebate organizations who He subsequently learned those persons should have disputed the were present. statement. Mr. Chillingworth said Mr. Brooks might have had a valid point regarding

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increased revenues through ADW; however, ADW only attracted new players, it did not create fans. The commission of the NTRA and ADW was to generate younger players who went to live meetings. Mr. Chillingworth said he was not sure that happened. Chairman Harris asked if OTRA sold its signal to rebate facilities. Mr. Chillingworth said it did not. He added he did not think there was a causal relationship between OTRA's declining handle and shutting off rebate facilities. The handle had gone down in the past. In addition, the handle at subsequent thoroughbred meetings in Southern California was also down. Mr. Chillingworth added the reduction in handle was a trend that was evident since the Fairplex Park Pomona meeting. Mr. Couto said he agreed with Mr. Chillingworth regarding the downward trend in handle. He stated Hollywood Park and Santa Anita sent their signal to rebaters and their handle still declined over the last year. That implied the correlation between cutting off rebaters and a decline of handle was not necessarily there. Mr. Couto added RGS was supposed to be a private wagering network with between 100 and 120 players. However, RGS was indicating they were providing incentives for new fans through rebates. Mr. Couto stated the big players were leaving the tracks for rebate shops where the industry got much less income. He said those who offered rebates liked to talk about handle, but it was revenue that mattered. With the switch of big players to rebaters the industry was receiving roughly a fifth of what it would get, and the churn was no longer there to make up for lost revenues. Mr. Couto added RGS claimed it continually asked TOC for information based on its rebating report. He stated such requests for information were always accompanied by threats of an antitrust action against TOC, so it was not

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going to respond. Vice-Chairman Licht asked if Mr. Couto believed California players were placing wagers with rebate shops. Mr. Couto said he did. He stated most of the track managers could confirm his belief. TOC looked at five years worth of California's out-of-state handle. ADW was taking just over one percent of the out-of-state handle, and rebaters just two percent. In the five-year period ADW grew to seven percent and the rebaters grew to in excess of 13 percent. Chairman Harris said TOC had the right to stop rebating. He asked at what point would TOC make a decision regarding the issue. Mr. Couto said TOC believed the discussion was ongoing. He said the next step in the process was the NTRA committee.

REPORT BY THE JOCKEYS' GUILD ON THE PROPOSAL FOR JOCKEY WEIGHT ALLOWANCES.

Barry Broad, representing the Jockeys' Guild (Guild), said the scale of weights, how it functioned, and the need to change it, was a matter of critical health and safety to the Guild's members. Mr. Broad said the Guild was asking the Board to draft amendments to its regulations to conform to the Guild's suggestions. The proposed amendments could then be debated within the industry prior to final action by the Board. Mr. Broad stated the Guild's proposal was in several parts, and was designed to work as a whole; it would not work if it were partially implemented. The first part of the proposal mandated that every horse would carry ten pounds of riding gear (gear) from withers to rump. Mr. Broad stated the Guild had a list of gear to be included in the rule. The gear did not include equipment on the horse's head, tail or legs, the channel breast place or running martingale or any foul weather gear. He stated the weight of the equipment would be noted in the track program so the fans would be informed. Chairman Harris asked how the equipment would weigh out at ten pounds considering heavy saddles, light saddles and such things. Mr. Broad said the jockey would carry the ten pounds, and if it were off, weight would be added or subtracted. The gear would be weighed daily to verify it was ten pounds. The second part of the proposal was the actual weight limit. Jockeys would be weighed in the nude. If a weighing in robe were used, the weight of the robe would be subtracted. The Guild proposed the weight limit for a jockey riding an Arabian or Thoroughbred horse would be 118 pounds. For a jockey riding an Appaloosa, paint, quarter horse or mule, the weight would be 123 pounds. Mr. Broad said the proposal would eliminate incentives to tamper with critical safety equipment. No one would be ripping off the lining of a safety vests or helmets to make weight. Additionally, the proposal would not alter apprentice or other allowances. The third part of the Guild's proposal was the most critical for health and safety. Mr. Broad stated the majority of jockeys struggled to maintain their weight. Such practices as sitting in a sweatbox for hours at a time, taking diuretics, and self-induced vomiting, were common. Each choice went from bad to worse in terms of health effects. The Guild proposed that all jockeys licensed after the effective date of the regulation must maintain a body fat content of not less than five percent. Mr. Broad stated the reason for the five percent limit was that anything below was unhealthy, and the body actually started cannibalizing itself. While jockeys looked healthy and appeared to be perfect physical specimens, they were actually physically ill on a daily basis, year after year. The five percent body fat standard would keep jockeys healthy. Mr. Broad said inexpensive, easily used, technology was available to weigh body fat content. The technology was noninvasive and cost under a hundred dollars to use. Dr. David Seftel, track physician for Golden Gate Fields and Bay Meadows, spoke about his efforts, in conjunction with Magna Entertainment, to improve the standard of care for jockeys. Dr. Seftel listed the physical maladies that afflicted the jockey community. He noted the most difficult and the most expensive aspect was damage to kidneys. He stated kidney damage was a direct reflection of low body mass, consistent dehydration, and chronic malnutrition. The treatment of chronic kidney failure was the most expensive medical treatment of any disease, and the jockey community had ten times the national incidence. Dr. Seftel said the reason jockeys had He spoke about the so many medical problems was their nutritional status. methodology used to arrive at a minimum body fat standard for jockeys. The search involved looking at the standards set for other professional sports and determining which activities were analogous to jockeys. The review was the basis for the five percent body fat proposal. In conclusion, Dr. Seftel reviewed technology used to weigh body fat content. He stated the Guild proposed using a device that cost under one hundred dollars to purchase and was very accurate in measuring body fat content. Vice-Chairman Licht said there was no question that jockey safety was an important Full disclosure of the weights was also important, and should be redone. issue. Chairman Harris thanked the Guild for its presentation. He said the process of drafting a rule and soliciting industry comment could be started. Chris McCarron, a licensed jockey, said there were trainers who believed that more weight would be detrimental to 2

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the horse. He stated, however, there were many examples that demonstrated otherwise. Steeplechase horses raced until they were as old as eleven years. They traversed three and a half miles of difficult ground, including jumps, and they carried 160 pounds. In addition, Mr. McCarron said exercise riders weighed considerably more than jockeys and they rode racehorses daily. Mr. McCarron stated horses carrying considerably more weight than most often broke track records. He said the horse that broke Churchill down record carried 126 pounds, yet the same horse ran considerably slower in the races leading up to the Breeders' Cup. Mr. McCarron said the proposals would receive some opposition, and urged the Board to resist the temptation to keep the weights at their current level. He stated the changes were needed to improve the jockey's health, which, in turn, would improve their performance and the industry. Chairman Harris thanked Mr. McCarron for his testimony. He stated everyone involved needed to be heard, and encouraged the Guild to work with the industry.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE **REQUEST TO APPROVE THE NEW AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE THOROUGHBRED OWNERS OF CALIFORNIA AND THE JOCKEYS' GUILD** REGARDING THE HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS FOR CALIFORNIA JOCKEYS PURSUANT TO BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 19612.9.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and the Jockeys' Guild (Guild) signed a new agreement. Mr. Reagan said the agreement covered the next three years, and staff recommended the Board approve it. Vice-Chairman Licht Ì.

motioned to approve the agreement between TOC and the Guild. Commissioner Moretti seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION OF THE CURRENT STATUS OF NORTHERN CALIFORNIA RACING AND THE FUTURE AVAILABILITY OF RACETRACKS IN THE BAY AREA.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said the industry was interested in the status of Bay Meadows Race Track (BMRT). He stated the 2005 race dates would soon be discussed, and at that time Magna Entertainment Company (MEC) would present details on the issue. Terry Fancher of the Bay Meadows Land Company (BMLC) said his organization was formed in 1996 when Paine Webber purchased the racetrack. At that time, BMLC told the Board its long-term interests were in developing the land for other uses. BMLC also entered into an eight-year lease for BMRT with Patriot America Hospitality (PAH). After PAH experienced financial difficulties, BMLC started direct operation of BMRT. Ultimately, BMLC management bought BMRT and was engaged in a continuing effort to seek entitlements for alternative uses of the property. Mr. Fancher stated he did not know how long the entitlement process would take, but he would conservatively predict a period of three to five years. Mr. Fancher said BMRT was currently leased to MEC. If the lease was not renewed in 2004, BMLC was prepared, with an experienced management team, to operate a race meeting. He added the development entitlements being sought from San Mateo would entail a 20-year period. BMLC would not have to develop the land for 20 years, so there was the prospect the racetrack would exist for a long time. Mr. Fancher said, in the meantime, BMLC was supporting the racetrack slot machine initiative, and investing capital to upgrade of the facility. Vice-Chairman Licht asked if there was

anything that would stop another racing association from requesting the race dates traditionally awarded Bay Meadows to be run at Golden Gate Fields (GGF). Executive Director Roy Wood said the race dates could be run at GGF. Mr. Fancher said if BMLC could not reach an agreement with MEC, it would work through an operating team to continue running BMRT in 2005. BMLC had an agreement with MEC that prohibited it from taking steps to damage future racing at BMRT. Mr. Fancher said BMLC would view an effort by MEC to consolidate race dates at GGF as a violation of that agreement. Scott Daruty of MEC said his organization was committed to year-round live racing in Northern California. He stated MEC intended to negotiate in good faith with BMLC to continue operating the meeting at BMRT. Mr. Daruty said MEC believed at some point BMLC would be successful in obtaining its entitlements, so it was working on alternative arrangements. MEC bought land in Dixon, California, and was working to build an alternative venue if BMRT should cease to exist. Chairman Harris asked if MEC had a timeline for the Dixon facility. Mr. Daruty said there were a lot of variables that made predictions a challenge. He stated he believed there was still a two to three year entitlement process. Chris Corby of California Authority of Racing Fairs spoke about racing fairs in Northern California and their impact on the industry, and the communities in which they operated. Rick Pickering of Alameda County Fairgrounds, and Jim Moore of Sonoma County Fair, spoke about their facilities. Charles Daugherty of California Thoroughbred Trainers, and John Van de Kamp of Thoroughbred Owners of California, spoke about their organizations' commitment to live horse racing in Northern California.

STAFF REPORT ON THE FOLLOWING CONCLUDED RACE MEETINGS: A. CAPITOL RACING, LLC, AT SACRAMENTO FROM SEPTEMBER 26, 2003, THROUGH FEBRUARY 29, 2004.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said there was a significant increase in ADW wagering. He stated ADW wagering was expected to grow ten to 20 percent in 2004. The on-track handle at Capitol Racing was up, as was off-track wagering and ADW.

REPORT FROM THE PARI-MUTUEL OPERATIONS COMMITTEE.

Vice-Chairman Licht said the committee met on February 20, 2004. The committee heard a number of items. In addition, members of the public expressed dissatisfaction ,with the XpressBet product. Commissioner Landsburg also spoke about sharing the signal among all advance deposit wagering providers, and the public's right to see the product.

PRESENTATION OF CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD RESOLUTION TO ALAN LANDSBURG.

Chairman Harris said he was sorry to see Commissioner Landsburg leave the Board. He stated he respected Commissioner Landsburg for his leadership, vision and diplomacy, and was happy to know he would remain active within the industry as an interim member of the Thoroughbred Owners of California board. Executive Director Roy Wood, Jr., presented Commissioner Landsburg with a resolution from the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB). Commissioner Landsburg thanked the Board and CHRB staff for their recognition and support.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE MATTER OF CAPITOL RACING'S (LLC) FAILURE TO POST BOND WITH THE CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD.

Executive Director Roy Wood, Jr., said Capitol Racing (CR) posted a bond in the amount of one million dollars on April 22, 2004. Deputy Attorney General Derry Knight examined the bond and reported it was complete. Mr. Wood stated the

requirements of the agreement by CR to provide bond were complete, so no action needed to be taken on the item.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING FO THE SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY FAIR (F), FROM JUNE 16 THROUGH JUNE 27, 2004, INCLUSIVE.

Roy Minami, CHRB staff, said the San Joaquin County Fair (SJCF) proposed to run 10 days for a total of 104 races. Mr. Minami stated the first post time would be 12:45 p.m. daily and 3:15 p.m. Fridays. SJCF would use CHRB regulations for its wagering program. Mr. Minami said the horsemen's agreements were completed. The fire clearance and the name of the horseshoe inspector were missing from the application. Mr. Minami stated staff recommended approval of the application conditioned on receipt of any missing items noted in the analysis. Chairman Harris asked when horse racing began in Stockton. Forrest White of SJCF said horse racing began in Stockton in 1860. Pari-mutuel wagering on the horse races started in 1933 when California voters passed an initiative authorizing such wagering. Mr. White commented SJCF was the first racetrack in California to take advantage of the new law. Commissioner Moretti asked if the items missing from the application had been received. Mr. White said the fire inspection was scheduled for the first or second week in May. He stated SJCF was still looking for a horseshoe inspector. Commissioner Moretti motioned to approve the application to conduct a horse racing meeting at SJCF contingent on receipt of the items the analysis noted were missing. Commissioner Granzella seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR (F), FROM JUNE 30 THROUGH JULY 11, 2004, INCLUSIVE.

Roy Minami, CHRB staff, said the Alameda County Fair (ACF) proposed to run 11 days for a total of 120 races. Mr. Minami stated the first post time would be 12:15 p.m. ACF would use CHRB regulations for its wagering program. Mr. Minami said the horsemen's agreements were completed. The fire clearance and the name of the fitness veterinarian were missing from the application. Mr. Minami stated staff recommended approval of the application conditioned on receipt of any missing items noted in the analysis. Commissioner Sperry **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting of ACF contingent on receipt of the items the analysis noted were missing. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion. Chairman Harris said he understood ACF was the oldest racetrack in California. Rick Pickering of ACF said the facility was the oldest one-mile continually operating horse racing track in the United States. The racetrack dated to 1848 and was originally part of a Spanish land grant. The **motion was unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING BY YOUBET.COM, FROM JUNE 6, 2004 THROUGH JUNE 5, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said Youbet.com (Youbet) proposed to renew its license to conduct in-state advance deposit wagering (ADW). Mr. Reagan commented Youbet was planning to use their Woodland Hills facility to conduct live operator ADW wagering, but their intentions did not come to fruition. An agreement was subsequently

reached with Autotote to service some of Youbet's California ADW accounts through the Bay Meadows hub. Chairman Harris said he was under the impression an effort would be made to have all ADW license approvals due at the same time. Mr. Reagan said the three remaining ADW providers would submit applications at the end of the year. Youbet's license was presented in June 2003 and was approved at that time. He stated if the Board wished, it could extend Youbet's license to December 2004 and hear a new application with the other ADW providers. Victor Gallo of Youbet said his organization was asking for permission to open an alternate hub site in California. Youbet would maintain its current hub in Oregon, but from a business perspective thought it would be prudent to have an alternate site with an alternate provider. Commissioner Moretti asked how many jobs the alternate hub would generate. Mr. Gallo said Youbet was contracting with Autotote to run the hub and he did not see any personnel increases associated with the hub relocation, but there could be one or two additional employees hired. Commissioner Sperry motioned to approve the application for license to conduct ADW by Youbet from June 6, 2004, through December 31, 2004, inclusive. Commissioner Bianco seconded the motion. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said his organization endorsed Commissioner Sperry's motion. Ron Liccardo of Pari-mutuel Employees' Guild said his organization was opposed to the application. The motion was unanimously carried.

PRESENTATION BY TVG REGARDING THEIR UPDATED PROGRAMMING FOR TELEVISION COVERAGE OF HORSE RACING.

Tony Allevato of TVG said his organization's new season started with the opening of the current Hollywood Park meeting where TVG had daily on-track announcers, beginning with the first race. TVG was also braodcasting every day to five million homes on Fox Sportsnet 2. In addition, TVG continued to produce a guarter horse show, as well as a show for the Kentucky Derby (Derby) called "The Works". The Derby production would be broadcast by Fox Sportsnet to approximately 30 million homes in 2004. Mr. Allevato said TVG was continually looking for ways to improve its product. He stated TVG would do more features on jockeys and trainers, as well as more educational packages to bring new fans to the sport. As a demonstration of TVG's productions methods, Mr. Allevato played a short promotional video. Ryan O'Hara of TVG said from a programming prospective, TVG decided to invest more capital in its product. He stated television viewers and cable carriers expected more from sports networks. Mr. O'Hara said TVG was distributed to approximately 8 million homes in 2003, and was currently in 12.5 million homes. TVG was also distributed on Fox Sportsnet, and just announced EquiStar would begin offering the channel in its basic tier. The EquiStar contract would last beyond 2010 and could include an interactive-TV application in the future. TVG was working with Comcast and Direct TV to be included in their sports tier packages. That would result in national distribution of TVG - including non-wagering states. In the promotional arena, TVG would be on the cover of Television Guide Magazine for the first time. The issue would appear in Indiana, Kentucky, Los Angeles, and Cincinnati, and would

feature photographs of the Derby and horse racing. Concurrent with the cover, an article on the Derby would be in the magazine. The TV Guide Channel would also have a feature on horse racing, but as the channel targeted women, the show would talk about the fashions at the Derby and various celebrities who would be at the event. Vice-Chairman Licht commented if TVG promoted its offerings in non-wagering states it would also promote wagering. Mr. O'Hara said TVG had lobbying efforts in nonwagering states to see if it could introduce TVG wagering. He stated TVG also regarded itself as a sports network and wished to launch its product in every state. Vice-Chairman Licht asked if that meant there would be more "outside" advertising on TVG. Mr. O'Hara said he believed there would be more regular advertising on TVG. However, due to the nature of TVG's product, the ad-sales pitch was unique and a lot of blue-chip advertisers shied away from the wagering aspect. Chairman Harris asked which states - other than California - provided the greatest wagering revenues for TVG. Mr. O'Hara said Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio were good states. He said New York (NY) had a large market and TVG would like more exposure in that state, but there were issues with NY Off Track Betting.

REPORT FROM THE CALIFORNIA JOCKEYS ON THE FORMATION OF A RIDERS COMMITTEE AND THE PROGRESS IN WORKING WITH THE JOCKEYS' GUILD TO ACHIEVE THE TYPE OF HEALTH AND WELFARE PROGRAMS THAT THE CALIFORNIA RIDERS DESIRE.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said in January 2004 California jockeys raised issues regarding the Jockeys' Guild (Guild) health and welfare fund. In response Chairman Harris directed that a riders committee be formed to work with the Guild and report to

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the Board. Paul Atkinson of the jockeys' committee said the jockeys were working to find the best insurance for California jockeys. He said a network of hospitals familiar to jockeys had been identified and was being investigated. He stated the next teleconference between Northern and Southern jockeys would take place in early May 2004. Chairman Harris said he was happy to see the parties working together to come to a resolution. He stated he assumed part of the problem was the limited amount of funds. The parties would have to arrive at a plan that did the most with the funding available. Commissioner Bianco said he understood there was no money left in the unclaimed refund pool. Mr. Reagan said there was not a set amount of money in the pool year-to-year. In May of 2003, the last time the system was purged, there was fewer than one million dollars. In January 2004 one million dollars was allocated to the Guild's Health and Welfare fund. Commissioner Bianco asked if ADW represented a percentage of the decline in funds. Mr. Reagan said staff was watching the system to see if a steady trend or a pronounced reduction in the funds occurred. Chairman Harris asked how out-of-state wagers affected the fund. Mr. Reagan said any funds from outof-state wagers would go to the out-of-state jurisdiction. Vice-Chairman Licht asked where the interest in the ADW accounts was allocated. Mr. Reagan said the ADW providers calculated the interest on their 2003 account balances and provided it to the backstretch welfare fund. He commented not a lot of money was generated due to low interest rates.

REPORT OF THE RACE DATES COMMITTEE.

Commissioner Granzella said the Race Dates Committee met on April 8, 2004. She stated the purpose of the meeting was to hear industry proposals for the 2005 race year and begin committee work on the racing calendar. Commissioner Granzella said subsequent committee meetings would be held to refine the calendar, with the next meeting in June 2004 in Sacramento. The committee hoped to finalize the calendar by July or August 2004 so it could be presented to the full Board in Del Mar.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Albert Fiss of the Jockeys' Guild (Guild) stated his organization wrote a letter on behalf of California jockeys regarding the Board's decision to grant a stay of suspension to Patrick Valenzuela. Mr. Fiss said the jockeys made recommendations in their letter they hoped the Board would consider. In addition, they asked that the Board expedite Mr. Valenzuela's appeal. Deputy Attorney General Derry Knight said the issue was not on the agenda, so the Board could not discuss it, but it could be placed on a future agenda. Executive Director Roy Wood, Jr., said staff would attempt to expedite Mr. Valenzuela's appeal. He stated another party might conduct the hearing due to time frames involved with administrative law judges. Vice-Chairman Licht asked if a third party had standing to appeal the granting of the stay. Mr. Knight said a third party would not have standing. STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1615 SCALE OF WEIGHTS FOR AGE

Regular Board Meeting June 3, 2004

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 states jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings is vested in the California Horse Racing Board. B&P Code Section 19562 provides that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results will be conducted in this state. Board Rule 1615 provides a scale of weights for age that mandates the weight to be carried if the conditions for a race do not specify otherwise.

At the March 25, 2004, Regular Board Meeting the Jockeys' Guild (Guild) presented a proposal to amend jockey weight allowances. Guild representatives talked about the adverse health effects many jockeys suffer as a result of their constant efforts to lose weigh, and the need to change the scale of weights for reasons of health and safety. At the direction of the Board, and in cooperation with the Guild, staff drafted a proposed amendment to Rule 1615.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1615 sets new minimum weights for California jockeys by replacing the scale of weights for the age of the horse. The minimum weight for jockeys riding an Arabian or Thoroughbred horse weight would be 118 pounds. The minimum weight for jockeys riding Appaloosas, Paints, Quarter Horses or mules would be 123 pounds. In addition, the proposed amendment states every horse shall carry 10 pounds of riding gear from withers to rump; provides a definition of riding gear; and requires that the official program include a statement regarding such The proposed amendment also provides a definition of jockey weight. This gear. would be the weight of the jockey, nude, absent any riding gear or clothing, at the time of weighing out. In response to the Guild's concerns regarding the health effects of low jockey body fat content, the proposed amendment requires jockeys to maintain a body fat content of not less than 5%. If a jockey's body fat content falls below 5%, he will be placed on warning, and must meet the minimum requirement within three calendar days or be suspended from riding. A jockey whose body fat content measures below 4% shall be disgualified from riding in any race. Compliance with the body fat requirements is optional for jockeys licensed in the United States before December 31,

2003. In addition, the proposed amendment does not affect or alter apprentice allowances.

The proposed amendment to Rule 1615 affects rules 1616, Minimum Weights to Be Carried; 1684, Items Included in Weight; and 1420, Definitions. With the weight changes proposed in Rule 1615 provisions of rules 1616 and 1684 are rendered unnecessary and will therefore be deleted. Subsection (aa) of rule 1420 may also be stricken, as the rules would no longer address weights for age.

RECOMMENDATION

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Staff recommends the Board instruct staff to initiate the 45-day public comment period.

(a) Every horse shall carry 10 pounds of riding gear from withers to rump. "Riding gear" means any or all of the items listed below. It does not include equipment worn on the horse's head, tail, or legs; nor a channel, breastplate, or running martingale; nor foul-weather gear, which is any additional riding apparel a jockey chooses to wear due to inclement weather.

(b) The official program shall include the following notice: "In addition to the listed jockey weight, all horses carry 10 pounds of riding gear from withers to rump."

(c) <u>"Jockey weight" means the weight of the jockey, nude, absent any riding gear</u> or clothing, as recorded by the clerk of scales when the jockey weighs out. If the jockey uses a robe to weigh out, its weight shall be deducted to arrive at the nude weight.

(d) <u>The minimum jockey weight for a jockey riding an Arabian or Thoroughbred</u> horse is 118 pounds. The minimum jockey weight for a jockey riding an Appaloosa, <u>Paint, Quarter Horse or mule is 123 pounds.</u> (e) Nothing in this Rule shall affect or alter apprentice allowances.

(f) Jockeys shall maintain a minimum body fat content of not less than 5%. A Jockey whose body fat measures below 5% shall be placed on warning, and shall be suspended from riding if this minimum standard is not met within three calendar days of the date of the warning. A jockey whose body fat content measures below 4% of their total body mass shall be disqualified from riding in any race.

(g) Compliance with subsection (f) of this rule is optional for any jockey licensed in the United States before December 31, 2003.

CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD TITLE 4. CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS ARTICLE 2. DEFINITIONS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1420 Definitions

Regular Board Meeting June 3, 2004

1420. Definitions.

As used in these rules:

(a) "Chairman" means the member elected by the Board to be Chairman of the Board and its presiding member.

(b) "Commissioner" means a member of the Board.

(c) "Age of Horse" means the age as reckoned beginning on the first day of January of the year in which the horse was foaled.

(d) "Authorized Agent" means an agent appointed by a written document, which is signed by the owner and filed with the Board.

(e) "Breeder" means the owner of the dam at the time of foaling.

(f) "Conviction" includes a plea of guilty, forfeiture of bail, a judgment or verdict of guilty, or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere, whether or not the conviction is later set aside pursuant to the provisions of Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code.

(g) "Driver" means one who drives and controls the horse from a seated position on a two-wheel vehicle.

(h) "Horse" means an equine and includes a stallion, gelding, mare, colt, filly or ridgling and includes mule, jack, jenny, ginnet, and hinney.

(i) "Jockey" means a race rider.

(j) "Licensee" means a licensee of the California Horse Racing Board.

(k) "Maiden" means a horse which has never won a race on the flat in a state or country where the races are covered by the Daily Racing Form or other similar authorized publication. A maiden which has been disqualified after finishing first is still a maiden. Conditions referring to maidens apply to the status at the time of starting.

(1) "Nominator" means a person in whose name a horse is entered to race.

(m) "Objection" means a formal complaint filed before a race with the stewards or the Board objecting to the eligibility of any horse to compete in the race or the right of any person to participate in the race.

(n) "Owner" includes the owner, part owner and lessee of any horse. An interest only in the earnings of a horse does not constitute ownership. If husband and wife, it is presumed that joint ownership exists.

(o) "Post" means the place on the race course from which a start is made.

(p) "Post Time" means the definite time for the start of a race, and is indicated by a clock device set up as directed by the Board.

(q) "Premises" means the inclosure and all other areas collectively utilized by an association in connection with its conduct of a licensed race meeting, including parking lots, auxiliary stabling areas, public inclosure and restricted areas, whether or not the areas are adjacent to the inclosure.

(r) "Protest" means a formal complaint filed after a race with the stewards or the Board protesting the right of any horse to a place, purse or award in the race, or protesting any decision of the stewards relating to the eligibility, participation or placing of any horse in a race.

(s) "Race" means a contest among horses for a purse, stake or reward, contested at an authorized race meeting. "Race" includes but is not limited to:

(1) Purse Race. A race for money or any other prize to which the owners of the horses engaged do not contribute.

(2) Stake Race. A race for which owners of horses entered or engaged for the race contribute to a purse for which money or any other prize may be added, nominations to which close 72 hours or more before starting.

, (3) Claiming Race. A race in which any horse entered therein may be claimed in conformity with the rules established by the Board.

(4) Handicap Race. A race in which the weights to be carried by the entered horses are adjusted by a handicapper, board of handicappers or the racing secretary, to equalize their respective chances of winning.

(5) Overnight Race. A race in which entries close 72 hours or less, excluding Sundays, in advance of the first race of the day on which the race is to be run.

(6) Walkover. A stake race in which only one horse starts or in which all the starters are owned by the same interest.

(7) Invitational Stake Race. An invitational stake race or an invitational handicap race for which owners do not contribute to the purse, but which is advertised in the regular stakes program, shall also be considered a stake race. (8) Non-wagering Race. A race contested without pari-mutuel wagering on its results including a race upon which pari-mutuel wagering is canceled.

(9) Match Race. A race contested between two horses under conditions of the contest agreed to by their owners.

(10) "Special Racing Event". A race of unique interest, magnitude or fame. "Special racing event" shall also mean an exhibition race when approved by the Board.

(11) "Exhibition Race". A race contested under conditions established by the association as a promotional event or to provide a special racing opportunity to a particular horse or class of horse or class of participants and to which the association contributes the purse or awards for the contest. No pari-mutuel wagering may be conducted on the results of an exhibition race.

(t) "Race on the Flat" means a race run over a course on which no jumps or other obstacles are placed.

(u) "Recognized Meeting," "Race Meeting," or "Authorized Meeting" means the entire period under the conduct of an association within the inclosure of the designated grounds, and for which a license has been granted by the Board. When the context in the rules applies, it may include a meeting conducted by an association in some other jurisdiction recognized by the Board.

(v) "Restricted Area" means those areas within the inclosure where admission can be obtained only upon presentation of authorized credentials, proper license or visitor's pass, including those areas designated as the stable area, receiving or detention barn, jockey room, saddling paddock, race course and pari-mutuel department. (w) "Rules" means the Rules and Regulations of the California Horse Racing Board and the orders of the Board.

(x) "Starter" means a horse when it is in the starting gate stall, and, when the field is dispatched by the starter, the stall gate in front of the horse is opened.

(y) "Sulky" means a dual wheel racing vehicle with dual shafts not exceeding the height of the horses withers. Shafts must be hooked separately on each side.

(z) "Time of Race Meeting" means that period of time commencing at 12:01 A.M. on the first day of racing at a recognized meeting and concluding at 12:00 midnight after the final race of the last day of racing as allocated and licensed by the Board.

, (aa) "Weight for Age" means the standard weight to be carried by a horse according to the scale established by the rules, and remains such though there be penalties or allowances.

STAFF ANALYSIS RACE DATES ADJUSTMENT

REGULAR BOARD MEETING JUNE 3, 2004

Background:

In 2003 the Board allocated the Solano County Fair in Vallejo race dates in 2004. The dates were what the fair requested: 10 days from July 14 to July 25, 2004.

However, Del Mar will be running on Monday, July 26, 2004. Therefore, when preparing the application (the next agenda item) for its 2004 race meet, the Fair rethought its earlier choice of ending dates and decided that July 26 would be a better. Although this does add one day to the total number of race dates, staff agrees with this decision since it continues the coordination of live racing days between the northern and southern zones.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board allocate an additional day (7/26/04) to the Solano County Fair.

Allocated to race 12 days in 2004 and request a trial experiment that reduces live racing by one day, Monday August 30, and provides for a double-header Friday, August 27 with 17 races. Their satellite facility and all other northern California satellite facilities will be open to receive Del Mar's signal and imported out-of-state races. They propose to race 128 races, four races less than if they raced 12 days.







On behalf of the California Exposition & State Fair, I respectfully request an item be placed on the agenda of the June 2004 CHRB meeting.

We respectfully request the CHRB to reallocate the annual live racing dates for the California State Fair from 12 days to 11 days in 2004 for the inclusive period August 25 through September 6. We would like to reduce the amount of live racing days as a trial experiment.

We are requesting to race on Wednesday through Sunday, August 25 through August 29 and Wednesday through Monday, Labor Day, September 1 through 6. We are always dark on Tuesday, but this request would include another live racing dark day of Monday, August 30. Our satellite facility and all other northern California satellite facility would be open on Monday to receive the signal from Del Mar and imported out of state races.

In an effort to increase field size for the second week of racing, expose horseracing to an evening Sacramento audience, and provide a much needed two day break for support staff, we would not operate a live card on Monday, August 30 and would operate a "double header card" consisting of 17 races on our opening Friday, August 27. The first of nine races would occur at 1:00 PM and the last race post time would be approximately 4:45 PM. We would then take a break for about one hour and begin the evening card with 8 races at 6:00 PM and finish the card at approximately 9:05 PM. The break period would provide most of the support staff time to have dinner and relax before the evening program. We would provide entertainment and concessions promotions during the break to "keep" the on track crowd present. The Del Mar signal would also be shown on the Jumbotron during this period.

I have written and spoken to various parties within the industry and I have received some comments regarding this concept. I have not received any negative comments or opposition to this proposal. We will make whatever concessions necessary and within reason to ensure that all industry participants are in support of this concept.

For instance, in conversations with Mr. Charles Dougherty of the CTT, we have agreed to pay the trainers participating in the evening program a \$50 bonus per starter, provide a food chit redeemable at the backstretch café for grooms, and provide whatever round trip shuttles are necessary for those horsemen shipping in from Golden Gate Fields and Bay Meadows at our own expense.

This program, if approved, would reduce the amount of races we attempt to card every year from 132 to 128 as depicted in our license application. Total per race purse funds would remain the same.

Again, we are requesting the approval of this concept as an experiment for 2004. We understand there may be a negative economic impact for Cal Expo but we are willing to try different concepts to improve the quality of our program, increase field sizes, and expose the live product to new fans.

STAFF ANALYSIS RACE DATES ADJUSTMENT

REGULAR BOARD MEETING JUNE 3, 2004

Background:

In 2003, during the allocation of dates for 2004, the harness industry had proposed race dates at Stockton. At the last minute, the harness interests withdrew the Stockton portion of the proposed allocation. This left a fall meet at Cal Expo commencing October 7 and ending December 24, 2004. In preparing it application for those fall dates, Capitol Racing, LLC, worked with Cal Expo and has come up with an alternate plan. They propose to begin the fall meet two weeks earlier on September 24. The first two weeks will have two days per week. These two weeks will not require any additional days to be allocated because Capitol will close their meet one week earlier than allocated (December 18 instead of December 24). The total number of nights of racing will remain the same – 45. Letters included with this item indicate that both Capitol Racing and Cal Expo are desirous of this change.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board approve the adjustment in the beginning and ending dates of Capitol Racing's fall meet.



STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION REGARDING WAGERING ACCOMODATIONS

REGULAR BOARD MEETING JUNE 3, 2004

Background:

As indicated in the attached letter, beginning in early May the management of Los Alamitos changed the wagering accommodations for those wishing to bet on simulcast harness races from Capitol Racing while attending the quarter horse meet at Los Alamitos. The management of Capitol Racing, LLC, and per their letter, the harness fans at Los Alamitos, do not appreciate those changes and requested that this item be placed on this agenda. Staff should note that the numbers used in the letter showing the decline in harness wagers at Los Al have been reviewed and found to be representative of the changes in the handle.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board hear from the interested parties on this matter.

Dear Mr. Wood:

As I indicated in my letter of May 7th, the management of Los Alamitos Race Course has, unilaterally, seriously curtailed the viewing and wagering opportunities on both live California harness races and those imported from Capitol Racing. In a blatant move to segregate the patrons who attend Los Alamitos Race Course and would like to watch and wager on harness races from Sacramento, these patrons are: being restricted to watching the harness races on only three regular-sized television sets, provided one or two mutuel windows and nine SAMs for wagering, and required to use facilities that are the poorest provided at Los Alamitos. Both Mr. Ben Kenney (President of CHHA) and Mr. Stephen Bieri (owner of Capitol Racing) witnessed the frustration of the harness fans attempting to place their wagers, even to the point that some of the fans were unable to place their bets on time and were "shut out", while numerous SAMs and several tellers were unused in an adjoining area, but were unavailable because the management of Los Alamitos had blocked their use for wagering on California harness races and its imports. In contrast, just a week ago, these same patrons had the "run of the facility" and could watch California harness races on TVs throughout the facility, place wagers unrestricted by location, and use the other amenities that are still offered to all other patrons of Los Alamitos. Watching and wagering on California harness racing and its imports is now even prohibited in the prestigious Vessel's Club.

Given the above treatment, it should come as no surprise that wagering at Los Alamitos on California harness races has taken a nosedive, as these patrons and fans of California harness racing have been purposefully disenfanchised. Capitol Racing has received numerous complaints from patrons of harness racing, including both fans and horse owners, who attend Los Alamitos Race Course expecting the same amenities that they have enjoyed for years, and that other patrons of Los Alamitos receive. These patrons believe that this is a deliberate effort by Los Alamitos to inconvenience and mistreat them to the point of frustration such that they will either cease to wager on the California harness product or stop coming to the racetrack altogether (see attached E-Mail). This "restricted area" policy is not only being used on nights when both harness and quarterhorses race, but also on Wednesday nights when the only racing in California is harness racing from Capitol Racing and its imports. The harness fans were so upset by this new treatment that they gathered over 125 signatures on petitions and turned them over to Mr. Mike Martin of the CHRB staff in Los Angeles, who personally handed them to you.

This intentional disenfranchising of harness fans at Los Alamitos has resulted in very major declines in the wagering on Capitol Racing's harness races at the Los Alamitos facility. In only one week under this new set up, the nightly handle at Los Alamitos on harness racing from Capitol Racing has evidenced the follow precipitous decline:

While these significant declines in handle on California harness races have had a negative impact on horsemen's purses, management's commissions and State license fees, Capitol Racing is most outraged by the uneven treatment of racing fans who want to watch and wager on California's harness product; both the harness fans that have been required to endure the inferior accommodations they have been restricted to, as well as the fans in the balance of the Los Alamitos facility that cannot view or wager on the California harness product in any convenient manner. *No satellite facility or racing breed can afford to offend any fan of horse racing in this day and age*. Clearly the fans of California harness racing are offended. The accommodations being extended to these patrons would not even qualify under the old Civil Rights doctrine of "Separate But Equal", which was discredited and discarded 50 years ago.

Accordingly, Capitol Racing requests that this issue of vital importance to California harness racing, its horsemen, and its fans be placed on the agenda for the upcoming June meeting of the California Horse Racing Board. The Board must weigh-in on critical matter in a timely manner.

Patrons are the life blood of the horse racing industry!
