 CHRB Case No. 06DM011 **PROCEEDINGS** of the Regular Meeting of the California Horse Racing Board held at the Santa Anita Park Race Track, Baldwin Terrace Room, 285 West Huntington Drive, Arcadia, California, on February 17, 2011.

MINUTES

Chairman Brackpool asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of January 20, 2011. Vice-Chairman Israel motioned to approve the minutes. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Allen Gutterman of Santa Anita Park Race Track (SA) spoke about SA's plans for an event called "On Track to Beat Cancer." The event would be held on April 17, 2011, and it was being organized in partnership with the City of Hope. The funds raised by the event would be donated to the City of Hope's women's cancer program. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding various horse racing related issues. Laura Rosier of San Luis Rey Downs (SLRD) spoke about her organizations continuing exchange with Southern California Off-Track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC) regarding vanning and stabling funding. Commissioner Rosenberg stated he was informed that the SCOTWINC board met in December 2010 and formed a committee to work on the issue with SLRD to try and solve the problem of possible inequity in the distribution of the vanning and stabling funds. SCOTWINC subsequently wrote a

letter about the December 2010 meeting, the formation of the committee and issues that were raised during its December meeting. The letter was for distribution to interested parties and the Board. Chairman Brackpool stated Commissioner Rosenberg had agreed to take the lead for the Board, and the issue would be heard at a future Regular Meeting.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1844, AUTHORIZED MEDICATION, TO REDUCE THE PERMITTED LEVEL OF PHENYLBUTAZONE IN AN OFFICIAL TEST SAMPLE FROM FIVE NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO TWO NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM, AND TO REDUCE THE PERMITTED LEVEL OF FLUNIXIN IN AN OFFICIAL TEST SAMPLE FROM 50 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO 20 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO 20 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment to Rule 1844, Authorized Medication, would reduce the permitted level of Phenylbutazone (Bute) in an official test sample from five nanograms per milliliter of blood plasma or serum to two nanograms per milliliter of blood plasma or serum to 20 nanograms per milliliter of blood plasma or serum. Ms. Wagner said staff recommended the Board instruct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, stated the issue was brought to the attention of the Association of Racing Commissioners International (ARCI) and the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium (RMTC) by the ARCI Veterinarians Committee. After a thorough review it was recommended that the Bute level be reduced to two micrograms. Dr. Arthur stated the issue was one of safety and integrity of racing. The examining veterinarian was the key safety check for race horses. The veterinarians expressed concern that current medication policies compromised their ability to properly evaluate soundness of in-today horses. Almost over 90 percent of fatal injuries in

horse racing had preexisting pathologies at the site of the fatal injury. However, veterinarians, jockeys and trainers were missing signs of such pathologies. Dr. Arthur said the proposed levels for flunixin and Bute were supported by the ARCI, which adopted a national model rule. The levels were also supported by the Jockey Club Safety Committee, the RMTC and the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association. He added the proposed levels would be a requirement of the Graded Stakes Committee as of January 1, 2012. Dr. Arthur added he held meeting with the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) regarding the proposed levels. The trainers expressed concerns that there would be a rash of positives due to the lower levels, but with a five microgram level currently in place, at least 85 percent of horses met the two microgram level. He stated that during the 45-day notice period the official laboratory could provide Board veterinarians with the level of each horse that ran, so trainers would have time to adapt to the new standards. Dr. Arthur commented he was willing to work with the horsemen regarding penalties, as his main concern was compliance. Commissioner Harris stated the proposed amendment would not change normal practice, as a therapeutic dose at least 24 hours out would result in compliance with the new level. Dr. Arthur said if the medication were administered via an IV injection, a two gram dose at 24 hours would not go over the proposed limit. He stated that was current practice in states with the two microgram limit. Commissioner Harris asked if administering Bute by paste more than 24 hours out would have a different effect. Dr. Arthur said it would, as paste was absorbed more slowly. IV injections were the most common form of administration, and most positives were the result of oral administration. Vice-Chairman Israel said he was concerned about unintended consequences. Many trainers used the oral method of administering Bute, but under the proposed amendment, they would be forced to use the more expensive IV method. Dr. Scott 1-3

Stanley of UC Davis said that was not necessarily the case. The proposed levels may change the timeline for administration of the oral paste, but the trainers would still be able to use it. He stated the University would provide the trainers with information needed to use the oral products. Dr. Stanley said for about a decade the recommended method of administering Bute was by IV injection, but trainers were able to continue to use the oral products with a slight adjustment of treatment time. Vice-Chairman Israel asked what the economic impact would be if trainers had to switch to IV injection versus oral administration. Dr. Arthur stated the costs were \$5.00 to \$10.00 a gram for IV injection and pills were 40 cents a gram. He stated he did not believe the costs were significant in relationship to veterinary bills, which averaged \$500 a month. The total cost difference was between \$1.00 for oral administration and \$15.00 to \$20.00 for IV injection. Vice-Chairman Israel stated another issue was that only a veterinarian could give an injection. Commissioner Harris commented some trainers might have a horse on Bute with no intention of running it for a few days. The oral administrations were more for a therapeutic use, not for running a horse. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if UC Davis knew what the timeline was for administering oral Bute. Dr. Stanley said the trainer would have to adjust the administration by approximately six to eight hours. If the trainer made that adjustment, the economic impact of the new level would be zero. Dr. Dana Stead, the Santa Anita Park track veterinarian, stated a lower Bute level would be advantageous for morning examinations. In the mornings the current higher level could affect the veterinarian's ability to detect if a horse had soundness issues. Dr. Jill Bailey, a CHRB veterinarian, stated she concurred with Dr. Stead's comments. She added it was true that the vast majority of horses were currently running at the lower level; however, in the mornings one did not know which horse was at a lower level, and which horse had a greater amount of Bute in its system. Pablo Suarez of TOC stated his organization was against lowering

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the Bute level. TOC's opposition was decided with the long-term health of the horse in mind. In addition, there were details that should be addressed before the proposed rule amendment went out to comment, such as the penalty guidelines. Mr. Suarez commented TOC was aware that the proposed levels were supported by the RMTC and the ARCI; however, the CTT agreed with the TOC. He added the TOC proposed putting off action until the next Regular Board Meeting. In the intervening period of time, the TOC would work with Dr. Arthur and the CTT to lay the groundwork prior to the 45-day comment period. John Sadler of the CTT stated his organization did not support the proposed amendment to Rule 1844. The CTT believed the proposed regulation was a poor idea. The CHRB had a good rule in place and no horsemen were complaining. Bute was a good therapeutic medication, the Board had excellent testing for it, and there was little support among the horsemen for a change. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if the CTT had any statistical information regarding the proposed amendment's effect on the entry box. He asked how many entries would be lost on a daily or weekly basis; would it be 5 percent, 2 percent or more? Mr. Sadler said the horse inventory was thin, and adding more regulations would adversely affect field size and handle. Commissioner Derek stated the purpose of the regulation was for the pre-race examination and soundness of horses. Would there be fewer horses because they would not pass the pre-race examination? She commented she thought that would be a positive thing. Mr. Saddler said in Europe they raced on no medication. However, they raced two or three days a week, six months a year. In California that was not possible, and if the State wished to go to no medication, it would have to implement a schedule to accommodate that. Commissioner Rosenberg asked what the difference was if in Europe horses raced two or three times a week for six months and in California horses started once every three to four weeks year round. Mr. Sadler said in Europe they did not need to train their horses 1-5

between races, so they could rest up. Commissioner Rosenberg asked why the CTT believed it was so positive to have the extra Bute in a horse's system pre-race. Mr. Sadler stated if one looked at the economic aspect - no one was speaking for the poor trainers on the fairs that were giving Bute orally versus an IV injection. That was one of the economic things the CTT was talking about. Chairman Brackpool commented Dr. Stanley of UC Davis testified trainers could still use oral medication if they adjusted the time of administration. Mr. Sadler said the CTT just thought the amendment would have a negative effect. The trainers did not think Bute was a big problem, and they did not feel the rule was necessary. Carlo Fisco of the CTT stated that after a May 2010 Medication Committee meeting at Golden Gate his organization attempted to obtain documents relevant to the issue of Bute and musculoskeletal injuries. He stated those Public Records Act (PRA) requests were still outstanding. The CTT looked at the scientific issue, and would like to have ample time to develop that. The presentation to the Board was one-sided, and the CTT would like the opportunity to present its side. Mr. Fisco also talked about why - under the Administrative Procedures Act (APA) - the item was not ready to send out for a 45-day public comment period. He added the CTT believed the Board should not amend Rule 1844 without at the same time amending Rule 1843.3, Penalties for Medication Violations. Chairman Brackpool stated the Board was not amending a rule, it was deciding whether to send a proposal out for public comment. He stated he understood the Medication Committee held several meetings on the subject, and at those meetings there was representation from TOC, CTT and various horsemen. It was not accurate to state there had been no industry involvement. Mr. Fisco said the CTT had not received the documents it requested. The documents would form the basis of its contrary opinion. He added there was also no proposal to amend Rule 1843.3. The CTT was seeking documentation on the connection between using Bute and injuries to the horse.

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Commissioner Choper said that went to the heart of Commissioner Derek's question. Was there any evidence that California would experience reduced injuries if it reduced the allowable level of Bute from five nanograms to two nanograms? The CTT stated it was an economic question, which meant one had to run the risk that horses would break down in order to run them. Chairman Brackpool stated the CTT representatives had said three different things. One stated that if given another month, the CTT was close to agreeing and the parties could resolve the issues. Another stated there was no way the CTT would be in favor of the regulation, and the regulation was not necessary. The third representative raised a lot of legal issues, and staff counsel would have to advise the Board regarding the merit of any of the points raised. Commissioner Choper said no regulation was completed in 45 days, so there was nothing wrong with approving a public comment period. He added it seemed the penalty would remain the same. Mr. Fisco stated there was no logic in changing the allowable level without changing the penalty. Dr. Arthur stated that under Rule 1843.3 there were currently penalties for Class "C" violations. He said he would work with the horsemen to modify the penalties. The science behind the proposal had been thoroughly debated. A number of prestigious persons have looked at the science and agreed. In addition, an analysis of the issue by Dr. Larry Solomon of the University of Pennsylvania would be published in the Journal of Veterinary Therapeutics and Pharmacology. The analysis reached the same conclusion; there was evidence that current allowable Bute levels compromised the clinical examination of the horse. Dr. Arthur stated 90 percent of race horses had preexisting pathology at the site of their fatal injuries. And the issue was: why were veterinarians not noticing the preexisting conditions? Commissioner Choper said that during the comment period all of the different perspectives could be raised. He added that the wagering public liked large fields, but it was not happy when horses broke down. 1-7

Commissioner Rosenberg said the CTT asked for information from UC Davis. If the information was available, it should be provided. If it was not available, the CTT should be told. Dr. Arthur stated the PRA was being handled by the university counsel. That office assisted in compiling the information. The difficulty was in answering all of CTT's questions. The CTT requested specific information in necropsy reports, and there were court decisions that impacted that. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if the CTT had the information that was in the Board's package. Dr. Arthur said the CTT had that information. Commissioner Derek stated the Bute levels were currently enforced in a number of other states, and it would be enforced as of January 2012 in graded stakes races. She asked if CTT was unaware of that, or of the ARCI recommendations and how they were made. Mr. Fisco said the CTT was aware. It was also aware of instances in other states where trainers had very minor overages. He added 85 percent of horses at the time of the pre-race exam were at or under the 2.0 level for Bute, which was an important statistic. With regards to the science, the CTT did not decide it wanted to figure out how to beat the proposal with science. Instead, it talked to persons who stated the science was not there, so it was trying to fill in the gaps. Commissioner Harris commented the proposed levels were not for the pre-race exam. There could be up to nine hours between the pre-race exam and testing of the horse. The administration of the medication was at least 24 hours out, and the pre-race examination was six or seven hours before the race. There would be a higher level of Bute at the pre-race exam, which was the point of the proposed amendment. The issue was the potential for the level of Bute in the horse to mask pre-existing conditions. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if the Board would violate the APA if it sent the item out for a 45-day public comment period. Staff Counsel Robert Miller stated the Board could direct staff to initiate a public comment period. He added that did not mean the Board was adopting the

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regulation. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his thoughts regarding the proposed amendment to Rule 1844. Mr. Suarez stated one reason the TOC opposed the proposed regulation was its concern that lowering the allowable Bute level would result in more joint injections, which would affect the long-term health of the horse. Commissioner Derek **motioned** to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment to Rule 1844. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **PROPOSED ADDITION OF CHRB RULE 1844.1, SUSPENSION OF AUTHORIZED MEDICATION,** TO ALLOW THE BOARD TO SUSPEND THE AUTHORIZATION FOR ANY AUTHORIZED MEDICATION AFTER NOTIFICATION AT A PROPERLY NOTICED PUBLIC HEARING.

Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, said the proposed addition of Rule 1844.1, Suspension of Authorized Medication, would allow the Board to suspend the authorization to administer drug substances and medications to horses entered to race, as currently allowed under Rule 1844, Authorized Medication. Dr. Arthur stated the Board's rules currently prohibited the administration of any drug substance within 48 hours of the race. However, certain substances were specifically authorized under Rule 1844. The proposed regulation will allow the Board to suspend the authorization for the administration of drug substances and medications for a single race, for a race meeting or for a breed for a period not to exceed 12 months. Dr. Arthur said there was currently an issue with Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing. There has been some preliminary discussion in the quarter horse industry about the problems with the drug. Non-Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved Clenbuterol was believed to have been smuggled from Mexico, and was being administered for purposes other than small airway disease. Dr. Arthur stated the drug could have an adrenergic, or muscle building effect. The proposed regulation 1-9

would allow the Board to prohibit the use of Clenbuterol in quarter horses in California. He added there was an effort on the part of several states to simultaneously address the problem. Dr. Scott Stanley of the UC Davis stated there were a disproportionate number of Clenbuterol violations in the quarter horse industry. The Maddy Laboratory at UC Davis received confiscated materials, and materials obtained from horsemen for testing. They all were Clenbuterol in liquid, paste and powder forms, and few of them were similar to the FDA approved commercial product. The materials were also more potent, and they were being administered in very high doses. The high doses acted as a body building agent versus a bronchodilator to treat airway disease. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if Clenbuterol had the same effect as a steroid. Dr. Stanley said Clenbuterol had a different effect but the same end result; it Vice-Chairman Israel asked if there were a reason to allow could build muscle mass. Clenbuterol, or was there no substitute for its legitimate use? Dr. Stanley stated in its present FDA approved form, it was the only product that treated the airway disease for which it was intended. However, Clenbuterol had to be used in small doses. In higher doses, it had a different effect. Dr. Stanley said some science indicated that with a high dose, after a period of time, the muscle building effect could be sustained. Chairman Brackpool stated he received a letter from the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association, which strongly supported the addition of Rule 1844.1, which was helpful. However, the supporting argument for the proposed regulation seemed to be centered on the problem with Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing. The proposed regulation had a wide effect that went beyond the particular issue at Los Alamitos. Dr. Arthur stated there were other authorized drugs that could be considered under the proposed regulation. One such drug was Stanozolol, which was the only permitted non-indigenous anabolic steroid. The drug was banned in other states, though it had not been a problem in California. He added

Clenbuterol was approved for use in small airway disease, which at any one time occurred in approximately 30 percent of thoroughbreds, and probably much less in quarter horses. Dr. Arthur stated that prior to a \$2 million futurity at Los Alamitos out-of-competition testing demonstrated that every horse had Clenbuterol in its system. Alan Balch of the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) asked what the process would be after the Board held a hearing. Would it suspend the use of a drug the next day? Chairman Brackpool stated if the purpose of the regulation was to stop the misuse of a drug substance the Board would want to take an emergency action. The proposed regulation was a necessary tool that the Board would use appropriately. Pablo Suarez of the Thoroughbred Trainers of California (TOC) said his organization agreed with the CTT. The TOC understood the issue with the quarter horses, but there were other drugs mentioned, and the TOC was worried the regulation might be too broad. Chairman Brackpool motioned to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed addition or Rule 1844.1. He stated he thought the rule was a necessary tool, and the Board would welcome any comments to potentially restrict the range of the regulation. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED ADDITION OF CHRB RULE 1500.1, RANDOM DRUG TESTING, TO ALLOW RANDOM DRUG TESTING OF JOCKEYS AND APPRENTICE JOCKEYS UNDER SPECIFIED CONDITIONS, AND THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1498, PHYSICAL EXAMINATION, TO REQUIRE DRUG SCREENING DURING THE ANNUAL JOCKEY PHYSICALS.

Chairman Brackpool said he received a letter from the Jockey's Guild (Guild) that stated the Guild did not have any opposition to the adoption of the proposed addition of Rule 1500.1, Random Drug Testing, or to the proposed amendment of Rule 1498, Physical Examination. However, the Guild wished to clarify whether jockeys were responsible for paying for their own

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drug testing. Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said under the proposed regulations jockeys and apprentice jockeys would only be responsible for paying for testing of the split sample, if they chose to have the samples tested. Otherwise, there were no expenses for jockeys and apprentice jockeys. Shane Gusman representing the Guild stated his organization's issues with the proposed regulations were addressed. He thanked staff for working with the Guild to resolve the outstanding issues. Commissioner Harris **motioned** to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed addition of Rule 1500.1, Random Drug Testing, and the proposed amendment of Rule 1498, Physical Examination. Vice-Chairman Israel **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **PROPOSED** AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1433, APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING, TO REVISE THE FORM CHRB-17, APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING, AND THE FORM CHRB-18, APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF A CALIFORNIA FAIR.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, stated the proposed amendment to Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, would update the current form CHRB-17, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, and CHRB -18, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting of a California Fair. Ms. Wagner stated the forms would be updated to ask about ownership and guarantees regarding the obligations of the licensee; clarification of the purse program to ensure applicants provide purse information from the same source; and additional information regarding advance deposit wagering providers. Ms. Wagner stated staff recommended the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Commissioner Rosenberg said he believed privately held companies should be added to section 4(c) of the form CHRB-17. Not all parent companies might be publicly traded. Ms.

Wagner stated staff would make that change. Chairman Brackpool asked what the process would be for amending the regulation. Ms. Wagner stated the rule amendment would require a 45-day public comment period. Following the comment period, the Board would hold a hearing for adoption. If the Board adopted the regulation, it would be sent to the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) for a 30-day review. If OAL approved the regulation it would file it with the Secretary of State and the regulation would become effective 30-day after that filing. Commissioner Harris asked about the \$100,000 surety bond requirement in the CHRB-17. Ms. Wagner stated that was a requirement of Business and Professions Code section 19464, which required the applicant to submit a surety bond of \$100,000 or greater, unless the association was licensed to operate a horse racing meeting prior to January 1, 2001, and had conducted a race meeting in each of the immediate three consecutive calendar years. Commissioner Harris stated there had been some concerns regarding the certification of persons manning the ambulance. Commissioner Derek commented that was a topic that would be discussed at an upcoming Medication and Safety Committee meeting. Commissioner Harris said the issue needed to be thought out, as apparently not all ambulance personnel were certified.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE FEASIBILITY OF AMENDING CHRB RULE 1634, CLAIMING OPTION ENTRY.

Chairman Brackpool said Rule 1634, Claiming Option Entry, allow owners to bring back a horse that had not been run in 180 days or more. The horse could be brought back at the same claiming level it last ran at, and it could be protected from being claimed for its first race back. He stated the rule was not being used as much as it might be, and perhaps there were ways to amend it to make it more attractive. Perhaps the horse could come back at one level lower, or stay safe for two claiming races with the second race at a higher level. Chairman Brackpool

stated in July 2010 the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) indicated it wanted to study the effects of the rule, and work with racing secretaries and the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT). Guy Lamothe of the TOC stated his organization met with the racing secretaries and concluded the regulation was working. In an 18-month period 145 runners took advantage of the rule, and 125 of those made at least one additional start in California. In addition, there was an increase in the number of horses winning off the layoff. The racing secretaries talked to trainers to determine if the rule could be improved. The consensus was that the rule was working in its current form. If anything, the rule needed to be promoted, so more owners and trainers would be aware of its benefits. Tom Robbins, racing secretary at Del Mar Race Track stated racing secretaries were in contact with the TOC and the CTT. The secretaries and the horsemen's organizations agreed that the rule was working in its present form. Approximately 25 percent of the horses that were eligible to use the claiming wavier rule used it, and approximately 10 percent of those horses won their comeback race. Chairman Brackpool asked what happened to the 75 percent of horses that did not take advantage of the rule. Mr. Robbins stated that was a question for the trainers and owners that ran the horses in comeback races. However, as a racing secretary, Mr. Robbins said he had not heard one owner or trainer suggest any sort of modification. The racing secretaries and the owner and trainer organization believed the rule was a success. Commissioner Choper stated he was curious as to whether the 180 horses that took advantage of the rule would not have run if the rule were nonexistent. Perhaps over the next year racing secretaries could work with the CTT and TOC to poll owners and trainers to find out why they did not use the rule. Mr. Robbins said it was evident that not everyone knew about certain regulations. The horsemen's organizations and racing associations tried to inform their constituents in their newsletters and the condition book. The rule benefited owners and

trainers and it was the only rule of its type in the United States. Commissioner Harris commented Rule 1634 was beneficial, but it was expensive to lay up a horse, and one often needed to come back at a lower level to be competitive. He added not many horses were being claimed, so owners were not as worried about losing a horse.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING A PLAN BY THE COMMERCE CASINO MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY TO EXPAND ITS FACILITY TO INCLUDE AN ADJACENT BUILDING.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said in April 2009 the Board approved the application for license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility at the Commerce Club. The Commerce Club minisatellite was approved for two years, and the current license would expire in April 2011. Staff expected the Commerce Club would submit an application in time for it to be heard at the March 2011 Regular Board Meeting. She stated a representative of the Commerce Club wished to inform the Board of the minisatellite's plans to expand its facility and to ask for the Board's endorsement. Rod Blonien, representing the Commerce Club, said he spoke to the Board in December 2010 about the Commerce Club's plans to expand its minisatellite facility. He stated the Commerce Club wanted to ensure it was approved before it hired an architect and began construction. Chairman Brackpool stated there was no application to approve. Ms. Wagner stated there was no application. The Board could endorse the concept of the expansion, but it would not be able to approve it until it received an application. Commissioner Harris said he did not know why the Board should endorse the concept. If the Commerce Club wished to expand its facility, that was great, but he did not see what the role of the Board was. Chairman Brackpool stated the Board would be supportive of anyone wishing to expand its minisatellite operation. Commissioner Harris stated that was true, but why was it a bureaucratic thing for the

Board to spend time on? Mr. Blonien said the Commerce Club anticipated it would have to come back and at least show staff it was in compliance with the fire regulations, but it wanted the Board's approval before it began expansion. Chairman Brackpool stated the Commerce Club would not get an approval because there was nothing for the Board to approve. However, the Board could indicate it was generally in favor of the proposed expansion. Commissioner Choper asked if the Commerce Club knew to what extent its patrons would not otherwise have wagered on horse racing. Mr. Blonien said there were some people placing wagers who otherwise might not without the minisatellite facility. He added there were also patrons who used to wager at other facilities. However, there were also patrons who were wagering at the Commerce Club who otherwise would make wagers through alternative sources. Commissioner Rosenberg asked how many patrons wagered on horse racing per day, and did the Commerce Club have any cross-promotions with the tracks. Mr. Blonien said between 150 and 200 people per day placed wagers. He added that in the beginning the Commerce Club was approached by tracks, but it was not currently doing cross promotions.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF THE BALANCE OF THE 2011 SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA THOROUGHBRED RACE DATES.

Chairman Brackpool stated the Northern California and the quarter horse and harness racing dates were approved. The Board also approved the Southern California thoroughbred race dates through the conclusion of the Del Mar meeting. Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said that was correct. Chairman Brackpool stated the next dates for approval were the 2011 Fairplex Park Pomona (Fairplex) dates. Jim Henwood of Fairplex said the proposed 2011 Fairplex race dates were from September 8, 2011 through September 26, 2011, which was 15 days. Chairman

Brackpool asked if Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) agreed with the proposed Fairplex 2011 race dates. Guy Lamothe of TOC stated his organization agreed with the proposed 2011 Fairplex race dates. Chairman Brackpool said the next 2011 race dates were the fall Hollywood Park (HP) dates. Bernie Thurman of HP said the requested dates for HP were November 9, 2011 through December 18, 2011. Mr. Lamothe of TOC said his organization agreed with the dates. Chairman Brackpool stated the dates for Fairplex and the HP fall dates were not contested. Chairman Brackpool said the remaining dates to be allocated were the fall dates that were historically awarded to Oak Tree Racing Association (OTRA) at Santa Anita In 2010 the OTRA meeting was run at HP. In 2011 there were competing applications for the dates. The applicants were OTRA at HP and Pacific Racing Association (PRA) at Santa Anita Park Race Track (SA). The Board was not approving applications for race meetings; it was approving the allocated dates. He said when SA underwent an organizational ownership change in 2010 the new entity voided the historic lease that OTRA had with SA. Although the new owner offered to let OTRA race at SA for an additional year, the TOC and California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) determined they did not wish to race at that venue due to concerns about the racing surface. OTRA found a temporary home at HP. Currently, issues such as purses and field size were items raised to the Board during discussions about the 2011 fall race dates. Chairman Brackpool emphasized that the Board was dealing with the 2011 race dates, and that the outcome is not a precedent for the 2012 and beyond dates. He asked the TOC, CTT and the SA and OTRA representatives to present their positions on the 2011 race dates. Mr. Lamothe stated the TOC's concerns with the SA racing surface were resolved when the race track replaced the synthetic surface. Therefore, TOC would support the OTRA meeting moving back to the SA racing facility. Chairman Brackpool commented he did not believe there was an offer

for the OTRA meeting to be held at SA. He said he thought what was on the table was that SA make some arrangement with OTRA that would have to be concluded between them. Mr. Lamothe said TOC heard there were discussions between OTRA and SA, but it was not aware of any details. Alan Balch of CTT said this was a complex problem and that CTT held the highest regard for OTRA, however, his organization favored allocating the fall 2011 race dates to the SA facility. Scott Daruty of SA stated his organization believed its facility was superior to the HP facility. SA was committed to the long-term health of the industry, so it made a significant investment in its racing surface and it was trying to keep its facility in top shape for racing. SA also believed that fans preferred to go to SA, which was evidenced by attendance figures. Mr. Daruty stated SA believed it was the proper venue for the fall 2011 Southern California thoroughbred race dates. He added SA recognized OTRA's longstanding involvement in the industry. SA also recognized that it made mistakes with regards to OTRA in 2010. SA currently did not have an agreement with OTRA, which was under contract to run its dates at HP – should OTRA receive those dates. SA did not wish to interfere with OTRA's contract, but SA did have a unilateral commitment to provide certain accommodations, including a financial payment, if OTRA did not receive its traditional dates. The SA offer was conditioned on SA receiving the fall 2011 race dates. Chairman Brackpool said the graded stakes races that led to the Breeders' Cup were an issue. Did SA believe it would be in a position to work with OTRA to allow those races to be run? Mr. Daruty stated if OTRA allowed SA to use the dates, SA would like to run the stakes races. Commissioner Harris asked about the Cal Cup dates. Mr. Daruty said SA was open to discussing Cal Cup. He commented the race was very important in California, and many people felt strongly about the race. However, Cal Cup was not very successful financially. SA would want to figure out how to run the race in a manner that made economic sense. SA was not

willing, nor was it in a position to fund significant losses. Sherwood Chillingworth of OTRA stated the past few months were rough for his organization. OTRA appreciated the accommodations HP provided in 2010. HP and OTRA had an agreement that OTRA would seek the fall 2011 race dates to be run at HP. Mr. Chillingworth stated OTRA continued to believe that was its obligation. He said he wanted the industry to understand that OTRA attended no meetings involving the issue of its running at SA. OTRA informed the Board that unless OTRA understood the Board intended to move the race dates to SA, it could not comment on the issue because that would be unfair to HP. Mace Siegel, a horse owner, spoke in favor of awarding the fall 2011 thoroughbred race dates to SA. He stated the 2010 OTRA race meeting at HP was not what the industry hoped it would be, and the Board had to award the dates to the venue it believed would provide the best outcome. Mr. Lamothe stated the TOC wanted to ensure that the "Win and You're In" races were kept intact regardless of the entity running the dates. TOC was also concerned about efforts to attract future Breeders' Cup races to California, advance deposit wagering contracts and television exclusivity. Chairman Brackpool stated there had recently been a series of meetings with Breeders' Cup, and it was anxious to see the issue resolved, so it could have certainty. The Breeders' Cup also wanted to keep the "Win and You're In" races going. Chairman Brackpool said the distribution of the signal was covered in the Board's waiver of MI Development's ownership of multiple racing venues. If SA was awarded more dates it had to demonstrate that it expanded its signal. That could be accomplished through wider distribution, or by non-exclusivity. Mr. Daruty said the waiver did condition the receipt of more dates on wider distribution of the SA signal. He added SA would work with OTRA to run the "Win and You're In" races. Chairman Brackpool stated he believed the 2011 fall dates should be held at SA with accommodations made to OTRA. The

accommodations would have to be worked out prior to Board approval of the SA application for license to operate a race meeting. Jack Liebau of HP stated his organization had not been a party to any discussions regarding the fall OTRA dates. He stated HP was thankful for Mr. Chillingworth's remarks. HP was glad it was able to help OTRA. He added he believed HP was the better racing facility and he invited the industry to visit HP and make a comparison. Chairman Brackpool asked if the 2010 OTRA meeting at HP had an effect on the HP winter meeting. Mr. Liebau said that was difficult to judge. The OTRA meeting was put on under difficult conditions. The HP meeting was superior to the OTRA meeting. The purses at HP were higher, and that was because of the contribution that OTRA made. Chairman Brackpool commented that this was a difficult issues, the same as it was in 2010. He said last year's OTRA meet at HP when combined with the HP fall meet following was not the meet that the industry had hoped for and it is doubt the historically the crowds at SA are ready for racing at that time of the year and it would seem that SA would be the more logical venue. He said he understood OTRA difficulties in terms of applying for anything because they had made various commitments, but the Board had to award the dates the way it believed the location should be. Chairman Brackpool motioned to award the dates of September 8, 2011 through September 26, 2011 to Fairplex; September 28, 2011 through November 6, 2011, to Pacific Racing Association (PRA) at SA; and November 9, 2011 through December 18, 2011 to HP. Chairman Brackpool stated the Board was aware of OTRA's contributions to the industry, and it strongly urged SA to continue to work in cooperation with OTRA to allow that organization's good works to continue in 2011. He emphasized that the awarding of the 2011 race dates were not precedent setting, and he strongly encouraged SA to understand that. He added a vote of sincere thanks to HP for stepping in so graciously in 2010, and on such short notice. Vice-Chairman Israel seconded the

motion, which was **unanimously carried**. Mr. Chillingworth stated OTRA understood that HP would be disappointed it did not receive the race dates. OTRA appreciated HP's help in 2010. He added OTRA would do everything possible to support California racing in 2011. OTRA felt one of its responsibilities was to contribute to the welfare of the industry.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE STATUS OF THE LABOR NEGOTIATIONS WITH THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) PROVIDERS.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, stated at the Board's January 2011 Regular Meeting applications from the advance deposit wagering providers (ADW) were heard. The TVG application was approved without conditions. TwinSpires and XpressBet were approved with conditions, including the successful negotiation of a labor agreement. The parties were to present an update at the February 2011 Regular Board Meeting. If there were no resolution, the applications would be reviewed at the March 2011 Regular Board Meeting. Ms. Wagner said XpressBet notified staff that it would not be represented at the February 2011 Regular Board Meeting. She stated XpressBet had been unable to reach an agreement with labor. Brad Blackwell representing TwinSpires met with union representatives once, and held numerous conversations via telephone and email. He stated TwinSpires was not able to conclude a labor agreement. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if any progress was made in the discussions. Richard Castro representing the Pari-Mutuel Employees Guild Local 280 (Local 280) said no progress had been made. He added compromises were discussed, but the issue of staffing versus white labels prevented an agreement. Local 280 just wanted protection from subcontracting. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if any party considered certain benchmarks for the white labels that would kick into effect staffing levels relative to the union. Mr. Castro stated he was not aware of any

such discussions. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if the parties considered suggesting benchmarks to find some middle ground. He stated he was frustrated that the discussions had been going on for months, and the parties were in the same place as day one of negotiations. Mr. Castro stated the irritation was longer than that. The Board approved DelMarBets.com and OakTreeBets.com and Local 280 objected. The entities were not even in the application when the Board voted, and Local 280 did not know for six months. Vice-Chairman Israel stated he was in favor of initiatives that benefited the industry. He stated he also understood Local 280 needed to protect its members. The parties needed to find where those lines crossed; where the ADW provider was confident the initiatives would succeed and where the union could get staffing concessions. If the ADW providers did not try to create new enterprises, there would be no jobs. The white labels were operating through existing platforms. The parties needed to be more reasonable and find a way to create new business and more jobs in a declining industry. Mr. Castro stated the union gave the industry back 22.5 percent. At that time, Local 280 asked for kiosks to be in place by September 2010. The Kiosks were little booths where one could advertise racing. The union wanted to bring ADW providers into that too. The kiosks could be places to introduce new fans to racing. They could be in malls, in supermarkets and train stations. Commissioner Choper asked if the kiosks were a part of the labor agreements the Board was unaware of. Mr. Castro said Local 280 had a side agreement with employers to establish kiosks. The concept was to bring horse racing into the community to get new fans. The deadline was September 2010. Commissioner Choper asked if the kiosks were authorized by state law. Mr. Castro stated Local 280 believed they were legal. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if a wager could be placed at a kiosk. Mr. Castro stated what would happen with the kiosks was not finalized, but Local 280 wanted to bring in the ADW providers. Commissioner Choper asked what the pari-mutuel employees

would do at the kiosks if they did not place wagers. Mr. Castro said it would be a marketing effort. He stated there would be at least one union employee in the kiosk north and south. That was what Local 280 agreed to when it gave back 22.5 percent, and it still did not have telephone jobs. When a California resident placed a telephone wager with XpressBet the wager was placed in Oregon. Local 280 was being displaced. It wanted wagering in California. The union thought the industry would rally behind it, but that did not happen. Commissioner Choper asked if the kiosks were in the contract at question. Mr. Castro stated Local 280 wanted to bring the ADW providers into the kiosks. Commissioner Choper stated his understanding of the issue was that Local 280 wanted veto power over subcontracting. Jake White representing Local 280 stated the union was trying to protect its jobs. It was asking the Board to allow the union to have the subcontracting language so it could protect the union and protect jobs. Commissioner Choper said both XpressBet and TwinSpires signed the agreement, which stated it was the obligation of the ADW provider to recognize and bargain. It extended to employees of ADW providers or any employees of subcontractors to ADW providers. Commissioner Choper asked if TwinSpires did, or did not agree to extend its obligations to subcontractors. Mr. Blackwell stated TwinSpires was in a difficult position because it had been brought into a issue that was between the union and XpressBet. TwinSpires did not offer a white label to California residents. The issue addressed by Commissioner Choper was in TwinSpires previous labor agreement, which TwinSpires agreed to. Commissioner Choper asked if XpressBet signed the agreement. If it had employees who were working for a subcontractor to the ADW provider, were they covered by the contract? Scott Daruty, representing XpressBet, said "yes" the employees were covered by the contract. Commissioner Choper asked why the agreement did not cover what Local 280 wanted. Mr. Castro stated it did not bring jobs to California. If a customer decided to use the

ADW provider, he would not be calling a person in California. He would be calling someone in Oregon or Pennsylvania. When Local 280 agreed to the ADW enabling legislation it understood the industry would promote jobs in California. Commissioner Choper said the statute specifically stated it applied to employees of ADW providers, whether in California or outside the state. The statute provided to such coverage, and the contract provided for such coverage. The statute did not state employees had to be in California. He said he did not understand why there would be a statutory obligation on the part of the ADW providers to bring employees to California. Mr. Castro stated the union was not looking at the ADW providers as business; it was concerned with its members. The union's concerns went beyond what the agreement stated. It was concerned with the white label issue, because what was to prevent an ADW provider from opening a company in India? Commissioner Choper asked if the ADW providers could answer Local 280's concerns. Local 280 stated all the employees were outside California, and they could be outside the United States, where they would not even be subject to the statute. Mr. Daruty stated XpressBet was owned by the same parent company that owned Santa Anita and Golden Gate Fields. As such, it was the largest employer of pari-mutuel clerks in California. He added that the ADW wager handled by employees in Oregon helped to support live racing in California – so there continued to be pari-mutuel clerks at such facilities. Commissioner Choper asked if the Oregon employees were unionized. Mr. Daruty said they were not, but the statute allowed Local 280 to go to Oregon without interference to organize those employees. XpressBet had lived up to that statutory obligation. Commissioner Choper said it was a hollow right; the right of a California union, pursuant to state law, to organize employees in Oregon. Commissioner Choper stated it would have cost more to have phone operators in California. Mr. Daruty said it would have cost considerably more. Chairman Brackpool said the issue at hand

was to make sure the ADW providers had labor agreements in place, or allow an exemption to the provider. He stated he was disappointed to learn, only eight days after the January 2011 Regular Board Meeting, that Local 280 would not meet to resolve the issue. The Board was attempting to get at the heart of the issue, not revisit the past or resolve whose view of history was correct. At its March 2011 Regular Meeting the Board would be forced to make a determination that either imposed the condition on the ADW providers, or state it believed the providers were within their rights. That was why the Board strongly encouraged the parties to meet and resolve the issue. If Local 280 wanted the Board to rule on a fairly narrow issue rather than the broader set of issues, one of the two sides would not like the ruling. That was why the Commissioners were trying to figure out if something could be done, and why the parties had been given so much time. Vice-Chairman Israel said he did not believe DelMarBets.com or OakTreeBets.com had hit a point where they needed additional employees. When the entities did reach a threshold some accommodation should be made for pari-mutuel jobs. The businesses should be able to establish themselves and to grow. If that were allowed, there would be more jobs in the long run. The parties needed to find a compromise to allow for the growth needed to create the jobs the union was looking for. Chairman Brackpool said Vice-Chairman Israel was asking the parties to do what the Board requested at its January 2011 meeting. That was to see if there was something the parties could resolve, or the Board would be forced to vote on the narrow issue at its March 2011 Regular Meeting. Commissioner Choper commented the ADW providers did pretty much all they had to do legally, while the union's request sounded pretty modest. Vice-Chairman Israel's suggestion was appealing, and was consistent with what was needed. The parties should meet again and find someone who could mediate the issue. Mr. Castro stated Local 280 did file a grievance against Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC). It

was supposed to be heard December 16, 2010, but was canceled. DMTC did open its books to the union, and the parties reached the conclusion that it would probably be fair to add one clerk. When Local 280 realized it could not resolve the issue, it wrote a letter to the Board that stated just that. However, the parties continued to meet and talked about a possible compromise, but the Local 280 executive board was so angry it did not want to compromise. It decided to let the CHRB decide the issue. Commissioner Choper asked why Local 280 had not gone to an arbitrator for a breach in a collective bargaining agreement. Mr. Castro said Local 280 tried, but it was not the party that broke the agreement. Mr. Blackwell stated the hearing would not take place until after the March 2011 Regular Board Meeting. Commissioner Choper stated the Board's decision would not preempt a grievance hearing, or the result. Chairman Brackpool said there were three basic things the Board could do at its March 2011 Regular Meeting. It could rule that the issue should be resolved by an arbitrator and allow the ADW providers to continue operating until that hearing, or it could rule for either side of the issue. Commissioner Harris commented he did not believe the Board could compel an ADW provider to not do business in other states. Commissioner Choper stated the statute provided that the jurisdiction extended beyond the state lines. Everyone should know that was seriously vulnerable to constitutional challenge. Mr. Daruty said TwinSpires was not going to challenge the statute. It agreed that Local 280 could go to Oregon and attempt to organize those workers. Steve Gressett of Local 280 said the problem was that there were three ADW providers in California. TVG did not have telephone operators, so it was in its interest to seek competitive advantage against the other providers that did have live operators by entering into an agreement about subcontracting. TVG was never going to subcontract. XpressBet contracted with other entities to provide telephone operators. That was why Local 280 filed a grievance. The grievance stated DMTC and Oak

Tree Racing Association could have operated ADW themselves, but they chose to subcontract with XpressBet. TVG would like the Board to deny XpressBet, as it would leave the market open. TwinSpires was right when it stated it was not subcontracting, so Local 280 was not sure why it did not wish to sign the agreement. On the other hand, XpressBet was undercutting Local 280's job jurisdiction. If the Board voted on the narrow issue, it would give competitive advantage to XpressBet. Commissioner Choper asked if Local 280 felt the collective bargaining agreement was undercut through XpressBet's subsidiary. Mr. Gressett said "yes" Local 280 felt the collective bargaining agreement was being undercut by a signatory through its subsidiary. In 2001 when ADW was approved the ADW providers told the Legislature they would create jobs in California. The Legislature did not approve ADW so that jobs could be created in Oregon. Commissioner Choper asked if Local 280 would use that argument before the arbitrator. Mr. Gressett said the union could not use that argument. It was using the argument before the Board because the Board was supposed to protect the interests of horse racing, its participants and of workers. Commissioner Choper asked if the problem would be taken care of if Local 280 won its arbitration. Mr. Gressett said it might be taken care of, but if the Board granted the ADW licenses, the providers would say they had a license to operate. Commissioner Harris said one problem was the lack of growth in the voice operator segment. The shift was to computer-based operations. The parties would be better off figuring out how to take advantage of technology jobs, and keeping live operators at the tracks. Chairman Brackpool stated the issue arose because the ADW providers did not provide a labor agreement. There were three broad issues for the March 2011 Regular Board Meeting. The Board could allow no labor agreement until arbitration took place, it could state it did not want the ADW providers operating without a labor

agreement, or the Board could state there was nothing it could do. Mr. Castro said Local 280 would commit to talking with the ADW providers.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING A REPORT CONCERNING THE REVENUE STREAM; THE TAKEOUT DOLLAR IN CALIFORNIA, WHERE IT GOES, HOW IT IS USED AND THE SOURCES OF HANDLE.

Chairman Brackpool stated the Board requested a more detailed breakdown of exactly where the takeout dollar went. The information was provided only to Board members. So a detailed document would be issued to the public, and approximately 60 days after it was issued, the agenda item would appear on a future Regular Board Meeting.

Hollywood Park Racing Association, LLC filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Hollywood Park:

- April 21 through July 17, 2011, or 54 days. The association proposes to race a total of 464 races, or 8.59 per day. In 2010 they raced 8.75 races per day with an average of 7.68 runners per race. In 2010 they were allocated to race 57 days the (actual) average daily purse for the meet was \$383,300. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$443,400.
- The race dates proposed are the dates the Board allocated.

This subdivision does not apply to any person or association licensed to operate a horse race meeting prior to January 1, 2001, which has conducted a race meeting in each of the immediate three previous consecutive calendar years.

- The Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) providers are TVG, Xpressbet and Twinspires.

Pursuant to Business and Profession Code section 19604, specific provisions must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

Summary of B&P code 19604

To accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- A <u>written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair</u> conducting the races on which the wagers are made.



During racing hours two certified EMTs staff and maintain the first aid facility with an addition team of two EMTs stationed in an ambulance on the race track. Also during racing hours there is a medical doctor on duty who provided through Kerlan-Jobe clinic.

The facility is equipped with the following: beds, stethoscope, otoscope, flash light, forceps, clamps, scissors, scalpel, tourniquet, sterile syringes, blood pressure kit, oxygen, eye flushes, splints, bandages, trauma dressing, hydrogen peroxide etc., masal packing, topical anesthetic, thermometer, Silver nitrate sticks (AgNO3), ice packs, backboards for spinal precautions, cervical collars, immobilization straps hare traction splints for closed femur fractures, KED splints, bag valve mask for CPR, Automated external defibrillator., oxygen masks, cannula tubing and a variety of addition supplies and over the counter drugs (aspirin etc.)

Subject: Emergency Medical Action Plan for Injured Jockeys

Since May 1, 2003 we at Hollywood Park have had in place an emergency medical action-plan for injured jockeys. There is now a new law requiring such an action plan. Pursuant to the Business and Professions Code section 19481.3 (b) each racing association shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical action plan for injured jockeys and shall be posted in English and Spanish within the jockeys room.

The system we have in effect follows the exact guidelines required by the above statute. The emergency action plan we deploy goes as follows:

"Upon the observed or reported injury of a jockey, medical assistance will be immediate. The responding medical technician, track doctor or security will contact communications (via hand held radio or calling 310 4191555). Security will then activate the emergency contact procedure. This procedure will be the responsibility of the Safety Director or his designee. The Safety Director will contact the Chief of Medical Staff at Centinela Hospital and prepare for the injured jockeys arrival. The phone number of Centinela Hospital is 310- 4198636 and is located at 555 East Hardy Street, Inglewood.

The Chief of Staff will ensure that his personnel are standing by to receive the injured jockey. The Chief of Staff will also contact any specialists who are contracted for the care of an injured jockey. This will lay the foundation for a rapid admittance and treatment of the injured Jockey. A Security Agent will also be dispatched to respond to the emergency room to assist family members of the injured jockey and to also maintain the integrity of the injured jockeys needs. It will also be the responsibility of the Security Agent to keep the Director of Safety informed as to the condition and progress of the injured jockey. It will be the responsibility of the Security Agent to obtain a copy of the accident from the T.V. department. The Security Agent will prepare a report as to the accident and treatment. The agent will also ensure that all workers compensation information pertaining to the jockey is accurate and current."

El sistema en efectivo que tenemos sigue exactamente todas las reglas y guias. El plan de emergencia se dirige asi:

"Asistencia medica sera inmediata al observar o reportar un jinete lastimado. El medico tecnico, el doctor de hipodromo o seguridad se comunicara via radio o llamara (310)419-1555. Seguridad activara el proceso de el contacto de emergencia. Este proceso sera la responsabilidad de el Director de Seguridad o su designado. El Director de Seguridad contactara al Jefe Medico de Centinela Hospital localisado en la 555 East Hardy

Street, Inglewood.

El Jefe de Estafa se asegurara que su personal se encargue de recibir al jinete herido y contactar a otros especialistas en el contrato y cuidado de el jinete. Este fundamento sera rapido para admitir y tartar al jinete herido. Un agente de seguridad sera despachado al cuarto de Emergencia para asistir a la familia y mantener la integridad y necesidades de el jinete herido. Sera la responsabilidad del agente, reportar e informar al Director de Seguridad de la condicion y el progreso de el jinete. Es la responsabilidad del agente de obtener copia del accidente de el Departamento de Television. El agente se asegurara que toda la informacion de compensacion de trabajo que pertenezca a el jinete sea fija y corriente."

NOTICE TO APPLICANT: Every licensee conducting a horse racing meeting shall pursuant to B&P Code 19481.3 maintain, staff, and supply an on-track first aid facility, that may be either permanent or mobile, and which shall be staffed and equipped as directed by the board. A qualified and licensed physician shall be on duty at all times during live racing, except that this provision shall not apply to any quarter horse racing at the racetrack if there is a hospital situated no more than 1.5 miles from the racetrack and the racetrack has an agreement with the hospital to provide emergency medical services to jockeys and riders. An ambulance licensed to operate on public highways provided by the track shall be available at all times during live racing and shall be staffed by two emergency medical technicians licensed in accordance with Division 2.5 (commencing with Section 1797) of the Health And Safety Code, one of whom may be an Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, as defined in Section 1797.84 of the Health and Safety Code. (b) Each racing association and racing fair shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical plan detailing the procedures that shall be used in the event of an on-track injury. The plan shall be posted in each jockey room in English and (c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate Spanish. procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.

Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY OF THE CALIFORNIA COMMERCE CLUB INC.

The California Commerce Club Inc. d/b/a Commerce Casino filed an application for a license to operate a minisatellite wagering site at its facility, the Commerce Casino in Commerce, California, for a period of up to two years. It is currently licensed through April 24, 2011 as a minisatellite wagering facility.

At the February 17, 2011, Board meeting Commerce Club sought the approval of the Board for a proposed building expansion. This application submitted for a license to operate a minisatellite wagering site does not include the proposed building expansion information. The applicants' representative has indicated they will submit the building expansion details at a later time.

• Commerce Casino is a card club located in the southern zone. Its card club license is valid through March 31, 2011. The proposed minisatellite wagering site will be located in the California Commerce Club (facility).

Business and Professions Code section 19605.25 (a) (1) provides no ministatellite may be within 20 miles of a racetrack, a satellite wagering facility, or a tribal casino that has a satellite wagering facility. If the proposed facility is within 20 miles of one of the above-referenced satellite facilities, then the consent of each facility within a 20-mile radius must be given before the proposed facility may be approved by the board.

Commerce Club has submitted an email amendment to their minisatellite wagering application. The applicant has asked that the email be considered as the amendment to the application. This is in lieu of submitting an updated application reflecting the changes. The email has been labeled as exhibit D and states that there have been no patio improvements made or planned for Commerce Club located in this building (6131 East Telegraph Road). The email amendment affects Part III section IV, V and VI of the application. The applicant has also certified "that the signatures obtained from the racing associations giving their consent were all obtained within the last 45 days."

- Seating Capacity is 54 in the main area and 64 in the patio; the number of tables in the minisatellite wagering area is nine (main) and eight (patio). The overall square footage is 900 (main) and 1,200 (patio). The 2009 application does not identify patio seating or square footage.
- Staffing (Days): Mutuel Supervisor, utility clerk, two clerks on weekdays, three clerks on weekends or clerks to be determined by attendance. Staffing (Nights): Mutuel Supervisor, one clerk on Thursday, two clerks on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Staffing will be determined by level of business.







STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING AN UPDATE FROM SAN LUIS REY DOWNS CONCERNING THE SUBSIDY FROM SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA OFF-TRACK WAGERING, INC. (SCOTWINC) STABLING AND VANNING FUND

Regular Board Meeting March 14, 2011

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19607 provides that when satellite wagering is conducted on thoroughbred races at associations or fairs in the central or southern zone, an amount not to exceed 1.25 percent of the total amount handled by the satellite wagering facilities shall be deducted from the funds otherwise allocated for distribution as commissions, purses and owners' premiums, and instead distributed to an organization formed and operated by thoroughbred racing associations, fairs conducting thoroughbred racing, and the organization representing thoroughbred horsemen, with each party having meaningful representation on the board of the organization, to administer, pursuant to supervision of the board, a fund to provide reimbursement for offsite stabling at Board-approved auxiliary training facilities for additional stalls beyond the number of useable stalls the association or fair is required to make available, and for the vanning of starters from those additional stalls on racing days for thoroughbred horses. Business and Professions Code section 19607.1(d) states that upon the request of any party within the organization, the Board shall adjudicate any dispute regarding costs or other matters relating to the furnishing of offsite stabling or vanning. The Board may, if necessary, appoint an independent auditor to assist in the resolution of disputes.

At the July 22, 2010 Regular Board Meeting a representative of San Luis Rey Downs (SLRD) spoke about her organization's concerns with the distribution of the Southern California Off-Track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC) vanning and stabling funds. SLRD horsemen were not receiving vanning and stabling subsidies, while horsemen at Santa Anita (SA) and Hollywood Park (HP) were receiving funds. Prior to the Del Mar meeting it was reported that a total of 2,877 horses were stabled at SA and HP; however, racing secretaries reported the active inventory (which SLRD assumed included horses stabled at its facility) was between 1,800 and 2,000 horses. That meant between 877 and 1,077 horses were being subsidized at SA and HP while horsemen at SLRD – who continued to contribute to the vanning and stabling fund – shouldered the entire cost of stabling their inventory.

In August 2010, SLRD sent a letter to the CHRB about the SCOTWINC vanning and stabling fund. The SLRD letter reiterated the comments that were made at the July 22, 2010 Regular Board Meeting and it requested that the CHRB respond in accordance with Business and Professions Code section 19607.1, which provides that upon the request of any party within SCOTWINC, the Board shall adjudicate any dispute regarding the furnishing of offsite stabling or vanning. The CHRB responded in writing to the SLRD and informed it that under Business and Professions Code section 19607.1 any request for adjudication by the Board must come from

a party within SCOTWINC, and absent such a request the Board had no authority. The horsemen at SLRD are represented by Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC); therefore, a request for arbitration on their behalf would have to come from the TOC.

At the September 23, 2010 Regular Board Meeting an SLRD representative again raised the issue of SCOTWINC vanning and stabling funds. The representative stated SLRD horsemen received subsidies from 1989 through January 2010 when subsidies were cut off at Pomona and SLRD. When SCOTWINC reconsidered subsidies, only Pomona was chosen to receive funds. SLRD contended the issue was equality, as SLRD horsemen ran horses and participated in the fund, yet only certain horsemen were receiving benefits. In addition, the SLRD contended that between 1988 and 2001 the Board intervened twice on its behalf. Commissioner Moss responded that in 2001 the Board may have indicated its preferences regarding vanning and stabling, but it did not intervene with SCOTWINC. Staff Counsel Robert Miller agreed the CHRB had no authority over distribution of the vanning and stabling funds. SLRD was informed the issue would be placed for discussion on a future Regular Board Meeting agenda.

On October 14, 2010 SLRD filed a <u>California Victim Compensation and Government Claims</u> <u>Board</u> (VCGCB) action against the CHRB and SCOTWINC. The claim asked for \$1,700,000 as the annual amount necessary to provide reimbursement for offsite stabling for horses at SLRD. According to the SLRD claim, the SCOTWINC board "...voted abitrarily [sic] and capriciously to exclude SLRDTTC from receiving \$1.7 million in subsidy funds intended to provide reimbursement for offsite stabling of thoroughbred horses at CHRB-approved auxiliary training facilities." In its claim the SLRD asserted the CHRB "supervises" SCOTWINC, a "...quasistate agency..." On November 18, 2010, the VCGCB held a hearing regarding the SLRD claim, and on November 24, 2010, the VCGCB rejected the claim. Under Government Code section 945.6, the SLRD has six months from the date of the VCGCB rejection notice to file a court action on its claim.

At the November 9, 2010 Regular Board Meeting a SLRD representative spoke about the SCOTWINC vanning and stabling fund. The SLRD representative reiterated that SLRD did not intend to close and that the SLRD horsemen deserved to receive benefits because they were active contributors to the vanning and stabling fund. The SLRD requested that the Board direct SCOTWINC to retroactively distribute to SLRD the sum of \$4,600 per day for the period of March 16, 2010 through October 31, 2010. The funds would be used to reimburse SLRD horsemen for stall costs and to cover SLRD incremental stall costs.

At its December 2011 Regular Meeting the Board heard a report from SLRD concerning the subsidy from SCOTWINC vanning and stabling fund. After discussion of the issue, Chairman Brackpool put the item over until early 2011 to give the parties an opportunity to develop a short term solution. The Board asked that the parties return with answers to a number of questions, including: statistics reflecting the number of horses that started from SLRD in 2008 and 2009; suggestions for a short term resolution of the issue raised by SLRD; and an explanation of the model currently used by SCOTWINC to determine disbursement of vanning and stabling funds.

At the February 2011 Regular Board meeting Commissioner Rosenberg reported that the SCOTWINC board met in December 2010 and formed a committee to work with SLRD to try

and solve the problem of possible inequity in the distribution of the vanning and stabling funds. SCOTWINC subsequently wrote a letter for distribution to interested parties and the Board about its December 2010 meeting, the formation of the committee and issues that were raised during its December meeting. Chairman Brackpool stated Commissioner Rosenberg had agreed to take the lead for the Board, and the issue would be heard at a future Regular Meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.

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STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE STATUS OF THE LABOR NEGOTIATIONS WITH THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING PROVIDERS

Regular Board Meeting March 14, 2011

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include, but not be limited to administration and enforcement of all laws, rules, and regulations affecting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering, as well as adjudication of controversies arising from the enforcement of those laws and regulations dealing with horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19460 states all licenses are subject to all rules, regulations and conditions from time to time prescribed by the Board. Business and Professions Code section 19461 provides that every license granted under this chapter is subject to suspension or revocation by the Board in any case where the Board has reason to believe that any condition regarding it has not been complied with, or that any law, including the Labor Code and the regulations adopted thereunder, or any rule or regulation of the Board affecting it has been broken or violated. Business and Professions Code section 19604(d)(1)(B) states the Board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an advance deposit wagering (ADW) provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization.

At the December 16, 2010 Regular Board Meeting, the application for approval to conduct Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) of ODS Technologies, L.P., dba TVG Network (TVG); Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company, dba Twinspires and Youbet; XpressBet LLC. dba XpressBet.com, DelMarBets.com and OakTreeBets.com for an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub, for a period of up to but not exceeding two years was presented for approval. The Youbet in state application for approval to conduct ADW was also presented for approval. The Board discussed the labor requirements and the ongoing negotiations between the ADW providers, horsemen and tracks. The Board determined there were too many outstanding items and unresolved issues to provide license approvals, so it granted the ADW providers a 30-day conditional license extension. The exception was TVG, which submitted a complete application, and was approved for a one-year license through December 2011.

At the January 2011 Regular Meeting the Board approved a one-year license for Twinspires and XpressBet subject to conditions (The Youbet ADW applications were withdrawn by the Churchill Downs Representative). The Twinspires application was approved contingent upon the submission of a hub agreement, an agreement with the horsemen, and an agreement with the pari-mutuel labor union. The XpressBet application was also approved contingent upon completion of the labor agreement.

Following the January 2011 Regular Board Meeting, staff received the Twinspires hub agreement and horsemen's agreement. Prior to the February 2011 Regular Board Meeting staff contacted Twinspires and XpressBet to obtain a status update of the labor negotiations. XpressBet stated it did not believe the parties would resolve the current labor dispute within the 21-day timeframe set by the CHRB. Twinspires indicated that they had just contacted the union representative again and would follow up." On January 31, 2011, the Pari-Mutuel Employees Guild (Local 280) informed the Board by letter that it had not reached an agreement with Twinspires or XpressBet.

At the February 17, 2011 Regular Board Meeting the ADW providers informed the Board that they had met with Local 280, but the parties were unable to reach an agreement. Chairman Brackpool continued the item until the March 2011 Regular Board Meeting. If the parties did not come to an agreement by March 2011, he indicated the Board would be forced to make a determination. Chairman Brackpool stated there were three alternatives: the Board could allow the ADW providers to operate until arbitration took place, or it could rule for either side of the labor issue.

Representatives of Twinspires, XpressBet and Local 280 are prepared to address the Board regarding the status of the labor agreements.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF CHURCHILL DOWNS TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVES COMPANY, DBA TWINSPIRES.COM, FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO BUT NOT EXCEEDING TWO YEARS

Regular Board Meeting March 14, 2011

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604(d)(1)(B) through 19604(d)(1)(B)(iv) provides that:

(B) The Board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bonafide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization that provides all of the following:

(i) The labor organization has historically represented employees who accept or process any form of wagering at the nearest horse racing meeting located in California.

(ii) The agreement establishes the method by which the ADW provider will agree to recognize and bargain in good faith with a labor organization which has demonstrated majority status by submitting authorization cards signed by those employees who accept or process any form of wagering for which a California ADW license is required.

(iii) The agreement requires the ADW provider to maintain its neutrality concerning the choice of those employees who accept or process any form of wagering for which a California ADW license is required whether or not to authorize the labor organization to represent them with regard to wages, hours, and other the terms and conditions of employment.

(iv) The agreement applies to those classifications of employees who accept or process wagers for which a California ADW license is required whether the facility is located within or outside of California.

Business and Professions Code section (C)(i) through (C)(ii) provides that:

(C)(i) The agreement required by subparagraph (B) shall not be conditioned by either party upon the other party agreeing to matters outside the requirements of subparagraph (B).

(ii) The requirement in subparagraph (B) shall not apply to an ADW provider which has entered into a collective bargaining agreement with a bona fide labor organization that is the exclusive bargaining representative of employees who accept or process pari-mutuel wagers on races for which an ADW license is required whether the facility is located within or outside of California.

ANALYSIS

At its January 2011 Regular Meeting the Board approved a one-year license for the advance deposit wagering (ADW) provider Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company, dba

TwinSpires.com (TwinSpires). The license was conditioned on submission of a hub agreement, a horsemen's agreement and an agreement with the Pari-Mutuel Employee's Union, Local 280 (Local 280). Following the January 2011 Regular Board Meeting staff received the TwinSpires hub agreement and the horsemen's agreement, but not the labor agreement. TwinSpires indicated it was unable to reach an agreement with Local 280. At the February 2011 Regular Board Meeting TwinSpires reported it still had not come to an agreement with Local 280. The item was continued until the March 2011 Regular Meeting, at which time Chairman Brackpool indicated the Board would take action to move the issue forward.

Should TwinSpires and Local 280 have not concluded a labor agreement, the Board may choose to take one of the following actions:

- 1. Revoke Twinspires license. The Twinspires license is conditioned on submission of a labor agreement. If TwinSpires fails to submit such an agreement, its license may be revoked.
- 2. Declare a labor agreement is not required because Local 280 failed to make a request to TwinSpires 90 days prior to licensing.
- 3. Allow TwinSpires to continue to operate until the DelMarBets.com/Local 280 mediation regarding the "subcontracting" issue is resolved.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for discussion and action. The Board may wish to hear from the parties.

(B) The Board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bonafide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization that provides all of the following:

(i) The labor organization has historically represented employees who accept or process any form of wagering at the nearest horse racing meeting located in California.

(ii) The agreement establishes the method by which the ADW provider will agree to recognize and bargain in good faith with a labor organization which has demonstrated majority status by submitting authorization cards signed by those employees who accept or process any form of wagering for which a California ADW license is required.

(iii) The agreement requires the ADW provider to maintain its neutrality concerning the choice of those employees who accept or process any form of wagering for which a California ADW license is required whether or not to authorize the labor organization to represent them with regard to wages, hours, and other the terms and conditions of employment.

(iv) The agreement applies to those classifications of employees who accept or process wagers for which a California ADW license is required whether the facility is located within or outside of California.

Business and Professions Code section (C)(i) through (C)(ii) provides that:

(C)(i) The agreement required by subparagraph (B) shall not be conditioned by either party upon the other party agreeing to matters outside the requirements of subparagraph (B).

(ii) The requirement in subparagraph (B) shall not apply to an ADW provider which has entered into a collective bargaining agreement with a bona fide labor organization that is the exclusive bargaining representative of employees who accept or process pari-mutuel wagers on races for which an ADW license is required whether the facility is located within or outside of California.

At its January 2011 Regular Meeting the Board approved a one-year license for the advance deposit wagering (ADW) provider XpressBet, LLC, dba XpressBet.com, OakTreeBets.com and DelMarBets.com (XpressBet). The license was conditioned on submission of an agreement with the Pari-Mutuel Employee's Union, Local 280 (Local 280). Following the January 2011 Regular

Board Meeting XpressBet indicated it was unable to reach an agreement with Local 280. At the February 2011 Regular Board Meeting XpressBet reported it still had not come to an agreement with Local 280. The item was continued until the March 2011 Regular Meeting, at which time Chairman Brackpool indicated the Board would take action to move the issue forward.

On March 2, 2011 XpressBet sent Local 280 a letter with a revised labor agreement for Local 280's consideration. To date, staff has no knowledge of whether Local 280 responded to the XpressBet letter and revised labor agreement.

ANALYSIS

If XpressBet and Local 280 have not concluded a labor agreement, the Board may choose to take one of the following actions:

- 1. Allow XpressBet to continue operating as a California licensed ADW provider until arbitration is through.
- 2. Revoke XpressBet's license. The XpressBet license is conditioned on submission of a labor agreement. If XpressBet fails to submit such an agreement, its license may be revoked.
- 3. Rule for either side of the labor issue.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for discussion and action. The Board may wish to hear from the parties.


