#### **MINUTES**

Chairman Shapiro asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of January 19, 2006. Vice-Chairman Moretti, Chairman Shapiro and Deputy Attorney General Derry Knight made corrections. Commissioner Bianco motioned to approve the minutes as amended. Commissioner Granzella seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE HOLLYWOOD PARK RACING ASSOCIATION (T) AT HOLLYWOOD PARK FROM APRIL 26 THROUGH JULY 16, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

Chairman Shapiro said the item would be tabled until the March 2006 Regular Board Meeting.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON WAIVING CHRB RULE 1606 - COUPLING OF HORSES.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was tabled.

PRESENTATION BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE CALIFORNIA THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN'S FOUNDATION ON THE BACKSTRETCH EMPLOYEES' HEALTH AND WELFARE PROGRAM AND FUNDING.

Kevin Bolling of the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation (CTHF) said the CTHF was a charitable foundation that provided assistance to California's thoroughbred backstretch workers and their immediate families. Mr. Bolling stated the CTHF operated two medical and dental clinics and served as the primary and preventive medical provider to its clients. He said the CTHF served approximately 10,000 patients yearly at its clinics in Bay Meadows and Santa Anita, and referred another 6,000 persons to outside providers. In addition, the CTHF provided financial assistance to the backstretch communities. Mr. Bolling said the CTHF received 50 percent of its funding from uncashed winning on-track tickets; however, such monies were decreasing while medical and other expenses were increasing. He stated that caused the CTHF to consider seeking legislation to increase the percentage of uncashed winning on-track ticket money it received. The CTHF would ask for up to 90 percent of such funds. In addition, the CTHF was actively working to reduce its expenses by negotiating service provider contracts for medical and dental procedures in Northern and Southern California. The CTHF was also assisting its clients in getting medical, unemployment, disability and hospital insurance programs. Moving clients into such programs reduced the client's costs and allowed the CTHF to serve additional persons. Mr. Bolling described a number of additional cost cutting strategies of CTHF, including administrative cuts that eliminated seven staff positions and the reduction of employee pension costs. He added the CTHF was fortunate to have the support of the industry and the Board, and he hoped the Board would endorse future legislative initiatives. Chairman Shapiro asked how much money the

CTHF received from racing charities and advance deposit wagering (ADW). Mr. Bowling said ADW contributed just over \$200,000 in 2005; he could not recall the amounts for racing charities. Commissioner Harris asked where the remaining uncashed winning on-track ticket monies were directed. Mr. Bolling said the remaining 50 percent of the monies was dedicated to track security. At the end of the fiscal year the unused portion of that money was paid to the General Fund. Chairman Shapiro said he would support any legislative initiatives and he encouraged the CTHF to approach the industry's charitable foundations. Commissioner Harris said he did not know if medical expenses should be thought of as charity, as private enterprise relied on employer and employee to pay such costs. He stated it was important to keep the charitable aspect alive, but at some point revenue from the employers could be necessary. Chairman Shapiro said he agreed with Commissioner Harris. He stated CTHF clients paid almost \$170,000 in co-payments, and they were the ones who did not have a lot of disposable income. Perhaps the California Thoroughbred Trainers could work with the CTHF to find a way to generate some funds. Chairman Shapiro asked if any of the funds for workmen's compensation could be used to assist the CTHF. Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight said it would take a statutory amendment to allow the use of such funds. Chairman Shapiro stated that if the workmen's comp fund were building a surplus, a statutory amendment to direct a portion of any surplus to the CTHF would be desirable. Commissioner Harris asked if the CTHF was enrolling its clients in California's Healthy Families Program. Mr. Bolling said the CTHF was moving as many of its clients as it could to the program.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON A PROGRESS REPORT BY THE RACING ASSOCIATIONS ON THE MATTER OF TRACK SURFACE SAFETY CONSISTENCY, INCLUDING BUY NOT LIMITED TO THE INSTALLATION OF POLY-TRACK TYPE SURFACES.

Craig Fravel of Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) said he would describe Polytrack as a state of the art athletic field. All of California's racetracks were based on designs from the 1930s and 1940s, and many still had the same sub-base from when they were built. While athletic fields across the United States had been modified with state of the art drainage and synthetic surfaces, racetracks were stuck in the past. Mr. Fravel said Poly-track was designed to work as an integrated system from the horse's hoof down to the bottom of the racetrack. The top layer of a Polytrack was about six inches, and was comprised of sand, synthetic fibers and recycled rubber. All of the materials were weighed and combined with microcrystal and Mr. Fravel commented the wax was a petroleum-based product that was entirely nontoxic. The wax coating served a number of functions. One was to increase the strength or ability of the track to hold together, replacing water. This essentially eliminated water as a variable, which affected track performance. The wax coating also reduced dust. At the bottom of the track was a clean-stone base, and drainage pipes that drained longitudinally and latitudinal, so any water applied to the track drains through and out into the drainage system. Mr. Fravel then explained how a Polytrack was built. He stated the training track at Keeneland had been used since September 2004, and was the preference of horsemen. In addition, Keeneland was completing the design process to replace its main track in the summer of 2006 with a Polytrack surface. Mr. Fravel stated the recovery ability of the Polytrack surface was dramatic. He said after hundreds of horses had covered the same ground it was difficult to see where they had been. One of the most significant elements of the Polytrack was

safety. In the year 2004 there were ten catastrophic breakdowns at Turfway Park from September to December. In 2005, with the Polytrack, that number was reduced to three. In comparison, Mr. Fravel said in two months of racing at DMTC, between 12 and 16 horses were lost on average. He stated fewer breakdowns were also beneficial for jockeys and others who rode racehorses. DMTC sent Dr. Sue Stover from the University of California at Davis (UCD) to Keeneland to test an instrumentive horseshoe she developed. The shoe was tested on the Polytrack, turf track and the regular organic dirt track. Mr. Fravel said Dr. Stover gave him a letter indicating her preliminary data supported the safety-friendliness of the Polytrack. He stated other studies using different equipment led to the same conclusions. In addition, focus groups and meetings with trainers and jockeys who performed on the Polytrack also supported the research. Another benefit of the Polytrack was financial. At Turfway Park the 2006 handle was up 99 percent, year-to-date. Mr. Fravel commented no track in California could report such positive financial results. DMTC projected that if it increased its handle by only 2.5 percent, it would have annual revenue increases of a half million dollars. At 5 percent, the projected annual benefit would be 1.6 million dollars. DMTC was only a twomonth race meeting, yet the possibilities for payback were in the three to four year category. Mr. Fravel reviewed the numbers regarding starts made by horses that trained on Polytrack and the increases in field size experienced at Turfway Park. In addition, he discussed the consistency of the racing surface and how it eliminated significant biases, which were a deterrent to large wagers. He stated the racetrack was fair to all riders and Turfway Park statistics showed horses could win from anywhere on the racetrack. Mr. Fravel concluded his presentation by talking about the results of research conducted by an independent market

research firm hired by Keeneland. The research firm did face-to-face interviews with trainers and jockeys during the 2005 fall and holiday meetings. The results of the research demonstrated that trainers and jockeys had a favorable opinion of the Polytrack surface. Mr. Fravel said DMTC made a presentation to the 22<sup>nd</sup> District Agricultural Association (DAA) to request an allocation of funding to install a Polytrack surface. He stated the DAA was receptive, but everyone recognized there were additional hurdles, including the California Costal Commission (CCC). The DAA gave the go-ahead for DMTC to file for a permit with the CCC. He added the State Racetrack Leasing Commission, which had the ultimate authority over DMTC's operations, also approved the process. Chairman Shapiro said from November 2004 to November 2005, there were 320 horse fatalities at California racetracks. In the prior year with corresponding dates there were 243 horse fatalities. He stated that did not include injuries and other problems the industry suffered on a daily basis. Chairman Shapiro stated the industry could not afford to ignore the problem, and he applauded DMTC and other tracks that were addressing the issue. He said it was critical to move California forward, and the Board wanted to assist the industry by subsidizing in any way possible the expense of installing synthetic racing surfaces. Chairman Shapiro thanked Jack Liebau of Bay Meadows for looking at legislative relief or incentive to offset the cost of installing a Polytrack surface. Howard Zucker of California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) thanked the industry for addressing the issue of racetrack surfaces. He spoke in favor of synthetic racing surfaces. Charles Dougherty of CTT spoke about the problems trainers were experiencing with organic dirt racing surfaces. He concluded by stating a majority of trainers supported the installation of new surfaces. Richard Mandella, a licensed trainer, talked about the problems trainers were

experiencing with organic dirt racing surfaces. He stated as the installation of alternative racing surfaces became a reality, the costs could cause some in the industry to become nervous, however, he urged the Board to keep its focus on the issue, as something needed to be done. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to initiate a rule that would require as a condition for license that any track operating four continuous weeks of thoroughbred racing in a calendar year installs a polymer synthetic type-racing surface not later than December 31, 2007. Commissioner Moss **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

# DISCUSSION ON SUGGESTIONS AND EFFORTS THAT WOULD STOP OR LIMIT ILLEGAL GAMBLING IN CALIFORNIA BY OFFSHORE ENTITIES.

Chairman Shapiro said illegal wagering houses were increasingly stealing the signal and the industry was not benefiting. He stated the industry needed to look at what it could do in conjunction with other horse racing venues on a state and national level. In addition, Chairman Shapiro stated the industry should lobby state and federal governments for assistance. Craig Fravel of Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) said the National Thoroughbred Racing Association funded a significant task force to study the issue and concluded it was a matter for the states' Attorney General's Office, the U. S. Attorney's Office and the Federal Justice Department. However, most of these entities were not interested in prosecuting individual gamblers. Mr. Fravel added there had been some movement regarding advertising illegal offshore bookmakers or sports betting activities in major publications. He stated "The Sporting News" recently paid a multi-million dollar fine for aiding and abetting illegal wagering activity. It appeared the fine did not result in a reduction of such advertising, but if such actions became more pervasive, there could be a reduction. Mr. Fravel said

perhaps the Board could adopt similar tactics, or encourage the U.S. Attorneys in California to act on a similar basis. Chuck Champion of Youbet.com stated illegal gambling was prolific and his organization had spent a lot of time and energy to understand what the industry could do about the problem. The effect of the issue on advance deposit wagering (ADW) and racetracks was similar, as ADW was seeing its larger customers migrate to offshore systems and bookmakers. Mr. Champion said Youbet believed the reason for the migration was that such entities fulfilled a consumer demand the legitimate racing industry was unknowingly facilitating. Bookmakers had to get into the pools if they were going to accommodate exotic wagers. The industry currently had thousands of guests entering its pari-mutuel system and it did not know who they were. Mr. Champion said the industry needed to understand who these guests were, and to ensure there was transparency in who was receiving the signal. The industry also needed to enact procedures and policies to make sure there was compliance. Mr. Champion stated Youbet bought an offshore rebate shop to ensure its customers wagered through a regulated and compliant entity. Youbet believed if others within the industry did the same, the industry would have an opportunity to cut off the illegal offshore bookmakers. Youbet was also aware of its customers who downloaded an enormous amount of race cards, yet did not place wagers. Mr. Champion said in certain cases Youbet knew such persons were wagering offshore. Youbet hoped to identify and work with such patrons to educate them regarding the implications of their behavior for the industry and because their behavior was illegal. Arturo Alemany of MIR International (MIR) said his organization represented clients in various Latin American markets. He stated illegal offshore wagering was very serious for his customers as it hurt their bottom line. MIR would happily assist with the issue as it was a

common problem, and its elimination was a common goal. Chairman Shapiro asked if he was correct in his understanding that certain sites were pirating the signal. Mr. Alemany said in Tijuana there were authorized decoders, which MIR controlled. If customers did not pay, the signal was cut off. However, TVG was received at some of the border community operations. If such sites did not want to pay for the signal, they simply took them from TVG, and they showed TVG throughout the day with some greyhound races. Chairman Shapiro asked if there was any technology to stop such activity. Mr. Alameny said he did not know of a way. Ron Charles of Magna Entertainment Company (MEC) said his organization was working with the industry to try to stop the advertising of the offshore bookmakers. MEC was successful with the Daily Racing Form, and it worked with Horseplayer Magazine. Mr. Charles said the problem was very large in Hong Kong until advertising offshore bookmakers was made illegal. He stated he did not know if that could be done in the United States, but advertising was the first step in removing potential players from bookmakers. Chairman Shapiro asked if there were any laws that prohibited advertising of illegal activities. Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight said he was not aware of such a law. The Wire Act and the Interstate Horseracing Act prohibited wagering that did not comply with them, but they did not expressly prohibit advertising. DAG Knight said the aiding and abetting approach had been used, but there was no clear-cut issue. In addition, free commercial speech under the First Amendment was an issue, and in some countries where such wagering was taking place it was not illegal. Chairman Shapiro asked why legislation could not be enacted in California. He stated illegal wagering was something that needed to be attacked on the state and federal level. If the promotion of such wagering was halted, it could lead to its eradication. Mr. Charles said he

thought legislation had not been tried because it was a difficult issue. If such legislation were possible. Youbet would be the first to support it. Chairman Shapiro stated studies of wagering patterns showed the fastest growing segment of wagering was the illegal offshore wagering sector. He stated it was the biggest threat to the industry, and while the wagering might be difficult to stop, the industry could at least try to stop the advertising. Mr. Charles said Youbet's other concern was that such wagering was growing, and was active in taking players right off the tracks. Chairman Shapiro stated he was aware that persons who were on-track were able to identify large wagers and were attempting to recruit them as customers. He suggested that perhaps a letter endorsed by the ADW companies would move some state legislators to act, and perhaps a national movement could be started. Mr. Charles said a law could be passed to make advertising of the offshore bookmakers illegal, but there were so many publications already engaged in such advertising and the Justice Department had not shown an interest. Mr. Champion sited Party Poker as an example. He said that entity got around the law by using a partypoker.net site as opposed to partypoker.com, and up to 75 percent of the customers were U.S. residents. He stated he believed the largest handle shift was the result of direct sales and people soliciting on track rather than mass media. While Youbet would support any effort to curtail advertising of illegal wagering, there would be individuals who would file lawsuits. Mr. Champion said he believed if the industry looked at the economics of the issue, and filled the customers' needs, progress would be made. The industry needed to provide at least its larger customers a mechanism where they could stay in the pools. Players who wagered with illegal offshore bookmakers were wagering on a race, and the risk of not being paid. The industry needed to educate such patrons regarding the risks

they were taking, and the injury to the sport they caused. Chairman Shapiro said he understood, and hoped the industry could arrive at a plan that would indicate if the current model should be reworked, if advertising should be attacked or if there was another solution. Mr. Champion commented there was a digital rights technology on the horizon that would give track operators and uplink and downlink companies the ability to better encrypt the signal and protect the media rights of the industry. He stated at the end of 2006 the industry should be in a better position to control the signal. Chairman Shapiro said he was aware Youbet could identify customers who were online for hours downloading data, yet did not make a wager. He asked if Youbet shared such information with law enforcement. Mr. Champion said Youbet did not. Youbet contacted some of those customers to try to understand their activities. He stated they were getting a better deal where they were placing wagers. There were larger customers who did need a different arrangement if they were willing to wager that kind of money into horse racing. Mr. Champion said a frequent wager program at higher levels was one answer. He stated the public was used to being rewarded for loyalty and frequency; it happened in supermarkets, and in the airline industry. The airline industry did not want to offer rewards, but it was something it had to do to compete in the marketplace. Mr. Champion said the horse racing industry should not think rebate programs would not affect it, and it would not have to engage in offering rewards. He stated, however, that if the industry did offer rewards, it would need to do it transparently, and make sure the persons involved were in compliance with the Board's rules and regulations. When a reward vehicle was available, the ADW companies could go out and bring the larger players back to legitimate channels for wagering. Chairman Shapiro said the industry needed to meet and consider different models.

While the notion of rebating was not popular, to be competitive the industry would have to look at what it could create to bring fans back. Commissioner Moss asked if most customers knew they were dealing with illegal bookmakers. Mr. Champion said most of the individuals with real volume were very sophisticated and knew exactly what they were doing. Some of them, however, did not recognize the implications of what they were doing and did not realize the bookmakers were making no contributions to the sport. Commissioner Moss said perhaps Youbet could let such individuals know what they were dealing with. Mr. Champion said Youbet was looking at approximately 1675 records that were consuming an enormous amount of audio/visual and racing cards. He stated Youbet knew what those individuals were doing; the time of day they arrived; the cards they wagered and the tracks they affected. Youbet would like to work with the track operators and horsemen's groups to educate those individuals, explain what they were doing to the industry and offer some type of rebate or volume discount. Vice-Chairman Moretti said some of the issues being discussed were similar to those in the recording and motion picture industries. She asked if Youbet had explored working with those industries' legal teams. Mr. Champion said there were some initial conversations, but they thought the issues were different. However, he stated he agreed that the digital rights problems with music were very similar to horse racing digital rights issues. Richard Castro of the Pari-Mutuel Employees Guild (Guild) said it looked like customer service shops could be in the scheme of rewards programs. He stated the Guild would be happy to start talking with the industry about such jobs.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE MATTER OF (1) LICENSING AND SETTING OF ADW HUB RATES AND THE OBLIGATIONS OF ADW COMPANIES AND OR RACING ASSOCIATIONS TO HAVE AGREEMENTS WITH HORSEMEN OR OWNERS ORGANIZATIONS; (2) TVG AND TOC HUB FEE RATE DISPUTE RELATING TO IMPORTED TB RACES AND THE PROPRIETY OF AN ADW COMPANY TO IMPORT RACES WITHOUT A CONTRACT IN PLACE WITH A RACING ASSOCIATION OR HORSEMEN'S ORGANIZATION OF THE SAME BREED AS THE IMPORTED RACES; (3) METHOD OF DETERMINING, CALCULATING AND RESERVING FOR RATES IN DISPUTE; (4) ANY OTHER RELATED MATTER CONSIDERED PART OF THE DISPUTE BETWEEN ANY ADW COMPANY AND ANY RACING ASSOCIATION OR HORSEMEN'S OR OWNER'S ORGANIZATION.

Chairman Shapiro said Section 19604(k) of the Business and Profession Code provided that the Board would hear matters in dispute. He stated there were a variety of issues that were in dispute, which included how hub fee rates were determined, who could import thoroughbred races and when such races could be imported. Another issue was the accounting of disputed funds. Chairman Shapiro said the item was not intended to be a discussion of how advance deposit wagering (ADW) should be conducted in the future, or of modifications of existing ADW agreements. He stated such issues would be discussed in a series of meetings chaired by himself and state Senator Dean Florez. Chairman Shapiro said he attempted to have the parties meet and resolve their differences, as he believed it was in the best interests of horse racing. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said the parties met to discuss the issues, and reached a temporary agreement regarding how to proceed. He thanked Senator Florez and Bob Alvarez for their help. Mr. Couto said the parties requested that the agenda item be continued until March 2006. Chairman Shapiro said the item would be continued. He thanked the parties for meeting and attempting to work on their problems. Senator Florez said he looked forward to working with Chairman Shapiro, and thanked him for his leadership in

attempting to resolve the issues. He stated the issues were important and the Legislature was attentive to the needs of the industry.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said the Sacramento Harness Association (SHA) and the Hollywood Park Fall Racing Association (HPFRA) saw increases in their average daily handle, and ontrack and off-track handle. Commissioner Harris said he was disappointed in SHA's on-track He asked if there were any initiatives to attract more fans to the track. attendance. Christopher Schick of SHA reviewed his association's meeting. He stated there were no breakdowns on the racetrack, which he attributed to not changing the track for thoroughbred racing. The qualifying standards for racing were lowered by two full seconds to improve the quality of racing. In addition, there was a track record on November 19, 2005. A horse did the first sub-150 mile in California by running 149. Mr. Schick said attendance might have been lower because of the grandstand and turf club renovations, which would be completed in April 2006. Meanwhile, SHA was initiating a strong marketing plan that would improve the on-track experience. Mr. Schick reviewed additional marketing plans and stated SHA was happy with its progress. Chairman Shapiro complemented Mr. Schick on SHA's handle, and its marketing plans. He commented he noted some new stables were running at Cal-Expo, and stated that was a positive step. Jack Liebau of HPFRA talked about HPFRA's meeting. He stated the average handle per starter was up, as was the average daily and on-track and offtrack in California. The out-of-state handle was down, which he attributed to lack of turf racing. Mr. Liebau said the renovations of the turf course were progressing well.

## REPORT OF THE STEWARDS COMMITTEE

Commissioner Harris said the Stewards Committee (committee) met on February 14, 2005. The committee heard attorney Darrell Vienna review the rules of evidence and how they applied to stewards' hearings. In addition videos of contentious inquiries were viewed and discussed to help build uniformity in how California's stewards call races. Problems with blood tests to get off the Official Veterinarian's List were also discussed. Other topics of discussion were the overall capability of the video equipment used to analyze races, and the interaction between stewards and the media.

#### **GENERAL BUSINESS**

Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke to the Board regarding various issues of concern to him. Richard Castro of the Pari-Mutuel Employees Guild said problems occasionally arose in the mutual department, but they were solved with the help of the industry. Chairman Shapiro said the Board would be looking into previous issues raised by Mr. Castro. Ed Halpern of California Thoroughbred Trainers said his organization was concerned about the effect of Rule 1663, Entry of Claimed Horses, on out-of-state trainers at fair meetings. Chairman Shapiro said the issue could be discussed at a future time.







#### Plan for Graded Stakes/Races of \$100,000 or more

When a Graded Stakes Race or race with a purse of \$100,000 or more is conducted at Bay Meadows, the following procedures are implemented to enhance security:

- Richard Lewis, Coordinator of Racing Operations, provides a list of starters to Michael Scalzo, VP Operations and Security. The list, which is compared to the day's official racing program, contains the following information:
  - 1. Name of Horse
  - 2. Name of Trainer or Substitute Trainer
  - 3. Name of Groom
  - 4. Name of Veterinarian
  - 5. Barn number where horse is stabled
  - 6. Stall number in barn where horse is stabled
- To supplement the normal security staff assigned to the barn area, "Special security" personnel are
  assigned to each horse's stall and surveillance begins six (6) hours before the official start of the
  race. The number of special security personnel is dependent upon the number of entrants in the
  race.
- The special security people attend an instructional meeting early in the morning of the race; instructions include:
  - 1. The specific assignment details for the individual horse assigned each guard.
  - 2. A briefing on race day medication rules, provided by a California Horse Racing Board representative.
  - 3. A briefing on the dynamics of horse racing and racing operations by Richard Lewis, Coordinator of Racing Operations.
  - 4. A briefing on general operations procedures as they relate specifically to the Bay Meadows Racecourse.
  - 5. Each guard is given a packet which includes an official racing program and a form provided by the CHRB which is to be signed by the attending veterinarian at the time of the administration of furosemide or estrogens for all horses registered as bleeders. The form notes the name of the Horse, Trainer, Veterinarian, Race Number, Barn Number, Stall Number, Official Post Time, Administered Time of Bleeder Medication and Number of injections/syringes.
  - 6. Each individual is given a video camera to record any and all activity involving individuals entering and exiting their assigned horse's stall. Guards are instructed to first direct their camera recording to the posted number of the stall to confirm that the video is directed at the assigned runner. Guards are instructed to videotape the attending veterinarian at the time of his or her administering the furosemide and/or estrogen shot for those horses registered as bleeders.

- 7. Each guard is instructed to monitor any suspicious activity or activity they don't understand, and to contact the VP of Operations and Security if and when suspicious activities may take place.
- 8. Guards are instructed to station themselves as close to the assigned horses' stall as possible, without jeopardizing safety, and are to remain in view of the horses' stall.
- Each guard is instructed to follow, on foot, the horse and handlers to the receiving barn before the race is run.
- 10. Each guard is instructed to meet the VP of Operations & Security at the receiving barn, where he or she will return the video camera and any notes he/she may have taken pertaining to the day's surveillance. At this time, there will be a discussion with all guards relating to the day's activities.
- Video surveillance tapes are saved until all test results have been determined to be negative.
- CHRB investigators coordinate with the BMRA special surveillance team. Investigators are
  encouraged to visit the location of all participating horses in the graded/stakes race(s) of the day.

#### Detention Barn Plan & Number and Location of surveillance cameras in detention barn area:

In January, 2005, a new surveillance system was installed in Barn One, which is the barn mostly frequently utilized by horses shipping in to run at Bay Meadows. Barn One is 360' long by 180' wide, and has ten exits and entrances. It contains approximately 162 stalls, and houses the receiving barn area, transit and detention stalls. Surveillance equipment includes a 16 camera, 180 GB digital recording system. The installation of surveillance equipment in Barn One enables the company to better monitor the activity of horses and persons entering and exiting Barn One and the stable gate area, which is roughly fifty feet away.

One camera has been strategically placed to monitor the stable gate entrance, two cameras monitor designated detention stalls, and the balance have been placed to provide surveillance of the entrances and exits to the barn.

The recorder is kept in a secure housing in a locked communications room in the Barn building. A password is required before any action can be taken on the recording system.

The cameras are powered from a common power supply located, with the recorder, in the communications room. The entire system is powered with a UPS power back-up, and will continue to operate during a power failure.

All cameras generate their own infra-red light source, so they provide a viewable image even in "total" darkness. They operate in color during the day, and convert to black-and-white in dark lighting conditions.

The digital recorder records all cameras at full frame. Recording options include resolution quality and motion detection. In motion detection mode, video frame recording commences only when motion is detected within selected areas, which saves on hard-drive storage space. The amount of time that can be stored before re-recording over existing material occurs is dependant upon the amount of barn activity. If all cameras recorded 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, at the highest resolution setting, the 180 GB drive would begin re-writing over existing data within about 48 hours. With standard resolution and motion detection engaged, recording time falls between 5 and 10 days before re-writing begins.

- D. For night racing associations: Describe emergency lighting system:

Bay Meadows has five diesel electric generators that power backup lighting systems. Normally, the generators are run only in the case of a PG & E failure. On nights during which evening cards are conducted, the generator connected to the twenty-four 1,500 watt metal halide lights on the roof is turned on in order to insure that there is no transfer lag time should there be a PG & E failure. Three portable 4-lamp, 1,000 watt metal halide generator sets, one in the corporation yard, one at the quarter chute entrance, and one in the south parking lot adjacent to the jockeys room, are also utilized. The emergency lighting system provides power not only to the track lights, but to key areas such as totalizator, computer, phone, and money rooms, public address systems, and public areas in the grandstand and parking lots. Additionally, each barn is equipped with battery powered emergency lighting. To insure reliability, the generators are serviced bi-annually and are run for at least one hour each month.

#### Wednesday, May 10 – Opening Day



#### • Thursday, May 11 - Senior Thursday

- Every Thursday during the meet will be Senior Thursday. On Senior Thursday, all seniors aged 62 and older receive free Grandstand admission or \$3 Clubhouse admission. Additionally, a \$5 Spaghetti Feed and free handicapping seminar will be offered each Thursday to all fans in attendance.
- Senior Thursdays will be promoted in local print, through direct mail pieces, in all in-house advertising tools (program ads, television bumpers and announcements, on the web-site), and through direct contact to local retirement communities.

## • Friday, May 12 - Friday's Alive

- Each Friday of the meet will be Friday's Alive, featuring evening racing. Friday night racing enables many customers to attend the races when they are not working. Also, group events are much more heavily attended on Friday nights, as compared to Friday afternoons. Friday's Alive will again consist of live music between races plus food and drink specials. New fans can log on to the Bay Meadows web site, <a href="www.baymeadows.com">www.baymeadows.com</a>, to learn about Bay Meadows in a unique manner. On the homepage, fans who have never attended the races can sign up for a personalized tour of the facility. The special tour includes free admission and programs, a look at the entire facility, and seating in the Clubhouse boxes which overlook the outside paddock and finish line. Fans arrange for their tours at their convenience. Newcomers are met in front of the facility, at the admission entrances, and receive an explanation as to how they would return to the races on their own. The tour includes trips to various areas of the plant, from the mainline to the Turf Club, and attendees are familiarized with where to buy a program or Form, where to purchase reserved seats, etc., during the tour. At the end of the tour, attendees are escorted to a seating area reserved for newcomers which overlooks the finish line. The tour guide walks them through a few simple handicapping techniques and visits them occasionally throughout the remainder of the day to make sure they are comfortable.

# STAFF ANALYSIS TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF RULE 1582. FORM OF ENTRIES AND DECLARATIONS

Regular Board Meeting March 23, 2006

#### **BACKGROUND**

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. Under Rule 1406, Suspension of Rule, the Board may temporarily suspend the application of any of its rules. Rule 1582, Form of Entries and Declarations, provides that entries and declarations shall be made in writing on forms provided by the association. In addition, it states that entries may be made by telephone and are valid if they are promptly confirmed in writing. On March 1, 2006, a directive was issued that temporarily waived the requirement for written entry confirmation. The directive was issued pursuant to Rule 1406.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Over time, industry practice may vary from the provisions of the Board's rules and regulations. An example of this is the requirement under Rule 1582 that telephone entries are followed up with a written confirmation. In reality, if the racing office recognizes the person who makes a telephone entry, it will accept the entry without requiring written confirmation. If a telephone entry is made from out of state, or by a person unknown to the racing office, written confirmation is required. Experience with this process has resulted in few, if any, problems. In addition, many horses are stabled at auxiliary facilities, which can make written entry confirmation impractical. In recognition of the divergence between industry practice and Rule 1582, the Board enacted Rule 1406 and issued a directive that temporarily waived the requirement for a written entry confirmation when an entry is made by telephone.

### RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for discussion and action by the Board.

Subject: TEMPORARY WAIVER OF RULE 1582 PURSUANT TO RULE 1406

Pending action by the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) at its March 2006 meeting, the requirement set forth in CHRB Rule 1582 that entries made by telephone must be confirmed in writing, is hereby temporarily suspended. Good cause exists for this temporary partial suspension of this Rule since horses are currently stabled not only at the track where race meetings are in progress, but are also stabled at auxiliary facilities, often miles from the track where the live racing is occurring. Such off-track stabling makes written entry confirmation impractical; and prior experience with no written entry confirmations has caused few if any special problems.

This temporary suspension of the written entry confirmation requirement of Rule 1582 is issued pursuant to the authority of Rule 1406, and is effective immediately.

# STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1969. WAGERING PROHIBITED

Regular Board Meeting March 23, 2006

#### **BACKGROUND**

Business and Professions (B&P) Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19440 states that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. The responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Board Rule 1969, Wagering Prohibited, provides that certain classes of licensees, as well as Board employees, shall not wager on the result of a race while on duty.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Maintaining the integrity of horse racing is an important facet of the sport's prosperity. In this regard, the actions of racing officials, association employees and Board staff have a direct bearing on the wagering public's confidence in the industry. Perceived unethical behavior can only reinforce the idea that the game is "fixed." To protect the integrity of horse racing the Board has enacted various rules regarding the conduct of persons under its jurisdiction. Rule 1969 currently prohibits wagering by certain classes of licensees and Board employees while on duty at a race meeting or simulcast wagering facility. The proposed amendment to Rule 1969 adds security staff, valets, and jockey or driver room attendants to the list of licensees precluded from wagering. In addition, the proposed amendment would provide that no person who falls under Rule 1969 may wager at a facility at which they are employed – if they are on duty, or off duty. This helps ensure that such persons, some of whom can affect the outcome of a race, are less likely to have a monetary interest in the result of a race. In addition, it will help eliminate the practice by some officials, association employees and Board staff of placing wagers at the facility at which they work, and in full view of the wagering public.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

Barry Broad, the Guild's General Counsel, has informed CHRB staff that changes to the Endowment's Board of Directors has placed control of the Endowment firmly in the hands of responsible industry representatives and not the prior Guild management. As such, since those issues have now been resolved, it is time to send the money to the Endowment. The amount of the funds is \$11,564.

Staff recommends that the Board approve this request.

As indicated in the prior item, Barry Broad, General Counsel for the Guild, has informed the CHRB staff that a restructuring of the Endowment's Board of Directors has clearly put the Endowment under the control of responsible industry representatives and not the prior Guild management. Since that issue has now been resolved, it is time to send the money to the Endowment. The amount of the funds is \$38,875.

Staff recommends that the Board approve this request.

# STAFF ANALYSIS REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

# REGULAR BOARD MEETING MARCH 23, 2006

# **Background:**

The Jockeys Guild provides a health and welfare program for California jockeys. That program is supported in part by uncashed refunds (Section 19612.9 of the Business and Professions Code). The current process is for the Guild to provide benefits for 6 to 12 months and then provide an audit of those benefit expenditures to the CHRB. The CHRB then approves the reimbursement to the Guild for the audit amount up to the amount of available uncashed refunds.

Because of the length of time that the Guild can be un-reimbursed for the funds it has spent on the California jockeys' benefits, it has created an unanticipated burden on the Guild. As such a solution has been found whereby the Guild will be reimbursed for benefit costs on a monthly basis. The attached Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) seeks to implement that solution. The key factor in this arrangement is that the Guild cannot be provided amounts greater than the available uncashed refunds. In recent years the amount of uncashed refunds has amounted to approximately \$1 million per year but there is no guarantee as to what will be available in any given year. In all cases, when the total amount of refunds has been transferred to the Guild to support this program, the Guild must work it out with its California participants as how to make up the difference, i.e., higher co-pays, less coverage, etc. Choices many organizations are making these days.

#### **Recommendation:**

Staff recommends that the Board approve this agreement.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This memorandum of understanding is between the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) and the Jockeys' Guild, Inc. (Guild) concerning the method of disbursement of funds authorized pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19612.9. The Guild has been previously certified by the CHRB as the majority representative of licensed California jockeys to provide health and welfare benefits pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19612.9. In accordance with the law, Business and Professions Code section 19612.9(a)(1), there is in effect an agreement between the Guild and the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) which describes the benefits which licensed California jockeys, former California licensed jockeys, and their dependents are entitled to (TOC Agreement). The TOC Agreement was approved by the CHRB. This memorandum of understanding is principally limited to addressing the method of payment by the CHRB to reimburse the Guild for health and welfare benefits provided in accordance with the TOC Agreement from funds held in trust by the CHRB.

This memorandum of understanding shall commence with funds to be disbursed to the Guild beginning on January 1, 2006 and shall continue until modified or terminated by the parties.

This memorandum of understanding may be terminated by either party with 30 days written notice and may be modified by the mutual consent of the parties at any time.

On or before the 20<sup>th</sup> day of each month, the CHRB shall distribute to the Guild a reimbursement for estimated expenses made in the previous month, as follows. The CHRB shall pay 85% of the monthly pro rata share of the amount distributed in the last calendar year for which a final audit was produced in accordance with Business and Professions Code section 19612.9. Should the amount held in trust by the CHRB not be sufficient to permit reimbursement of 85% of the monthly pro rata share, the CHRB may reduce the monthly estimate payment to match available funds and increase the monthly reimbursement when funds become available, provided that any advance shall not, during any calendar year, exceed 85% of allowances for any period of the last audited year. The Guild shall provide monthly certifications to the CHRB, on or before the 15<sup>th</sup> day of each month when reimbursement payment is being requested, that it provided the health and welfare benefits in accordance with the TOC Agreement during the preceding month.

No later than April 1 of each year, the Guild shall submit to the CHRB a final audit of the health and welfare program for the previous calendar year. The audit shall include verification of actual amounts expended on health and welfare benefits per the TOC Agreement, and shall meet the requirements of the CHRB. Within 45 days of submittal of the audit, the CHRB shall perform a reconciliation of the audit to determine the actual amount due pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19612.9. Within 90 days of the receipt of the audit, the CHRB shall pay any final amount due for the prior credited calendar year or submit to the Guild an invoice for any overpayment

made to the Guild. If any overpayment to the Guild does not exceed \$75,000, the Guild may choose not to make immediate repayment, and the CHRB may withhold the overpayment amount from the monthly estimated payments made pursuant to this memorandum of understanding.

It is the intent of the parties, notwithstanding the preceding paragraph, that the estimated payments made to the Guild shall no time exceed the amount of available funds generated in any one year from the unclaimed parimutuel refund tickets of a given year. Further, the parties agree that, should any overpayment or over advance occur, the amount of said overpayment or over advance shall be recouped from the immediately following year, or reconciliation period, whichever is first to occur. Should the Guild at any time cease to provide health and welfare benefits pursuant to the TOC Agreement, the amount of any overpayment or over advance shall be repaid upon demand.

Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19612.9(b), the Guild shall provide the CHRB with access to all records and documents necessary for the performance of its duties, including those held by third parties who may be acting for or on behalf of the Guild. Upon request, the Guild or its plan administrator shall provide monthly statements to the CHRB detailing actual plan expenses paid pursuant to the TOC Agreement.

# STAFF ANALYSIS REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF SIMULCAST AGREEMENT

# REGULAR BOARD MEETING MARCH 23, 2006

# **Background:**

The Horse Racing Law allows the import of out-of —country thoroughbred races. When this activity was first implemented there was considerable confusion about how to correctly distribute the takeout among the various participants. A unique aspect was the inclusion of the Los Alamitos as the hub for the "international" thoroughbred races. When a solution could not be found, the importing of the races was stopped while the various interests sought a viable solution.

The attached agreement is the product of that effort to find a solution. Normally such an agreement would not necessarily require specific Board approval. However, this agreement has a provision whereby the track commissions and horsemen's purses are reduced from standard takeout amounts so that other participants in the process can be adequately compensated. This is allowed by law (Section 19614.3 of the Business and Professions Code) but the law specifically requires Board approval of such a reduction in commissions and purses and also requires notification of the labor groups that could be affected by any such agreement.

### **Recommendation:**

Staff recommends that the Board approve this request.

# PROXY HOST AGREEMENT Out-of-Country Simulcasting March 10, 2006

This document will serve as an agreement between the following parties:

LAQHRA - Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association

LATC - Los Angeles Turf Club (Santa Anita)

PRA – Pacific Racing Association (Golden Gate Fields)

SHRA - Sacramento Harness Racing Association

HPRA - Hollywood Park Racing Association

BMRA – Bay Meadows Racing Association

TOC - Thoroughbred Owners of California

LAQHRA will serve as Proxy Host, distributing the signal and accepting wagers on the results of out-of-country Thoroughbred races pursuant to Section 19596.3(d) of California Horse Racing Law, in accord with the following terms:

- 1) The parties to this agreement will import out-of-country Thoroughbred races under the provisions of California law pertaining to Thoroughbred licensees, including Section 19596.3, and with express reference to Section 19601(j). These races shall be considered a Thoroughbred (or Fair) product; the Thoroughbred licensee conducting a race meeting at the time shall be considered the "Host Association" for wagers in the licensee's zone, and LQHRA shall be considered as "Proxy Host".
- 2) The term of this agreement will commence immediately and terminate Monday, May 15, 2006, unless otherwise extended by written agreement of all affected parties.
- 3) This agreement covers wagering on: (a) all out-of-country Thoroughbred races commencing at or before 5:30 pm (Pacific) ("Daytime"), and (b) all out-of-country Thoroughbred races commencing after 5:30 pm (Pacific) ("Night") on Wednesdays and Sundays. Wagering on out-of-country Thoroughbred races commencing after 5:30 pm (Pacific) on days other than Wednesdays and Sundays is not contemplated under this agreement and shall not take place unless the parties at a later date agree.
- 4) Host Fees payable to the out-of-country racing association shall be agreed upon by the parties in accord with Sec. 19601(j)(2). By way of example, the Host Fee payable from wagers on races conducted by the Australian Jockey Club shall be at the rate of 3.0% of gross handle.
- 5) The takeout schedule for out-of-country Thoroughbred racing shall be that of the out-of-country Host racing association. By way of example, the takeout schedule for Australian Jockey Club races shall be as follows:

6) The distribution of takeout from wagers on out-of-country races shall be in accord with California Horse Racing Law pertaining to the applicable Thoroughbred or Fair licensee conducting a racing meeting, including a reduction in Track/Purse Commissions pursuant to Section 19614.3, as follows:

- 8) Proxy Host Fees: As permitted under Sections 19614.3 and 19596.3(d), with respect to wagers placed on "Night" out-of-country races, the amounts retained from such wagers for Track/Purse commissions (excluding breakage and prior to CTBA 0.70% deduction from purses) shall be reduced (a) by 50% of Track/Purse commissions generated from such wagers placed at Los Alamitos, to be paid to LQHRA from Sunday wagering and to SHRA from Wednesday wagering; and (b) by 35% of the Track/Purse commissions generated from wagers at all other locations, which shall be allocated to LQHRA from

commissions generated on Sundays and to SHRA from commissions generated on Wednesdays (see below). The remainder shall be distributed pursuant to Sections 19605.8 and 19606(a), as set forth in item #7 above.

# STAFF ANALYSIS THE SETTING OF ADW HUB RATES

# REGULAR BOARD MEETING MARCH 23, 2006

# **Background:**

Section 19604 of the Horse Racing Law authorizes Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW). A copy of Section 19604 is attached to this item for easy reference. Paragraph (f) of the law indicates that in order to be licensed, the applicant must meet the following requirements: make a contractual agreement with the California licensee (horse racing association or fair) so that all of the ADW wagers they process are included in the appropriate wagering pools; obtain approval from the CHRB and distribute the ADW takeout in accordance with the Horse Racing Law, i.e., Section 19604, etc.

In addition, two-thirds of the way through paragraph (b) the Section 19604 indicates that the ADW hub may be deduct up to 6.5% for providing the service, and that they may also deduct up to 3.5% as a *host* fee if they contract with an out of state track to use that track's signal in their ADW program for their California patrons.

A dispute as to which organizations have a say in setting the hub fees has finally come to a head. The issue has raised questions that the CHRB may need to address: Is it only the CA racing association that has a contractual agreement with the ADW hub that negotiates with the hub to set the hub fee? Or, do the horsemen's organizations have a say in setting the hub fees, i.e., they work with the CA racing association when setting the hub fee? If so, what role do they play and how much weight do they have in setting the hub fees?

On a practical note: early in the start-up of ADW in California, certain Commissioners of the CHRB indicated their strong desire to see the horsemen participate in the development of ADW. This included agreements between the horsemen's organizations and the ADW hubs. Although some CA associations and the ADW hubs protested this extra-legal requirement, they relented to the CHRB's wishes and made agreements with the horsemen's organizations. After the initial start-up period was over, the horsemen have continued to insist on participating in the ADW approval process including the setting of hub fees – a position that has brought us to this agenda item.

The Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) have raised the issue of setting hub fees and the CA racing associations and the ADW hubs has joined the debate. Staff expects all sides to have representatives at the meeting to present their side of the issue.

# REGULAR BOARD MEETING MARCH 23, 2006

# **Background:**

Totalizator (tote) services in California are provided by Scientific Games Racing (SGR) formerly Autotote. This is a turn-key arrangement whereby the tracks contract with SGR to provide all aspects of the tote operations (hardware, software, personnel, etc.). The prior SGR contract expired in September 2005 and we have been operating under a one-year extension since that time. This item will allow the industry to report to the Board on the continuing contract negotiations with an emphasis on the fresh technologies that the new contract will bring to California tote operations. Of course, the biggest change will be the creation of a new West Coast data center in Sacramento that will consolidate the statewide tote operation. A report on this development is on the agenda for the prior day's Pari-Mutuel Committee meeting thus allowing the Committee to report to the Board on that subject.

In addition, on February 18, 2006, a hardware failure in the CHRIMS statewide communication network (used by tote and others) adversely affect tote operations in California for several hours. A report on that day has already been forwarded to the CHRB commissioners and executive director but is also included here.

Subject: REPORT ON PROBLEM THAT OCCURRED ON FEBRUARY 18, 2006

On the afternoon of February 18, 2006, a communication problem with the frame relay communication network caused a significant slow down in the processing of wagers. This led to the delay in tote calculations and the display of wagering results as well as the other assorted troubles of that afternoon. In order to understand the problem some background is necessary.

First: The problem was the fault of the communication network created and maintained by CHRIMS and its subcontractors and here is why:

During the late 1980's and early 1990's Autotote operated the totalizator systems in California. The three main totes (Bay Meadows, Los Alamitos, and a southern traveling tote at each live meet) were all interconnected by the use of leased communication lines. The executive director of CHRIMS during that time also needed to link the CHRIMS mainframe with all of the tracks throughout the state. He devised a plan to build a frame relay system to transfer CHRIMS data throughout the state. He realized that his network was almost identical to the tote network. He made a deal with Autotote to expand his frame relay system so that they could also send their tote data on his restricted and secure frame relay system for a fee. This was a better deal for Autotote and helped support CHRIMS with additional revenue. The arrangement has continued to this day even after Scientific Games Racing absorbed Autotote.

**Second:** Please review the attached memo from CHRIMS that explains how the problem occurred and what they are doing to avoid future problems.

John,

I regret to report that we did have a telecom outage on Saturday afternoon. Here is my understanding:

New Edge, one of our Telco providers for the frame relay circuits, reported a major Telco backbone routing issue due to a hardware failure in the Fresno area that affected all of their customers in Southern California, Los Alamitos (US!) being one of them. Our technician, Derek, was in the office at the time of the outage and worked with Marv at Scientific Games on switching the tote system to backup communications for all of the So. Cal sites. The ISDN backup ran until late Saturday evening. ISDN is a viable backup solution, but unfortunately under its current configuration is slower than the Frame Circuit network. This caused some delays on and off in the final couple of hours of racing. By working through the night on Saturday with New Edge (and finally getting a report from New Edge that their hardware had been replaced), my guys were able to confirm the Frame Circuits were functioning again and back in their normal configuration in time for Sunday's betting. Please be assured that we did everything we could to keep the wagering traffic flowing at the time. My guys definitely understand the criticality of wagering downtime.

I am following up with SBC and New Edge to see about compensation for the outage, even though our agreements with the Telco providers do not cover this. It felt like a huge outage to the tracks, to the patrons and to us, but at a couple of hours out of 365 days, their service levels are still 'acceptable' at near 99% uptime (their argument).

As further information, on November 29th 2005, the CHRIMS Board of Directors approved a major network upgrade for the California network. We are in the process of finalizing that upgrade agreement now with AT&T. Basically, we are upgrading from Frame Circuit technology to MPLS technology. This will eliminate the type of outage we experienced on Saturday. I feel the frame circuit technology with SBC has been stable, however, the AT&T MPLS network is more robust, more stable, and much more flexible. We have done our research and feel that it is the best network money can buy for our type of business. I expect the upgrade to be complete throughout the State by mid-summer - but I wish it could happen over night!



Subject: End of Race Meet Security Report for Los Alamitos (12/26/04 -12/18/05)

Since my transfer to Los Alamitos (03/05), this office has established a highly visible law enforcement presence in both the restricted barn area, starting gate and jockey's room at Los Al. Included in this enforcement plan were the following:

# CHRB Rule 1929 (Examination of Personal Effects)

A daily audit of horse trailers and vehicles were routinely searched for illegal medications, controlled substances and contraband, in addition to large amounts of currency. A total of approximately 110 trailers have been searched. Numerous trainers and owners have been suspended for this violation in addition to the seizure of syringes/needles and unauthorized medications. Staff also seized a vehicle and \$165,000.00 in cash, which is currently under investigation by the Cypress P.D. and the DEA - LA.

#### CHRB 1597 (Association to Maintain Records of Horses on the Grounds)

A daily audit is conducted on all horses shipping into the backside at Los Alamitos within a 24-hour period prior to the race. Several horses have been scratched for this violation and trainers fined.

#### CHRB Rule 1504 (Qualifications for License as Farrier)

Investigative staff conducted routine inspections for unlicensed farriers in the barn area. Several trainers were fined for shoeing a horse without the proper CHRB license.

#### CHRB Rule 1701 (Weighing In)

A daily audit is performed at both the jockey scales (in and out) for the proper weights. On each race night, several races are reviewed with the Clerk of the Scales. No violations have been observed.

### Starting Gate

Investigative staff is physically located at the stating gate on a weekly basis to review gate procedures and to monitor jockeys and assistant starters. Several assistant starters had been suspended for possession and under the influence of a controlled substance (off track arrest by a police agency).

#### Lasix Administration

Investigative staff conducted a weekly audit of lasix administration to in today horses. This included the audit of in today detention signs posted.

### Veterinarian Vehicle Inspection

Investigative staff conducted an unannounced inspection of the practicing veterinarians vehicles with the state veterinarian. No violations were found.

### CHRB Rule 1922 (Display of License)

Both track security and CHRB are currently enforcing the display of license in both the paddock and receiving barn. This was instituted during the 2006 renewal period and will remain in force.

### Jockey Room

Investigative staff routinely visits the jockey's room on a daily basis to monitor the use of cell phones and the "weighing out" at the jockey room scales.

#### Additional Information

This racetrack does not utilize enhanced outside security personnel to monitor the graded races at Los AI. The only exception was in December 2005 during the running of the Los AI Million Futurity and the Champion of Champions. The BET (Big Event Team), organized by TRPB, came out to Los AI and was complimented by CHRB investigative staff from Santa Anita.

This office conducted a total of 169 investigations that resulted in 85 complaints submitted to the Board of Stewards.

CHRB investigative staff will continue to work with stable security to maintain a strong presence in the restricted barn area. This includes working with the Cypress P.D. and Orange County District Attorney's Office. In addition, this office will be instrumental in the near future in the continued training of backside security officers and stable gate personnel relative to CHRB rules and regulations.



RE: End of Meet Report-Golden Gate Fields

The recent 46 day meeting at Golden Gate fields was completed without a signatory event which might define the compact season. Overall, as far as the stewards were concerned, the meet fell into the routine category.

A statistical comparison between this year's meeting and the one conducted last year would appear skewed in most categories due to the length of the two meets. In 2004 Golden Gate opened a 59 day meeting on November 10, and concluded on January 30, 2005. This year's 46 day offering began on October 18, and ran through December 19, 2005. Average handle and attendance figures for the corresponding meetings indicate that this year's handle dropped 10% while attendance was down 9.8% from last year.

Physical aspects of the plant's operation went smoothly with only a brief and unexpected power outage prior to the first race on December 1, putting a blemish on the record. There were also some tote board malfunctions caused by moisture in the circuitry after a rainstorm but the video monitors were able to take up the slack and keep the public informed.

With respect camera coverage the addition of a 5/16 camera would be beneficial for determining the cause of interference around the far turn and stronger lenses on the 3/8 and 7/8 cameras would be appreciated.

In discussions with the racing office staff the stewards had concerns about leaving also eligible horses on the program until the morning of the race because of medication issues and the fact that the public might be wagering on horses that were never actually in the body of the race. Management was asked to rethink the policy.

On the disciplinary front California Horse Racing Board Investigators filed 48 complaints during the meet and the allegations contained therein ran the gamut

of rule violations. Thirty one formal and/or informal hearings were conducted into those complaints while the others were rescheduled or resolved prior to a hearing. The number of rulings issued (9) concerning violation of rule 1874 (Disorderly Conduct) seemed unusually high for such a short meeting. Whether this is an anomaly or an emerging trend will be monitored.

End of Meet Security Report for Golden Gate Fields, October 19, 2005 through

December 19, 2005

The Golden Gate Security staff has gate guards and security officers posted at the main and walk-in gate. They have at least one or two roving security guards throughout the barn area. During the races they have a security guard posted at the receiving barn checking licenses. They are proactive security force and maintain good liaison with law enforcement, including the CHRB investigative staff.

During the grade one through three races security is supplied for every entered racehorse. The security management, CHRB investigative staff and the Associate Steward monitor the security staffs during these races.

Additionally the transit barn has eight security stalls monitored by cameras for detention purposes. These stalls are utilized for trainers who have high TC02 tests. Trainers charged with high TC02 tests are placed in pre-race detention stalls twenty- four hours prior to the race for a period of thirty days. This procedure is still implemented at Golden Gate Fields even since the onset of the rule change in September of 2005.



End of Meet, Security Evaluation for Bay Meadows, 12-26-05 through 2-5-06

Licensees are checked at the entrance to the barn area by gate guards, security staff and CHRB investigators. CHRB investigative staff conducted transportation van inspections, vet. truck inspections and the monitored lasix shots. Security or gate guards are posted at the tunnel leading to the barn area during the races. A security guard is also posted at the receiving barn checking the licenses of all persons entering the receiving barn for the pre-race inspection. Security has one or two roving guards monitoring the back side.

The Bay Meadows security staff continued with proactive security measures for all Grade one through three stakes races. Guards are briefed by track management and CHRB supervisors as to their duties prior to grades one through stakes races. The security staffs are monitored throughout the day by track management, CHRB investigative staff and the Associate Steward. Due to that high level of security a trainer was charged with giving his horse a prohibited substance on race day. The security guarding a stakes horse observed a groom give a paste like substance and recorded the act with his video camera. The horse was scratched and the trainer was fined over the incident.

The detention barn containing eight stalls are being utilized for trainers for high TC02 tests even since the rule was implemented wherein the CHRB is responsible for the investigation and the filing of complaints against the trainer. Trainer charged with high TC02 tests are subject to have all their entered horses into 24 hour pre-race detention for 30 days.

RE: End of Meet Report - Bay Meadows Race Course

The Bay Meadows 31-day Winter meeting was conducted from December 26, 2005 through February 5, 2006. Last year most of these same racing dates were run at Golden Gate Fields so the usual yearly statistical comparisons will be rendered moot.

One innovation implemented by Bay Meadows was the addition of a 5/16 remote control camera in the middle of the far turn to aid the stewards by offering another camera angle. While the attempt is greatly appreciated the position is not being fully utilized as the camera is too low to the ground to be effective. If the camera pole were raised the resulting picture would be much more definitive and the video department is working to rectify the problem.

The TCO<sub>2</sub> testing program was in full force and effect during the meeting and no problems in that regard have been reported.

Conversations were initiated with Horse Identifier, Patrick Kealy, concerning the problem of gelded horses still appearing in the program as colts. Although the situation arises only occasionally any wrong information in the program is cause for serious concern as patrons are wagering on erroneous data.

Kealy stated he would check the overnight for first time starters and contact trainers as early as possible to determine if the information on the foal certificate matches the horse. This will help alleviate some, but not all, of the cases where a gelding is listed as a colt in the program.

The ongoing statewide problem of a shortage of horses was again apparent this meeting. Along with short fields, 15 races during the meeting were run without show wagering due to late scratches off the program.
