#### APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF APRIL 11, 2013

Chairman Israel asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of April 11, 2013. Vice-Chairman Winner stated a correction was required on page 17; 'Vice Chairman Israel seconded' should be changed to 'Vice Chairman Winner seconded'. Vice Chairman Winner motioned to approve the minutes as amended. Commissioner Rosenberg seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

#### PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPROVAL OF SERVICE, STEWARD AND OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN CONTRACTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2013-2014.

Kirk Breed, CHRB Executive Director, stated getting approval of the steward and official veterinarian contracts was done every May in preparation for all of the contracts for the coming fiscal year. The contracts were provided in the Board package. Commissioner Beneto motioned

to approve the service, steward, and official veterinarian contracts for fiscal year 2013-2014. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REQUEST FROM NORTHERN CALIFORNIA OFF-TRACK WAGERING, INC. (NCOTWINC) TO CONTINUE THE MODIFICATION OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF MARKET ACCESS FEES FROM ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) AS PERMITTED UNDER BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 19604(F)(5)(E) FOR WAGERING CONDUCTED BY THOROUGHBRED ASSOCIATIONS IN THE NORTHERN ZONE.

Bryan Wayte, representing Northern California Off-Track Wagering Inc. (NCOTWINC), stated the agreement was for July 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013 and would reduce the additional deduction on Market Access fees derived from advanced deposit wagers (ADW) placed on all live and imported races hosted by the Pacific Racing Association at Golden Gate Fields (GGF) from 2.9 percent to 2.15 percent of total handle in the northern zone. It would also allow the rate deducted from brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone to revert from the modified 2.9 percent down to the minimum 2.5 percent. Chairman Israel asked what would happen on December 31, 2013. Mr. Wayte said NCOTWINC would reassess the expense fund and if a new agreement was needed it would be negotiated with GGF and the Thoroughbred Owners of California. Commissioner Rosenberg stated it was rare to see reductions in expenses. He asked how this was accomplished. Mr. Wayte stated the savings occurred on the labor side, mainly in the health and welfare costs. Commissioner Rosenberg motioned to approve to continue the modification of the distribution of market access fees from ADW as revised. Vice Chairman Winner seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

## DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REQUEST FROM GOLDEN GATE FIELDS TO ALLOW A JOCKEY TO WEAR PIVOTHEAD GLASSES DURING ONE DESIGNATED TURF RACE AT GOLDEN GATE FIELDS.

Joe Morris, representing Golden Gate Fields (GGF), stated a Pulitzer Prize winning writer at the New York Times had written an article on Russel Baze and they were preparing an accompanying video for NewYorkTimes.com. They had already shot video of Mr. Baze racing and wanted to include some first person point of view footage. Mr. Morris stated this was a great promotional opportunity. He said the Pivothead Glasses were safe and Paul Nicolo, CHRB Safety Steward at GGF, agreed. Chairman Israel stated the Pivothead glasses seemed to solve all of the previous safety issues the Board had with previous jockey mounted camera systems. Commissioner Derek encouraged the Board to approve the request. She said the video footage she has seen from the perspective of the jockey really demonstrated the excitement and power of the horses. Commissioner Derek motioned to approve to request from GGF to allow a jockey to wear Pivothead Glasses during one designated turf race at GGF. Chairman Israel seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

#### REPORT FROM THE MEDICATION AND TRACK SAFETY COMMITTEE.

Commissioner Derek stated the committee discussed moving toward a national uniformity in medication. California was ahead of most jurisdictions with authorized levels for permitted medications; however, it did not have established withdrawal times. Withdrawal times would state very clearly how long before a race to stop a specific medication, resulting in fewer positive blood tests. There was discussion to prohibit a horse from starting in a race if it has received an itra-articular injection of cortisone within seven days. Dr. Rick Arthur had referred to a study that showed such injections to be most effective seven to ten days before a race. Pennsylvania

and New York already had similar regulations in place and Commissioner Derek hoped California would have its own prohibition in place within approximately one year. Commissioner Derek said the committee began discussions on improving backside security. CHRB held meetings on this issue in 2003 and 2004, implementing many of the recommendations from these meetings; however, the major issues of detention barns and camera surveillance were not resolved. Kirk Breed, CHRB Executive Director, and Bill Westerman, CHRB Chief Investigator, were going to take a look at backside security and come up with more recommendations. At the 2003-2004 meetings there was consensus that cameras were the best solution. The preferred solution now may be an increase in security personnel with extensive horseracing experience, such as safety stewards Luis Juaregui and Paul Nicolo. Commissioner Derek stated the committee continued discussions on jockey and exercise rider injuries. In these discussions Dr. Pita Hitchens reported on a study of jockey and exercise rider accidents from 2007 to 2011. During this period there were 351 workers' compensation claims totaling \$17 million, more accidents in quarter horse racing than thoroughbred racing, and jockey injuries in 60 percent of falls from catastrophic horse injuries. The study also discovered the injury rate for exercise riders was surprisingly high. A great number of these accidents occur in the stable area where the roads were packed down hard. CHRB safety stewards would be meeting regularly with California Thoroughbred Trainers to discuss stable area safety as well as track safety. Commissioner Derek stated the committee discussed the possibility of assessing the qualifications of exercise riders and improving the licensing procedures to make certain the exercise riders were qualified to do their work. She said this issue was being turned over to the Jockey Welfare Committee, chaired by Vice Chairman Winner. Vice Chairman Winner stated the issue was not only important because of the jockey and horse injuries but also because of the expense to the industry. Some of the \$17 million spent on workman's compensation claims could be reduced, but only with industry cooperation. Vice Chairman Winner said he, Commissioner Derek, and Commissioner Krikorian took the opportunity to tour the Maddy Equine Laboratory at Davis. He said the lab not only served California but the industry worldwide as well. Because of the economic issues the committee was looking into ways to enhance the budget for the lab. Commissioner Derek stated the committee heard a presentation from Dr. Sue Stover who has studied the preexisting injuries found in 85 percent of catastrophic breakdowns and would soon have recommendations for prevention.

#### REPORT FROM THE EXCHANGE WAGERING AD HOC COMMITTEE.

Chairman Israel consolidated discussion of items seven, and eight.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED ADDITION OF THE FOLLOWING EXCHANGE WAGERING RULES AND THE PROPOSED REVISIONS TO THESE RULES MADE IN RESPONSE TO THE OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATIVE LAW'S (OAL) MARCH 20, 2013 DECISION OF DISAPPROVAL OF REGULATORY ACTION.

Chairman Israel stated the committee was successful in finding resolutions to all but one of the Office of Administrative Law's (OAL) issues with the exchange wagering regulations. He said Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, subsequently chaired a meeting with the potential stakeholders to solve the one remaining issue. Ms. Wagner stated she met with representatives from Global Betting Exchange, Twinspires, and Betfair to discuss proposed Rule 2086.5, which addressed the fee, and how the fee was to be collected. She said the total fee for a license to provide exchange wagering was \$500,000 per year, equally apportioned among the approved applicants, paid on a monthly basis, and expiring on June 30, end of the fiscal year. Ms. Wagner stated the Board would provide notification of any adjustments to the monthly assessment fees within seven days of an increase or decrease in the number of approved exchange wagering applicants. Vice Chairman Winner asked if one exchange wagering applicant started service on December 26. 2013 would they have to pay \$500,000 and then pay \$500,000 five days later. Ms. Wagner stated if there was one approved applicant they would be assessed \$41,667 for the first month. Vice Chairman asked what the assessment would be for a provider licensed in May. Ms. Wagner said they would be assessed the monthly amount for May then again for June, the last two months of the fiscal year, and then required to renew on July 1. Chairman Israel suggested a scenario where one applicant was approved in July and then a second applicant approved in October. He asked if the first applicant would pay three months at \$40,000 and then \$20,000 starting in October, splitting the full assessment with the second applicant. Ms. Wagner said that was correct. Chairman Israel stated some of the costs, like the initial software purchase, were spread over the whole year so the first company approved could potentially be overcharged. He asked would there be a credit for such an overcharge. Ms. Wagner stated there would be no such credits. Commissioner Choper asked if the startup costs were amortized over a given period or if they were all in the first month. Ms. Wagner stated there was not a specific amortization schedule; instead the estimated yearly assessment was equally divided into 12 months. Vice Chairman Winner said the first one in would pay the most. Chairman Rosenberg stated the first one paying the most was fair. Chairman Winner asked if Global Betting Exchange, Twinspires, and Betfair all agreed to this. Ms. Wagner stated that they had. Commissioner Choper said these companies knew what they were doing and there was an advantage to being the first one to provide exchange wagering. Chairman Israel said in the computer industry there has always been more of an advantage to being second. Commissioner Rosenberg stated worrying about fairness was not the Board's problem. If the parties involved already agreed to this arrangement, the Board's goal should focus on keeping the budget sound. Chairman Israel and Vice Chairman Winner agreed. Vice Chairman Winner asked if the language 'the application must be filed not later than 90 days' referred to working days or calendar days. Harold Coburn, CHRB Staff, stated it was calendar days. Chairman Israel asked if this was to give enough time for a full and thorough investigation. Ms. Wagner stated it was. Vice Chairman Winner asked if the Board could reduce the 90 days. Chairman Israel stated the Board alone could reduce the 90 days. Commissioner Choper asked about Global Betting Exchange, Betfair, and Twinspires applying for a license to provide exchange wagering when the statute required the applicant to be a natural person. Ms. Wagner stated the exchange wager account holder, not the provider, had to be a natural person. Commissioner Choper asked why that was. Ms. Wagner said it was language included at the request of the Office of Administrative Law (OAL). Commissioner Choper said OAL wanted the language included because it was in the statute, but the language would cause problems. He said exchange wagering account holders were going to include entities that were not natural persons, such as a partnership or corporation, using a natural person as a front. Chairman Israel stated if corporations use a natural person as a front this language would mean they were breaking the law. Commissioner Choper said the corporations would argue that by having a natural person place their bets they were following the law. Commissioner Rosenberg motioned to initiate a fifteen day comment period for the proposed exchange wagering rules with proposed revisions made in response to OAL's March 20, 2013 decision of disapproval of regulatory action. Chairman Israel seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE DEL MAR THOROUGHBRED CLUB (T) AT DEL MAR, COMMENCING JULY 17, 2013 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 4, 2013, INCLUSIVE.

Craig Dato, representing Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (Del Mar), stated they expected another very successful meet with attendance to remain in the 18,000 per day range. He said they would be offering a daily average of \$645,000 in purses, which would be the highest in California racing history. It was the third year of the Ship and Win program, which in 2012 brought in 137 out-of-state horses; because of the 25 to 33 percent increase in purse bonuses more out-of-state horses were expected for 2013. Chairman Israel asked if Del Mar's signal was shared with

HRTV and TVG. Josh Rubenstein, representing Del Mar, stated the signal was exclusively shared with TVG through 2016, but there had been discussions with TVG, HRTV and the Thoroughbred Owners of California to expand the distribution. Commissioner Derek asked if there was a planned horse auction associated with the race meeting. Mr. Rubenstein stated the paddock sale at Del Mar would take place on the opening Sunday of the meet. Chairman Rosenberg asked if there was any movement on the idea of putting a train station near the Del Mar Fairgrounds. Joe Harper, representing Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, stated the problem with that idea was the limited parking in the area around the fairgrounds. The train station once located in Del Mar years ago was moved to Solano Beach, but there was an effective bus shuttle system set up which efficiently moved people between the station and the fairgrounds. Commissioner Rosenberg stated he had heard the Del Mar Fairgrounds might be governed by a group of local entities. Mr. Harper stated the idea was for a joint Powers Authority (JPA) with the County of San Diego to manage the operations of the fairgrounds. He said there was already one in place which allowed for the financing for the grandstand and other renovations. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if Del Mar had a five year lease. Mr. Harper said yes, five years with re-openers. Vice Chairman Winner motioned to approve the application to conduct a horse racing meeting of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club at Del Mar, commencing July 17, 2013 through September 4, 2013. Commissioner Beneto seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE **APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE SONOMA COUNTY FAIR (F) AT SANTA ROSA,** COMMENCING JULY 24, 2013 THROUGH AUGUST 11, 2013, INCLUSIVE.

Chairman Israel asked what was happening between the Sonoma County Fair (Sonoma) and the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF). Tawny Toscani, representing Sonoma, stated historically as the revenue had gone down the expenses had gone up. In 2012 Sonoma requested information from CARF that would show where their expenses were going. From this information, which included salary rate increases for CARF employees, Sonoma determined CARF should reduce their expenses for all fairs by fifteen percent; a request for the reduction was sent to CARF in December 2012. She said Sonoma was concerned with being singled out to cover its overpayments for its 2012 Wednesday race meets. Ms. Toscani stated that after threatening to withdraw Sonoma's membership the CARF Board said they would consider reductions after the 2013 meet, but Sonoma's Board stuck to their demand for consideration before the 2013 meet. Chairman Israel stated he was concerned how this would impact the rest of the horse racing industry. He asked if Sonoma acquired a paymaster of purses, starting gates, tote boards, or anything else CARF had previously supplied. Ms. Toscani said Sonoma reached out to the contractors that worked with CARF and reached agreements for everything required but the paymaster of purses. Chairman Israel asked if the TOC members would have to wait a year for either overpayments or underpayments to be compensated. Richard Lewis, representing Sonoma, stated the books would be balanced sooner than they had been done in the past. Ms. Toscani stated they were attempting to negotiate with CARF for the use of their paymaster of purses, Vicky Lane. There was agreement among the other fairs that using the same paymaster of purses was important, so that was being pursued. Commissioner Choper asked if CARF disagreed with any of the statements from Sonoma. Ann Grattveit, CARF legal counsel, stated

she disagreed with the timeline; Sonoma's separation with CARF was not raised until January, 2013. She also disagreed with Sonoma's version of the overpayment issue. Ms. Grattveit said there was a great deal of discussion in the spring of 2012 about concerns related to the Wednesday race dates, including how overpayments would be dealt with. Commissioner Choper asked what the chances were the budget negotiations planned for late 2013 would resolve the issues which caused Sonoma to leave CARF. Ms. Toscani stated leaving CARF was not an easy decision because of the impact on the other fairs; however, without consideration of the financial issues Sonoma could not rejoin CARF. Ms. Grattveit said CARF was looking into reducing their budget by ten percent for all of the fairs. Commissioner Beneto asked for an estimate on the savings Sonoma hoped for in leaving CARF. Ms. Toscani stated it was estimated to be \$70,000 but that did not include the paymaster of purses. Commissioner Rosenberg asked what impact Sonoma leaving CARF would have on the other fairs. Chris Korby, representing CARF, stated it was better when the fairs worked together to present a consistent comprehensive program, which CARF strove to facilitate. He said the fundamental disagreement between Sonoma and the rest of the Northern California fairs was running either five or four race dates a week. The rest of the fairs felt four race day weeks were more appropriate and that five days would produce significant overpayments. Mr. Korby said in the case of Sonoma's 2012 meet that turned out to be correct. Commissioner Beneto asked what the projected cost increases to the other fairs were. Mr. Korby stated there would need to be adjustments which included the savings from not providing services to Sonoma, but it would probably cost the other fairs more. Chairman Israel asked if the horsemen approved of Sonoma's application. Joe Morris representing the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), stated the TOC had signed an agreement with Sonoma; however, the possibility they may not be able to contract the universal paymaster was a disappointment.

Owners not based in the Santa Rosa area would be inconvenienced in dealing with their accounts. Rick Pickering, representing CARF, stated the increased costs were traditionally absorbed by CARF when CARF was receiving money from horse racing license fees, and then money from the general fund, both of which were no longer available. Now CARF would have to pay for track safety and maintenance with money from its members. Commissioner Krikorian asked if CARF supported the concept of minisatellite wagering facilities within 20 miles of the existing CARF locations. Mr. Korby stated each satellite had the right under statute to determine that themselves. Commissioner Krikorian asked CARF for a list showing which satellites supported it, which did not; and if they did not, why. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if CARF opposed the recent legislation which attempted to reduce the 20 mile radius down to 15 miles. Mr. Korby stated ves. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if they would still oppose it. Mr. Korby said he would have to ask the CARF Board as the legislation was several years ago and the subject has not come up again. Mr. Korby stated several satellites had given consent to minisatellites within their 20 mile boundaries. Commissioner Choper asked if any of those did not have a split on fees. Mr. Korby stated he did not know the specific terms of all of them. Commissioner Rosenberg stated the Board has expressed before that minisatellites were the wave of the future, and having a list of satellites and their position on the 20 mile radius would be very helpful. Chairman Israel suggested it be an agenda item for the Pari-Mutuel Operations Committee. Commissioner Rosenberg stated the item was already on the agenda with SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC attending. Commissioner Derek stated Sonoma's first aid protocols refer to the ambulance and crew being responsible for "initiating basic life support". Now that Sonoma has paramedics instead of basic EMTs she assumed it should read advanced life support. Ms. Toscani said yes it should be advanced life support. Commissioner Derek said under the security section it states the security staff should report to the scene of an accident and take direction from the EMT. Ms. Toscani stated it should read paramedic. Commissioner Rosenberg motioned to approve the application to conduct a horse racing meeting of the Sonoma County Fair at Santa Rosa, commencing July 24, 2013 through August 11, 2013. Commissioner Krikorian seconded the motion, which was carried, with Commissioner Benito voting no.

## DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF 2014/2015 RACE DATES AND RELATED ISSUES FOR 2014/2015.

Joe Morris, representing Golden Gate Fields, stated the northern tracks were very close to working out a calendar. He requested the Board give them one more month, allowing them to work around the southern tracks finalized schedule. Chris Korby, representing CARF, agreed. Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, stated there was an error in the Board package on page 11-5. Del Mar Thoroughbred Club's (Del Mar) 2015 summer race meet request should read July 15 to September 7, 2015; not July 15 to October 18, 2015. Chairman Israel stated for Southern California tracks they should begin the discussion with the stabling and vanning issue. Mr. Morris said the only solution the stabling and vanning fund could afford was temporary, solving the stabling issue only for the next two years. It involves splitting the horses from Hollywood Park between Santa Anita Park (Santa Anita), with room to stable 1,900; San Luis Rey Downs, with room for 500; and Los Alamitos Race Course, with room for 500. Mr. Morris said these 2,900 stalls would be enough considering some of the horses now stabled were not race ready and should go back to farms. Chairman Israel asked how many horses were race ready. Mr. Morris said about 2,650. Chairman Israel asked if the plan was to move two to three hundred

horses back to farms. Mr. Morris stated if they can; it was probably where they belonged. Chairman Israel asked if Mr. Morris could briefly share any ideas for a more permanent solution. Mr. Morris stated a new fund should be created, owned by Santa Anita, Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, and the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC). This fund should be large enough to accumulate three million in two or three years. He said this fund could buy or create a training facility which could stable the 500 to 1000 horses needed to conduct racing into the next five or ten years. Scott Daruty, representing Santa Anita, stated San Luis Rey Downs (SLRD) was an adequate and safe training facility as is; however, to be a major training center there would need to be major improvements which Santa Anita, or the Stronach Group, has committed to provide. He said these improvements would cost in the range of \$5 million; take 6 months to complete; and include renovation of the barn areas, reworking the dirt training surface, installation of a 7/8ths turf course on the interior of the dirt surface, and installation of a turf-gallop. Commissioner Krikorian asked if the future plan was indeed to generate more money for stabling and vanning would Fairplex be considered again as an option as opposed to looking for or creating a new facility. Mr. Daruty stated the high cost of stabling at Fairplex made it an unlikely option regardless of there eventually being more funds available. Commissioner Krikorian asked if Santa Anita was going to ask to be reimbursed for their costs associated with improving San Luis Rey Downs. Mr. Daruty said no, but Santa Anita did not want to be charged twice either. He said Santa Anita was asked to invest in SLRD and believed this investment should serve as a credit to any requested contributions to an industry fund. Commissioner Choper stated this was a fair point; there should be a formula to determine what the additional revenue would be and the related affect on their payment to the industry fund. Commissioner Rosenberg stated by the way Mr. Morris was talking it seemed there was already an agreed upon deal. He asked if any of it was in writing. Mr. Morris said there was no deal in writing: however, there had been three weeks of negotiations so it would not have to be worked out in front of the Board. Commissioner Choper asked if everyone was included in these negotiations. Mr. Morris stated the negotiations on the fund mostly involved the TOC, the Stronach group, and Del Mar. Commissioner Choper asked if Fairplex was involved. Mr. Morris said the first meeting was at Fairplex and they were invited a week later to a meeting with the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association. Vice Chairman Winner asked how it was known the improvement project at SLRD would get through the regulatory process fast enough to allow the improvements to be completed in time. Mr. Daruty stated the improvements on the facility were all within the current entitlements so there was no further regulatory approval required. Vice Chairman Winner asked if there were any planned safety related improvements for the backstretch at Santa Anita. Mr. Daruty stated Santa Anita did inspect the backstretch, making sure it meets all health and safety codes or other similar requirements. He said the challenge involved with a backside renovation was the \$5 to \$10 million cost of the storm water runoff requirements. Santa Anita was negotiating with the regional Water Quality Control Board to help create a plan for upgrading the barns that would also comply with the requirements. Vice Chairman Winner asked if the plans involved reducing the number of barns. Mr. Daruty stated it could go either way. Vice Chairman Winner asked if Santa Anita could work with the Board to help improve the safety issues associated with backstretch ingress and egress. Mr. Daruty said Alan Balch, representing California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT), stated the training issue must be resolved before assigning race dates. He said the CTT was invited to two informal meetings; however, there had not been a meeting with all of the tracks represented. Mr. Balch stated there was money to pay for Fairplex. While Santa Anita was running during the 2013 calendar Hollywood Park received almost \$18,000 a day from the Stabling and Vanning Fund. Santa Anita received approximately the same amount on Hollywood park race days. When Del Mar was open alternately Santa Anita or Hollywood Park received the same amount. Chairman Israel stated the CTT may not have been a part of the negotiations, but because of previous negotiations five positions on the TOC Board were held by trainers. Mr. Balch stated the trainers on the TOC Board were licensed owners as well and did not represent the CTT. Commissioner Beneto asked if the higher cost of vanning to SLRD over Fairplex was added to the cost comparison. Jim Cassidy, representing CTT, stated the cost for vanning between Del Mar and Santa Anita was between \$150 and \$200 where the vanning from Fairplex to Santa Anita was \$50. Mr. Balch stated this was the kind of data CTT wanted to see in detail. He said the greater the distance between stabling and the operating track the more difficult it becomes for the trainers. Chairman Israel stated change was always hard, but with the downsizing of the industry change may be unavoidable. Commissioner Choper asked how many non-owner trainers CTT hoped to have in these discussions. Mr. Balch stated CTT sent letters to the TOC stating the negotiations should involve all of the stakeholders and that the CTT would be satisfied sending two representatives. Commissioner Beneto asked what the negative point was to stabling at Fairplex. Mr. Morris stated the Stabling and Vanning Fund could not afford it: even under the most affordable scenario the way vanning was accomplished would have to change. Chairman Israel asked how it would have to change. Mr. Morris stated the horses would need to be vanned on a schedule preventing trucks from leaving at less than capacity. Chairman Israel stated it was a disgrace this wasn't already happening. Mr. Morris stated Fairplex also would need to install a new storm water drain system, costing up in the seven figure range, before it could commit to year round training. Vice Chairman Winner asked if trainers would be deterred from California racing if they could not stable at Fairplex. Mr. Cassidy stated it was speculation, but some trainers said they would leave horseracing or take their horses to another state. Commissioner Derek asked why Fairplex was so much more expensive. Jim Henwood, representing Fairplex, stated the costs were considered normal for a non-auxiliary training center. Vice Chairman Winner asked if Fairplex was chosen for stabling was there any guarantee it would be available for a certain amount of time. Mr. Henwood stated ves, but they would need extra race days as part of the deal, to help pay for the drain water project and other associated costs. Vice Chairman Winner asked if Fairplex had recently submitted proposals with Shea Development which included dismantling its racing program. Mr. Henwood stated Fairplex would not move forward with that plan if it meant no horse racing. Chairman Israel asked if the drain water issue involved other parts of the park other than parts associated with horseracing. Mr. Henwood said it was an issue with only the horse racing enclosure. Commissioner Beneto asked what it would cost to immediately stable 1,000 horses at Fairplex for training. Mike Sedder, representing Fairplex, stated it would cost \$16,000 a day. Mr. Balch said at Golden Gate Fields (GGF) it costs around \$16,000 for 1,100 horses but because they know they need the training GGF puts in \$5,000 a day bringing the cost to the fund down to \$11,000 a day. Mr. Morris stated GGF uses the Alameda County Fair in Pleasanton (Pleasanton) as an auxiliary for 600 horses, costing \$6,500 a day. Commissioner Rosenberg said when the \$6,100 was for 500 horses and the \$16,000 was for 1200 horses the cost's should not be compared directly. Chairman Israel stated the \$16,000 did not include the cost of improving the storm water drainage. Commissioner Rosenberg said Fairplex wants race days to compensate for the water project and it should not affect the cost of stabling. He said Santa Anita was adding a whole calendar and that the financial benefits should be part of this discussion. Chairman Israel said Santa Anita was getting approximately 11 more weeks of racing but that item would be discussed later. Mr. Daruty stated Santa Anita was losing \$1.7 million it once received from the stabling and vanning fund. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if Santa Anita received funds while Del Mar was open. Mr. Daruty said Del Mar's summer meet was the time of year Santa Anita closed its stabling for maintenance. Vice Chairman Winner asked what would happen if Del Mar had a fall meet. Mr. Daruty said if that happened Santa Anita would get stabling funds for 55 days. Commissioner Beneto asked how many horses were at Santa Anita while Del Mar was open. Mr. Daruty said well over 1,000. Commissioner Krikorian asked if there were specific numbers on the costs for the storm water containment at Fairplex. Mr. Henwood stated the best guess was an initial two million dollars for containment but eventually Southern California wants no untreated water to flow downstream of a racetrack. He said this was not just a problem for Fairplex but for all the tracks, including Santa Anita. Commissioner Krikorian stated the choice was between Fairplex at \$16,000 a day, possibly lower with additional allocated race days, for up to 1,200 horses; or the combination of SLRD and Los Alamitos at 9,100 a day for 1,000 horses (\$6,100 for 500 at SLRD and \$3,000 for 500 at Los Alamitos). Mr. Morris stated there were probably not 1,200 horses that would need stabling, more like 600. Commissioner Krikorian stated if there were only 600 horses, Fairplex would reduce its fee to \$1,300. Commissioner Choper asked if all the trainers could get together and find a way to allocate the costs for the transitional period of two years to keep the smaller trainers solvent. Mr. Balch stated the CTT agreed they would need to do that if Fairplex was the chosen option. Mr. Sedder stated the TOC was elected to evaluate this issue and it was evaluated. He said the CTT was not left out of the discussion; it was a budget decision. Mr. Sedder stated it was the TOC that held the legislative power to represent the horsemen. Commissioner Beneto stated if the SLRD/Los Alamitos option was chosen there was a possibility that stables might be split 3 ways. He said the Fairplex option was the best choice especially during the transition period. Mr. Balch stated the tracks that received the Hollywood Park race days would be getting a windfall and should feel obligated to invest some of it into training. Chairman Israel said no one was denying that Santa Anita was going to make out nicely in this, but like Del Mar they had shown they were committed to horse racing where as Fairplex's principal business was operating a county fair. Commissioner Beneto asked how much Pleasanton lost in stabling 700 horses for \$6,500 a day. Mr. Morris said they did not have a loss. Commissioner Beneto asked Rick Pickering if he agreed. Rick Pickering, representing California Exposition and State Fair, previously with Pleasanton, stated that \$6,500 a day did not cover the wear and tear of their equipment. He said Pleasanton originally asked for \$10,000 a day which was negotiated to \$8,000 and then fell to \$6,500. Commissioner Beneto asked if Pleasanton ran its training at a loss. Mr. Pickering stated Pleasanton was training to help the industry. Commissioner Derek asked if the stabling negotiations could be delayed until a later date. Chairman Israel stated the Board did not have statutory power to vote on stabling, only race dates. Commissioner Krikorian stated the horse racing dates were the Board's leverage in negotiations on stabling and any other unresolved issue such as safety improvements at Santa Anita's back stretch, or minisatellites within the 20 mile radius. The days should not be allocated until commitments were made that resolved some of these issues. Mr. Daruty stated he did not have a problem with receiving race dates conditionally on commitments to improving SLRD. Commissioner Krikorian asked if Santa Anita and Del Mar had resolved the Breeders' Cup negotiations. Chairman Israel stated he was OK with conditionally granting race days for commitments to improve conditions, but the conditions needed to be decided immediately.

There was only six months before Hollywood Park closed and if the Board chose to go with SLRD, they needed that time to make the improvements. Commissioner Choper suggested the Board wait one more month to decide, giving the industry more time to negotiate. Commissioner Rosenberg stated if the Board could not decide on the conditions then it could not conditionally allocate dates. Commissioner Choper said Santa Anita would not be worried if the Board used the race days as leverage when there was no other track for the days to go to. Vice Chairman Winner asked if waiting 30 days would make a difference in the SLRD improvement project. Mr. Daruty stated if the improvements were started immediately it would still be a challenge to have them completed by January 1, 2014. Vice Chairman Winner asked what they would need from the Board to start immediately. Mr. Daruty said Santa Anita was prepared to go ahead with the improvements if it received the 2014 race days. Commissioner Choper stated it was clear to everybody that SLRD was the only feasible option and that Santa Anita should get what it needed to start the improvements. Josh Rubenstein, representing Del Mar, stated they did not own the land and did not want a delay in getting the race days, the 22<sup>nd</sup> District Agricultural Association (22<sup>nd</sup> AG) controls the facility that houses Del Mar and needed to start booking events on the days around Del Mar's race schedule as soon as posible. Commissioner Beneto asked if the Board could give Del Mar its race dates. Chairman Israel stated the race dates were independently allocated. He said the future of thoroughbred racing in California was held by Santa Anita and Del Mar, and Fairplex, with its 5/8 mile track, was not the same caliber. Commissioner Rosenberg said for this discussion Fairplex was being considered as a training facility not as a race track. Commissioner Derek said this discussion was futile if the Board did not have the authority to mandate the industry on what training facility to use. Chairman Israel stated it was up to SCOTWINC. Mr. Morris said if Santa Anita, Del Mar, and the TOC voted together they would constitute a majority on the SCOTWINC Board. Mr. Balch stated the SCOTWINC operating agreement required a unanimous decision on stabling and vanning decisions, if it was not unanimous the Board could be asked to resolve it. Robert Miller, CHRB Staff Counsel, said that he did not have the SCOTWINC operating agreement with him but he could confirm the Board had the authority to resolve SCOTWINC disputes. Chairman Israel asked if CTT was a member of SCOTWINC. Mr. Balch said it was not, but that racing law gave the authority to the CTT to negotiate agreements related to track safety and backstretch conditions, which he thanked the Board for having been given an opportunity to do so. Mr. Rubenstein stated Del Mar was requesting for 2014 their traditional seven week summer meet from July 16 to September 3. In 2015 they were requesting an eight week summer meet from July 15 to September 7, and a five week fall meet from October 28 to November 29. The fall dates revolve around the Breeders' Cup which they were proposing host status could alternate every other year between Santa Anita and Del Mar. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if the 22<sup>nd</sup> AG received a higher rent from Del Mar or from its other scheduled events. Mr. Rubenstein stated Del Mar paid considerably more. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if the Board did not allocate dates for another month would the 22<sup>nd</sup> AG hold off on scheduling events. Mr. Rubenstein said he could not guarantee it would not. Mr. Harper stated the rent Del Mar pays to the 22<sup>nd</sup> AG goes into a capital improvement fund which gets used on racetrack improvements. If 22<sup>nd</sup> AG rents out the space to a gun show on the day of the Breeders' Cup they get to keep that rent for themselves. Commissioner Choper asked if there was still no agreement between Santa Anita and Del Mar. Mr. Rubenstein stated the only disagreement was over the Breeders' Cup. Hollywood Park alternated the host status with Santa Anita and now Del Mar wanted to take Hollywood Park's place. Commissioner Krikorian asked if Del Mar considered a spring meet. Mr. Harper stated they had considered all possibilities for expansion and spring in 2014 would not allow enough time for the turf to mature. Commissioner Krikorian asked if it was possible for 2015. Mr. Rubenstein stated Del Mar agreed to not ask for spring days with the goal that Santa Anita would agree to share the Breeders' Cup. Commissioner Choper asked if Santa Anita could keep the turf course going for the term requested. George Haines, representing Santa Anita, stated the turf course was two season, perennial rye and bermuda grass. By running a little more cautious, cutting back a little during the race meet, and reducing turf workouts it would not be a problem. Commissioner Krikorian asked why Santa Anita was not requesting to run up through July 13 for an additional week of racing. Mr. Daruty stated some believed a small break was healthy. Commissioner Beneto asked if Del Mar was converting from synthetic back to a dirt track. Mr. Harper said there was no formal discussion to make the change back. The change to synthetic was for safety and so that Del Mar, Hollywood Park, and Santa Anita ran the same surface. Now that Hollywood Park was closing and Santa Anita was dirt it made less sense to continue using synthetic. He said if there was a need to change the surface immediately, or as a condition for getting the Breeders' Cup, it would be difficult to find the funding. Vice Chairman Winner asked if Santa Anita was going to reduce the turf course racing during its meets. Mr. Haines stated there would be reductions in January and February. Mr. Cassidy said Santa Anita has the best turf course in California but by April it was fairly torn up; he was unsure how it could handle three more months of racing. Mr. Haines stated they would be changing to a perennial rye grass and by April the Bermuda grass began to grow in as well. Chairman Israel asked Mr. Cassidy if the CTT was concerned to have fewer training days on the grass. Mr. Cassidy stated it was not concerned. Commissioner Krikorian asked if Santa Anita would be hiring a turf conditioner full time if it got more race dates. Mr. Haines stated it could be considered. Tom Robbins, from Del Mar, asked if Santa Anita was going to cut down the rye grass after July 6, 2014. Mr. Haines stated the grass would be cut down after July 6 to give the bermuda grass a chance to rebound. Commissioner Choper asked if that was a good idea. Mr. Haines said no, ideally the rye should be cut earlier as bermuda grows best in spring. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if after the race dates were tentatively signed would the TOC meet with the CTT in a manner they described to hear their opinion on the stabling issue. Mike Pegram, representing the TOC stated CTT could make a presentation to the TOC. Mr. Daruty stated Santa Anita was in agreement with the dates Del Mar presented. He said the plan to alternate host status with Del Mar on the Breeders' Cup was also agreeable with one caveat; if the Breeders' Cup was held at either Santa Anita or Del Mar the venue that holds the event should be awarded the dates. Mr. Harper agreed that was reasonable; Del Mar would be pitching to host the Breeders' Cup in 2015 but would not stand in the way if Santa Anita was chosen. He said if Santa Anita was chosen Del Mar would meet with them and the TOC and work something out so that Del Mar still has a successful fall meet from a purse standpoint. Chairman Israel asked what Del Mar's purses would be. Mr. Rubenstein stated around \$500,000 a day, compared to \$380,000 from 2013. Commissioner Rosenberg asked why the budget for marketing was \$2 million. Mr. Rubenstein said Del Mar has had a successful marketing program in the past and planned to do as well with the fall meet. Chairman Israel asked for confirmation that if Santa Anita ends up getting the Breeders' Cup for five consecutive years Del Mar would need a subsidy to maintain purse levels at a high enough rate for the November meet. Mr. Rubenstein stated that was correct, but that it was just for purses not track commissions. Mr. Daruty stated here was the small difference in what Santa Anita and Del Mar were proposing. Santa Anita did not like the idea of a subsidy, was not requesting one if Del Mar was the 2015 host for the Breeders' Cup, and did not want to pay one if Santa Anita was the host. He proposed the Board grant the noncontroversial 2014 schedule, and the 2015 schedule with the exception of the Breeders' Cup weekend, granting it later to Santa Anita if it was the host, or to Del Mar if it was the host or neither one was the host. Mr. Rubenstein stated that it was in all of the tracks best interest for Del Mar and Santa Anita to have a successful fall meet; for Del Mar that meant maintaining the amount of its purses. Mr. Morris said there had been many conversations to work this out. He said the TOC would also like to run the first week of December and if it gets worked out Del Mar would run that portion. Chairman Israel stated that it was important to run that week because that was when the two year old stakes races ran. Mr. Morris stated the TOC believed the industry fund needed to happen for the future of California horse racing. Lastly, he said, the advance deposit wagering television distribution was scheduled to end at the end of the Hollywood Park meet, July 14, 2013. He said it had been extremely successful but with Hollywood Park gone a new agreement would need to be negotiated for it to keep going. Mr. Daruty stated all of the stakeholders were at the table and it appeared they were open to finding a solution. Mr. Rubenstein stated TVG seemed open to releasing Del Mar from its exclusive commitment as long as it worked out for all parties. Chairman Israel asked how much the sharing increased purses. Mr. Sedder said Northern California purses increased \$5,000 a day and Southern California purses increased \$15,000 a day. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if Del Mar's theoretical new dates would be covered by the exclusivity contract with TVG. Mr. Rubenstein said no, only the summer meet. Vice Chairman Winner asked what the points of disagreement were. Mr. Daruty stated there were well established economics in the account wagering business and Santa Anita proposes those same economics would just continue if there was an exchange of content. The past deal was a trade in both directions, TVG had Santa Anita and HRTV had Hollywood Park. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if this was good for all parties why would they not want to participate. Mr. Daruty stated Santa Anita believed that TVG's business model was not sustainable for the long term and what the industry needed was a relationship with television that was long term. Chairman Israel stated the sustainable option was to have only one channel, but not sharing could drive them both out of business. Commissioner Choper stated this was one of the conditions. Chairman Israel agreed. Mr. Morris stated the last point of contention was on the Breeders' Cup week if Santa Anita was host. He said the TOC would like Santa Anita to help keep Del Mar's purse levels stay around the \$440,000 to \$500,000 range. Chairman Israel stated this year could establish the baseline for the purses that future years could compare to. Mr. Daruty said Santa Anita didn't understand why it should have to pay Del Mar to keep up purses that were more than Santa Anita's fall meet purses. Chairman Israel stated Santa Anita would not be paying Del Mar it would be paying the owners, the trainers, and the jockeys who make all of the success the industry shares. He said with the established baseline from this year the range would be very narrow. Mr. Balch compared guaranteeing purse levels to guaranteeing the right training in that both were good for the industry. Mr. Daruty stated he was not advocating purse guarantees; however, his arm was being twisted. Brad McKenzie, from Los Alamitos, stated Los Alamitos had the 500 stables available whether they were desired or not; they were not choosing sides in the training disagreement. He said it was Los Alamitos's intention to apply for any empty weeks in December for thoroughbred racing. Mr. McKenzie stated Santa Anita and Del Mar were the engines that drove the industry and getting them more race dates was the priority; however, the market in Orange County was ready for a taste of thoroughbred racing. On Kentucky Derby day 2012, as a satellite, Los Alamitos handled \$1.9 million; that was \$200,000 more than Santa Anita, \$1,000,000 more than Surfside at Del Mar, and \$1.3 million more than Pamona. He said making more thoroughbred fans in Orange County means more fans for Santa Anita and Del Mar. Los Alamitos only wanted to apply for dates that no one else already claimed. John Barr, representing Oak Tree Racing Association (Oak Tree), stated strong support for a Los Alamitos thoroughbred racing meet. He said Oak Tree would like to negotiate working with Los Alamitos to continue its charitable effort. Sherwood Chillingworth, also representing Oak Tree, stated a market study showed that a thoroughbred meet at Los Alamitos would be successful with estimated the purses of \$400,000 a day. He said the long term plan included adding a one mile race track. Vice Chairman Winner asked if the marketing study was done based on having the one mile track. Mr. Chillingworth stated it was. # STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE DISTRIBUTION OF 2012 RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF BETFAIR HOLLYWOOD PARK RACING ASSOCIATION LLC IN THE AMOUNT OF \$84,000 TO 17 BENEFICIARIES

Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds there from to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a nonprofit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Betfair Hollywood Park Racing Association (BHPRA) is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated from the 2012 racing meet conducted at Betfair Hollywood Park during its Spring/Summer meet from April 15, 2012 through July 15 2012 and its 2012 Fall meet from November 8, 2012 through December 16, 2012. From the race day charity proceeds BHPRA is proposing to distribute \$84,000. The list of organizations selected and amount to be distributed is listed on the attachment. Staff notes that approximately 76 percent of the proceeds will be given to horse racing related organizations.

#### RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

# Hollywood Park Racing Association, LLC Charitable 2012 Organization Descriptions

### **EQUINE RELATED:**

### California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation, Inc. (CTHF)

Established in 1983 to provide assistance to needy backstretch workers and their dependents, primarily in the area of medical and dental care. The CTHF contracts physicians and dentists professional services; provides hospitalization, outpatient, rehabilitative or preventative medical programs and provides temporary family financial aid.

### Permanently Disabled Jockeys Endowment

The fund was created in 2006, after merging with the DJE (Disabled Jockey Endowment). It is a collaborative effort between leaders in horse racing, race tracks, jockeys and horsemen to bring financial assistance to jockeys stricken by catastrophic injury.

### **Winners Foundation**

Established in 1984 to provide information, support and referral services for employees and family members of the California horse racing community being adversely affected by alcohol and/or substance abuse. Maintains relationships with twelve step groups, detox centers, and inpatient and outpatient hospital programs

### California Equine Retirement Foundation (CERF)

Established in 1986 to provide a full range of services to former racehorses in need of rehabilitation toward retirement or placement in a new career. CERF houses seventy-plus horses ranging in age from two to thirty-two years of age. Each horse is maintained with his or her own specific nutritional needs to ensure optimal health and fitness.

### Edwin J. Gregson Foundation

Established in 2000 to provide educational programs to backstretch workers, such as scholarship grants, English as a Second Language, and computer skills. Recreational programs are also provided including sports leagues and games, i.e. dominoes, pool and poker tournaments.

#### Racetrack Chaplaincy of America (Southern California) RTCA/SC

Established in 1971 to assist backstretch personnel with everything from daily devotions to bible study, counseling, translations, social security, insurance and IRS appointments, tax preparation and notary services.

### Southern California Equine Foundation, Inc.

Established in 1976, runs the equine hospital on Hollywood Park's backstretch, providing veterinary care, ambulances and all medical services for ill and injured race horses.

### Tranquility Farm

Established in 1998 as a full service program for rehabilitating race horses for a second career as pleasure horses or humane retirement. All horses are given needed medical treatment as well as additional training as needed for ownership in a new career setting if possible.

### EDUCATION/SOCIAL SERVICES

### Inglewood Educational Foundation

Established in 2003 to help Inglewood area teachers/schools submitting requests for needed materials and/or funding for classes and projects such as books, science materials, or costs for special off campus field trips.

### Inglewood Children's Dental Center of Greater Los Angeles

Established in 1995 to provide outreach services to elementary school children in Inglewood and the surrounding area with dental care and education. In California more than 50% of kindergartners and 70% of 3<sup>rd</sup> graders suffer from tooth decay with 25% having never had any treatment. It remains the most common chronic childhood illness.

### Los Angeles Urban League

Established in 1921 to provide advancement and business opportunities to African-Americans and minorities, employment development and training being their more recent focus. Programs include the Milken Youth and Family Literacy program working with area colleges and universities as well as the LAUSD.

#### Centinela Youth Services, Inc.

Established in 1975 to reduce violence at school and at home for Inglewood youth as well as those in surrounding communities. Provides at-risk youth with programs such as counseling, tutoring, educational support, targeted to help them form more productive lives and provides referrals to other agencies if needed.

### Inglewood After School Program

Established in 1984 to provide citywide after school recreation program for elementary school youth within the Inglewood Unified School District. Provided through the Recreation, Parks and Community Services Department with activities such as music, art, dance and gymnastics as well as homework completion and tutoring for children with special needs.

### Inglewood Senior Citizens Center

Established in 1973 to provide programs for Inglewood senior citizens. Peer counseling and visitor programs are provided for both those able to come to the center and home-bound seniors.

### Catholic Charities of Los Angeles, Inc./Saint Margaret's Center

Established in 1987 to provide emergency support services to residents of Inglewood who live at or below the poverty level. Among the programs provided are a food pantry, medical and vision screening and an emergency shelter. Provides a Christmas program in conjunction with Hollywood Park each year for low-income families.

### Salesian Boys a& Girls Club of Los Angeles

Established in 1966, provides various educational programs to middle school and high school youth. Like the Watts/Willowbrook programs, this club is in a largely immigrant area marked by poverty, violence and poor educational achievement. Assists students in reaching requirements for entrance into UC or CSU campuses.

### Watts/Willowbrook Boys & Girls Club

Established in 1957 to provide various programs to youth ages 7 – 18. Educational services are the primary focus with computer use for homework assignments, creative writing, art and health and wellness. Membership is predominantly African-Americans and Hispanics that live in neighborhoods plagued with drugs, violence and crime. Provides supervision and assistance in a safe environment.



## 12C First aid and Medical Staffing

The Humboldt County Fair provides emergency care which supports comprehensive care for jockeys, track staff and allied personnel. Emergency care focuses on immediate stabilizing, comfort and evacuation of injured racetrack personnel to appropriate hospital care facilities.

Two Emergency Medical Technicians from City Ambulance of Eureka staff are located in an on-track ambulance, which is located at a location with ease of access to the track during each day of training and racing. This ambulance and crew are present whenever horses are on the track (during both racing and training hours, and are responsible for initiating basic life support measures, including immediate medical stabilization, care and evacuation to medical care facilities.

Licensed Physicians are on-duty at Redwood Memorial Hospital and are responsible for ongoing care for jockeys, track staff and allied personnel requiring emergency medical care.

The Humboldt County Fair provides the services of a Kimzey Horse Ambulance, as well as a senior experienced driver who is responsible for the evacuation and disposition of injured horses.

Redundant communication services are provided to ensure constant contact between all emergency care personnel. Two-way radio networks are established within the racing operations, as well as fair emergency operations. All key emergency card personnel also carry cell phones and each is provided a lamented card containing all contact numbers. The fair also has an emergency response cell which responds to all emergencies, both medical as well as non-medical.

### 12F Medical Protocols and Procedures: English

In case of an accident on the racetrack, the following procedures shall be implemented:

#### Track Ambulance

The track ambulance will travel immediately to the scene of an accident and assume triage and patient care responsibilities and evacuated.

### Security

1. As soon as possible, a member of the track security staff shall report to the scene of the accident and thereafter take direction from the EMT responsible for

- management of the accident scene. The track security representative shall be responsible for keeping bystanders away from the accident scene.
- 2. A member of the track security staff shall proceed to the Jockey's Room to secure the ambulance transfer area, as well as prevent visitation from bystanders from entering the accident area.
- 3. A member of the track security staff shall be responsible for escorting emergency vehicles.
- 4. The security staff shall be responsible for all crowd control activities.

### Racing Staff/Track Veterinarian

- 1. Upon arrival at the scene, the Outrider should hold the injured horse in order to prevent further harm to people, horses or property.
- 2. Horses with severe injuries should be transported off the track via the horse ambulance, whenever it is practical to do so.
- 3. The track veterinarian shall make the decision as to the necessity of euthanasia on the track.
- 4. A screen blocking the public's view of the injured horse shall be set up prior to the euthanasia procedure.
- 5. Outriders are responsible for the removal of any debris from the racetrack following the removal of the injured person or horse from the track.

## Plant Staff

- 1. The Horse Ambulance shall travel immediately to the scene of an accident whenever it appears that a horse will require transport.
- 2. Members of the plant department who are near the accident site shall assist in screening the accident scene from the public view and shall take direction from the EMT that is responsible that is responsible for the management of the accident scene.

### Announcer

1. The announcer shall make riders aware of the details of the situation (such as the location of a loose horse, the necessity to pull up, etc.), enabling them to take the necessary steps to mitigate additional problems.

# Senior Management

- 1. A senior management representative should quickly proceed to the location on the racetrack where the accident has occurred. The manager should report to other members of the management team as to the accident status.
- 2. An additional member of the management team should report to the video department in order to monitor the scene and access the extent of video coverage to be transmitted to the public.
- 3. A member of the management team should provide input as to announcements

to be made by the track announcer.

- 4. A member of the senior management team should be responsible for seeing that information regarding the accident is communicated to the family member of the injurec. Efforts need to be made to escort family members to the hospital, if necessary. In this regard, a current compilation as to who should be notified in the case of an injured jockey is kept on file.
- 5. All public address announcements and responses to press inquiries are within the sole purview of the senior members of the management team then available.

### All Department Heads

All department heads shall communicate to their employees that, although intentions are good, the treatment of the injured rider must be left up to trained personnel, and all other employees must stay away from the scene of an accident.

APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE PACIFIC RACING ASSOCIATION II AT GOLDEN GATE FIELDS AUGUST 15, 2013 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 15, 2013

The Pacific Racing Association II (PRA II) is a racing association formed by the Pacific Racing Association (PRA). Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19532(a) any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the northern zone may receive no more than 35 weeks of racing. Pacific Racing Association II was created to assist with the distribution of race days allocated to the northern zone.

PRA II filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Golden Gate Fields:

• August 15, 2013, through September 15, 2013, or 20 days; three more than 2012. August 15 PRA II will simulcast only and live racing will begin August 16, 2013. PRA II proposes to race a total of 166 races, or 8.30 races per day. The average daily purse for the 2012 race meeting was \$145,855. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$151,134.

- ¢.50 pick 5 will be offered 100% payout to all tickets selective five winners 14% takeout.
- \$2 Pick 6 on last 6 races 70% major pool or carryover, and 30% to the minor pool.
- Business and Professions Code section 19464(b) specifies no application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting shall be granted unless the applicant has deposited with the Board a surety bond in the amount of \$100,000, or a greater amount, as determined by the Board, which is sufficient to ensure payment of employees wages and benefits including, but not limited to, health, welfare and pension plans. The surety bond shall be maintained during the period of the meeting that all payments are made. In the event of a dispute over the amount owed, the dispute shall be resolved through the grievance procedures set forth in the labor agreement of the union representing the class of employees affected.

This subdivision does not apply to any person or association licensed to operate a horse race meeting prior to January 1, 2001, which has conducted a race meeting in each of the immediate three previous consecutive calendar years.

PRA II initial race meeting was conducted after 2001. Therefore, it is subject to the provisions of the Business and Professions Code section 19464(b).

Pursuant to Business and Profession Code 19464(b) PRA II is required to submit a \$100,000 surety bond payable to the Treasurer of the State of California to ensure payment of employee wages and benefits. The PRA II \$100,000 surety bond on file will expire August 17, 2013 therefore an updated bond will be required prior to the start of the race meeting.

• The Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) providers are Xpressbet, TwinSpires and TVG.

Pursuant to Business and Profession Code section 19604, specific provisions must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

## Summary of B&P code 19604

To accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- A <u>written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair</u> conducting the races on which the wagers are made.

This letter shall serve as TOC's authorization for Pacific Racing Association II ("PRA II") to transmit the audiovisual signal of PRA II Thoroughbred races to, and accept wagers on those races placed through, the out-of-state betting systems ("Guests") in accordance with the conditions of, and at Host Fee rates no lower than those specified in the rate sheet provided to TOC by Monarch Content Management LLC ("Monarch") on behalf of PRA II, during the PRA II racing season commencing August 14, 2013, continuing through September 17, 2013.

As a condition of TOC's authorization of the acceptance of wagers on PRA II races by Guests which engage in phone and/or Internet wagering, herein called "ADW," PRA II shall take all reasonable steps to distinguish between ADW and other wagering handled through such Guests, including requiring tote vendors of both PRA II and Guest to facilitate the separation of ADW and non-ADW data in reports used by PRA II and/or CHRIMS to account for and settle balances between PRA II and Guests.

TOC's authorization shall not serve, nor should it be construed as, a precedent to future requests for permission to simulcast to the Guests specified herein or to any other Guest. TOC reserves the right to cancel or withdraw its authorization for any Guest, at any time, upon 48 hours written notice.

Pursuant to AB-701, raising the takeout to fund Workers' Compensation costs, PRA II shall collect the incremental increase in takeout as an addition to the money room adjustment, for the transmittal to the Fund in accord with such legislation. Should any Guest herein authorized fail to enter into a contractual obligation with PRA II to allocate this additional takeout in this manner, TOC authorization for that site is hereby immediately rescinded.



A qualified and licensed physician shall be on duty at all times during live racing, except that this provision shall not apply to any quarter horse racing at the racetrack if there is a hospital situated no more than 1.5 miles from the racetrack and the racetrack has an agreement with the hospital to provide emergency medical services to jockeys and riders. An ambulance licensed to operate on public highways provided by the track shall be available at all times during live racing and shall be staffed by two emergency medical technicians licensed in accordance with Division 2.5 (commencing with Section 1797) of the Health and Safety Code, one of whom may be an Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, as defined in section 1797.84 of the Health and Safety Code. (b) Each racing association and racing fair shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical plan detailing the procedures that shall be used in the event of an on-track injury. The plan shall be posted in each jockey room in English and Spanish. (c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.

# EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES -MORNING TRAINING-

#### FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS OR EXERCISE RIDERS

#### "FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, the Outriders shall immediately contact the on-track GGF Human Ambulance using Radio Channel #1 ("Rider Down"); (or the accident may very well be witnessed directly by the Ambulance Crew);
- The on-track GGF Human Ambulance (manned by GGF-contracted medical personnel) shall respond immediately to the site of the accident;
- The attending contracted medical personnel shall arrive equipped with advanced cardiac life support (ACLS) and other necessary acute medical treatment equipment & supplies;
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) or exercise rider(s) shall be made by the attending contracted medical personnel.



#### "ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the attending contracted medical personnel "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a
  decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) or exercise rider(s) on-site
  or to request emergency medical transport for off-site treatment at a hospital trauma
  center;
  - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, the GGF Human Ambulance shall provide the injured jockey(s) or exercise rider(s) with appropriate medical treatment; or,
  - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary, "911" shall be used to summon a City
    of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance (a Fire Dept. truck shall also respond).



#### "INJURY TREATMENT"

- · If an injured jockey(s) is treated on-site:
  - the attending contracted medical personnel shall provide medical treatment until surrendering custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;
  - the Track Physician of the GGF Medical Clinic shall likewise be notified either via telephone or when arriving on-site (live race days only).
- If an exercise rider(s) is treated on-site:
  - the attending contracted medical personnel shall provide medical treatment until surrendering custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;
- If the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance is summoned to respond, the injured jockey(s) or exercise rider(s) shall be transferred to this ambulance at either of the two following locations for transport to a local hospital;
  - If the injuries are deemed less severe, the jockey(s) or exercise rider(s) will be transported by the GGF Human Ambulance to an off-track location for pick-up by the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance; or,
  - If the injuries are deemed severe and the jockey(s) or exercise rider(s) cannot be moved, the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance will be escorted by GGF security personnel directly onto the track for patient pickup.



#### "POST INJURY ACTIVITIES"

- · The incident must be reported immediately to the appropriate CHSA representative;
- In consultation with the attending contracted medical personnel, an "Accident/Injury Investigation Report" must be completed by track management following completion of the above-noted procedures.

Should the GGF Human Ambulance need to leave the track premises, for whatever reason(s), all morning training must be delayed until a city-chartered or other substitute ambulance is on-site and available for on-track medical service.



# EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES -LIVE RACING-

#### FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

#### "FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, the Stewards and/or Outriders shall immediately contact the Track Physician ("Jockey Down") using Radio Channel #7 (or the accident may very well be witnessed directly by the Track Physician);
- The on-track GGF Human Ambulance (manned by GGF-contracted contracted medical personnel) and the Track Physician (transported via the GGF "chase" or "Vet" truck) shall respond immediately to the site of the accident;
- The attending medical professionals shall arrive equipped with advanced cardiac life support (ACLS) and other necessary acute medical treatment equipment & supplies;
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by the Track Physician.



#### "ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the Track Physician's "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to request emergency medical transport for off-site treatment at a hospital trauma center;
  - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, the GGF Human Ambulance shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the GGF Medical Clinic; or,
  - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary, "911" shall be used to summon a City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance (a Fire Dept. truck shall also respond).



#### "INJURY TREATMENT"

- If the injured jockey(s) is treated at the GGF Medical Clinic, the Track Physician shall be the primary care provider unless (or until) the Track Physician surrenders custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;
- If the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance is summoned to respond, the injured
  jockey(s) shall be transferred to this ambulance (accompanied by the Track
  Physician) at either of the two following locations for transport to a local hospital;
  - If the injuries are deemed less severe, the jockey will be transported by the GGF Human Ambulance to an off-track location for pick-up by the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance; or,
  - If the injuries are deemed severe and the jockey(s) cannot be moved, the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance will be escorted by GGF security personnel directly onto the track for patient pickup.



#### "POST INJURY ACTIVITIES"

- The incident must be reported immediately to the appropriate CHSA representative;
- In consultation with the Track Physician, an "Accident/Injury Investigation Report" must be completed by track management following completion of the above-noted procedures.

Should the GGF Human Ambulance need to leave the track premises, for whatever reason(s), racing must be delayed until a city-chartered or other substitute ambulance is on-site and available for on-track medical service.



WATCH AND WAGER LLC, TO ALLOCATE THREE ADDITIONAL RACING DAYS TO ITS OCTOBER 25, 2013 THROUGH DECEMBER 21, 2013 RACE MEETING

> Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19440(a) states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include allocation of racing dates to qualified associations in accordance with law. Business and Professions Code section 19530 provides that the Board shall have the authority to allocate racing weeks to an applicant or applicants pursuant to the provisions of this article and article 6.5 and to specify such racing days, dates and hours for horse racing as will be in the public interest and will subserve the purposes of this chapter. The decision of the Board as to such racing days, dates and hours shall be subject to change, limitation or restriction only by the Board. Business and Professions Code section 19531 states the Board shall make allocation of racing weeks, including simultaneous racing between zones, as it deems appropriate. The maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated for harness racing is 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. Business and Professions Code section 19549.6 states that notwithstanding subdivision (b) of section 19531 and sections 19540, 19546, and 19549, the Board may allocate additional weeks of harness racing to the California Exposition and State Fair in Sacramento or its lessee, to be raced at the California Exposition and State Fair in Sacramento.

Board Rule 1430, Allocation of Racing Weeks and Dates, states the Board shall allocate racing weeks and dates for the conduct of horse racing in this State for such time periods and at such racing facilities as the Board determines will best subserve the purposes of the Horse Racing Law and which will be in the best interests of the people of California in accord with the intent of the Horse Racing Law.

In August 2012 the Board allocated harness racing dates at California Exposition and State Fair (Cal-Expo) from October 25, 2013 through December 21, 2013, to be operated by Watch and Wager LLC.

On May 3, 2013, Cal-Expo submitted a request on behalf of itself and Watch and Wager LLC for the allocation of four additional harness racing days. The dates requested were October 5, 12, 19 and 26. On June 3, 2012, Watch and Wager LLC submitted a letter in which it stated it was aware of Cal-Expo's request, was not aware of any opposition to the plan, and that it would ask

the Board to favorably consider Cal-Expo's request for allocation of October 2013 harness racing dates.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Cal-Expo has requested the allocation of Saturday race dates in October 2013 so Watch and Wager LLC may run Saturday nights. The dates requested are October 5, 12, 19 and 25. If the Board grants the request, it would only have to allocate 5, 12 and 19, as the date of October 25 is already allocated.

Watch and Wager LLC stated the proposal was unanimously approved by the California Harness Horsemen's Association board. Watch and Wager LLC contends the proposed race dates would provide racing opportunities and entry box preference to horsemen who stay in California over the break. It also contends that single night racing in October could jump start handle for the November harness meeting.



# STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 2066, APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY, TO CHANGE THE TERM OF A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY LICENSE FROM TWO YEARS TO FIVE YEARS IN ACCORDANCE WITH BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 19605.25 (A).

#### Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that the Board shall have jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings. Business and Professions Code section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of Chapter 4, Business and Professions Code. Responsibilities of the Board shall include, but not be limited to, adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19590 provides that the Board shall adopt rules governing, permitting, and regulating pari-mutuel wagering on horse races under the system known as the pari-mutuel method of wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19605.25 authorizes the Board to license up to 15 minisatellite wagering facilities in both the northern zone and the southern zone.

Senate Bill 305, Chapter 334, Statutes of 2011, amended Business and Professions Code section 19605.25, subsection (a), to change the term of license for minisatellite wagering facilities from two years to up to five years.

In accordance with the change to the enabling statute the Board has been approving five-year minisatellite licenses. Santa Clarita Lanes, OC Tavern, Commerce Casino, Twisted Kilt, Sammy's of Lake Forrest and Silky Sullivan's applications for license to operate a minisatellite facility were all approved for five years.

#### ANALYSIS

Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.25, the proposed amendment to Rule 2066 would increase the term for a minisatellite wagering facility license from two to five years. This amendment is required for Rule 2066 to reflect the change in statute. as well as current Board practice of approving minisatellite applications for license for a period of five years.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

# CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD TITLE 4. CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS ARTICLE 25.5. MINISATELLITE WAGERING AMENDMENT OF RULE 2066. APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY.

#### Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

2066. Application for License to Operate a Minisatellite Wagering Facility.

- (a) An applicant for license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility shall complete an Application for License to Operate a Minisatellite Wagering Facility CHRB-228 (New 11/08), hereby incorporated by reference, which is available at the Board's headquarters office. Note: CHRB-228 incorporates by reference the Personal History Record form CHRB-25A (Rev. 11/08). The application must be filed not later than 90 days in advance of the scheduled start date of operation. The application must include a certified check in the amount of \$500.00 payable to the Treasurer of the State of California for a nonrefundable application fee. The term of the license shall be two five years from the date the license is issued.
- (b) The Board may conduct investigations, inspections or request additional information from the applicant, as it deems appropriate in determining whether to approve the license.
- (1) Upon the written request of the applicant the Board may waive the requirement for submission of a Full Disclosure Statement and CHRB-25A for persons who have a current valid state gambling license and/or finding of suitability issued by the California Gambling Control Commission.
- (c) The Board, or its designee, shall be given access for review and audit of all records.

  The applicant shall, at its location during hours of operation, make such information available.

  The Board may require the applicant to annually submit audited financial statements.

(d) All advertisements shall contain a statement that persons under 21 are not allowed

access to the minisatellite wagering site. All advertisements shall contain contact information for

a recognized problem-gambling support organization.

(e) The Board shall notify the applicant in writing within 30 calendar days from the date

the application is received by the Board's administrative office if the application is complete or

deficient. If the application is deficient, the notice shall include:

(1) Instructions as to what is required of the applicant to complete the application.

(2) Instructions for requesting additional time to satisfy the requirements listed in the

notification, if needed.

(f) The Board shall approve or deny an application within 90 calendar days from the date

it is received by the Board unless the applicant requests and is granted additional time to supply

information.

(g) If the Board denies an application, the applicant has 30 calendar days from the date of

receipt of the Board's denial notification to request a reconsideration of the Board's decision. The

request must be in writing and sent to the Board's headquarters office. The Board shall respond

in writing to the reconsideration request within 30 working days from the date of receipt of the

request. If reconsideration is denied, the applicant may file for judicial review in accordance

with Business and Professions Code section 19463.

(h) After a license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility is issued under this article,

changes or amendments to information or operating procedures contained in the application for

the license will be permitted by order of the Board or by Board approval of a request submitted

in writing by the applicant.

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that the Board has jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings. Business and Professions Code section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board include adjudication of controversies arising from the enforcement of those laws and regulations dealing with horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19562 provides that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions, consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. In February 2013 the Board adopted an amendment to Rule 1658, Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse, which states that title to a horse which is claimed shall be vested in the successful claimant from the time the field has been dispatched from the starting gate and the horse becomes a starter. The successful claimant becomes the owner of the horse unless the claim is voided by the stewards. The stewards shall void the claim and return the horse to the original owner if the horse suffers a fatality during the running of the race, or the racing or official veterinarian determines the horse will be placed on the Veterinarian's List as unsound or lame before the horse is released to the successful claimant. When the Board adopted the amendment to Rule 1658 it stated the regulation was not perfect. but it was the best approach presented. The Board also recognized that the regulation might need further modification; however, it could take some time for the rule to have its desired impact on those who might use claiming to discard damaged horses.

#### **ANALYSIS**

The Office of Administrative Law approved the amendment to Rule 1658 on May 2, 2013. The effective date of the regulation was also May 2, 2013. The Board did not implement the regulation until May 16, 2013. The delay was to allow time for the stewards, veterinarians and others involved in the process to fully understand the change, and to notify the industry and the public. Since its implementation, Rule 1658 has generated some controversy. In response to the various reactions to the amended Rule 1658, the item has been placed on the agenda for the

purposes of a discussion of all relevant issues and a presentation by the Equine Medical Director of the recent history of the enactment of Rule 1658 and all examples of claims voided.

#### RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. The Equine Medical Director, Dr. Rick Arthur, is prepared to make a presentation to the Board.

#### Report on implementation of CHRB Rule 1658 Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse

Rick M. Arthur DVM Equine Medical Director

The Office of Administrative Law notified the CHRB that May 9 would be the effective date of the new amendments to 1658 requiring the BOS to void claims when the horse is determined to be unsound or lame by the official (CHRB) or association (track) veterinarian prior to the horse being released from their care. The Executive Director set May 16, 2013, as the start date to begin implementing the rule. A conference call of official veterinarians and stewards reviewed the procedures and protocols presented to the Board last September when the amendment was first approved for notice. Those procedures are attached (see Appendix A & B) and available at <a href="http://www.chrb.ca.gov/Board/board\_packages/Sep-2012.pdf">http://www.chrb.ca.gov/Board/board\_packages/Sep-2012.pdf</a> pages 5-5 to 5-6.

Based on preliminary information available as of June 11, 2013, between May 16 and June 9 there were 162 successful claims at Los Alamitos, Hollywood Park and Golden Gate Fields. During that time period, 19 claims were voided when the horses were declared unsound or lame by the official veterinarian. There were 66 successful claims and 6 voided claims at Hollywood Park; there were 53 successful claims and 7 voided claims at Los Alamitos; and there were 43 successful claims and 6 voided claims at Golden Gate Fields.

Claim data from July 1, 2009, through June 30, 2012, showed that historically about 2.5% (128/5212) of all claims ended up on the Veterinarian's List as unsound or lame. In the first four weeks of the new claiming rule, about 10% (19/181) of the horses for which claims were dropped have been placed on the Veterinarian's List as unsound or lame, roughly four times the historical rate. The reason for this is unclear at this time. However, the new procedures now require the official (CHRB) or association (track) veterinarian to specifically examine claimed horses for unsoundness or lameness prior to their being released to the claimant.

Certain historical metrics are available and can be used as a comparison to evaluate the new procedures. Between July 1, 2009, through June 30, 2012, 60% of Thoroughbreds and 75% of Quarter Horses that were claimed and placed on the Veterinarians List as unsound or lame never raced again. Of those horses that did race again, the average time to their next race averaged 126 days for Thoroughbreds (27-603 days) and 206 days for Quarter Horses (28-420 days). For comparison, the average Thoroughbred races back 43 days after being claimed (see Appendix C).

Horses placed on the Veterinarian's List as unsound or lame must work satisfactorily for the official or association veterinarian and pass a post-work blood test prior to being removed from the list and allowed to start.

#### Appendix A:

#### **Procedures for Voiding Claims:**

- All claimed horses capable to do so are to be sent to the Receiving Barn for post-race testing and post-race evaluation by the official veterinarian.
- The horse will be examined in or near the Receiving Barn by the official veterinarian in a manner similar to how other horses are evaluated post-race for possible unsoundness or lameness.
- Unless otherwise designated for post-race testing, only blood samples (official and split samples)
   will be drawn.
- If the official veterinarian determines the horse is lame or unsound and will be placed on the Veterinarian's List, the official veterinarian will notify the stewards prior to the horse leaving the receiving barn.
- Based on the findings of the official veterinarian the stewards will determine whether the claim will be voided. If the stewards decide the claim is void, the horse will remain in the control of the original owner. If the stewards decide the claim will stand, the horse will be turned over to the claimant upon leaving the receiving barn.
- If, in the opinion of the official or racing (track) veterinarian, a claimed horse is incapable of being sent to the Receiving Barn, the racing (track) veterinarian will obtain blood samples (official and split samples) whenever humanely possible and determine the extent of the horses injuries. If the horse is incapable of being sent to the Receiving Barn because the horse is lame or unsound, the racing (track) veterinarian will so notify the stewards and the official veterinarian.
- Based on the findings of the racing (track) veterinarian the stewards will determine whether the claim will be voided. If the stewards determine the claim is to be voided, the horse will remain in the control of the original owner once the horse leaves the track. If the stewards decide the claim will stand, the horse will be turned over to the claimant upon leaving the track.
- A horse with a lameness with an AAEP Lameness Score greater than 3 shall be placed on the Veterinarians List as Lame.

- A horse with an AAEP Lameness Score of 3 or less and determined to be unfit to race shall be
  placed on the Veterinarian's List as Unsound.
- The official veterinarian shall place a claimed horse on the Veterinarian's List as Unsound or Lame upon the recommendation of the racing (track) veterinarian.
- Horses that are injured and showing lameness will be placed on the Veterinarians List as
   Unsound or Lame. Horses that are injured such as a cut or grabbed quarter and not showing
   lameness may be designated as Injured on the Veterinarians List. Claims should not be voided
   unless the horse is going to be placed on the Veterinarian's List as lame or unsound. Accordingly,
   horses placed on the Veterinarian's List for other reasons such as bled, exhausted, injured and
   are not to be voided.

#### Appendix B:

#### AAEP LAMENESS SCALE

Because each horse has unique performance characteristics, evaluating lameness can be challenging. Experienced riders may detect minor alterations in gait before they are apparent to an observer. Lameness may appear as a subtle shortening of the stride, or the condition may be so severe that the horse will not bear weight on the affected limb. With such extremes of lameness possible, a lameness grading system has been developed by the AAEP to aid both communication and record-keeping. The scale ranges from zero to five, with zero being no perceptible lameness, and five being most extreme. **The AAEP quidelines explain the grading system this way**:

- **0:** Lameness not perceptible under any circumstances.
- 1: Lameness is difficult to observe and is not consistently apparent, regardless of circumstances (e.g. under saddle, circling, inclines, hard surface, etc.).
- 2: Lameness is difficult to observe at a walk or when trotting in a straight line but consistently apparent under certain circumstances (e.g. weight-carrying, circling, inclines, hard surface, etc.).
- 3: Lameness is consistently observable at a trot under all circumstances.
- 4: Lameness is obvious at a walk.
- **5:** Lameness produces minimal weight bearing in motion and/or at rest or a complete inability to move.

1658. Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse.

(a) Title to a horse which is claimed shall be vested in the successful claimant from the

provisions of this article. Only a horse which is officially a starter in the race may be claimed. A

# STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE EXTENSION OF THE 2012 BOARD DECISION TO SUSPEND FOR TWELVE MONTHS THE USE OF CLENBUTEROL BY ALL BREEDS AT ALL CALIFORNIA RACE TRACKS, WHICH IS SET TO EXPIRE JULY 18, 2013

Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the Board. Business and Professions Code section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this state. Business and Professions Code section 19580 states the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication in order to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in the state. Business and Professions Code section 19581 provides that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race in a horse race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. Board Rule 1406, Suspension of Rule, provides that the Board may for good cause, with or without a hearing, temporarily suspend the application of any of its rules upon any conditions it may impose. Any such action by the Board shall be in writing. Board Rule 1844.1, Suspension of Authorized Medicaiton, provides that the Board may temporarily suspend the authorized administration of a permitted drug, substance or medication for any time up to one year maximum after a public hearing has been noticed in accordance with Government Code section 11125(a). The temporary suspension may be for a race, breed, or race meeting, provided all horses in the same race compete under the same conditions. The Board shall notify in writing the racing association and the trainers' organization of any temporary suspension, as specified.

Board regulations prohibit the administration of any drug, substance or medication after entry time with a few specific exceptions. The exceptions were established after due consideration by the Board based on information available at the time the regulations were adopted. Scientific information and practical experience in managing the threshold levels for the exceptions change over time as unintended consequences become apparent. Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing is an example. Clenbuterol is a beta-2 agonist approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in equines as a bronchodilator.

The Board established threshold levels consistent with therapeutic use to treat small airway disease. Clenbuterol, like all beta-2 agonists, has an adrenergic effect on muscle somewhat similar to anabolic steroids. Only the Ventipulmin brand of clenbuterol is approved by the FDA. Non-FDA approved clenbuterol at extremely high concentrations was being used in quarter horse racing for the adrenergic effect. The CHRB confiscated and otherwise obtained samples of this illicit formulation. Clenbuterol violations occurred at levels unattainable with the FDA approved formulation at FDA approved dosages.

At the August 2011 Regular Board Meeting the Los Alamitos Race Course (LARC) and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association (PCQHRA) requested that the CHRB consider enacting Rule 1844.1 to suspend the authorized administration of clenbuterol to horses entered to race at the LARC for a period of 12 months effective October 14, 2011. The Equine Medical Director reported that since February 2011 there were eight confirmed clenbuterol violations, with one pending at the time of the August 2011 Board meeting. The Board enacted Rule 1844.1 and approved the joint request to temporarily suspend the use of clenbuterol in quarter horses entered to race at LARC, effective October 14, 2011 through October 14, 2012.

At the April 2012 Medication and Track Safety Committee meeting Dino Perez, representing the PCQHRA, reported on the impact of the clenbuterol suspension in quarter horses at LARC which took effect on October 14, 2011. Mr. Perez reported horsemen were pleased with the results, and owners and trainers believed they had a more level playing field. Qualifiers to stake races were more diverse, races were more competitive and from a broader group of trainers. He also said times have slowed down quite a bit where they were back to normal. Mr. Perez, in cooperation with California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF), asked the Committee to send a proposal to the Board to enact Rule 1844.1, and extend the suspension of clenbuterol to all quarter horses at all CARF tracks during the fair season. The Committee agreed and the proposal to use Rule 1844.1 to prohibit the use of clenbuterol in quarter horses at all CARF tracks for one year was sent to the Board where it was approved at the April, 2012 Regular Meeting.

At the May 24, 2012 Regular Board Meeting a discussion was held regarding the feasibility of suspending the use of clenbuterol for thoroughbred horses at all California racetracks. The Board determined it would use its authority under Rule 1406, Suspension of Rule, to temporarily suspend the use of clenbuterol by all breeds at all California racetracks for a period of twelve months, and to initiate a recommended 21-day withdrawal time.

After the May 24, 2012 Regular Board Meeting the following advisory regarding the suspension and the recommended 21-day withdrawal time was posted on the Board's website. It was also forwarded to official veterinarians, racing associations, the horsemen's organizations and racing secretaries. The effective date of the suspension of the use of clenbuterol for all breeds was July 18, 2012, which was concurrent with the opening of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club race meeting.

Effective July 18, 2012, authorization of a threshold level for clenbuterol as currently allowed under CHRB Rules 1844 (e)(9) and 1844(f) will be suspended for all breeds at all tracks in California. Accordingly, clenbuterol will be treated the same as all other drugs that are not

specifically authorized by the Board. If the testing laboratory detects clenbuterol under the laboratory's standard operating procedures, the finding will be reported as a violation. The Maddy Laboratory has extremely sensitive testing for clenbuterol. The drug can be readily detected at low picogram levels in both urine and blood. A picogram is 0.000000000001 grams or one-trillionth of a gram.

A 21-day withdrawal time should safely avoid an inadvertent positive provided the clenbuterol is the FDA-approved Ventipulmin Syrup form of clenbuterol and it is used at the standard therapeutic dose of 5cc (0.8 micrograms per kilogram) twice a day. Higher dosages will require longer withdrawal times. Anyone using a non-FDA-approved form of clenbuterol does so at his or her own risk. The CHRB and Maddy Laboratory have obtained numerous samples of compounded clenbuterol and other non-FDA-approved clenbuterol formulations. None of the samples examined have been compliant with federal compounding regulations. They are considered contraband by the CHRB. As with all withdrawal time recommendations, this recommendation for clenbuterol does not constitute and is not a guarantee, warranty, or assurance that the use of any of the therapeutic medications at the dosage listed will not result in a positive post-race test. Trainers are required to insure the condition of all horses they race and will be held accountable for any violation.

To be clear, clenbuterol is not "banned." The drug may be used within CHRB racing and training enclosures upon the prescription of a CHRB licensed veterinarian. Only FDA-approved Ventipulmin Syrup clenbuterol is allowed. Veterinarians prescribing and dispensing Ventipulmin are required to report the same on form CHRB-24 (Veterinary Confidentials). The CHRB will continue to use out-of-competition testing to monitor compliance in conjunction with our existing post-race testing program. In addition, the Maddy Laboratory is continuing to investigate alternative testing techniques for other beta-2 agonists and other growth-promoting drugs.

The suspension of the use of clenbuterol in quarter horses at Los Alamitos Race Course, and all CARF tracks, was accomplished under the authority of Board Rule 1844.1. The regulation was adopted by the Board specifically to address issues related to equine medication. To provide consistency in the authority under which the Board temporarily suspended the use of clenbuterol in all breeds at all California racetracks, the Board's Equine Medical Director and the Board's General Counsel recommended that the Board affirm its May 24, 2012 decision pursuant to the provisions Rule 1844.1. At its June 28, 2012 Regular Meeting the Board reaffirmed the suspension of the use of clenbuterol in all breeds at all California race tracks for a period of twelve months, and voted to acknowledge a 21-day withdrawal pursuant to Board Rule 1844.1. The previous action by the Board to impose a total ban on the use of clenbuterol in quarter horses would continue as enacted.

Since the Board suspended authorization for use of clenbuterol in quarter horses there have been 6 violations, all at Los Alamitos Race Course in the last 20 months. No violations have occurred at any other track. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, has provided that to date, there has been no evidence that the suspension of an authorized threshold for clenbuterol has negatively impacted equine health.

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19605.25 provides that the Board may approve an additional 15 minisatellite wagering sites in each zone if, among other requirements, an agreement in accordance with section 19605.3 has been executed and approved by the Board. Business and Professions Code section 19605.3 states that the organization described in section 19608.2 is the party that executes the agreement approved by the Board with the association conducting a racing meeting and the satellite wagering facility. The organization described in 19608.2 is Southern California Off-Track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC) or Northern California Off-Track Wagering, Inc. (NCOTWINC). In addition to executing the minisatellite wagering agreements, SCOTWINC has assumed the task of locating and developing minisatellite wagering sites.

A California racing industry entity, Sportech, which is more commonly known as a totalizator operator, has expressed an interest in developing mini satellite wagering facilities. Sportech is prepared to present its plans to create and market a high end combination restaurant/sports bar minisatellite brand that would be located in high density populated areas of California. Sportech, a British wagering company, bought Scientific Games Corporation's racing and venue management business (including Scientific Games Racing) in October 2010. Scientific Games Racing, which processed pari-mutuel wagers for North American racing interests, including racetracks and wagering sites in California, subsequently changed its name to "Sportech, Inc." The company currently acts at totalizator for California race tracks and wagering facilities.

## STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION REGARDING AN UPDATE OF THE CHRB GOVERNING PROCEDURES FOR HEARINGS

#### California Horse Racing Board Meeting June 20, 2013

#### BACKGROUND

When the California Horse Racing Board Enforcement Unit serves a disciplinary Complaint against a Licensee, the Licensee also receives a copy of the Governing Procedures that will be used in the prosecution of the matter.

Attachment 1 is the current version of the Governing Procedures served by the Enforcement Unit.

The Governing Procedures are required to be given to the Licensee to inform him or her how the disciplinary hearing will be conducted. Importantly, the Governing Procedures set forth the rights of the Licensee, including the right to discover the evidence that supports the allegations in the Complaint, the right to have counsel represent the Licensee at the Hearing, the right cross examine witnesses and present rebuttable evidence, as well as the appeal rights of the Licensee should the Board of Stewards uphold the Complaint.

Presently, there is only one form of Governing Procedures provided to the Licensee, regardless of the type of Rule violation alleged or the penalty to be requested. Staff Counsel and the Office of the Attorney General have reviewed the current Governing Procedures and propose adopting the three separate Governing Procedures, depending upon the type of Rule violation alleged and the penalty sought.

#### ANALYSIS

A: Attachment 2 is the proposed Governing Procedures for non-drug related violations before the Board of Stewards.

Attachment 2 mirrors the current Governing Procedures with one important addition. Paragraph 9 distinguishes between a hearing seeking to revoke a license and a non-revocation hearing. The current Governing Procedures are silent in this

important regard and do not provide the Licensee with a clear understanding of his or her rights. In the cases where the revocation of a license is sought, the totality of Chapter 5 (Administrative Adjudication: Formal Hearing) of the Administrative Procedure Act applies, Government Code section 11500 et seq, as mandated by Business and Professions Code section 19461. A revocation hearing will not be conducted by the Board of Stewards, but will be heard by an Administrative Law Judge, hearing officer or referee who will be taking evidence and drafting a proposed decision on behalf of the California Horse Racing Board to consider. Attachment 2 makes clear that the Board of Stewards may refer a matter to the California Horse Racing Board if license revocation is determined to be appropriate.

However, if license revocation is **not** sought, Business and Professions Code section 19461 does not require the disciplinary hearing to be conducted pursuant to Chapter 5 of the APA. In the past and currently, non-revocation hearings before the Board of Stewards are conducted pursuant to the Governing Procedures in Attachment 1. Attachment 2 more clearly delineates how non-revocation disciplinary hearings before the Board of Stewards are to be conducted. Attachment 2 provides the non-revocation hearing will be conducted under Government Code section 11513 (Evidence; examination of witness), Government Code section 11514 (Affidavits) and Government Code section 11515 (Official Notice). Further, Attachment 2 conforms to the Administrative Adjudication Bill of Rights stated in Government Code section 11425.10.

Finally, Attachment 2 authorizes hearing officers to the hear appeals in addition to Administrative Law Judges and referees.

### B. Attachment 3 is the proposed Governing Procedures for non-revocation Class 1, 2 or 3 Drug Violation cases.

Attachment 3 is consistent with the Attachment 2, with an additional provision regarding a Licensee's right to elect to have the matter heard by the Board of Stewards or a hearing officer as permitted by Business and Professions Code section 19517.5.

Appeals from a non-revocation drug violation case will be heard directly by the California Horse Racing Board.

### C. Attachment 4 is the proposed Governing Procedures for Class 1, 2 or 3 Drug Violation cases where revocation of license is the penalty sought.

Revocation of a California Horse Racing Board license requires the proceedings tp be conducted pursuant to Chapter 5 of the APA, Government Code section 11500 et seq.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the proposed Governing Procedures (Attachments 2, 3 and 4) be adopted by the California Horse Racing Board.

### GOVERNING PROCEDURE FOR HEARING BEFORE BOARD OF STEWARDS

- 9. A verbatim record of the proceedings will be made, using either a shorthand reporter or a tape recorder. You may request a tape recording or a transcript of the hearing from the CHRB. It will be provided to you free of charge.
- 10. You will receive a written decision after the hearing. The decision will be written by the majority, be based on the record, and include a statement of the factual and legal basis for the decision. The decision will also include a description of the penalty imposed, if any. The Board of Stewards will take action upon a majority decision. - 9. The Stewards may refer your matter to the CHRB if license revocation is determined to be appropriate. If the matter is not referred to the CHRB, the proceedings will be held before the Board of Stewards, Hearing Officer or Referee under the evidentiary provisions of Government Code sections 11513, 11513 and 11515, but Chapter 5 will not otherwise apply.

Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5(e)(1) provides that the Board shall have full power to prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions under which exchange wagering may be conducted in California consistent with this section, including the manner in which exchange wagers may be accepted and the requirements for any person to participate in exchange wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19604.5(m) states the Board shall promulgate administrative rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this section. At its November 2012 Regular Meeting the Board adopted the proposed addition of Article 27, Exchange Wagering, which comprises 25 regulations governing the conduct of exchange wagering in The exchange wagering rulemaking file was submitted to the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) on January 31, 2013. On March 20, 2013, the OAL disapproved the file. Of the 25 regulations submitted, the OAL cited necessity, clarity or consistency issues with eight regulations, as well as certain procedures of the Administrative Procedures Act (APA). The CHRB has 120 days from the date of the disapproval to correct and resubmit the rulemaking file. After a 15-day public comment period, during which only comments on the proposed revisions will be accepted, the corrected texts will be heard for adoption by the Board. Upon resubmission of a disapproved regulation the OAL shall only review the resubmitted regulation for those reasons expressly identified in the written opinion, or for those issues arising as a result of a substantial change to a provision of the resubmitted regulation (Government Code section 11349.4(b).

On May 2, 2013, the Exchange Wagering Ad Hoc Committee met at Hollywood Park Race Track to review modifications to certain proposed exchange wagering regulations. Following a discussion which focused on the proposed addition of Rule 2086.5, Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering, Chairman Israel directed staff to hold a meeting with industry representatives to craft a text that would address most of the issues raised concerning the rule. On May 9, 2013, staff met with representatives of Global Betting Exchange, Churchill Downs and Betfair.

At its May 23, 2013 Regular Meeting the Board directed staff to initiate a 15-day public comment period regarding the modifications to certain proposed exchange wagering regulations. The 15-day public comment period was begun on June 4, 2013 and ended on June 19, 2013. To date, no comments have been received.

### **ANALYSIS**

The OAL disapproval letter cited issues with eight of the 25 exchange wagering regulations. To address OAL's concerns staff has modified the texts of the eight regulations. The modified texts are:

Rule 2086, Definitions: The OAL stated Rule 2086 did not comply with the consistency standard of Government code section 11349.1(a)(4). The enabling statute, Business and Professions Code section 19604.5, uses the terms "person" and "natural persons". However, only "natural persons" may hold accounts and place wagers through an exchange. The OAL stated the use of the term "person" in subsections 2086(h), (m), (p) and (s) was inconsistent with the enabling statute's more specific statements that only "natural persons" may hold an exchange wagering account and place wagers through the exchange. To address the OAL's concerns, staff modified the text of Rule 2086 to use the term "natural person" where necessary. Subsection 2086(k) was also modified to incorporate by reference the form CHRB-229 (New 5/13) Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering. The form was previously incorporated by reference under Rule 2086.5, Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering. However, subsection 2086(k) defines "exchange wagering license application" and it contains the first reference in Article 27 to the form CHRB-229; accordingly, subsection 2086(k) is where the incorporation by reference should occur.

Rule 2086.5, Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering: The OAL stated the regulation did not meet the clarity standard of Government Code section 11349.1. Subsection 2086.5(b) states the exchange wagering assessment fee is \$1,400,000 "or an amount to be determined by the Board". The OAL provided that it was unclear what factors would be examined for the Board to determine it would modify the amount of the assessment fee. To address the OAL's concerns, staff deleted the phrase "or an amount to be determined by the Board" This means the assessment fee is as stated in the regulation and cannot be modified outside of the Administrative Procedures Act.

The OAL stated subsection 2086.5(b) requires an application for license to operate exchange wagering to be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of \$1.4 million. However, in the rulemaking record the Std. 399, Economic and Fiscal Impact Statement, shows the total annual

estimate of program costs to regulate exchange wagering as \$510,000 which makes the \$1.4 million appear to exceed the reasonable costs of the program. Upon reexamination of estimated costs, the assessment fee for license to operate exchange wagering has been modified to \$500,000 per fiscal year. This brings the regulation in line with the original estimates of the Std. 399, Economic and Fiscal Impact Statement, which is based on the State's fiscal year. The assessment fee amount was moved from subsection 2086.5(b) to a new subsection 2086.5(d).

At the May 2, 2013 Ad Hoc Committee meeting Chairman Israel stated the term of license for an exchange wagering operator should be one year, which is consistent with Board practice regarding advance deposit wagering approvals. Subsection 2086.5(c) has been modified to state that the term of license is a maximum of twelve months, commencing the first day of the month following approval. However, to accommodate the effort to have both payment of assessment fees and the term of license coincide with the State of California's fiscal year, subsection 2086.5(c)(1) has been added to provide that every original exchange wagering license shall expire on the last day of the State of California's fiscal year in which it is issued. Subsequent (renewal) approvals shall be for a period of 12 months beginning July 1 and ending June 30.

The new subsection 2086.5(d) provides that the assessment fee for license to operate exchange wagering shall be equally apportioned amongst the approved applicants and paid on a monthly basis. Moving to monthly payments rather than a yearly lump sum eliminates the possibility of having to provide refunds or credits to licensed exchange wagering operators if a new operator is subsequently licensed. The monthly payments are simply adjusted for all parties. Monthly payments also allow an operator to be approved at any time of year.

New subsections 2086.5(d)(1) and (d)(2) provide for assessment fee payment timelines and the amounts to be paid monthly – dependent on the number of approved applicants. A new subsection 2086.5(d)(3) requires the Board to notify existing exchange wagering operators of an adjustment to the monthly assessment fees within seven business days.

### In summary:

- (1) The term of an exchange wagering license is a maximum of 12 months.
- (2) An original exchange wagering license will expire on June 30 in the year it is issued, the last day of the State of California's fiscal year, and thereafter shall be for a period of 12 months beginning July 1 and ending June 30.
- (3) The total amount per fiscal year to be assessed to operate exchange wagering is \$500,000.
- (4) The assessment fee shall be equally apportioned amongst the approved applicants and paid on a monthly basis.
- (5) The Board shall provide notification of adjustments to monthly assessment fees within seven business days of an increase or decrease in the number of approved exchange wagering applicants.

The OAL stated the original subsection 2086.5(d), which is now subsection 2086.5(e), did not meet the clarity standards of Government Code section 11349.1 since it could not easily be understood. The subsection provides the Board "may approve" the application, but it does not provide the reasons why the Board may or may not approve an application. To address OAL's concerns, staff deleted the word "may" and inserted the word "shall". This means the Board

shall approve an application if it determines the applicant meets the criteria identified in its regulations and the enabling statute.

The form 299 (New 05/13) Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering, was also amended – where appropriate - to reflect the changes made to Rule 2086.5.

Rule 2086.6, Operating Plan Required: The OAL stated Rule 2086.6 did not meet the clarity standard of Government Code section 11349.1, as there was no guidance provided as to the format required by the Board for an operating plan. In addition, it was unclear what additional information, beyond the "minimum" that was listed in the regulation, might be required or in what instance the Board might require any additional information. To address OAL's concerns, staff deleted the phrase "in a format and containing such information as required by the Board." This means that the operating plan must contain at least the items listed in the regulation.

The OAL stated subsection 2086.6(i) did not meet the consistency standard of Government Code section 11349.1(a)(4). The proposed subsection 2086.6(i) provided that the operating plan and any subsequent updates or changes would be exempt from disclosure pursuant to Government Code section 6254(k). The OAL disapproval stated the subsection was not in harmony with Government Code subdivision 6254(k), and that no federal or state law exempting or prohibiting disclosure of the operating plan as a record could be located. To address OAL's concerns, staff proposes the deletion of subsection 2086.6(i).

Rule 2086.7, Exchange Wagering Data: The OAL stated Rule 2086.7 did not meet the clarity standard of Government Code section 11349.1. Subsection 2086.7(a) did not identify the data base "designated by the Board" as the entity to which an exchange operator must provide information. To address OAL's concerns, staff has modified subsection 2086.7(a) to identify CHRIMS Inc. as the nonprofit horse racing data base. The OAL also stated the regulation did not require an exchange operator to provide data, but only data interface. To address OAL's concerns, staff has modified subsection 2086.7(a) to require the exchange operator to provide data, as well as a data interface.

Rule 2087.6, Cancellation of Matched Wagers: The OAL stated subsection 2086.7(c) did not meet the clarity standard of Government Code section 11349.1 as an account holder might not understand when a payout was "inappropriately disrupted". There was no guidance as to when any disruption was inappropriate. To address OAL's concerns staff has modified subsection 2086.7(c) to delete "inappropriately disrupted". The term "not made" has been inserted to make it clear that if a payout is not made due to the cancellation of a matched wager, the account holder who disputes such non-payment may submit a claim to the exchange provider.

Rule 2089, Errors in Payments of Exchange Wagers: The OAL stated subsection 2089(a) did not meet the clarity standard of Government Code section 11349.1 since it could not be easily understood by directly affected persons. The regulation provides when an account holder must be immediately notified of over or under payments. However, OAL stated the exchange provider and account holder would not be able to determine when the required notification must be made. To address OAL's concerns, staff has deleted the word "immediately" from subsection 2089(a) and inserted the phrase "within one business day". This makes it clear that the exchange

operator has one business day to notify the account holder of an overpayment. For consistency, staff modified subsection 2089(b)(1) to include the requirement that the exchange provider notify an account holder of an underpayment within one business day. Finally, OAL stated the use of the term "person" in subsection 2089(b)(4) was inconsistent with the enabling statute's more specific statements that only "natural persons" may hold an exchange wagering account and place wagers through the exchange. To address the OAL's concerns, staff modified subsection 2089(b)(4) to use the term "natural person".

Rule 2089.5, Requirements to Establish an Exchange Wagering Account: The OAL stated subsection 2089.5(j) did not comply with the consistency standard of Government Code section 11349.1(a)(4). The regulation requires the exchange provider to keep recordings "for at least 180 days, unless otherwise directed by the Board". The OAL stated the regulation failed to provide the factors that might necessitate the Board to direct an entity to keep recordings for a longer or shorter period of time. To address the OAL's concerns, staff modified subsection 2089.5(j) to specify the factors that would necessitate the Board to direct an entity to keep recordings for a longer or shorter period. Staff inserted the phrase "for purposes including but not limited to conducting an investigation, an audit or an ongoing wagering inquiry." In addition, subsection 2089(j) has been modified to provide that the Board may direct the entity to retain such records for an additional period of one year past the 180 days. This provides a clear period of time over which the Board might require retention of records.

Rule(s) 2087, Suspending Markets; 2091.5, Suspending an Exchange Wagering Account; 2092.5, Prohibitions on Wagers to Lay a Horse to Lose, and Rule 2092.6, Suspension of Occupational License: The OAL stated the regulations did not comply with the consistency standard of Government code section 11349.1(a)(4). The enabling statute, Business and Professions Code section 19604.5, uses the terms "person" and "natural persons". However, only "natural persons" may hold accounts and place wagers through an exchange. The OAL stated the use of the term "person" was inconsistent with the enabling statute's more specific statements that only "natural persons" may hold an exchange wagering account and place wagers through the exchange. To address the OAL's concerns, staff modified the text of Rules 2087, 2091.5, 2092.5 and 2092.6 to use the term "natural person" where necessary.

<u>Other modifications</u>: Rule 2086.9, Financial and Security Integrity Audits Required, was modified to create subsection 2086.9(c). Rule 2088.6, Cancellation of Unmatched Wagers, was modified for purposes of grammar and clarity.

### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board adopt the modified exchange wagering regulations as presented.

### 2086. Definitions

### As used in this article:

- (a) "Back" means to wager on a selected outcome occurring in a given market.
- (b) "Confidential information" means the following:
- (1) the amount of money credited to, debited from, or present in any particular account holder's exchange wagering account;
- (2) the amount of money wagered by a particular account holder on any races or series of races;
- (3) the exchange wagering account number and personal identification number of an account holder:
- (4) the identities of particular entries on which the account holder is wagering or has wagered; and

- (5) unless otherwise authorized by the account holder, the name, address, and all other information in possession of the exchange provider that would identify the account holder to anyone other than the Board or the exchange provider.
  - (c) "Credits" means all positive inflow of money to an exchange wagering account.
- (d) "Debits" means all negative outflow of money from an exchange wagering account related to a wager placed from such account.
- (e) "Declared Entry" means a horse withdrawn from a race in which its entry has been accepted.
- (f) "Deposit" means a credit of money to an exchange wagering account from an account holder.
- (g) "Exchange" means a system operated by an exchange provider in which the provider maintains one or more markets in which account holders may back or lay a selected outcome.
- (h) "Exchange wagering" means a form of pari-mutuel wagering in which two or more natural persons place identically opposing wagers in a given market, as provided under Business and Professions Code section 19604.5.
- (i) "Exchange wagering account," "account" means the account established with an exchange provider by a natural person participating in exchange wagering. An account may only be established or maintained with an exchange provider by a natural person.
- (j) "Exchange wagering license applicant," "applicant" means any entity including, but not limited to, corporations, partnerships, limited liability companies, limited

partnerships, or individuals that file an application with the Board to conduct exchange wagering.

- (k) "Exchange wagering license application" means the application form CHRB 229 (New 5/42 13), Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering, hereby incorporated by reference, which shall be available at the Board's headquarters office.
- (1) "Exchange wagering licensee," "exchange provider" means a person located within or outside of California that is authorized to offer exchange wagering to residents of California pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19604.5 and this article.
- (m) "Identically opposing wagers" means wagers in which one or more <u>natural</u> persons offer to lay a selected outcome at the same price at which one or more <u>natural</u> persons offer to back that same outcome, with the amount subject to the lay being proportionately commensurate to the amount subject to the back.
  - (n) "Lay" means to wager on a selected outcome not occurring in a given market.
- (o) "Market" means, in relation to a given horse race or a given set of horse races, a particular outcome that is subject to exchange wagering as determined by an exchange provider.
- (p) "Matched wager" means the wager that is formed when two or more *natural* persons, none of whom are the exchange provider or agents, are confirmed by the exchange provider as having placed identically opposing wagers in a given market on the exchange.
- (q) "Means of personal identification" means the unique number, code, or other secure technology designated by an exchange wagering account holder to assure that only that account holder has access to his account.

- (r) "Natural person" means a living, breathing human being, as opposed to a legal entity.
- (s) "Net winnings" means the aggregate amounts payable to a <u>natural</u> person as a result of that person's winning matched wagers in a pool less the aggregate amount paid by that <u>natural</u> person as a result of that <u>natural</u> person's losing matched wagers in that pool.
- (t) "Operating plan" means the plan submitted to the Board by an exchange provider detailing the proposed method of operation of the exchange.
- (u) "Other electronic media" means any electronic communication device or combination of devices including, but not limited to, personal computers, the Internet, private networks, interactive television and wireless communication technologies, or other technologies approved by the Board.
- (v) "Person" means any individual, partnership, corporation, limited liability company, or other association or organization.
  - (w) "Pool" means the total of all matched wagers in a given market.
  - (x) "Price" means the odds for a given exchange wager.
- (y) "Unmatched wager" means a wager or portion of a wager placed in a given market within an exchange that does not become part of a matched wager because there are not one or more available exchange wagers in that market with which to form one or more identically opposing wagers.
- (z) "Withdrawal" means a payment from an exchange wagering account by the exchange provider to the account holder.

- (a) Prior to any exchange wagers being accepted, the applicant for license to operate exchange wagering must obtain a license from the Board.
- (b) An applicant must complete form CHRB <u>-</u> form 229 (New 05/12) Application for License to Operate Exchange Wagering (New 05/13), hereby incorporated by reference, which shall be available at the Board's headquarters office. The application must be filed not later than 90 calendar days in advance of the scheduled start of operation. A certified check in the amount of \$1,100,000 payable to the California Horse Racing Board, or an amount to be determined by the Board to fulfill Business and Professions Code section 19604.5(e)(6), a A detailed operating plan as described under Rule 2086.6, Operating Plan Required, and proof of the applicant's compliance with labor provisions of Business and Professions Code section 19604.5(f), must accompany the application.
- (c) The term of the exchange wagering License is a maximum of shall be not more than 2 12 months, years from the date commencing the first day of the month following approval of the exchange wagering license is issued, unless otherwise determined by the Board.
- (1) Every original exchange wagering license granted by the Board shall expire on the last day of the State of California's fiscal year in which it is issued. Subsequent approvals of the exchange wagering license shall be for a period of 12 months beginning July 1 and ending June 30 to coincide with the State's fiscal year.

- (d) To fulfill Business and Professions Code section 19604.5(e)(6), the total amount per fiscal year to be assessed to operate exchange wagering is \$500,000. The assessment fee for license to operate exchange wagering shall be equally apportioned amongst the approved applicants, and paid on a per month basis for the duration of the license.
- (1) Within 14 business days of notification of the assessment fee apportioned by the Board, the approved applicant shall submit its first month's assessment fee in the form of a certified check payable to the California Horse Racing Board. Subsequent payments shall be submitted at the first of each month for the term of the license.

No later than 90 calendar days following the receipt of the application, the Board shall make a final determination on the application. The Board shall make appropriate approve the application if, after reasonable investigation and inspection, as it deems appropriate, it determines that the applicant has demonstrated that exchange wagers placed through the exchange will be accurately processed and that there will be sufficient safeguards to

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5, identifies specific provisions that must be met before an exchange wagering provider may accept thoroughbred wagers on horse races from persons whose primary residence address is in the northern and central/southern zone of California; and specific requirements for quarter and standardbred wagers accepted from a resident whose primary residence address is in California;

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5 (b)(4) provides an exchange wagering licensee may only offer exchange wagering on thoroughbred horse races, conducted within or outside of this state, to persons whose primary residence address is in the northern zone of this state if it has an exchange wagering agreement with the racing association/fair located in the northern zone authorized by the Board when the exchange wagering licensee is offering exchange wagering to persons whose primary residence is in the northern zone of this state, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for a live thoroughbred racing meeting.

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5 (b)(5) provides an exchange wagering licensee may only offer exchange wagering on thoroughbred horse races, conducted within or outside of this state, to persons whose primary residence address is in the central/southern zone of this state if it has an exchange wagering agreement with the racing association or racing fair located in the central/southern zone authorized by the Board, when the exchange wagering licensee is offering exchange wagering to persons whose primary residence is in the central/southern zone of this state, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for a live thoroughbred racing meeting.

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5 (b)(6) provides an exchange wagering licensee may only offer exchange wagering on quarter horse races, conducted within or outside of this state, to persons whose primary residence address is in this state if it has an exchange wagering agreement with the racing association or racing fair located in the state authorized by the Board to conduct a live quarter horse racing meeting, when the exchange wagering licensee is offering exchange wagering to persons whose primary residence is this state, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the live quarter horse racing meeting.

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5 (b)(7) provides an exchange wagering licensee may only offer exchange wagering on standardbred horse races, conducted within or outside of this state, to persons whose primary residence address is in this state if it has an exchange wagering agreement with the racing association or racing fair located in the state authorized by the board to conduct a live standardbred racing meeting, when the exchange wagering licensee is offering exchange wagering to persons whose primary residence is this state, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the live standardbred racing meeting.

Business and Professions Code section 19604.5 (k) provides exchange wagers placed on a market after the start of a race shall be lawful if authorized by the Board, racing association, or racing fair conducting the races, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the exchange wager is made.

- (b) The provider shall immediately notify the Board by means of electronic mail any time a market is so suspended. Upon settlement of the market the provider shall submit to the Board a written account of the suspension that at a minimum provides the following information:
  - (1) The market suspended;
  - (2) The date and time of the suspension;
  - (3) The reason for suspending the market;
  - (4) The results of the investigation;
  - (5) How the market was settled.

#### (c) Upon the completion of an investigation, the exchange provider shall settle the market

  - (4) human error by the exchange wagering provider in recording an exchange wager.
- (b) If a matched wager is canceled or voided due to situations described in subparagraphs (a)(1), (a)(2) and (a)(3) of this *regulation section*, the exchange provider shall notify the Board in writing of its actions and the circumstances that resulted in such action.
- (c) An account holder who believes a payout was *not made inappropriately disrupted* due to the cancellation of a matched wager may submit a claim to the exchange provider in accordance with Rule 2089 of this article.

If an error occurs in the payment of amounts for exchange wagers, the following shall apply:

- (a) In the event the error results in an over-payment to the individuals wagering, the exchange provider shall be responsible for such payment account holder, the exchange provider may prohibit the withdrawal of funds equal to the overpayment. The exchange provider shall immediately within one business day notify the account holder of the overpayment and shall be entitled to recover from such account holder the amount of the overpayment.
- (1) An account holder who disputes an overpayment may, within 90 calendar days of the date of the overpayment, request in writing that the Board determine the validity of such overpayment.
  - (b) In the event the error results in an under-payment:

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(1) Within one business day The the exchange provider shall notify the account holder of

such underpayment.

(12) An account holder must submit a claim for the underpayment within 30 90 calendar

days inclusive of the date on which the alleged underpayment occurred. The exchange provider

shall investigate such claims and shall pay each claim, or a part thereof, which it determines to

be valid, and shall notify the claimant in writing if his claim is rejected as invalid.

(23) Any claim not filed with the exchange provider within 30 90 calendar days inclusive

of the date on which the alleged under-payment occurred shall be deemed waived and the

exchange provider shall have no further liability therefore.

(34) Any *natural* person whose claim is rejected by the exchange provider may, within

15 45 calendar days from the date he received the notice of rejection, request in writing that the

Board determine the validity of the claim. Failure to file such request with the Board within the

said time shall constitute a waiver of the claim.

(45) A hearing shall be held on each such rejected claim timely filed with the Board. The

Board shall give notice of such hearing to the claimant and the exchange provider. The Board

may determine a claim to be valid, in whole or in part, and thereafter order the exchange

provider to pay to the claimant the amount of the claim determined to be valid, or may deny the

claim *I in* whole or in part. Any such determination shall be final and binding on all parties.

#### 2089.5. Requirements to Establish an Exchange Wagering Account.

- (a) An exchange wagering account is necessary to place exchange wagers. Exchange wagering accounts may be established by residents of California. Residents of another jurisdiction state may establish exchange wagering accounts provided it is not unlawful under United States federal law or the law of that jurisdiction state to place an exchange wager provided, however, that these rules shall apply only to wagering on California races. An account may be established in person, by mail, telephone, or other electronic media including but not limited to the Internet. Only natural persons may open an account. An account shall not be assignable or otherwise transferable.
  - (b) The information required to establish an account shall include:
  - (1) The prospective account holder's full legal name.
- (2) The principal residence address of the prospective account holder. Such address shall be deemed the address of record for mailing checks, withdrawals, statements, if any, of the

account, notices, or other correspondence or materials. It is the responsibility of the account holder to notify the exchange provider of any address change.

- (3) Telephone number.
- (4) Social Security Number or Individual Tax Identification Number.
- (5) Certification or other proof that the applicant is at least 18 years of age.
- (c) An exchange provider shall employ electronic verification with respect to each prospective account holder's name, principal residence address, date of birth and social security number at the time of the account establishment by a Board-approved national, independent, individual reference company or another independent technology approved by the Board which meets or exceeds the reliability, security, accuracy, privacy and timeliness provided by individual reference service companies.
- (d) An exchange provider may refuse to establish an account, or may cancel or suspend a previously established account, without notice, if it is found finds that any information supplied by the prospective account holder is untrue or incomplete, or for any other reason as determined by the exchange provider.
- (1) If the exchange provider cancels a previously established account, within five business days it shall return to the account holder at the address of record any funds held in the account.
- (e) If an exchange provider or an affiliate of such provider is also licensed by the Board to conduct advance deposit wagering, the exchange provider may offer holders of existing advance deposit wagering accounts held with such exchange provider or such affiliate a convenient method of establishing an exchange wagering account by verifying information on file for the existing advance deposit wagering account.

- (f) The exchange provider shall have the right to suspend or close any account at its discretion.
- (g) The account applicant shall supply the exchange provider with a means of personal identification to be used by the account holder to access his account. Exchange wagering accounts are for the use only of the account holder and the account holder is responsible to maintain the secrecy of the account number and means of personal identification. The account holder must immediately notify the exchange provider of any breach of security for the account.
- (h) Each account shall have a unique identifying account number. The exchange provider shall inform the account holder of the assigned account number and provide a copy of the exchange provider's exchange wagering procedures, terms, and conditions, as well as any information that pertains to the operation of the account.
- (i) Each exchange provider shall, at all times, comply with Internal Revenue Service (IRS) requirements for reporting and withholding proceeds from exchange wagers by account holders and shall, following the credit to an account for a winning exchange wager, send to any account holder who is subject to IRS reporting or withholding a Form W2-G summarizing the information for tax purposes. Upon written request by an account holder, the exchange provider shall provide the account holder with summarized tax information on exchange wagering activities.
- (j) All wagering conversations, transactions or other wagering communications through the exchange wagering system, verbal or electronic, shall be recorded by means of electronic media, and the tapes or other records of such communications shall be kept by the entity for at least 180 days. unless otherwise directed by the Board The Board may direct the entity to retain such records for an additional period of one year past the 180 days for purposes including but

not limited to conducting an investigation, an audit or an ongoing wagering inquiry. These tapes

and other records shall be made available to the Board upon request or order by the Executive

Director.

(k) Upon request of the account holder the exchange provider shall provide a statement

- (a) An exchange provider may suspend any exchange wagering account if the provider has reason to believe that the account holder may have committed acts of fraud in connection with exchange wagering or any other action or inaction which threatens the integrity or fairness of any exchange wagering, or is otherwise ineligible to hold the account.
- (b) The exchange provider shall immediately notify the Board by electronic mail if it suspends an account due to fraud in connection with exchange wagering or any other action or inaction which threatens the integrity or fairness of any exchange wagering. The provider shall also submit to the Board a written account of the suspension that at minimum states:
  - (1) The name of the *natural* person whose account was suspended;
  - (2) The date and time of the suspension;
  - (3) The reason for suspending the account;
  - (4) The results of any investigation associated with the suspension of the account.

(c) Funds in a suspended account shall be maintained by the exchange provider until such time as any investigation associated with the suspension is complete and/or the account is no longer suspended.

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#### 2092.5. Prohibitions on Wagers to Lay a Horse to Lose.

- (a) No exchange wager that lays a horse to lose may be made by a *natural* person who owns such horse in whole or in part, nor shall an exchange wager to lay the horse to lose be made by:
  - (1) The trainer, or assistant trainer or substitute trainer who trains the horse;
  - (2) The authorized agent who represents the owner of the horse;
  - (3) The jockey or driver who rides or drives the horse;
  - (4) The jockey agent who represents the jockey who rides the horse;
  - (5) The valet who attends the jockey; or
  - (6) Any stable employee of the trainer who trains the horse-:
  - (7) The veterinarian or any assistant to the veterinarian providing services to the trainer who trains the horse.
- (b) Nor shall any of the <u>natural</u> persons named in subsection (a) through (a)(7) of this regulation instruct another <u>natural</u> person to lay a horse to lose on their behalf, or receive the whole or any part of any proceeds of such a lay.

(c) No exchange wagering account shall be used to lay a horse to lose, except by the account

holder. All wagers that lay a horse to lose will be presumed to be effected by, and for the benefit

of, the account holder.

(d) Nothing herein is intended to otherwise alter the applicability or application of Rule 1970.

(e) Individuals prohibited from wagering under Rule 1969 Shall be prohibited from placing

an exchange wager while on duty at a race meeting or off-track wagering facility, including an

out-of-state-Hub.

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2092.6. Suspension of Occupational License.

(a) The Board of Stewards may suspend the occupational license of any *natural* person if, after a preliminary hearing, it determines there is probable cause to believe that such *natural* person may have has committed acts of fraud in connection with exchange wagering or any other action or inaction which threatens the integrity or fairness of any exchange wagering.

(b) Such suspension of license shall be for a period of time designated by the Board of Stewards, unless otherwise determined by the Board<sub>3</sub> provided that any such suspension under this section shall be limited to ten days and, if probable cause that a violation has occurred has been found, a hearing under Business and Professions Code section 19461 to determine whether a licensee has committed a violation of the rules must be held before any further discipline may be imposed.

(c) The licensee may make an appeal to the Board by complying with the provisions of Rule 1761 of this division.

# STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPROVAL OF THE 2013-14 AGREEMENT PROVIDING FUNDING SUPPORT FOR THE BOARD

Regular Board Meeting June 20, 2013

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 1961.51 (a) states the notwithstanding any other provision of law, and in lieu of any license fee payable to the state prescribed for or referred to in Section 19491, 1949.5, 19596.3, 19601, 19601.2, 19602, 19603, 19604, 19605.25, 19605.35, 19605.45, 19605.6, 19605.7, 19605.71, 19606.5, 19606.6, 19610.8, 19611, 19612, 19614, 19616, 19616.1, 19616.2, or 19641, any association or fair that conducts a racing meeting shall only pay a license fee to the state to fund the Board and the equine drug testing program as follows:

- (1) All racing associations and fairs including all breeds of racing shall participate in the funding of the Board in accordance with the formula devised by the Board in consultation with the industry.
- (2) The baseline funding for the Board and equine drug testing program in the first fiscal year after the enactment of this section shall be the amount approved in the 2008-09 Budget Act.
- (3) Adjustment to the funding in subsequent budget years may only be made by an act of the Legislature.

For the 2013-14 fiscal year, the CHRB's operating budget as determine by the Governor's Budget is \$11,639,000 and such amount shall be subject to change in future years.

#### ANALYSIS

The CHRB support formula was developed in consultation with the horse racing industry. As in prior years, the formula is based upon the license fees that would have been paid to the State of California had the Senate Bill 16 (SB16) not been enacted. The following mechanism was used to develop the formula:

- The projected commingled handle was multiplied by the pre SB16 license fee rate for each host track to arrive at the estimated pre SB16 license fees for the fiscal year 2013-14.
- The CHRB support percentages were calculated by dividing the CHRB approved budget by the estimated pre SB16 license fees. The rate for the 2013-14 fiscal year will be 52.65 percent.
- The same procedure was followed to calculate the Fairs and Expositions (F/E) recapture payments. The rate for the 2013-14 fiscal year will be 4.16 percent.

Fiscal year 2013-14 is the fifth year the CHRB support formula is in effect to provide for the CHRB support funding. Table 1 below shows the CHRB approved budgets and the CHRB support fee rates used to fund the CHRB operations.

The CHRB support fee rate is an estimate, and depending on handle activity there may be over/under payments made for CHRB support and F/E support and F/E recapture payments. The CHRB and the industry recognize that a determination of over/under payment amounts will be necessary at the end of each fiscal year. The industry has agreed to fund underpayments within ten business days. For overpayments, the industry will get a credit towards amounts due in the following year. See attachments as follows:

As of June 13, 2013 industry representatives had agree to the CHRB support formula. However, due to logistics we do not have all the signatures attached to the agreement. We are missing Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association signature.

# STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF 2014/2015 NIGHT RACING DATES AT LOS ALAMITOS AND CAL EXPO

#### BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19530 provides the Board the authority to allocate racing weeks to an applicant pursuant to the provisions of the horse racing law and to specify such racing days, dates, and hours for horse racing meetings as will be in the public interest, and will subserve the purposes of the law. Business and Professions Code section 19531 states the Board shall make allocations for racing weeks, including simultaneous racing between zones as it deems appropriate. The maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated for horse racing other than at fairs, shall be as follows: (a) For thoroughbred racing: 44 weeks per year in the northern zone: 42 weeks per year in the central zone; and seven weeks per year in the southern zone. (b) For harness racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. (c) For quarter horse racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. (d) For harness racing and quarter horse racing: a total of 77 weeks per year in the combined central and southern zones. Business and Professions Code section 19532(a) specifies any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the northern zone may receive no more than 35 weeks of that racing. (b) Any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the central zone may receive no more than 17 weeks of that racing, except that any association which conducts a split meeting may receive up to 20 weeks of that racing. No more than one such split meeting may be licensed in any one year. Business and Professions Code section 19549 provides the maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated to a fair shall be four weeks each, except under specified conditions.

Board Rule 1430, Allocation of Racing Weeks and Dates, states the Board shall allocate racing weeks and dates for the conduct of horse racing in this State for such time periods and at such racing facilities as the Board determines will best subserve the purposes of the Horse Racing Law and which will be in the best interests of the people of California in accord with the intent of the Horse Racing Law.

In preparation for discussion regarding 2014 and 2015 race date allocations, the industry was asked to submit proposed race dates as well as any information or plans related to its 2014/1015 race dates requests. Proposals for night racing dates were received for quarter horse racing at Los Alamitos and harness racing at Cal Expo.

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

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

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
#### LOS ALAMITOS RACING CALENDAR (12/26/14 - 12/21/15)

CARF believes that this approach would allow for an initial decision confirming most of the dates that GGF has requested for 2014. At the same time, this approach would give Fair Boards a chance to consider potential changes to the summer fair racing calendar in Northern California for 2014 and 2015.

In conjunction with the CARF request to defer a decision on 2014 summer racing dates until the Board's September regular meeting, the California Exposition and State Fair, has also respectfully requested that the Board's discussion and decision regarding 2014 and 2015 Northern California Fairs race dates be continued until the end of the summer Fair season. The request is based on a number of factors including the impending opening of the state fair and the Alameda County Fairs. Both fairs have new CEO's that are working to produce successful face meetings. In addition there are significant changes this summer at the Sonoma County and San Joaquin county fairs. Given the amount of change, Cal Expo submits that is seems prudent to get through the bulk of the Northern California Fair Race meetings this summer so that all parties can better evaluate the fairs future.

CAL Expo submits that in order for GGF to plan appropriately for the first half of 2014, the Board could approve the 2014 spring race dates at GGF up to June 15, 2014.

Cal Expo submitted the following information regarding its 2015 State Fair and Cal Expo Thoroughbred Racing Dates:

Although it plans to operate the 2015 State Fair in July of 2015, it has been approached by members of the racing industry, suggesting that the State Fair shift its fair dates back to the end of the summer to encompass the Labor Day weekend. While the State Fair is open to prudently dialoguing with industry leaders on this item, such discussion could not be adequately held until much later in the year. Discussion would need to be broad based to include the racing industry, as well as other fair industry partners that would be impacted by such date changes. In addition the timing and possible impacts of Cal Expo's Renewal Plan would also need to be carefully considered.


