APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MARCH 21, 2014

Chairman Winner asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of March 21, 2014. Commissioner Auerbach stated the phrase "voided saddle cloths" used five times on page 13 was incorrect; it needed to be changed to "embroidered saddle cloths." Commissioner Choper motioned to approve the minutes with corrections made. Commissioner Beneto seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

Executive Director Baedeker stated staff was moving forward with action previously taken by the Board to adopt the National Uniform Medication Regulations. He said that he, along with Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, and Steve Schwartz, of the Breeders' Cup; had appeared before the Board of the California Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) seeking support for the proposed amendment to Rule 1845, Authorized Bleeder Medication, which allowed for the administration of bleeder medication by third parties. He said the CVMA voted six-to-one to work with CHRB on the amendment. Executive Director Baedeker stated the

Board had directed staff to review current penalties for medication violations to determine if they provide sufficient deterrence, and to see if the mitigating factors considered during the hearing process were applied consistently. He said the Board had directed staff to develop an amendment to Rule 1843.3(i) which would prevent a suspended trainer from continuing operations through another employee. The Board was considering using the necropsy program to investigate, in a non-accusatory process, all equine fatalities to assist in the development of preventive measures. Executive Director Baedeker stated the Board had directed staff to develop an amendment to Rule 1842, Veterinarian Report, to prevent the practice of prescribing medications without a specific diagnosis. He stated it was the Board's goal to see that all California race tracks had evacuation procedures in place, and that they conducted drills to ensure the procedures were effective. Executive Director Baedeker stated the Board was submitting budget requests for the 2015/2016 fiscal year which included funding for eight additional investigators, improvements to the records management system, and enough money for a sufficient out-of-competition testing program. Chairman Winner stated it was the Board's overall goal to ensure that those that played by the rules had the best shot, to protect the integrity of the sport. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the Board needed agency approval on all of its actions. Executive Director Baedeker said the relationship between CHRB and the Business, Consumer Services, and Housing Agency was more of a procedural one. He said agency was a great resource for staff to help ensure that the actions of the Board were carried out to fruition. Chairman Winner stated the Board's experiences with agency had been very positive.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **DISTRIBUTION OF** 2012 RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE CALIFORNIA EXPOSITION AND STATE FAIR (HARNESS) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$16,157.49 TO FOUR BENEFICIARIES.

Francisco Gonzales, CHRB staff, stated this item pertained to a time period between 2008 and 2011 when Cal Expo was running the harness race meet. The race day charity distributions were made; however, Board approval for the distributions, as required by Business and Professions Code section 19557, was never obtained. Chairman Winner asked why previous years donations averaged \$8,000, but the current distribution was for \$16,000. Mr. Gonzales stated the total required donations for 2008 through 2012 came to \$39,674; however, \$16,157 remained to be distributed. Commissioner Auerbach asked for more information on the group Friends of the Fair and why it received equine charity money. Commissioner Beneto stated Friends of the Fair was a volunteer non-profit that worked at the state fair. Chris Korby, of the California Authority of Racing Fairs, stated Cal Expo was not normally involved in harness racing; it was a recent change in the fair management that turned up the unapproved charity distributions. Commissioner Auerbach asked if Mr. Korby could ensure that the charity distributions would comply with the law in the future, and have a representative present when presenting something to the Board. Mr. Korby stated these distributions only pertained to an unusual specific time period when Cal Expo was running harness racing. Mr. Gonzales stated usually fairs were exempt from charity day distributions; however, in this case the fair management was running a harness race meet. Commissioner Beneto motioned to approve Cal Expo's \$23,674.06 already distributed race day charitable funds, and the request by Cal Expo to distribute the \$16,157.49 remainder of its race day charity proceeds from the period of 2008 through 2012. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **DISTRIBUTION OF RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE WATCH AND WAGER LLC RACING ASSOCIATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,200 TO SIX BENEFICIARIES.**

Ben Kenney, of Watch and Wager (WAW), stated that WAW, as a new operator of harness racing at Cal Expo, continued the erroneous policy of making the charitable donations without Board approval. He ensured the Board that going forward any distributions made by WAW would first be approved by the Board. Commissioner Auerbach asked what the California Historical Artillery Society (CHAS) was and how it related to horseracing. Mr. Kenney stated the CHAS performed civil war reenactments using retired standard bred horses. Commissioner Auerbach asked if the CHAS kept the horses after the performances. Mr. Kenney said the CHAS took over ownership of the horses and WAW kept the racing papers on the horses as a way to keep track of the transfer of ownership. Chairman Winner stated he did a little research on the CHAS after reading the agenda item; he believed the CHAS was a good option for retired standard bred horses. Commissioner Beneto stated he was a member of the Sacramento Horsemen's Association, which was listed as receiving \$1,400, and he needed to recues himself from this item. Commissioner Choper motioned to approve the request by WAW to distribute its race day charity proceeds in the amount of \$5,200. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried; Commissioner Beneto recused himself from the vote.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE OAK TREE RACING ASSOCIATION AT THE ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR (F), AT PLEASANTON, (RACE MEETING TO BE CALLED "OAK TREE AT PLEASANTON") COMMENCING JUNE 19, 2014 THROUGH JULY 6, 2014, INCLUSIVE.

John Barr, of the Oak Tree Racing Association (Oak Tree), spoke on the charitable history of Oak Tree, and its 40 year relationship with the Los Angeles Turf Club. He said moving the Oak Tree race meet to the Alameda County Fair (Alameda) would be an opportunity for Oak Tree to continue its charitable work, while improving the attendance at Alameda. Chairman Winner stated Oak Tree had one year of racing at Hollywood Park. Mr. Barr stated that it did. Chris Korby, of the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF), stated the Oak Tree application was part of the evolving role for fairs in Northern California racing. Larry Swartzlander, representing CARF, stated the outstanding agreements had been negotiated and would be submitted to CHRB when finalized. Jerome Hogan, of Alameda, stated Alameda was pleased to have formed a partnership with such a prestigious racing association. Sherwood Chillingworth, of Oak Tree, stated his organization was prepared to supply \$150,000 in additional purses, \$65,000 in marketing funds, and \$167,000 towards capital improvements. Janet Lockhart, representing the Alameda County Fair Board, stated Alameda's Board was 100 percent in support of the partnership with Oak Tree. Mr. Swartzlander said the Stakes program was increased to \$425,000 with a \$100,000 Cal-Bred race and another \$100,000 guaranteed. He stated Alameda would continue the successful \$500 to \$1,000 program started during the 2013 fair season where trainers received \$500 if they started five times, or 1,000 if they started ten times. Mr. Swartzlander said there was an increase in HRTV and TVG coverage, and two new wagers: the 20 Cent Pick 6, and the 20 Cent Super High Five. 2nd Vice Chairman Rosenberg asked if "unique tickets" meant there was a chance for more than one winner. Mr. Swartzlander said it should read "unique ticket" as there could only be one winner. Commissioner Beneto asked if the bottom level of purses was being raised. Mr. Swartzlander stated some of the claiming races at Alameda were cut by \$500 because 2013 purses were overpaid by around \$80,000 and the books needed to be balanced. Commissioner Beneto stated the proposed changes would take from the smaller horse owners and gave to the wealthier ones. Commissioner Auerbach asked how the 2014 stakes races compared to those offered in 2013. Mr. Swartzlander stated 2013 paid out \$325,000 and 2014 would pay out \$425,000. Commissioner Auerbach asked if the races were the same. Mr. Swartzlander stated no, the \$100,000 Oak Tree handicap was added to the schedule. Commissioner Auerbach asked what was being done to increase the horse inventory. Mr. Swartzlander said there was the \$500 to \$1,000 incentive, and a \$300 and \$150 incentive for the first and second start of a horse that traveled 600 miles or more. Mr. Chillingworth stated that an additional \$10,000 was added by Oak Tree to the normal recruitment program to increase incentives for horses in Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas. He said that the extra incentives for the Alameda race meet would help increase the numbers for the rest of the fairs. Commissioner Beneto asked what were the total purses for 2014 in comparison to 2013. Mr. Swartzlander said the 2013 total was \$1.5 million, and the 2014 total was \$1.65 million, with \$30,000 cut from the bottom end. Chairman Winner stated Oak Tree had been a very beneficial part of California racing for many years. He believed the partnership between Alameda and Oak Tree would be beneficial to both parties and for all of California horseracing. Commissioner Choper said Alameda was in the center of one of the most prosperous locations in California, and there was a great potential for it to be partnered with such a distinguished association as Oak Tree. He stated he hoped the partnership had an agreement that was longer than one year, as it could take time to show its potential. Mr. Barr stated the agreement was for two years, which would hopefully be long enough to show enough successes to continue. He stated in response to Commissioner Beneto, that he also was not happy with the \$30,000 cut from the bottom, and would be working with Mr. Swartzlander to try and find a more fair compromise. Commissioner Beneto asked what the Oak Tree Foundation balance sheet looked like. Mr. Barr stated it was down to about \$5 or \$6 million. He said until there was a new revenue stream Oak Tree was only giving to charity the minimum five percent required by law. Commissioner Krikorian said he also had fond memories of Alameda and was looking forward to the success of the partnership. Commissioner Krikorian motioned to approve the application to conduct a horse racing meeting of the Oak Tree Racing Association at Alameda, commencing June 19, 2014 through July 6, 2014; contingent upon receiving all outstanding items. Commissioner Auerbach seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried. Mr. Chillingworth asked if the license was jointly shared between Oak Tree and Alameda. Executive Director Baedeker stated the application was a joint application therefore license would be a joint license.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY AT THE FIREHOUSE SPORTS BAR AND RESTAURANT IN BAKERSFIELD, CALIFORNIA.

Phil Balderamos, representing Sportech, spoke about Sportech's successfully started minisatellites, and goals for future minisatellites. He said the Firehouse Sports Bar (Firehouse) location was fantastic, with great access and ample parking. He stated it was an established bar and restaurant, with an experienced operator and successful owner. Mr. Balderamos said the Firehouse proposed building an addition of around 8,000 square feet which would include an eight lane bowling alley and almost 3,000 square feet dedicated to the minisatellite operations. He said operations were anticipated to begin in August, 2014, and have around \$8 million to \$10

million a year in handle. He stated his concern for the closure of the Bakersfield fairgrounds and how getting a minisatellite operating as soon as possible was important to keep a horse racing presence in the Bakersfield area. Chairman Winner asked about the application's outstanding items. Mr. Balderamos said there was some confusion on what was required with the financials, but the matter had been cleared up with CHRB staff, and the fire clearance and worker's compensation would be submitted after the renovations and prior to opening. Commissionier Krikorian asked if the property was owned or leased. Russell Johnson, owner of the Firehouse, stated it was leased, with the option for three five year extensions. Chairman Winner said the approval could be conditioned upon the submission of the outstanding items as well as the terms of the lease. He said making the submission of a lease a term of the application could be discussed at the ad hoc committee on minisatellites. Commissionier Krikorian asked if the seating listed was shared with the restaurant or dedicated to wagering. Mr. Balderamos said the seating listed would be fully dedicated to wagering. Commissioner Krikorian asked about the marketing budget for the minisatellite operations. Mr. Balderamos stated there was no formal marketing plan; however, one was being worked on. He said the management of the Firehouse would be assisting with the marketing plan, as it had a successful track record with the local marketing of its current operations. Commissioner Krikorian stated he had a problem with the contract preventing another minisatellite operation within a ten-mile radius. Commissioner Choper asked if minisatellite applications should be first submitted to committee to have all of the issues worked out before coming before the Board. Executive Director Baedeker stated it had been previously suggested that minisatellites go to committee prior to going before the Board; however, in practice, there has been a desire to expedite the application. He said that going forward, the committee would be given the option of hearing the application before it goes before the Board. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg suggested the Board come up with a policy on the ten-mile radius restriction so that time was not wasted sending every application to committee. Executive Director Baedeker said there was plenty of time during staff's review of the application to advise committee and decide whether or not the committee should see the application before it goes before the Board. Commissioner Krikorian stated there shouldn't ever be a ten- mile restriction; when a new application came before the Board existing minisatellites concerns could be heard. Joe Morris, representing Southern California Off-Track Wagering Inc., stated in the case of rural Bakersfield, a ten-mile radius protection was appropriate. He said removing it as a contingency for the license would prevent the deal from taking place. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated that requiring the removal of the protection this late in the negotiation would be unfair to the applicant. Chairman Winner asked for the opinion of the owner of Fireside on the ten-mile radius. Mr. Johnson stated the ten-mile radius was very important as the area could not sustain more than one minisatellite. Commissioner Choper stated both sides to the issue had merit, but requiring its removal from the contract as a contingency for license was not a good idea. He said the issue underlined the importance of minisatellite applications going to committee as early as possible to get these issues ironed out early in the process. Chairman Winner stated he agreed that future minisatellite applications needed to be seen by committee before going to the Board. He agreed that the Board should not try to make changes in the agreements that had been reached by the parties of the applications currently before it. Commissioner Beneto stated he did not want the Board to rubber stamp an application it did not agree with. Chairman Winner said going forward the issues would be taken care of at committee, but the current applicants should not be held to a change in procedure decided upon in the discussion of their application. Commissioner Krikorian stated the Board already decided the applications should first go to committee. Executive Director Baedeker agreed that the Board already requested minisatellite applications go first to committee, but staff did not follow through with implementing the request. Commissioner Krikorian stated what was decided for the Firehouse application would set even more precedent that the applicants could negotiate exclusive development rights without the approval of the board. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated it might matter for the next item, the application in San Diego, but it was not an issue for an applicant in Bakersfield. Commissioner Krikorian motioned to approve the application for license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility at the Firehouse Sports Bar and Restaurant contingent upon receiving all outstanding documents, and the removal of the ten-mile radius restriction on new minisatellite operations. Commissioner Beneto seconded the motion; the motion failed. Chairman Winner motioned to approve the application for license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility at the Firehouse Sports Bar and Restaurant contingent upon receiving all outstanding documents. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was carried, with Commissioner Krikorian and Commissioner Beneto opposed.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY OPERATED BY S&S VENUES CALIFORNIA LLC IN DOWNTOWN SAN DIEGO, CALIFORNIA.

Phil Balderamos, representing Sportech, stated the proposed minisatellite in San Diego was the first downtown minisatellite location in a major California city. He said it would be an 8,126 square foot, two story bar/restaurant with wagering on the second story and food service on the first floor. He stated the plan was for wagering downstairs, once San Diego was willing to permit it. Mr. Balderamos stated the entire project was over a \$2 million investment with an already substantial investment in planning and with the city to fast track the approval process.

He stated it was scheduled to open in October, 2014, and once fully operational would bring in around \$15 million a year in handle. Commissioner Choper asked if the Sycuan Tribe was involved in the project. Mr. Balderamos stated the location was outside of Sycuan's 20 mile radius. Commissioner Choper asked who would run the restaurant. Mr. Balderamos stated this was a joint venture with the Silky Sulivan Group, who would run the food service side of the business. Commissioner Beneto asked how far the proposed minisatellite location was from the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (Del Mar). Mr. Balderamos stated it was 19.2 miles, and that the applicant had waivers from both Del Mar and the 22nd Agricultural Association. Commissioner Krikorian stated that approving a minisatellite in a downtown of a major city with a ten-mile radius restriction on new minisatellites would be a bad decision for the Board. George Haines, of Southern California Off-Track Wagering Inc. (SCOTWINC), stated any new satellites in the downtown San Diego area would have to get waivers from Del Mar and Surfside; he asked if it mattered if another waiver was required from a proposed minisatellite. Executive Director Baedeker said the entire downtown area of San Diego and beyond was covered by the combined 20-mile radius restrictions of Del Mar, Syucan, and Barona. Commissioner Krikorian said if the Board did not approve this license with a ten-mile radius restriction then Del Mar's waiver would be the only one required for another minisatellite in the downtown San Diego area. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the applicant had any objection to giving up the protection of a ten-mile radius restriction. Mr. Balderamos said because of all of the work and investment on the location there would have to be at least a compromise such as a three-mile radius restriction. Commissioner Auerbach asked if Mr. Balderamos had the authority to make such a compromise. Mr. Balderamos said that he did. Scott Daruty, of Santa Anita, stated that SCOTWINC should add a minimum handle condidtion to receive the three-mile radius protection. Mr. Balderamos said there was such a clause which required the minisatellite to achieve a minimum of \$5 million in handle on the first year, increasing three percent year on year. Commissioner Auerbach motioned to approve to approve the application for license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility by S&S Venues in downtown San Diego contingent upon receiving all outstanding documents, and the reduction of the ten-mile radius restriction on new minisatellite operations to a three mile radius. Commissioner Krikorian seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REQUEST FROM DEL MAR THOROUGHBRED CLUB FOR A WAIVER TO CHRB RULE 1472, (B), AND (G) RAIL CONSTRUCTION AND TRACK SPECIFICATIONS, TO FACILITATE THE INSTALLATION OF THE MAWSAFE RAIL SYSTEM AS ITS OUTSIDE TURF RAIL.

Josh Rubenstein, representing the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (Del Mar), stated the inside rail was replaced with a Mawsafe rail in 2013. He said there was consensus in favor of the installation of the same product for the outside rail. Commissioner Auerbach motioned to approve the request from Del Mar for a waiver to CHRB Rule 1472, (b), and (g) Rail Construction and Track Specifications, to facilitate the installation of the Mawsafe Rail System as its outside turf rail. Commissioner Beneto seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **PROPOSED** AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1688, USE OF WHIPS, TO REVISE THE JOCKEY'S USE OF THE WHIP DURING RACES.

Shane Gusman, representing the Jockeys' Guild, stated the amendment would replace the term whip with riding crop, which was what jockeys actually used. He said it made other minor

changes, such as limiting a riding crop from making contact with a horse to two times before seeing if the horse responded. Mr. Gusman said the Jockeys' Guild requested that the proposed limit be raised to three times. Chairman Winner stated it was about the health and safety of the horse, but also the public perception of horse racing. He said the riding crops currently used were made of soft leather, and it was his understanding that since the softer modern crops were put into use there have been hardly any welts or evidence of skin intrusion by the riding crop. Commissioner Choper asked about the included language concerning the way the riding crop was raised overhead. Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB Assistant Executive Director, stated the Jockeys' Guild requested that the language referring to the riding crop position be removed from the proposed amendment. Chairman Winner motioned to to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1688. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED ADDITION OF CHRB RULE, 1891.1, PENALTY FOR POSSESSION OR USE OF ELECTRICAL DEVICE, TO ESTABLISH PENALTIES FOR THE USE OF A BUZZER ON A HORSE.

Executive Director Baedeker stated the intent of the proposed addition of CHRB Rule 1891.1 was to make the punishment for using an electrical devise the maximum possible, which was an automatic permanent license revocation. Commissioner Choper asked if the Board retained discretion to give less than the maximum. Executive Director Baedeker said that was up for discussion. Chairman Winner stated 1st Vice-Chairman Derek had stated at committee that she wanted to send a clear message, without question, that anyone involved with using an electrical device received the maximum penalty. He said the Board could discuss retaining its discretion in

the penalty; however, he too would prefer to send a clear message that if you use a buzzer, you lost your license, permanently. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked what would be the procedure for penalizing the licensees who "conspired" to use an electrical device. Chairman Winner said that a trainer or owner who instructed a jockey to use an electrical device would receive the same punishment as the jockey that used it. Robert Miller, CHRB General Counsel, stated there would be a hearing before the full Board with a court reporter as well as an Administrative Law Judge to advise the Board. John Barr, of Oak Tree Racing Association, asked if the device could be discovered anywhere for it to be a punishable offense. Mr. Miller stated the Board had jurisdiction anywhere within the inclosure. Commissioner Choper stated the defense would be that someone else put it in their pocket. Commissioner Beneto said if the Board was going to clean up racing it needed to remain firm. Chairman Winner stated there would be a hearing and the defense could be heard before the Board. Commissioner Auerbach motioned to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed addition of CHRB Rule 1891.1. Commissioner Beneto seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE REPORT REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF 2014 RACE DATES TO THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FAIR AT POMONA.

Chairman Winner stated the item was an initial report on the possible agreement between the Los Angeles County Fair at Fairplex (Fairplex) and the Los Alamitos Racing Association (Los Alamitos), so that a more informed decision could be made at the next Regular Board Meeting. James Henwood, of Fairplex, stated that Fairplex, after 70 years of California horse racing, was no longer in a position to properly provide a racing experience the audience deserved. He stated

that Los Alamitos was in a position to provide what Fairplex could not, and he requested the Board allow the Fairplex meet to move there. Brad Mckenzie, of Los Alamitos, stated Los Alamitos was excited about the prospect of adding three more weeks of thoroughbred racing to its calendar. Chairman Winner stated there were many questions about how moving the Fairplex race meet to Los Alamitos could be done; he said he was not asking the questions because he was against the move, only because the process for such a move needed to be clarified. He asked for specifications on the financial arrangements, if it would require legislation, and if there were any other arrangements that had been negotiated. He wanted to know why race dates that belonged to the State of California should be transferred between individual parties. Chairman Winner stated the race dates in question were granted to Fairplex under certain conditions, which were now being changed. He asked if this move was already being considered when the stabling and vanning negotiations were taking place. Mr. Henwood stated the move would require legislation, but the legislation would be determined by what the Board decided. He said Fairplex was not leading the discussion on vanning and stabling; there was a need for stabling and Fairplex offered its facilities. He stated the agreement between Fairplex and Los Alamitos was a private agreement. He stated that when it looked for a location for its race meet, Fairplex considered the reality that the Southern California industry favored Santa Anita, Del Mar, and Los Alamitos. Chairman Winner said it could be argued that once the race meet was moved it would no longer be a Fairplex meet. He stated if Fairplex no longer wanted the dates, and legislation was required either way, what prevented the Board from allocating them any way it wanted. Mr. McKenzie stated it was possible that legislation would not be required for Fairplex to run the dates at Los Alamitos. He said it could be run like Oak Tree's meet at the Alameda County Fair. Commissioner Beneto said a fair meet was a place where people who did not

usually bet on horse racing, would do so. He stated he was concerned that moving the fair race meet to Los Alamitos moved it away from the fair customers that were potentially new horseracing customers. Mr. Henwood said there was a lot of analysis on what it took to attract a horse racing customer at a fair. He said every fair was different, and Fairplex racing did not benefit as much from being part of a fair as other county fairs did. Mr. McKenzie stated Los Alamitos would have the responsibility, while Fairplex would pay the overhead of running the meet. He said the deal ensured the first money made would go to pay expenses, if more money was made it would go to Los Alamitos, and if there was more money made Fairplex would see a profit. Commissioner Beneto asked if \$100,000 was made at the meet how much would go to Los Alamitos and how much would go to Fairplex. Mr. McKenzie stated it was a private deal between two parties. Commissioner Beneto stated if the meet was going to be advertised as the Los Angeles County Fair it was not a private deal. 2nd Vice Chairman Rosenberg asked if there was anything with the lease of the fairground facilities that could become an issue. Mr. Henwood stated the lease had a clause that allowed the thoroughbred racing to be terminated if it became economically unfeasible. Chairman Winner asked how the Los Angeles County Fair Board felt about the relocation of the race meet. Mr. Henwood stated the board had been notified. Chairman Winner stated it was important to know how Los Angeles County felt about relocating the race meet before the Board could make a decision. Mr. Henwood said it would be looked into. Commissioner Auerbach stated she was hesitant to discuss anything else concerning Fairplex's needs, after all of the negotiation over vanning and stabling, where Fairplex demanded first payment and received so much out of the deal. Mr. Henwood said it was the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) that pushed for stabling at Fairplex, not Fairplex. He said Fairplex needed to get paid first to cover the expenses of stabling as it did not receive any new racing dates to cover the costs. Commissioner Auerbach stated Fairplex did not request any new dates. Mr. Henwood stated the dates were never offered. Commissioner Auerbach asked why would Fairplex want new dates if it intended on moving its existing dates to Los Alamitos. She asked if the October or January horse sale would still be held at Fairplex. Mr. Henwood guaranteed the October sale would still take place at Fairplex but the January sale was uncertain; Fairplex was working with Del Mar to relocate the Barrett Sales platform to Del Mar. Commissioner Krikorian asked where CTT stood on the requested relocation. He said the CTT were stakeholders in the horse racing business and deserved the respect to consider its opinion on the race meets relocation. Mr. Henwood said the CTT was informed of the proposed relocation a week earlier. Commissioner Krikorian said closing down the only non-privately owned facility in the Los Angeles area, when the future for Los Alamitos and Santa Anita were unknown, was a terrible deal for the future of California horse racing. Commissioner Beneto asked if the barns at Fairplex would be torn down soon. Mr. Henwood stated there were not yet any plans for demolition. Commissioner Choper asked if Fairplex would still be an option for stabling if needed. Mike Seeder, of Fairplex, stated the contract for stabling was through mid-July, 2014, and Fairplex had consistently said it would stay open for stabling as long as needed. He said Fairplex also made clear that if it was needed for stabling beyond 2014, it would require a large investment in its storm drainage system, an investment that Fairplex could not afford on its own. Commissioner Beneto asked how the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) felt about relocating the race meet. Joe Morris, representing TOC, stated his organization supported the move. Commissioner Beneto stated that previously Mr. Morris had stated a fair meet could not be run without a fair. Mr. Morris said the situation was different as this was not a fair location, but a full racing association located in a better market for horse racing. Commissioner Krikorian

asked if the TOC had ever considered giving more race days to Fairplex to make it more economically viable and able to make the required improvements, such as a turf course. Mr. Morris stated it was never considered. Commissioner Krikorian said maybe it was something that should be at least explored before committing to closing the Fairplex racing complex. Demascus Castellanos, representing Teamsters Union Local 495, stated Los Alamitos would do a great job with the Fairplex race meet; however, many jobs would be lost. He agreed that Fairplex was a great location for the industry to expose horse racing to people who might not otherwise bet on horses, and that would be lost with relocation to Los Alamitos. Chairman Winner asked how many jobs would be lost. Mr. Castellanos stated between 40 and 50; he said Los Alamitos would not be able to absorb many new personnel due to issues with redundancy. Mr. Henwood said that if a favorable decision was given by the Board, negotiations with the Teamsters would be the first to take place. Helen Shelley, from the Arabian Racing Association of California (ARAC) spoke about the recent growth of Arabian California racing. requested that the Board encouraged Los Alamitos to run Arabian racing, should the Board approve the relocation of the Fairplex meet. Mr. McKenzie stated encouragement was not needed as Los Alamitos planned to continue and expand upon all aspects included in the tradition of Fairplex racing. Alan Balch, representing the CTT, stated the request to relocate the Fairplex meet was another example the industry's lack of a strategic plan for the future of California racing. He said the CTT had not been included in the decision in any way. Mr. Balch said his organization was still concerned with the potential stabling requirements once Fairplex shut down its stabling on July 10, 2014. Mr. Balch stated private negotiations were not the best way to transfer race dates. If the dates were available, Santa Anita and Del Mar should be involved in the discussion for what was the best interest of the industry. Commissioner Choper suggested that the CTT invite the TOC to discussions it had about the stabling issue as both parties shared an interest in proper stabling. Mr. Henwood stated Fairplex was not relinquishing its race dates, and desired an outcome that served the industry. Robert Miller, CHRB General Counsel, stated the dates in question were not thoroughbred race dates, they were fair race dates, and could not be run by an association without increasing the 49 weeks of Southern and Central California thoroughbred racing. Chairman Winner stated an increase could only be done by legislation. Mr. Balch said the fair dates could be run at Santa Anita, or Del Mar in the same way they could be run at Los Alamitos. Mr. Miller said currently the fair dates were held by Fairplex.

REPORT FROM THE LEGISLATIVE, LEGAL AND REGULATIONS COMMITTEE.

Commissioner Choper stated the Legislative, Legal and Regulations Committee resolved two issues: a lawsuit by San Luis Rey Downs, and a revision to the rules of procedures for a disciplinary hearing.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE MATTER OF THE SAN LUIS REY RACING, INC. (DBA SAN LUIS REY DOWNS) JULY 18, 2013 PROPOSED DECISION.

Robert Miller, CHRB General Counsel, stated that in July of 2013 the Board considered and adopted a proposed decision by Scott Cheney having to do with issues referred to the Board by the San Diego Superior Court involving the allocation of stabling and vanning funds and consideration of an audit of the Stabling and Vanning Fund (SVF). He said the adoption of the decision was then stayed by then CHRB Chairman David Israel, and then stayed again by the current Board. Mr. Miller said the issue then went to the Legislative, Legal and Regulations

Committee which decided to adopt certain parts of the Scott Cheney decision and void other parts. He said that Patrick Webb, a lawyer for San Luis Rey Racing, Incorporated (SLRRI), stated he did not receive notice of the Committee meeting; however, Mike Marten, CHRB staff, did send notice of the meeting to Mr. Webb; the notice was published on the CHRB website as well. Commissioner Auerbach asked if the lawsuit was from the current owners of San Luis Rey Downs (SLRD). Mr. Miller said SLRRI were the previous managers. Commissioner Auerbach stated SLRRI were not authorized to receive money from the SVF. Jack Liebau, representing the SVF, said SLRD, while managed by SLRRI, had not yet been approved as an off-site stabling facility. Commissioner Krikorian motioned to adopt the recommendation of the Legislative, Legal and Regulations Committee. Commissioner Auerbach seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING APPROVAL OF THE REVISED CHRB GOVERNING PROCEDURES NOTICE FOR DISCIPLINARY HEARING.

Robert Miller, CHRB General Counsel, stated the modification in Governing Procedure for disciplinary action was for cases when a licensee was charged with a class 1, 2, or 3 drug-positive violation where the penalty sought was less than license revocation. He said the modification would allow such said licensee the ability to seek discovery under Government Code Section 11507.6., giving the licensee access to all of the evidence that the Board intended to use at the hearing or request any relevant documents admissible in evidence. Commissioner Choper said the change reflected what was already current practice. He said the change would be re-examined in a year to determine its effectiveness. Alan Balch, of the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT), stated the CTT agreed with the Committee's decision and offered

its assistance in determining how it would be implemented. Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, stated he did not enjoy preparing what he considered were fishing expeditions, but he was behind whatever the Board wanted to do. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated the Committee felt that the reputation of trainers, owners, jockeys, or whoever stood accused, deserved full right to any information, as in any normal litigation. Mr. Miller said there was an option to limit discovery if the information requests were onerous or overly burdensome. Commissioner Choper said the first year would be reviewed to see if the Board had enough protection against abuse of the discovery process. Commissioner Beneto asked if a license could be temporarily suspended during the disciplinary process. Mr. Miller said that under due process a license could still participate in racing during the disciplinary hearing. Commissioner Beneto asked if the associations were free to deny access to the race track based on their own policies. Mr. Miller stated the Board did not take a position on that matter. Chairman Winner stated that due process was a protection of law. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg motioned to approve the revised CHRB Governing Procedures Notice for Disciplinary Hearing. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

REPORT FROM THE PARI-MUTUEL/ADW AND SIMULCAST COMMITTEE.

Commissioner Krikorian said the Pari-Mutuel/ADW and Simulcast Committee were given a presentation on a new tote system by the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau (TRPB) that could give more accurate real time information on wagers, and would be ready for testing by fall of 2014. He said the primary advantage would be more accurate posting of odds, which would be posted in decimals instead of fractions. It would also have an improved stop-betting control and the ability to track any wager made. Commissioner Krikorian said if the new system worked

it could go far in restoring public faith in honest wagering. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated the new system would help shorten the lag time to show true odds live, on-line, or on television. Commissioner Krikorian said the next item discussed by Committee was an ADWs authorization to add white label or off-shoot brands to existing licenses. He said the Committee concluded the matter should go before the full Board on a case-by-case basis. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said so far these off-shoots were merely marketing tools managed by the original ADW; however that might not always be the case. Commissioner Krikorian stated the next Committee item was discussion on a request by Xpressbet, LLC to allow for the operation of a new wagering tablet at Santa Anita and Golden Gate Fields; the request was to be discussed before the full Board in the next item. He said the final item was a presentation by Sportech on its progress with developing new minisatellite locations.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REQUEST FROM XPRESSBET, LLC (XPRESSBET) TO AMEND ITS CURRENT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) APPLICATION TO ALLOW FOR THE OPERATION OF THE NEW WAGERING TABLET AT SANTA ANITA PARK AND GOLDEN GATE FIELDS RACE TRACKS.

Scott Daruty stated that Business and Professions Code section 19604 (g) authorized an association may enter an agreement with an ADW provider to facilitate any wager from a customer at its facilities that could be made through the ADW provider. He stated that Santa Anita and Golden Gate Fields had an agreement with Xpressbet to operate wagering tablets at the association facilities that would allow for any wager that could be placed on Xpressbet, but with a distribution of a wager placed at the race track. Mr. Daruty stated the distribution used would provide more for the purses and industry funds than a regular ADW distribution. He stated positions created by the use of the tablets would be staffed with Local 280 personnel.

Chairman Winner said Hollywood Park had tried using tablets in a similar way but with little success. Mr. Daruty stated the difference was this tablet would allow any wager available through Xpressbet. Commissioner Auerbach asked if the tablets would be checked in at the end of the day. Mr. Daruty said they would be checked in, and could not be used for wagering away from the location. Tom Kelso, with Sportech, stated Sportech had a right of refusal for any third party technology. Mr. Daruty said Sportech's agreement was to provide tote services with the race tracks in California, but the wagers made on these tablets went through an Xpressbet account, and Xpressbet used a different tote service. Jon Valenzuela, of Local 280, stated his opposition to the new tablets, and his concern that Xpressbet did not follow standard procedure in giving notice to his organization for the introduction of labor saving devices. Mr. Daruty said he was in negotiations with Mr. Valenzuela's predecessor, Richard Castro, and furthermore believed the bargaining agreement did not apply to the tablets for the same reasons the Sportech agreement did not apply. Chairman Winner stated this would be a part of the next labor agreements for Golden Gate Fields and Santa Anita. Joe Morris, of the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), stated the TOC's support for this technology as it would increase purse distributions and would allow for ADW wagers made at the race track to be tracked for marketing purposes. Commissioner Auerbach motioned to approve request from Xpressbet, LLC (Xpressbet) to amend its current advance deposit wagering (ADW) application to allow for the operation of the new Wagering Tablet at Santa Anita Park and Golden Gate Fields race tracks. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPROVAL OF 2014/15 STEWARD, OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN AND SERVICE CONTRACTS

Regular Board Meeting May 22, 2014

ISSUE

Pursuant to Section 2.06 of the State Contracting Manual, state boards and commissions with contracts in excess of \$5,000, must provide a copy of a motion approving and authorizing execution of the agreement/contract.

ANALYSIS

The attached list of service contracts includes two University of California, Davis (UCD) contracts:

1) A one year contract for Equine Medical Director services: UCD has requested and CHRB staff recommends an annual program cost increase of 5% or \$15,440 to accommodate increases in salary, benefits and indirect expenses to the UCD program budget item. Travel and program operating expenses will not incur a cost increase.

Current Year allocation:

\$308,800.00

Fiscal Year 2014/15 recommendation: \$324,240.00

2) A one-year contract for equine drug testing services: Fiscal year 2014-15 annual contract amount remains unchanged. For fiscal year 2015-16, the next available budget cycle, a Budget Change Proposal is being requested to increase the annual equine drug testing budget by \$970,000.00.

Current Year Allocation:

\$1,987,250.00

Fiscal Year 2014/15 Cost:

\$1,987,250.00

The service components of the equine drug testing contract include routine and in-depth analysis of blood and urine samples; out of competition testing; proteomics and designer drug methodology development; confiscated evidence testing; testimony of laboratory staff at hearings; and technical support for equine emergency situations.

Included is a list of contractors who serve as Stewards, Hearing Officers, Out of Competition sample collectors and Official Veterinarians, with estimated annual costs. Hearing Officer amounts are based on an estimated caseload using the previous fiscal year as a guide. Steward and Official Veterinarian contractor costs are estimates based on proposed assignments for the remainder of the 2014 racing calendar and for the first half of the 2015 racing year. Out of competition sampling costs are based on the Equine Medical Director's estimate of the number of days samples will be collected. No assignment guarantees are assumed for any of the contractors on the attached list. Each of the miscellaneous service contracts listed represent continued services for the day to day operations of the Board.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board approve the attached list of stewards, out of competition sample collectors, official veterinarians, hearing officers and miscellaneous service contracts for Fiscal Year 2014/15.

Regular Board Meeting May 22, 2014

ISSUE

Discussion and action by the Board on the approval of Dr. Clifford Zucco, as the replacement Official Veterinarian at the California Exposition and State Fair (Cal Expo).

BACKGROUND

The Cal Expo Official Veterinarian, Dr. Robert Goodbary, passed away before the conclusion of his current Cal Expo contract term. The Equine Medical Director has recommended Dr. Clifford Zucco to replace Dr. Goodbary. The Office of Legal Services has conditionally approved Dr. Zucco's current year contract contingent upon the full Board approving Dr. Zucco's assignment at Cal Expo.

Dr. Goodbary's contract has been disencumbered and Dr. Zucco has been encumbered for \$60,000.00 for the race dates assigned to him through June 30, 2014, the end of the current fiscal year.

RECOMMENDATION

CHRB Item 15.1 - Explanation of lack of paramedic staff

Unlike Los Angeles County, which allows for the licensing of private paramedic services, all paramedic services in Orange County fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Health Care Agency, Department of Emergency Medical Services and that agency does not license private paramedic services within the county.

All paramedic services within Orange County are provided by the Orange County Fire Authority and there is no provision within current guidelines that allow for OCFA units to be staged for activities of private events such as horse racing.

Because of this guideline, all racing events at Los Alamitos are covered by two fully equipped ambulances staffed by state certified EMT's. These EMT's and our ambulance service also fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Emergency Medical Services and our operations at the track are reviewed on an annual basis. I have included our last review with the suggestions of OCEMS which have been implemented by our track.

It is important to note that while our track is not covered by paramedics, the protocol for having paramedics on the scene in case of an accident has been reviewed and approved by the OCEMS.

The nearest paramedic staffed fire station to Los Alamitos Race Course is literally across the street. This proximity is no accident. The OCEMS will tell you that the site was chosen for the specific reason of its proximity to the race track.

In case of an accident that requires paramedic response, our Huntington Ambulance EMT's will stabilize the patient and will meet the OCFA paramedic unit at the pre-designated location directly across the street from the fire station. This location is accessed through a gate on our backstretch that we have shown on the enclosed graphic.

Not only does the OCEMS approve of this system, as you can see from our latest review, they believe having experienced EMT's handle the initial care of the jockey before handing the patient off to paramedics has benefits.

Dear Brad:

After visits to the Los Alamitos horse racing facility, reviewing patient care reports, and using input from jockeys, trainers, track administration, the current ambulance provider, paramedics at the nearest OCFA fire station and agency staff, Orange County Emergency Medical Services is comfortable with the current provider continuing to provide ambulance transportation and medical care at Los Alamitos Race Track.

We would make the following recommendations to improve the track EMS operations:

- 1. Ensure track personnel activate the 9-1-1 system immediately using the tower observer (steward, etc.) on every call in which a jockey falls at high speed during racing or training.
- 2. Require that all contract ambulance employees complete and maintain certification in the 16 hour International Trauma Life Support course, or an equivalent, along with their EMT, CPR etc. Statewide, many paramedics and EMTs have not taken this certification but it is especially appropriate for track medical personnel whose main focus will be on patients for whom mechanism of injury is often high speed trauma.
- 3. Educate the jockeys on Orange County EMS trauma policies that require that all patients who fall at full gallop/racing/training speed be transported to a designated Orange County Trauma Center for evaluation and treatment.
- 4. Consider that the contracted ambulance provider have on every transport unit an 800 MHz radio available capable of direct communication with responding Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) personnel. Contract ambulance staff would also receive training on operating this radio.
- 5. Consider the contract ambulance provider participate in the Orange County Medical Emergency Data System (OC-MEDS) which is a web-based, electronic Patient Care Report system to ensure compliance with OC EMS triage and treatment policies. The current call volume (1-3/month) is low enough that the provider would not have to buy additional hardware. Access and manual data entry of the patient care record can be done on any internet connected computer.
- 6. The ambulance provider, in conjunction with Race Track management, could coordinate with OCFA an orientation meeting with one of the three OCFA shifts at the closest fire station each month. Initial orientation should include the identification of the entry gate at the parking lot adjoining the track; track operations unique physiological characteristics of the jockeys such as, dehydration, etc.)

- 7. OC EMS could coordinate an annual safety briefing with jockeys/trainers at which contract ambulance personnel explain (in Spanish, or with translators) the care patients receive on the track, in the ambulance or at the hospital including a sinal immobilization demonstration, description of the capabilities of a trauma center, etc.)
- 8. The ambulance provider will have AEDs on the two transport vehicles at the racetrack and EMTs will be trained in their use.

As we discussed at the track, the first 5-10 minutes of most trauma calls are focused on the Basic Life Support skills of stabilizing the patient's airway and spine, evaluating for injuries and packaging them for transport.

At this time, intermediate techniques such as the Combitube are controversial in an urban setting, especially when the nearest Advanced Life Support fire station is less than a half mile away.

We believe there is a benefit to having horse-racing-specific EMS personnel who are familiar with track operations, personnel and geography.





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EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

FIRST RESPONSE

*In the event of an accident, the LARA Trackside Human Ambulance which follows each race and is staffed by state certified EMT's will respond immediately to the location of the accident. *EMT's will make an evaluation of the injuries and if deemed necessary they will call for the Security Dept. to call for Paramedics. The Security Dept. communications desk is manned at all times during racing hours.

ON SITE EVALUATION AND JOCKEY PROTOCOL

- If involved in a spill during a race, regardless of how serious the jockey deems the spill to be, they are instructed that if it is safe and they are clear of any loose horses they are to remain as still as possible until instructed to move by the EMT's.
- If EMT's request that the jockey be stabilized and placed on a backboard, jockeys are instructed to comply with that request or risk disciplinary action.
- If Paramedics are called the injured jockey will be stabilized and taken to meet
 Paramedics at the pre-designated location just outside of the Los Alamitos back fence.
 The OC Fire Paramedics will then evaluate the injuries and determine whether or not the injured rider should be transported to a trauma hospital.
- If the injuries are not deemed serious by either the EMT's or Paramedics, the rider will be directed either to a local emergency room or the Track Physician for evaluation. It will be the policy of the Track Doctor that with the exception of the most minor accidents the injured jockey be evaluated immediately by an emergency room doctor in a medical setting. Should a jockey refuse treatment recommendations from EMT's, Paramedics or the Track Doctor, they will be required to sign a Refusal of Medical Treatment form and their ability to continue riding on that day's program will be determined by the CHRB Stewards.
- In the case of multiple injuries in a single race, the two fully staffed and equipped track ambulances that are on site for every race will respond and will immediately call the Security Dept. to call for the necessary number of Paramedic backup. In this case paramedic units will be instructed to enter the track through the backstretch gate which is unlocked at all times.

2014 Los Alamitos Racing Association Marketing/Advertising Strategy

The marketing/advertising program for the 2014 Los Alamitos summer thoroughbred season is a strategy that has been in implementation since our track was first awarded racing dates. Los Alamitos is faced with a unique branding dilemma – we are a new thoroughbred meet but yet the Los Alamitos name is nationally known as the historic home to world class quarter horse racing.

As we approached this first thoroughbred racing season our goal was to not only market to our potential on-track customers, but to make a concentrated marketing effort to reach the off track satellite bettors and the home ADW players who generate approximately 85% of the purse and track commission revenues at any southern California thoroughbred meeting.

To reach this vital audience Los Alamitos has entered into marketing partnerships with the Daily Racing Form, TVG and ExpressBet/HRTV. We will discuss those partnerships in detail within this report.

In addition to these industry-related partnerships, Los Alamitos has forged a new partnership with the Orange County Register which is specifically designed to drive new fans to horse racing. This partnership with Register Connects is an exciting addition to our marketing strategy and brings the full power of the Orange County Register subscriber list to horse racing. We detail this partnership in this presentation.

Despite the budget constraints brought on by being limited to an 8-day race meeting, we feel we have crafted a marketing/advertising program that will reach the entire scope of the potential and established customers so essential to the success of this first Los Alamitos summer thoroughbred season.

We look forward to presenting this package to the CHRB at our upcoming May meeting.

The elements of this program include -

- DRF Ads Prior to Opening. Well before the start of our meet LARA will be placing print
 advertising and web page advertising with the DRF branding our race meet as a first class
 event. To accomplish this goal we will be using recognizable faces such as Gary Stevens, Bob

This date is Los Alamitos Derby Day and we will be the only track with advance past performance lines in the DRF national print edition.
- 4. Los Alamitos Derby Feature Race Of The Day. The \$500,000 Los Alamitos Derby will be the DRF's "Race of the Day" in both print and on-line editions despite the presence of numerous other major stakes being run throughout the country on this day. This "Race of the Day" status will include extensive pre-race coverage, email race news to all DRF on line subscribers and all articles and handicapping information on this race day being offered free to DRF on-line subscribers.
- Closer Looks on All Los Alamitos Races in DRF Print Edition. In addition to running Los

Reaching ADW Players

The purpose of targeting ADW players with a specific marketing/advertising push is two-fold. One goal is to encourage the players who are betting at home and have a potential menu of every race in the country to focus on the Los Alamitos races. A second goal is to entice the substantial number of ADW players who live within a 15-mile circle of Los Alamitos to leave their coach and come to the track.

To accomplish this goal LARA has entered into a marketing/advertising partnership with TVG. Prior to the opening of our meet we hope to reach a similar partnership agreement with ExpressBet/HRTV. The elements of this package include –

- Pre Meet Awareness Spots. These spots will be designed to brand our July meeting well before opening day. Once again we will be using familiar faces to send the message that the Los Alamitos thoroughbred meeting will feature nationally known horsemen. We will be running a minimum of 95 pre-meet 30-second awareness spots leading up to the July meeting. These spots will run nationally on TVG.
- 2. **Visit Los Alamitos spots**. These spots, which will run both nationally and locally when TVG is carried by FOX, Prime Ticket and Fox Sports San Diego, will highlight the on-track experience at Los Alamitos. A minimum of 20 Visit Los Alamitos spots will run leading up to the meet.
- National Wagering Promotions. These partnership promotions will include "Double Your Odds" on the Los Alamitos Derby where TVG subscribers can receive double the odds when playing the Los Alamitos Derby.
- 4. On Track Attendance Marketing to TVG Players. LARA will produce a special on-track fan experience package for 23,000 local TVG players giving them special incentives to attend the races at Los Alamitos. This package will include free preferred parking, reduced Vessels Club admission and Vessels Club food discounts.
- On Line Handicapping Contest. LARA and TVG will partner to host a \$5,000 Opening Day Handicapping Contest for TVG players. The purpose of this contest is to focus the ADW audience on the Los Alamitos program right from the start of the meet.

On Track Promotions

Driving new fans to the first Los Alamitos Thoroughbred meet is a key goal for LARA. To accomplish this goal we are making a sizeable commitment to local print and air media. This local media package includes –

- Orange County Register Print and Digital. LARA will spend \$26,000 with the Orange County
 Register for pre-meet and actual race day print advertising and promotion. This advertising
 for our 8-day Thoroughbred season is part of a year-round promotion commitment to the
 OC Register that will include the entries and results for southern California racing returning
 to the OC Register sports section.
- 2. Register Connects New Fan Promotion. Register Connects is a program offered by the OC Register that connects businesses with the 180,000 Register subscribers. The purpose of the program is to offer Register Connects members special incentives to attend Angels games, Ducks games, music festivals and other local activities. This promotion element involves a new partnership between the OC Register and Los Alamitos Race Course specifically designed to drive new fans to the track. Los Alamitos will spend more than \$20,000 to upgrade our infield to allow for a special "Register Connects Party Section". Los Alamitos will also offer Register Connects members added incentives such as handicapping classes, betting vouchers and free admission. The entire purpose of this partnership is to drive a new, younger audience to the on-track racing experience.
- 3. Long Beach Press Telegram. LARA will spend \$10,000 with the Long Beach Press Telegram for pre-meet and race day print advertising.
- 4. Local Cable Television Advertising. LARA will spend \$12,000 in the local cable market focusing mainly on 30-second spots during Angel and Dodger telecasts as well as additional buys on the Golf Channel. This targeted approach is designed to reach a demographic most likely to be interested in horse racing. This television buy will include 195 30-second spots on local cable networks.
- 5. On Track California Chrome Tee Shirt Giveaway. On opening day of the LARA meeting all fans in attendance will be given a full color California Chrome tee shirt. This promotion will be well promoted in local media through both print and television advertising as well as through direct mail to the Los Alamitos mailing list of 20,000 fans. The cost of this promotion including the cost of 10,000 tee shirts and direct mail campaign is \$45,000.



California Exposition and State Fair (Cal Expo) filed its application to conduct a horse racing meeting at Cal Expo in Sacramento:

- July 9 July 20, 2014, or 7 days, one day less than in 2013. July 9, 10, 14, 15, and 16 simulcast only; live racing to commence July 11, 2014. The fair proposes to race a total of approximately 82 races, the same number as in 2013.
- The proposed race dates are the approved dates allocated to Cal Expo.



(c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. Item #14F English:

California State Fair Racing Accident Procedures

In case of an accident on the racetrack, the following procedures are to be implemented:

Track Ambulance

The track ambulance will travel immediately to the scene of an accident and assume triage and patient care responsibilities and evacuate.

Security

- 1. As soon as possible, a member of the track security staff shall report to the scene of the accident and thereafter take direction from the EMT responsible for the accident scene management. The track security representative shall be responsible for keeping bystanders away from the accident scene.
- 2. A member of the track security staff shall proceed to the Jockey's Room to secure the ambulance transfer area and prevent visitation from bystanders away from the accident area.
- 3. A member of the track security staff shall be responsible for escorting emergency vehicles.
- 4. The security staff shall be responsible for all "crowd control" activities.

Racing Staff/Track Veterinarian

- 1. Upon arrival at the scene, the Outrider should hold the injured horse in order to prevent further harm to people, horses and property.
- 2. Horses with severe injuries should be transported off the track via the horse ambulance whenever it is practical to do so.
- 3. The track veterinarian shall make the decision as to the necessity of euthanasia on the track.
- 4. The screen blocking the public's view of the injured horse shall be set-up prior to the euthanasia procedure.
- 5. Outriders are responsible for the removal of any debris from the racetrack following the removal of the injured person or horse from the track.

Plant Staff

- 1. The Horse Ambulance shall travel immediately to the scene of an accident whenever it appears that a horse will require transport.
- 2. Members of the plant department who are near the accident site shall assist in screening the accident scene from the public view and shall take direction from the EMT that is responsible for the management of the accident scene.

Announcer

The announcer shall make riders aware of the details of the situation (such as the location of a loose horse, the necessity to pull up, etc), enabling them to take the necessary steps to mitigate additional problems.

Senior Management

- 1. A senior management representative should quickly proceed to the location on the racetrack where the accident has occurred. The manager should report to other members of the management team as to the accident status.
- 2. An additional member of the management team should report to the video department in order to monitor the scene and determine the extent of video coverage to be transmitted to the public.
- 3. A member of the management team should provide input as to announcements to be made by the track announcer.
- 4. A member of the senior management team should be responsible for seeing that information regarding the accident is communicated to family members of the injured. Efforts need to be made to escort family members to the hospital, if necessary. In this regard, a current compilation as to who should be notified in the case of an inured jockey is kept on file.
- 5. All public address announcements and responses to press inquiries are within the sole purview of the senior member of the management team then available.

All Department Heads

All Department heads shall communicate to their employees that, although intentions are good, the treatment of the injured rider must be left up to trained personnel, and all other employees must stay away from the scene of an accident.

Procedimiento en caso de Accidente en California State Fair

De ocurir un accidente en el hopodromo, se debe hacer lo siguiente:

El personal de la Ambulancia

El personal de la ambulancia trasladarse inmediatamente al lugar del accidente siumpre que lo necesario para tartar a la(s) victima(s).

Seguridad

- 1. Tan pronto como sea possible, unmiembro de seguridad del hipodromo debera reportarse al lugar del accidente y desde ahi recibir las instrucciones del Paramedico responsible del lugar del accidente. El miembro de seguridad sera responsible de mantener a los transeuntes fuera del lugar del accidente..
- 2. Un miembro del departamento de seguridad del hipodromo se acercara al cuart del jockey para asguarar el area donde la amulancia estara y prevenir que transeuntes y personas ajenas se acerquen.
- 3. Un miembro de seguridad del hipodrmomo sera responsible de escoltar a los vehiclulos de emergencia..
- 4. Los miembros de sequridad seran responsible de controlar a la multitud.

Personal de Carreras/Vetennano del hipodromo

- 1. Una vez en el lugar del accidente, el Outrider/escolta debera sujetar al caballo herido para evitar que lastime a la gente, a otros caballos o a la propiedad.
- 2. Los caballos muy mal heridoa deberan ser sacados de la pista con la ambulancia para caballos, siempre que sea possible hacerlo de esa manera.
- 3. El veterinano del hipodromo debera decider si se sacrifice al caballo en la pista.
- 4. Sea possible hacerlo, se debe colocar la pantalla/screen para tapa la vista al publico, antes de iniciar el procedimiento de sacrificio del animal.
- 5. Los Outriders son responsables de remover cualquier desecho en la pista desputes de que la persona o caballo accidentado haya sido trasladado del lugar.

Personal de Planta/Plant Staff

- 1. La Ambulancia de Caballos debera trasladarse inmediatamente al lugar del accidente siempre que un caballo este severamente lesionado y necesite transporte.
- 2. Los miembros del departamento de planta que esten cerca del accidente deberan ayudar a fapar el lugar para que el pulico no pueda ver lo que sucede, ademas deberan recibir instrucciones del Paramedico responsible del lugar del accidente.

Locutor

El locator debera informar a los jinetes acerca de los detalles de la situcion (como la ubicación del caballo suelto, la necesidad de adelantar, etc.) para que puedan hacer lo necesario y mitigar otros problemas.

Gerencia

- 1. Un representante de la gerencia se apersonara rapidamente al lugar del accidente en el hoipodromo. El genente informara a los otros gerents sobre las lesions sufridas.
- 2. Otro representante de la gerencia debera informar al departamento de videio para monitorear la escena y ver la cobertura de video que sera transmitida al publico.
- 3. Un miembro de la gerencia debera aportar con informacion sobre los anuncios que debera hacer el locutor.
- 4. Un miembro de la gerencia sera responsible de ver que la informacion con respecto al accidente sea dada a los familiars de los heridos. Se debe hacer lo necesario para acompanar a los familiars a los hospitals, de ser el caso. Al respecto, es necesario tener un registro de la persona a quien se debe comunicar en caso de que un jockey sufra un accidente.
- 5. Todos los anuncios publicos y respuestas a la prensa las realize unicamente el funcionario de gerencia de alto nivel que se encuentre disponible en ese momento.

Del Mar Thoroughbred Club filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Del Mar:

- July 17 through September 3, 2014, or 36 days, 1 day less than 2013. The association proposes to race a total of 324 races, or 9 races per day. In 2013 Del Mar raced 8.89 races per day with an average of 8.80 runners per race. In 2013 Del Mar was allocated to race 37 days the (actual) average daily purse for the meet was \$668,172. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$682,788.
- The race dates proposed are the dates allocated by the Board.

Spires.com for Internet and telephone wagering (live operator and IVR – Interactive Voice Response) on Del Mar content and via Southern California customers (during Del Mar's season).



Overview: The Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) is committed to the overall health and safety of the riding professionals that are valued members of the racing community and DMTC. A large part of this commitment is the provision of professional medical and first aid services, should a jockey need to avail themselves of such services or be involved in an accident that requires first aid or emergency medical aid. DMTC takes their role in providing first aid and emergency medical care and transportation, when required, seriously. This program defines the plan elements and procedures DMTC will follow, should such events occur where medical aid becomes necessary.

Program Elements:

I. Medical Professionals On-Site During Racing - Summary

DMTC maintains licensed medical and first aid professionals that comply with the levels established by the horse racing industry. DMTC contracts with Scripps Coastal Medical Clinics to provide a licensed physician and medical assistants, who are on duty during live racing. DMTC maintains two Advanced Life Support Ambulances. Each ambulance is staffed by a Paramedic and a Bridge Program certified Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). In addition, municipal fire department, with paramedic and EMT services are readily available as these services are co-located with the track.

II. Jockey Health Information System (JHIS)

DMTC participates in the Jockey Health Information System through InCompass. All Medical Doctors and the Risk Management Department have access to this program.

The medical doctors staffing the on-site clinic can access medical information for those jockeys who participate in the program.

When a jockey, who participates in the program, is injured on track, the DMTC Risk Management Supervisor will access and print the Jockey's information. This information, along with Work Comp information is then sent with the Jockey to the hospital and/or faxed directly to the hospital emergency room.

II. Area Hospitals and Rapid Admittance

 a. DMTC maintains a working relationship with two area hospitals, both members of the Scripps Hospital and Healthcare family of operations. The hospitals are found in either La Jolla, just south

of the DMTC track, or Encinitas, just north of the track. Both are Level 1 trauma hospitals.

- The Scripps triage and base station is located at the La Jolla hospital – when determined transport is necessary they will be contacted immediately by the Medical Clinic Staff, Paramedics or Risk Management.
- c. Riders will be transported to Scripps La Jolla unless base station determines alternate site is necessary. All decisions on where a rider will be seen are made by Scripps La Jolla at the time of a reported incident. DMTC will not know where a rider is being taken until such time that transport has been initiated and we are advised as to which facility they are directed to.

III. The DMTC Safety and Health and Program Manager

- The DMTC Risk Manager serves as the Safety Manager and coordinator of the Jockey medical treatment and on-track accident program.
- DMTC also maintains an Assistant Safety and Health Manager (the Risk Management Supervisor) during the live meet period in the event the Safety Manager is unavailable.

Both the Risk Manager and the Risk Manager Supervisor can be reached at the following extensions, Ext. 4233 or Ext. 3225 respectively or via radio on the Security Channel as Risk 1 and Risk 2. As needed, the DMTC Operator or security Dispatch can assist with obtaining alternate contact numbers as well.

IV. On-site First Aid Facilities and Staffing

a. Physician - Services for the on-site medical clinic are contracted through Scripps Coastal Medical Center. During all live racing periods there will a licensed physician and medical assistant on duty.

b. Advanced Life Support Ambulances (ALS) – A Paramedic and Bridge Program certified Emergency Medical Technicians are on site at all times that either training or live racing is taking place. During Training hours there will be one ALS ambulance and one team which includes one (1) Paramedic and one (1) Bridge Program certified Emergency Medical Technician on site at all times. During live racing there will be two ALS ambulances, which will include two (2) Paramedics and two (2) Bridge Program certified Emergency Medical Technicians on site. Team 1 will follow the field during live racing; Team 2 will cover the paddock during pre-race activities and serve as a back up to Team 1. Both teams will maintain radio contact with the officials and security dispatch at all times.

c. Municipal Response Capabilities- DMTC is located on a State of California Fairgrounds. As such, we enjoy the benefits of the Del Mar Fire Department municipal fire service and Paramedic and Emergency Medical Technicians that are stationed on the grounds. If the on-site station has responded to an off-site emergency, the North Com dispatch will send the closest responding unit available. On track Paramedics have the capability of calling North Com directly should back up be necessary.

V. Ambulance and Medical Transport Protocols

- a. Contracted ambulance service DMTC contracts with the San Diego/Rural Metro Ambulance who provides ALS on-track emergency medical response and may provide transport services. Depending on the time and nature of an incident as well as the number of riders involved, transport may be referred to or in conjunction with the local municipal services.
- b. Local municipal services The Del Mar Fire Department or others within the Rancho Fire Service area may respond as needed or called upon. The Rancho Fire Service will respond with Paramedics and EMT's on the fire trucks as well as Paramedics assigned to the municipal ambulances.

VI. The Emergency Medical Plan

These steps will be followed in the event of an on-track accident:

General Conditions

- On-site Paramedics and EMT's will respond to any observed rider on-track accident or as otherwise summoned for assistance. Such response will occur during training and/or live racing periods,
- If an incident requires transport, the hospital will be contacted and notified
 of the patient transport. (The La Jolla location of Scripps Hospital serves
 as the triage and base station for all incidents requiring hospital

emergency care; they will direct the medical transport team as to which hospital to respond to.)

Communications

- Paramedic and EMT's (Team 1 and 2) will be assigned two radios per team allowing for constant communication with both security dispatch and officials. Both Official Channel and Dispatch Channel will be monitored at all times.
- Medical Clinic will be assigned one radio and will maintain contact with security dispatch at all times.
- DMTC security dispatch will monitor the official channel at all times.
- Safety and Health Program Manager and Assistant will monitor the security channel at all times and the official channel during a live race.
 Both individuals will be available either on site or via cell phone 24 hours a day during the live meet.

Response During Training Periods

- During training periods, Paramedic and EMT will determine the nature and extent of any injuries and whether transport to a medical facility is necessary,
- The DMTC Security Dispatch will be notified immediately of any rider incident on-track or otherwise during training periods and will assist San Diego Medical Enterprises Services with securing additional medical help for transport to area hospital when necessary.
- Municipal units will meet San Diego Medical Enterprises unit at the clock tower to secure injured rider and transport to one of designated hospital.
- Incidents with injuries not requiring transport to one of the local hospitals identified within this program will be treated on-track or at the DMTC medical clinic based upon Paramedic judgment.
- Any on-track accidents during training periods will be immediately reported to the Safety Manager, for analysis review and additional reporting as might be required.

Response During Pre-Race (Paddock)

- EMT Team 2 will be situated in the paddock area during pre race activities to respond to an emergency occurring in the paddock area.
- Should an emergency occur Security Dispatch will be notified immediately.

- DMTC Safety and Health Program Manager and/or Assistant will respond to incident.
- Security dispatch will notify on site medical clinic that an incident has occurred.
- As needed, additional medical assistance will be summoned from local municipal resources,
- DMTC Security will respond to incident and assist with crowd control. If necessary security will provide escort to the medical clinic.

Accidents During Live Racing

- ALS unit -Team 1 following the racing field will immediately respond to ontrack accidents; simultaneously, the on-track physician and medical assistant will be made aware of the incident via radio contact, observation of the race via closed –circuit television or as advised by the DMTC Safety or Security Staff,
- ALS unit Team 2 will be on stand by at medical clinic to assist and/or replace the on track unit should it be necessary for Team 1 to leave the track for any reason.
- Should incident require ambulance to leave the track prior to the start of the race, Team 2 will immediately move in to position at the starting gates. When this occurs Team 2 will notify stewards via radio that they are in place.
- If for any reason Team 2 is unavailable CHRB stewards must be notified immediately via the official channel.
- As needed, additional medical assistance will be summoned from local municipal resources,
- Riders will be transported to the on-site medical facility for initial review, observation and triage. Should the Paramedic feel that immediate transport is necessary to hospital he will alert Security that rider will be transported directly to hospital (Paramedics have radio contact with Scripps La Jolla and will notify them directly of the transport). Risk Management will notify Officials.
- To the extent possible, all care will be provided by the professionals within the DMTC medical clinic,

- DMTC Safety and Security staff will immediately respond to the medical clinic to assist with event management and access control to the medical clinic,
- Depending on the nature and severity of injuries, the rider(s) may be transported to one of the local hospitals noted within this plan for further medical care and treatment as is needed.
- Any on-track accidents during live racing will be immediately reported to the Safety Manager, for analysis review and additional reporting as might be required.
- When one of the ALS units are required to leave the grounds DMTC Security will be notified immediately and instructed to call North Com for any patron medical aids until unit returns to grounds.
- Risk Management Department will provide Jockey Health Information System paperwork and Workers Compensation to the hospital.

Please note: Under no circumstances will information regarding the medical condition of a rider be provided to members of the media or others. Any such request should immediately be referred to the Director of Media and or President/General Manager.

Club de Caballos Purasangre Hipódromo Del Mar Programa de Respuesta ante un Accidente de los Jinetes en las Pistas

Visión General: El Club de Caballos Purasangre del Hipódromo Del Mar (DMTC) se compromete a la salud y seguridad de todos los profesionales de equitación que son miembros valorados de la comunidad de equitación y DMTC. Una gran parte de este compromiso es proporcionar atención médica profesional y servicios de primeros auxilios, en caso de que un jinete necesite utilizar tales servicios o se vea implicado en un accidente que requiera atención de primeros auxilios o asistencia médica de emergencia. DMTC hace su función al ofrecer asistencia médica de emergencia, de primeros auxilios y transporte cuando se requiera en caso necesario. Este programa define los elementos del plan y procedimientos. DMTC realizará un seguimiento, cuando ocurran estos hechos donde se necesite asistencia médica.

Elementos del Programa:

I. Profesionales Médicos en el Sitio Durante la Carrera-Resumen

DMTC mantiene a profesionales médicos licenciados y de primeros auxilios que cumplen con los niveles establecidos por la industria hípica. DMTC contrata a "Scripps Coastal Medical Clinics" para ofrecer un médico licenciado y ayudantes médicos que están en servicio durante la carrera de caballos. DMTC mantiene dos Ambulancias Avanzadas de Apoyo Vital. Cada ambulancia cuenta con un personal Paramédico y un Técnico Médico de Emergencia certificado del Programa Bridge (EMT). Además del departamento de bomberos municipal con paramédicos y servicios de EMT que están preparados, disponibles y están situados al lado de la pista.

II. Sistema de Salud para la Información del Jinete (JHIS)

DMTC participa en el Sistema de Salud para la Información del Jinete por medio de InCompass. Todos los Médicos y Departamento de Gerencia de Riesgo tienen acceso a este programa.

Todo el personal médico en el sitio puede acceder a la información médica de aquellos jinetes que participen en el programa.

Cuando un jinete, que participa en el programa, se accidenta en la pista, el Supervisor de Gerencia de Riesgo de DMTC accederá e imprimirá la información del Jinete. Esta información, junto con la información de Compensación de los Trabajadores se manda junto con el Jinete al hospital o se envía por fax directamente a la sala de emergencia del hospital.

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III. Hospitales de la Zona y Admisión Rápida

- a. DMTC mantiene una relación profesional con dos hospitales de la zona, tanto los miembros del Hospital Scripps y la familia de asistencia médica de operaciones. Los hospitales se encuentran o en La Jolla, justo al sur de la pista de DMTC, o en Encinitas, justo al norte de la pista. Los dos son hospitales de traumatismos Nivel 1.
- La selección de Scripps y estación base se sitúa en el hospital de La Jolla, cuando se necesite un transporte determinado se les pondrá en contacto inmediato con el Personal Médico, Paramédicos o Gerencia de Riesgo.

IV. Salud y Seguridad y Gerente del Programa de DMTC

- a. El Gerente de Riesgo de DMTC atiende como Gerente de Seguridad y coordinador del tratamiento médico del jinete y el programa de accidentes en la pista.
- b. DMTC también mantiene un Subgerente de Seguridad y Salud (el Supervisor de Gerencia de Riesgo) durante el periodo del encuentro de carreras en directo en caso de que el Gerente de Seguridad no esté disponible.

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Tanto el Gerente de Riesgo y el Supervisor de Gerencia de Riesgo pueden localizarse en las siguientes extensiones, Ext. 4233 o Ext. 3225 respectivamente o por medio de la radio mediante el canal de Seguridad como Riesgo 1 y Riesgo 2. V. Instalaciones de Primeros Auxilios en el sitio y Personal

- a. Médico- Los servicios para el centro médico en el sitio se contratan por medio de "Scripps Coastal Medical Center". Durante los periodos de carreras en directo se proporcionará un médico licenciado y ayudante médico en servicio.
- b. Las Ambulancias Avanzadas de Apoyo Vital (ALS)- Un Paramédico y Técnicos Médicos de Emergencia certificados del Programa Bridge están en el sitio en todo momento ya sea si están entrenando o se está llevando a cabo una carrera hípica. Durante las horas de entrenamiento habrá una ambulancia ALS y un equipo que incluirá un (1) Paramédico y un (1) Técnico Médico de Emergencia Certificado del Programa Bridge en el sitio. El Equipo 1 seguirá el campo durante la carrera en directo, el Equipo 2 cubrirá las caballerizas durante las actividades antes de las carreras y atenderá como un refuerzo del Equipo 1. Ambos equipos mantendrán el contacto por radio con los oficiales y despacho de seguridad en todo momento.
- c. Las Capacidades de Respuesta Municipal-DMTC está situado en un recinto ferial del Estado de California. Como tal, disfrutamos de los beneficios del servicio de bomberos municipal Del Mar, Paramédicos y Técnicos de Emergencia Médica que se localizan en el terreno. Si la estación en el sitio ha respondido a una emergencia fuera del sitio, el despacho North Com mandará a la unidad de respuesta más cercana disponible. Los Paramédicos en la pista cuentan con la capacidad de llamar directamente a North Com en caso de que se necesite un refuerzo.

VI. Protocolos de Transporte Médico y Ambulancia

a. El servicio de ambulancia contratada-DMTC contrata a Ambulancias Rural Metro/de San Diego que proporciona ALS para responder ante las emergencias médicas que puedan surgir en la pista y proporcionará servicios de transporte. Dependiendo del tiempo y la naturaleza de un incidente así como el número de jinetes implicados, transporte al que podrá referirse o conjuntamente con los servicios municipales locales.

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> b. Los servicios municipales locales- El departamento de bomberos Del Mar u otros dentro del área de servicio de incendios de Rancho podrá responder según se necesite o solicite. El Servicio de Bomberos de Rancho responderá con Paramédicos y EMTs en los camiones de bomberos así como los Paramédicos asignados a las ambulancias municipales.

VII. Plan Médico de Emergencia

Estos pasos se seguirán en caso de que ocurra un accidente en las pistas:

Condiciones Generales

- Los Paramédicos y EMT en el sitio responderán a cualquier accidente que observen de un jinete en la pista o de otro modo pedirán ayuda. Tal respuesta ocurrirá durante el entrenamiento o periodos de carreras en directo,
- Si un incidente requiere transporte, se contactará y avisará al hospital del transporte del paciente. (La localización de La Jolla del Hospital Scripps atiende como sala de urgencias y estación base para todos los incidentes que requieran asistencia de emergencia hospitalaria y dirigirán al equipo de transporte médico a qué hospital deberán acudir).

Comunicaciones

- Los Paramédicos y EMTs (Equipo 1 y 2) se les asignarán dos radios por equipo para permitir una comunicación constante con el despacho de seguridad y los oficiales. Tanto el Canal Oficial y el Canal de Despacho se controlarán en todo momento.
- Se le asignará al centro médico una radio y mantendrá contacto con el despacho de seguridad en todo momento.
- El despacho de seguridad de DMTC controlará el canal oficial en todo momento.
- El Gerente del Programa de Seguridad y de Salud controlará el canal de seguridad en todo momento y el canal oficial durante una carrera en directo. Ambas personas estarán disponibles tanto en el sitio como por teléfono celular las 24 horas al día durante el encuentro de las carreras en directo.

Respuesta Durante los Periodos de Entrenamiento

- Durante los periodos de entrenamiento, el Paramédico y EMT determinarán la naturaleza y extensión de cualquier lesión y si el transporte a una instalación médica si fuera necesario,
- Se avisará de inmediato al Despacho de Seguridad de DMTC de cualquier incidente de los jinetes en la pista o de otro modo durante los periodos de entrenamiento y ayudará a "San Diego Medical Enterprises

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Services" a conseguir ayuda médica adicional para facilitar transporte al hospital del área cuando se necesite.

- Las unidades municipales se reunirán en la unidad de "San Diego Medical Enterprises" en la torre del reloj para asegurar al jinete lesionado y el transporte a un hospital designado.
- Los incidentes con lesiones que no requieran transporte a uno de los hospitales locales identificados dentro de este programa, se tratarán en la pista en el centro médico de DMTC según el criterio del Paramédico.
- Cualquier accidente en la pista durante los periodos de entrenamiento se reportará de inmediato al Gerente de Seguridad, para una revisión del análisis y reporte adicional según se requiera.

Respuesta Durante la Pre-carrera (Caballeriza)

- El Equipo 2 de EMT estará situado en el área de caballerizas durante las actividades de pre-carrera para responder a una emergencia que ocurra en el área de las caballerizas.
- Si ocurre una emergencia se avisará al Despacho de Seguridad de inmediato.
- El Gerente del Programa de Salud y Seguridad de DMTC o Ayudante responderá al incidente.
- El despacho de seguridad avisará al centro médico del sitio de que ha ocurrido un accidente.
- Se solicitará ayuda médica adicional de los recursos municipales locales, según se necesite,
- La Seguridad de DMTC responderá al incidente y ayudará con el control de la multitud. Si se necesita seguridad se proporcionará escolta hasta el centro médico.

Accidentes Durante la Carrera en Directo

 La unidad ALS-Equipo 1 que sigue el campo de carreras responderá de inmediato a los accidentes en la pista; simultáneamente, el ayudante médico y médico en la pista se les pondrá en conocimiento del incidente contactándoles por medio de radio, la observación de la carrera se hará por medio de un circuito cerrado de televisión según lo aconsejado por el Personal de Seguridad de DMTC,

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- La unidad ALS-Equipo 2 estará preparada por el centro médico para ayudar o remplazar a la unidad de la pista si fuera necesario por el Equipo 1 abandonar la pista por cualquier razón.
- Si un incidente requiere ambulancia deberá abandonar la pista antes de que empiece la carrera, el Equipo 2 se desplazará a una posición al cajón de salida. Cuando esto ocurre el Equipo 2 avisará a los comisarios por medio de radio de que están en su lugar.
- Si por cualquier razón el Equipo 2 no está disponible se avisará de inmediato a los comisarios CHRB por medio del canal oficial.
- Se pedirá asistencia médica adicional desde los recursos municipales locales, según se necesite,
- Se transportará a los jinetes a una instalación médica en el sitio para una revisión inicial, observación y emergencia. Si el Paramédico considera que se necesita transporte de inmediato al hospital se alertará a Seguridad de que se llevará al jinete directamente al hospital (los Paramédicos tienen contacto por radio con Scripps La Jolla y se les avisará directamente del transporte). La Gerencia de Riesgo avisará a los Oficiales.
- En la medida de lo posible, los profesionales ofrecerán toda la atención médica dentro del centro médico de DMTC,
- El personal de Seguridad de DMTC responderá de inmediato al centro médico para ayudar con la gerencia del evento y control de acceso al centro médico,
- Dependiendo de la naturaleza y gravedad de las lesiones, se podrá trasladar al jinete a uno de los hospitales locales señalado dentro de este plan para atención médica exhaustiva y tratamiento según se necesite,
- Cualquier accidente en la pista durante la carrera en directo se reportará de inmediato al Gerente de Seguridad, para una revisión del análisis y reporte adicional según se requiera.
- Cuando una de las unidades de ALS se requiere que abandone los campos la Seguridad de DMTC avisará de inmediato y se le instruirá llamar a North Com para cualquier atención médica hasta que regrese la unidad al terreno.

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 El Departamento de Gerencia de Riesgo proporcionará la documentación del Sistema de Salud de Información al jinete y Compensación de los Trabajadores al hospital.

Por favor tenga presente: Bajo ninguna circunstancia la información con respecto al estado médico del jinete se proporcionará a los miembros de los medios u otros. Cualquier petición se referirá de inmediato al Director de Medios o Presidente/Gerente General.

An ambulance licensed to operate on public highways provided by the track shall be available at all times during live racing and shall be staffed by two emergency medical technicians licensed in accordance with Division 2.5 (commencing with Section 1797) of the Health and Safety Code, one of whom may be an Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, as defined in section 1797.84 of the Health and Safety Code. (b) Each racing association and racing fair shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical plan detailing the procedures that shall be used in the event of an on-track injury. The plan shall be posted in each jockey room in English and Spanish. (c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.

The California Horse Racing Board approved the proposed alternative methods proposed by DMTC on April 25, 2014 conditioned upon DMTC signing the following Hold Harmless Agreement:

DMTC hereby waives all claims and recourse against the State including the right to contribution for loss or damage to persons or property arising from, growing out of, or in any way connected with or incident to this Agreement and regardless of whether such claim resulted from incidents on the premises.

DMTC shall indemnify and save harmless the State of California, California Horse Racing Board, and all officers and employees thereof from all claims, suits or actions of every name, kind and description, brought forth from, or on account of injuries to or death of any person including but not limited to workmen and the public, or damage to property resulting from the performance of this agreement based upon or arising out of alternative methods of compliance approved by the Board, except as otherwise provided by statute. Any interpretation of this agreement shall be pursuant to Section 2778 of the Civil Code. DMTC waives any and all rights to any type of express or implied indemnity against the State, its officers or employees.

It is the intent of the parties that DMTC will indemnify and hold harmless the State, its officers and employees from any and all claims, suits or actions as set forth above regardless of the existence or degree of fault or negligence whether active or passive, primary or secondary on the part of the State, DMTC the subcontractor or employee of any of these. In the event the State is named as co-defendant, DMTC shall notify State of such fact and shall represent State in such legal action unless State undertakes to represent itself as co-defendant in such legal action, in which event DMTC shall bear State's litigation costs, expenses, and attorney's fees.

Dear Rick,

As you are aware the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) has been working on the enlargement of its turf course. This project is advancing and will be ready for racing for our 2014 summer meet.

As you also know, DMTC installed a new inner turf rail (Mawsafe) which we used for racing in 2013. While the rail provided optimum safety features, its unique design required a waiver from the CHRB as it didn't comply with all existing demands of CHRB Rule 1472—Rail Construction and Track Specifications.

Again, the key features of the Mawsafe Rail System:

- The ability of the rail posts to kick out and release from a fallen horse or rider
- The rail, which is positioned several inches higher than our existing rails, when brushed by a horse adds support to aid in keeping such horse on course—jumping, or horses attempting to jump, has been virtually eliminated.
- Rail pieces are 40 feet long reducing the number of connections.
- Quick and easier rail moves will allow for more turf recovery time which will allow horses to run on more consistent ground.

The Jockeys' Guild gave its full support for the new inner rail as did the CHRB. Because of its unique safety features, DMTC would like to install the Mawsafe rail for use as its permanent outside turf rail. Again, DMTC is requesting a waiver from the CHRB addressing certain requirements of current CHRB Rule 1472 as they pertain to the specifications of an outside rail:

Rule 1472 - (b) All rail posts, except portable, auxiliary, or chute rail posts, must be set in concrete at least 6 inches below the racetrack surface and shall be at least 24 inches deep. Permanent rails shall be designed not to collapse or break away when a horse that is running parallel to the rail bumps, lugs or falls into the rail or posts during normal training or racing. Notwithstanding the above, no permanent or portable turf post or rail shall be constructed of fiberglass, poly vinyl chloride (P.V.C.), or wood, and hedges shall not be used as a post or rail.

The Mawsafe outside turf rail will be installed as it is for the CHRB approved inside turf rail. DMTC believes the unique breakaway rail post system is safer than the requirement that the posts be set in concrete. We covered the P.V.C. materials explanation in our 2013 waiver request – CHRB accepted.

Rule 1472- (c) The height of all outside and inside rails shall be between 38 and 42 inches from the top of the racing surface to the top of the rail.

The height issue was covered in our 2013 waiver request - CHRB accepted.

Rule 1472 - (g) No objects shall be placed within 10 feet from the face of the inside rail.

There are some areas where the face of the inside main track rail are less than 10 feet from the posts of the outside turf rail, which has always been the case. As covered in the response to Rule 1472 (b), should a horse make contact with the posts of the Mawsafe outside turf rail, DMTC believes the special release safety design will mitigate the severity of the contact more so than the current regulation of an immovable post set in concrete.

The Mawsafe rail is manufactured by Global Barrier Systems. If you haven't already, we encourage you to visit its website – www.globalbarriersystems.com to learn more about its product and see the extensive list of tracks in Australia that have installed the rail system. You will also find video of race accidents and how the rail performed.



Sonoma County Fair Emergency Care and Medical Facilities

Sonoma County Fair, as well as all Racing Fairs, provides emergency care which provides for comprehensive medical care for jockeys, track staff and allied personnel. Emergency care focuses on immediate stabilizing, comfort and evacuation of injured racetrack personnel to appropriate hospital care facilities.

On-Track Staffing

One Advanced Life Support (ALS) Paramedic and one Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), from American Medical Response, are located in an on-track ambulance that follows at a safe distance from the horses racing during each race. This ambulance and crew are present whenever horses are on the track (during both racing and training hours) and are responsible for initiating basic life support measures, including immediate medical stabilization, care, and evacuation to medical care facilities.

Jockey Quarters Staffing

Licensed Physician on duty is responsible for care on an ongoing basis of jockeys, track staff, and personnel requiring non-emergency medical care.

Grandstands First Aid Staffing

As a back-up to any medical emergencies that happen on the track or backstretch or to any fans; the Fair also has a fully equipped First Aid Station located on the lower level of the Racing Grandstands. This location is staffed daily from 10:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. The contractor must provide at a minimum one person certified in ALS (Advanced Life Support) and one EMT; and there is an ambulance also located near this First Aid Station that is equipped with the same equipment as listed on the Ambulance inventory included in this application for the track ambulance.

Location of nearest Emergency Room Facility (Hospital) and Fire Department

Both the Emergency Room and Fire Department is located less than 3 miles away from the Fairgrounds.

Physical Resources

Redundant communications services are provided to ensure constant contact between all emergency care personnel. Two-way radio networks are established within the racing operations as well as fair emergency operations. All key emergency care personnel also carry cell phones and each is provided a laminated card containing all contact numbers.

14.F. Emergency medical plan procedures that will be posted in each jockey's room to be used in the event of an on-track injury to a jockey:

(English) Sonoma County Fair Racing Accident Procedures

In case of an accident on the racetrack, the following procedures are to be implemented:

Track Ambulance

The track ambulance will travel immediately to the scene of an accident and assume triage and patient care responsibilities and evacuate.

Security

- 1. As soon as possible, a member of the track security staff shall report to the scene of the accident and thereafter take direction from the EMT responsible for the accident scene management. The track security representative shall be responsible for keeping bystanders away from the accident scene.
- A member of the track security staff shall proceed to the Ambulance Gate to secure the area to allow swift and secure exit by the ambulance and prevent visitation from bystanders to the accident area.
- 3. A member of the track security staff shall be responsible for escorting emergency vehicles.
- 4. The security staff shall be responsible for all "crowd control" activities.

Racing Staff / Track Veterinarian

- 1. Upon arrival at the scene, the Outrider should hold the injured horse in order to prevent further harm to people, horses and property.
- 2. Horses with severe injuries should be transported off the track via the horse ambulance whenever it is practical to do so.
- 3. The Track Veterinarian shall make the decision as to the necessity of euthanasia on the track.
- 4. The screen blocking the public's view of the injured horse shall be set-up prior to the euthanasia procedure.
- 5. Outriders are responsible for the removal of any debris from the racetrack following the removal of the injured person and/or horse from the track

Fair Association Staff

- 1. The Horse Ambulance shall travel immediately to the scene of an accident whenever it appears that a horse will require transport.
- 2. Members of the Fair Association staff who are near the accident site shall assist in screening the accident scene from the public view and shall take direction from the EMT that is responsible for the management of the accident scene.

Announcer

The announcer shall make riders aware of the details of the situation (such as the location of a loose horse, the necessity to pull up, etc.) enabling them to take the necessary steps to mitigate additional problems.

Senior Management

- 1. A senior management representative should quickly proceed to the location on the racetrack where the accident has occurred. The manager should report to other members of the management team as to the accident status.
- 2. An additional member of the management team should report to the video department in order to monitor the scene and access the extent of video coverage to be transmitted to the public.
- 3. A member of the management team should provide input as to announcements to be made by the track announcer.
- 4. A member of the senior management team should be responsible for seeing that information regarding the accident is communicated to family member of the injured. Efforts need to be made to escort family members to the hospital, if necessary. In this regard, a current compilation as to who should be notified in the case of an injured jockey is kept on file.
- 5. All public address announcements and responses to press inquiries are within the sole purview of the senior member of the management team then available.

All Department Heads

All Department Heads shall communicate to their employees that, although intentions are good, the treatment of the injured rider must be left up to trained personnel, and all other employees must stay away from the scene of an accident.

14.F. Emergency medical plan procedures that will be posted in each jockey's room to be used in the event of an on-track injury to a jockey (Spanish):

Procedimiento en caso de Accidente en Sonoma County Fair

De ocurir un accidente en el hipodromo, se debe hacer lo siguiente:

El personal de la Ambulancia

El personal de la ambulancia trasladarse inmediatamente al lugar del accidente siempre que sea necessario para tratar a la(s) victima(s).

Seguridad

- Tan pronto como sea possible, un miembro de seguridad del hipodromo debera reportarse al lugar del accidente y desde ahi recibir las instrucciones del Paramedico responsable del lugar del accidente. El miembro de seguridad sera responsable de mantener a los transeuntes fuera del lugar del accidente.
- 2. Un miembro del departamento de seguridad del hipodromo se acercara a la puerta designada para ambulancia easguarar el area para que la ambulancia salga a la escenda del accidente y prevenir que transeuntes y personas ajenas se acerquen.
- 3. Un miembro de seguridad del hipodromo sera responsable de escoltar a los vehículos de emergencia.
- 4. Los miembros de seguridad seran responsable de controlar a la multitud.

Personal de Carreras / Veterinario del Hipodromo

- Una vez en el lugar del accidente, el Outrider/escolta debera sujetar al caballo herido para evitar que lastime a la gente, a otros caballos o a la propiedad.
- 2. Los caballos muy mal heridos deberan ser sacados de la pista con la ambulancia para caballos, siempre que sea possible hacerlo de esa manera.
- 3. El Veterinario del Hipodromo debera decider si se sacrifica al caballo en la pista.
- 4. Sea possible hacerlo, se debe colocar la pantalla/screen para tapa la vista al publico, antes de iniciar el procedimiento de sacrificio del animal.
- 5. Los Outriders son responsables de remover cualquier desecho en la pista despues de que la persona o caballo accidentado haya sido trasladado del lugar.

Personal de la Feria / Fair Association Staff

1. La Ambulancia de Caballos debera trasladarse inmediatamente al lugar del accidente siempre que un caballo este severamente lesionado y necesite transporte.

 Los miembros del departamento de la feria que esten cerca del accidente deberan ayudar a tapar el lugar para que el publico no pueda ver lo que sucede, ademas deberan recibir instrucciones del Paramedico responsable del lugar del accidente.

Locutor

El Locutor debera informar a los jinetes acerca de los detalles de la situación (como la unbicación del caballo suelto, la necesidad de adelantar, etc.) para que puedan hacer lo necesario y mitigar otros problemas.

Gerencia

- 1. Un representante de la gerencia se apersonara rapidamente al lugar del accidente en el hipodromo. El gerente informara a los otros gerente sobre las lesiones sufridas.
- 2. Otro representante de la gerencia debera informar al departamento de video para monitorear la escena y ver la cobertura de video que sera transmitida al publico.
- 3. Un miembro de la gerencia debera aportar con informacion sobre los anuncios que debera hacer el locutor.
- 4. Un miembro de la gerencia sera responsable de ver que la informacion con respecto al accidente sea dada a los familiars de los heridos. Se debe hacer lo necesario para acompanar a los familiars a los hospitals, de ser el caso. Al respecto, es necesario tener un registro de la persona a quien se debe comunicar en caso de que un jockey sufra un accidente.
- 5. Todos los anuncios publicos y respuestas a la prensa las realiza unicamente el funcionario de gerencia de alto nivel que se encurentre disponible en ese momento.

Todos los Jefes de Departamento

Todos los Jefes de Departamento deben comunicar a sus empleados que, a pesar de que las intenciones sean buenas, el tratamiento de un jinete/jockey herido debe ser realizado por el personal calificado para ello, y todos los demas empleados deben permanecer lejos del lugar del accidente.

STAFF ANALYSIS DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING AN INDUSTRY UPDATE REGARDING HORSE INVENTORY AND THE STATUS OF THE STABLING AND VANNING FUND, AND SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA'S AUXILIARY OFF-TRACK STABLING

Regular Board Meeting May 22, 2014

ISSUE

At the September 2013 Regular Board Meeting, representatives of the Thoroughbred Owners of California, Santa Anita, Del Mar, and Los Alamitos outlined an agreement among themselves, coupled with a vote of the Stabling and Vanning Committee, whereby horses displaced by the closure of Hollywood Park on February 1, 2014, would be stabled initially at Santa Anita, Los Alamitos, Fairplex, and San Luis Rey Downs, and later at Del Mar. Additional details of this agreement were provided at the October 2014 Board meeting.

ANALYSIS

The loss of stalls at Hollywood Park and the anticipated closure of the stable area at Fairplex have and will continue placing a greater burden on other Southern California racetracks and authorized stabling facilities. Stalls are at a premium. Racing offices need assurance that horses occupying those stalls can be reasonably expected to participate in the current race meet. Furthermore, the stabling agreement provides the Stabling and Vanning Committee with authority to reduce or cease entirely payments to facilities if their stabling occupancy falls below 50 percent. For these reasons, it is increasingly important to have accurate inventories of horses at each facility. In January, the industry began the process on inventorying horses at each facility and updating those lists at the end of each month.

The industry reported at the September 2013 Board meeting that the Stabling and Vanning Fund had a current deficit of \$1.3 million, which was expected to grow by an additional \$1 million in 2014. The vanning aspect of auxiliary stabling is an expensive part of the program. Statements were made at Board and committee meetings that vanning was not being provided in the most efficient manner (e.g. multiple vans were traveling less than half-full).

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.
