PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE ADOPTION OF THE **PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1843.2, CLASSIFICATION OF DRUG SUBSTANCES**, TO RECLASSIFY SPECIFIED DRUG SUBSTANCES.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment to Rule 1843.2, Classification of Drug Substances, would reclassify several drugs that were currently listed on the document "CHRB Penalty Categories Listed by Classification." The document was incorporated by reference in Rule 1843.2, so its modification necessitated amendment of the regulation. Ms. Wagner stated the proposed amendment also added the Administrative Law Judge and the Hearing Officer to the text of the regulation. No comments were received during the 45-day public comment period, and staff recommended the Board adopt the regulation as presented. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, said the proposed amendment reclassified drugs that were already listed, and added others. He stated amending the regulation would be an ongoing process as new drugs were added, or others reclassified. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if there would be a threshold established for Equipoise and Winstrol. Dr. Arthur said he would be submitting a proposal to amend Rule 1844, Authorized Medication, which would

Consortium would soon conduct research regarding withdrawal times for the drugs. Withdrawal times would be established for urine and blood. The estimated withdrawal time for Stanozolol was 15 to 45 days and for Boldenone, 30 to 60 days. Dr. Arthur commented that would essentially eliminate their use in horses while they were performing. He stated he hoped the Board would have anabolic steroid regulations in place in advance of the 2008 Breeders' Cup. Commissioner Moretti motioned to adopt the amendment to Rule 1843.2. Commissioner Moss seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE FEASIBILITY OF ALLOWING A HORSE THAT HAS NOT STARTED FOR A MINIMUM OF 180 DAYS SINCE ITS LAST RACE, AND IS ENTERED IN A CLAIMING RACE AT A PRICE EQUAL TO OR GREATER THAN THE PRICE AT WHICH IT LAST STARTED, TO BE ENTERED IN A CLAIMING RACE AND DECLARED INELIGIBLE TO BE CLAIMED.

Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said his organization was asking for a new regulation to permit horses that had not run for 180 days or more to be entered into a claiming race with the option of not being claimed. Such horses would have to be entered in a claiming race at a price equal to or greater than the price at which they last started. TOC believed this would provide greater incentive for owners to give horses time off. Mr. Couto stated horses that were given time off, and came back, were typically claimed coming out of the first claiming race in which they were entered. TOC's proposal would give owners who did the right thing a way to protect their investment. In addition, it was a way to protect the health and well being of horses by encouraging owners to rest their horses. Mr. Couto stated the proposal was the result of at least two TOC Racing Affairs Committee meetings, as well as

the racing departments of several racing associations. It was the combined judgment of these industry groups that the proposal was the best way to effect the protection and health of the horse. TOC proposed the addition of Rule 1634, Claiming Option Entry. Chairman Shapiro said the idea was admirable, and owners should be encouraged to lay up their horses but was a regulation needed? It seemed the horsemen and racing associations could enact the idea without Board intervention. Vice-Chairman Harris stated associations were currently writing optional claiming races, which were a similar idea. The Board should simply endorse the concept and the industry could act without a rule. Commissioner Amerman asked if TOC could state what percentage of horses coming back after a lay up were claimed from their first race. Mr. Couto stated TCO had not quantified the number of horses, but it knew it often happened. Commissioner Amerman said he did not know what that meant; was it 2 percent or 20 percent of first starts? He stated the industry should provide facts before it initiated a new regulation. There were already optional claiming races and allowance races where horses that were coming back could run. Chairman Shapiro said if a \$25,000 claimer was laid up for six months and there was no optional claiming race for it to run in when it came back, the TOC proposal would allow it to run at the level at which it last ran. Owners did not want to lose horses after the expense of rehabilitation. Vice-Chairman Harris said optional claiming races fulfilled that purpose. A horse that was laid up could be entered with the option of not being claimed. Mr. Couto said the current system discouraged owners from laying up their horses. Owners kept their horses running, or dropped their claiming price so they would be claimed. The TOC proposal would encourage owners to give horses time off, and would give owners the ability to see where the horse fit when it came back. The current optional claiming races

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were different quality races than typical claiming races, and would present a difficult level of competition. Vice-Chairman Harris stated he did not mean horses returning from a lay up should enter existing optional claiming races. Racing secretaries could write races that would fit the Board's rules and the goals outlined by TOC. Mr. Couto said the industry tried to find a solution, and after considering a number of ideas, it decided a new regulation was the answer. The issue was that owners did not give their horses time off because they did not see any value in it if they would lose the horse in its first race back. The ability to enter a claiming race after a lay off without being eligible to claim would serve an important purpose. Chairman Shapiro said the Board should try to find a way to give the horsemen and racing associations the latitude to craft the best way to achieve their goals. Commissioner Choper asked if there were any arguments in opposition to TOC's request. Mr. Couto said TOC was not aware of any objections. Commissioner Choper asked what would stop racing secretaries from writing the optional claiming as a condition of the race if the associations and the horsemen agreed? There would be no problem if the playing field were even for everyone, unless there was a rule that precluded racing secretaries from writing such conditions. Mr. Couto said the problem existed in the law. Business and Professions Code Section 19408.2 stated all horses in a claiming race were eligible to be claimed as defined by Board rules. If there were no rules that permitted horses entered in a claiming race to be declared ineligible for claiming, the statute would not be permissive. That meant the Board needed a regulation that enabled such conditions, and was consistent with the statute. Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight said the statute, not the Board's rules, defined claiming races. statute said a claiming race was a race in which any horse entered therein may be claimed in

conformity with the rules established by the Board. It did not say any horse might be claimed except those that the owner chose to declare ineligible. The industry could give such races another name, but as soon as they call them claiming races, they would run afoul of the law. Commissioner Amerman asked what other racing jurisdictions were doing with regards to the issue. Mr. Couto stated no other jurisdiction was giving horses time off. Chairman Shapiro asked if the races could be called "alternative claiming races." DAG Knight said that was a possibility. Commissioner Choper motioned to direct staff to write a regulation for alternative claiming races in which a horse coming off a lay up could be entered but not claimed. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the issue of horses returning from a lay off and the TOC proposal. Vice-Chairman Harris seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCED DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF CHURCHILL DOWNS TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVES COMPANY DBA TWINSPIRES.COM., FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FROM OCTOBER 19, 2007 TO DECEMBER 31, 2007.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives doing business as Twinspires.com (Twinspires) proposed to act as an advance deposit wagering (ADW) out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub beginning October 19, 2007 through December 31, 2007. Twinspires would operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week, except on December 25, 2007. Ms. Wagner stated Twinspires had a pending agreement with Bay Meadows and Golden Gate Fields that would become operative if it could obtain the ADW approval. The application was missing a horsemen's agreement and the association contract. Brad Blackwell of

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Twinspires said his organization reached an agreement with Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), which completed the horsemen's agreement. Drew Couto of TOC stated the parties did come to an agreement. Commissioner Amerman motioned to approve the application of Twinspires to act as an ADW out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub. Commissioner Moretti seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION REGARDING THE STATUS OF ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) AND THE FEASIBILITY OF OPENING UP ADW WAGERING TO ALLOW ADW WAGERING PROVIDERS TO HAVE ACCESS TO ALL CALIFORNIA SIGNALS AND ANY OTHER MATTERS RELATED TO ADW AND EXCLUSIVITY.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was a discussion on how advance deposit wagering (ADW) could benefit the industry to bring more revenue to the tracks and purses while providing a fair and reasonable profit to ADW providers. The recent enactment of Assembly Bill 765 would change how the industry approached ADW, so the Board needed to look at the issue in the context of the law to gain understanding. Chairman Shapiro stated if there was a need for new regulations the Board might wish to look at short-term ADW license/approvals renewals until such regulations were in place. The Board could then renew the ADW licenses/approvals based on the new regulations. Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight said he agreed. He commented exclusivity was an issue that needed to be looked at with regulations in mind, but the industry had not focused on exactly where that had to occur. David Nathanson of TVG said until the numbers were in, and what non-exclusivity meant for ADW and the industry was tested, it was not the time for anyone to assert that a specific direction was best. TVG was happy to participate in any process to compare what past ADW performance meant in

conjunction with the new model. Mr. Nathanson encouraged the Board to look at the facts and to explore what was in the best interest of the industry and the State of California. Chairman Shapiro asked what facts TVG was suggesting the Board review? Mr. Nathanson stated ADW had operated under a very different model from the one it might experience under the Hollywood Park Racing Association (HPRA) proposal. The industry would be able to see if there was any real growth in wagering, or if television had an effect. Chairman Shapiro asked if the parties adhered to the global agreement, was TVG suggesting the Board should observe for a period of time, then determine if new regulations were needed? Mr. Nathanson said he agreed with the suggestion that a sub-committee should be formed to objectively explore the value of wagering exclusivity versus non-exclusivity, and the effect they had on handle and purses. Barry Broad representing Service Employees International Union (SEIU) stated the initial ADW legislation held an implicit promise of jobs for SEIU employees, but that did not happen. However, the new ADW legislation had prescriptive language that limited the Board's authority to approve an ADW application if the entity did not enter into a contractual agreement with a bona fide labor organization. Mr. Broad recited the conditions for the labor agreement. He stated the labor language was self-executing, effective January 1, 2008, and did not require the Board to write regulations for its application. Mr. Broad added the SEIU would vigorously enforce the labor provisions. He spoke about the negotiations for the new ADW legislation, and stated the SEIU would shut down any entity that tried to move forward without a card check agreement. Chairman Shapiro asked if Mr. Broad believed that under the new ADW legislation there was an implied deal that the Board could not insist on any nonexclusive wagering for ADW. Mr. Broad said that was his sense of the legislation. The Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) wished to be in on the front end of ADW negotiations, and TVG wished to have the right to maintain exclusivity in its agreements. The agreement was that TVG could have exclusivity if the other parties agreed, and TOC got an enhanced voice in the initial ADW discussions. The legislation had language that referenced terms of exclusivity, which meant the Legislature contemplated that the parties could negotiate exclusivity. As a result, the Board could not prohibit exclusivity as a condition of licensing. Commissioner Choper asked if SEIU had a position regarding exclusivity. Mr. Broad said SEIU did not have an opinion regarding the issue. Vice-Chairman Harris said the law was what it was, and the Board was not restricted by any back room deals. Mr. Broad stated he was trying to explain the meaning of the language that passed the Legislature, which had some impact and limiting affect on the Board's power. Vice- Chairman Harris asked if the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) had oversight over ADW. He stated it seemed that since the ADW providers operated nationally, they should fall under the NLRB. Additionally, the Board did not have the expertise in labor law. Mr. Broad said the SEIU's position was that because the ADW providers were accepting pari-mutuel wagering they were within the area where the NLRB did not take jurisdiction. Commissioner Choper stated the ADW legislation appeared to provide control over labor elections outside California. Mr. Broad said the control existed because the legislation governed the licensing of ADW providers in California. If the ADW provider did not want to agree, it did not get licensed in this state. Additionally, if the ADW provider already had a collective bargaining agreement the provisions of the ADW legislation did not cover them. The SEIU believed that if the original ADW law could allow the State of California to require that a hub be moved to this state, the new legislation could

require a collective bargaining agreement. Commissioner Choper said he thought Mr. Broad was right, but the premise itself was subject to dispute. Mr. Broad stated the reason the NLRB never took jurisdiction was that horse racing was so comprehensively regulated by the states, and was treated like a special state concern. Commissioner Choper said the ADW legislation was complicated. It would be beneficial if the SEIU could present its points with respect to what the bill provided labor, and if the other parties who might have a different opinion could also present arguments. Chairman Shapiro stated his reading of the ADW legislation did not indicate the Board was precluded from adopting rules requiring racetracks to offer ADW on a non-exclusive basis. Mr. Broad said the legislation did not prohibit such an action by the Board. Chairman Shapiro commented the Board should understand Mr. Broad was expressing his opinion about the negotiations, but there were others who disagreed with that view. Scott Daruty with TrackNet Media stated he was very involved in the negotiations, and there was not a backroom agreement regarding exclusivity. Chairman Shapiro asked if Mr. Daruty was stating there was no agreement that would prevent the Board from moving forward with nonexclusive wagering. Mr. Daruty stated that over the months of negotiations there were a variety of positions about exclusivity. A compromise was reached wherein exclusivity was neither mandated nor prohibited. Mr. Daruty said he did not know how the parties could take the Board's authority regarding exclusivity without an express statement in the statute. Cathy Christian, representing TVG, said no party was suggesting the Board was bound by a back room deal. Within the legislative process compromises were made to satisfy the interests of the parties so the bill could move forward. The resulting ADW legislation represented what the parties agreed was acceptable, otherwise, there would have been opposition, and it never would have passed. Ms. Christian read aloud Section 19604, Subdivision (B)(1)(c) of the She stated the purpose of the statute was to include terms related to ADW legislation. exclusivity to be negotiated and subsequently approved by the horsemen. Ms. Christian said the statutory provision did exactly what SEIU expressed, it allowed the horsemen to participate in a direct way, and it left exclusivity open for negotiation. To achieve an agreement that was acceptable to all parties the Legislature agreed that exclusivity would be a negotiated term. Chairman Shapiro asked where the ADW legislation stated the Board could not determine if exclusivity was in the best interests of horse racing. Commissioner Choper stated the law bound the Board, and if there was a legislative history it could be examined by the Board. Vice-Chairman Harris commented the law clearly stated the horsemen's organization had the right to agree or disagree regarding exclusivity. The Board would not wish to overrule an agreement between the horsemen and the ADW providers. Ms. Christian stated the statute contemplated negotiations between horse racing associations and ADW providers. believed the statute provided for negotiations between the parties on the issue of exclusivity. The Board had no basis for denying a ADW license because the provider might enter into a contract that the Board preferred it did not. The Board could not substitute its judgment for the Legislature's with respect to such negotiations. Commissioner Choper said the parties should provide the Board with their written positions regarding the issue. Drew Couto of TOC stated his organization believed the parties could negotiate exclusivity. It appeared some were interpreting the agreement to mean the parties would negotiate exclusivity independent of the Board exercising its authority. The new ADW legislation contained language from the original statute regarding the Board's role. The language from the old statute was included in the new

statute to reflect the Board's role of oversight. Commissioner Choper asked if TOC thought that included the Board's ability to require non-exclusivity. Mr. Couto stated he could not answer the question. TOC agreed with the parties who maintained the terms of exclusivity would be negotiated, but it would draw a line at the assertion that the Board was precluded under Federal and State law from exercising its authority. Commissioner Choper reiterated his request that interested parties submit comments regarding the ADW legislation. Jack Liebau of Hollywood Park stated if the HPRA – ADW model was agreed to by TOC the discussion regarding exclusivity was unnecessary. Chairman Shapiro stated Mr. Liebau was correct. He said he hoped the parties would reach an agreement, so the industry could avoid further conflict. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding ADW wagering. Commissioner Moretti said it would be valuable if DAG Knight could provide the Board with an overview of what the new ADW law required of the Board.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE HOLLYWOOD PARK RACING ASSOCIATION, LLC (T) AT HOLLYWOOD PARK, COMMENCING NOVEMBER 7, 2007, THROUGH DECEMBER 22, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the application of Hollywood Park Racing Association, LLC (HPRA) was initially heard at the September 2007 Regular Board Meeting, but was deferred due to difficulties regarding advance deposit wagering (ADW) providers. Jack Liebau of HPRA stated an ADW agreement was completed, and was submitted to Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) for review and approval. Mr. Liebau commented the ADW agreement provided global coverage for California thoroughbred horse racing through the end of the HPRA 2008 summer meeting. The agreement could provide a model

for use throughout California. It provided for exclusivity with respect to broadcast rights for TVG at HPRA and Bay Meadows, and for HRTV at Santa Anita and Golden Gate Fields. The various ADW providers would have the opportunity, on a non-exclusive basis, to take wagers from HPRA, Bay Meadows, Santa Anita and Golden Gate Fields, whose meetings would run through to the closure of the HPRA 2008 summer meeting. Chairman Shapiro said he understood Mr. Liebau and the industry worked very hard to reach the agreement. He proposed approving the application subject to an approval of the ADW portion. Mr. Liebau said he would like to make it clear that the only approval being sought was the HPRA 2007 fall meeting, not the full ADW agreement, as there were other issues that flowed from the new ADW legislation. Chairman Shapiro stated the Board was only dealing with the HPRA application. While the Board liked the global solution, ADW would have to be considered with each application to conduct a horse racing meeting. Deputy Attorney General Derry Knight said the Board also needed to make it clear there could be provisions of the global agreement that might not be acceptable for the purposes of ADW licensure. Drew Couto of TOC stated his organization did not have any problems with approving the HPRA license subject to an approval of the ADW portion. Commissioner Moss said the schedule for the end of the HPRA meeting seemed a little odd. He stated he knew the Strategic Planning Committee tried to provide for one week off between the meetings, but the number of off-days between December 16, and December 21 and 22, and then until the beginning of Santa Anita raised questions. Eual Wyatt of HPRA stated ending on December 16, then returning for two days on December 21 and 22 was to accommodate the \$750,000 Cash Call futurity. The dates were worked out with TOC and California Thoroughbred Trainers earlier in 2007. Chairman

Shapiro added the HPRA dates were adjusted at a Regular Board Meeting at Bay Meadows. The dates provided HPRA with a special week of racing. Vice-Chairman Harris motioned to approve the application to conduct a horse racing meeting of HPRA, subject to TOC approval of the ADW agreement. Commissioner Andreini seconded the motion. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the HPRA application. The motion was unanimously carried. Commissioner Choper motioned to delegate to the Chairman and Vice-Chairman the authority to review the ADW agreement and approve it if appropriate, or to bring the issue to the full Board for approval. Commissioner Moretti seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Rod Blonien, an industry lobbyist, stated the Governor signed Assembly Bill 241, which authorized 45 mini-satellite wagering facilities. The legislation required the Board to approve emergency regulations regarding mini-satellite facilities not later than April 1, 2008. He encouraged the Board to form an ad-hoc committee to work to draft regulations. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California stated the Jockey's Guild requested that the issue of the status of the Jockey Guild's Health and Welfare Program be placed on the November 2007 Regular Meeting agenda. Chairman Shapiro stated the item would be placed on the November 2007 Regular Meeting agenda. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his horse racing related concerns.

PROCEEDINGS of the Regular Meeting of the California Horse Racing Board held at the Arcadia City Hall, 240 West Huntington Drive, Arcadia, California, on September 27, 2007.

MINUTES

Chairman Shapiro asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of August 21, 2007. Commissioner Amerman motioned to approve the minutes. Commissioner Moss seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE PACIFIC RACING ASSOCIATION (T) AT GOLDEN GATE FIELDS, COMMENCING NOVEMBER 7, 2007, THROUGH DECEMBER 22, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Pacific Racing Association (PRA) proposed to run 32 days, for a total of 275 races. Ms. Wagner stated the 2007 PRA meeting ran from April 25 through June 11 for a total of 31 days. She said PRA was asking to revise its application to allow coordination between north and south signals. PRA wished to give up December 17, 2007, as a race day and add December 21 and 22, 2007. The first post time would be 12:45 p.m., daily, and 11:15 a.m. on Thanksgiving Day. The advance deposit wagering (ADW) providers were XpressBet and if approved, Twinspires. Ms. Wagner stated the application was complete and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented.

Chairman Shapiro asked how the installation of the synthetic racing surface was progressing at Golden Gate Fields (GGF). Robert Hartman of GGF said the synthetic track was installed, and GGF was in the process of grooming the surface. Mr. Hartman stated requests for stall space were greater than GGF's capacity, and it expected the horse population to be significantly increased for the upcoming meeting. Chairman Shapiro said he noted PRA applied for an average of 8.6 races per day. He stated if the new track and the number of horses could support that many races it would be fine, but he was concerned about running ten races a day on the weekend and what that might mean to the horse population. Chairman Shapiro said he would prefer that PRA request permission to run additional races so the average field size and horse population could be evaluated. He asked if PRA had any objections to that requirement. Mr. Hartman said PRA did not object to the requirement. PRA would contact the Executive Director and the Board if it planned to run a ten-race day. Commissioner Choper asked why PRA did not have early wagering. Mr. Hartman said he imagined it was not economically feasible. Although the facility was open at 9:30 a.m., additional staff and a change in janitorial crew times would be required. Choper commented if PRA had wagering machines they could be used by persons who wished Vice-Chairman Harris asked what time wagering commenced via ADW providers. Mr. Hartman stated wagering could begin when the pools opened. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if Youbet would be an ADW provider for PRA. Mr. Hartman said Youbet was not scheduled to provide ADW services; however, there were negotiations underway that could change the situation. Chairman Shapiro stated the Board would like to see every possible ADW provider accept wagering on PRA. Vice-Chairman Harris asked why the purses were down dramatically from the prior meeting. Mr. Hartman said the average daily purses were relatively the same; it was the stakes races that were different. PRA tended to increase its stakes purses during the prime time of the racing year and scale back stakes purses in the winter. Commissioner Amerman said he was impressed with PRA's winter marketing plan. However, the advertising budget was only 5.5 percent ahead of the previous year. Part of that would be media inflation, so the true budget was not very aggressive in reaching out to the public. Mr. Hartman stated PRA conducted an advertising campaign regarding its new surface that resulted in more horsemen from out of state coming to Northern California. PRA was also reaching out to the local community. An invitation to an open house was mailed to all local businesses in the East Bay, and PRA expected 500 to 1,000 people at that event. PRA was also reaching out to racing fans through advertising and promotions. During the spring PRA attracted a lot of new patrons, and it was currently trying to develop those customers with increased direct mailing. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke regarding his concerns about the PRA application. Commissioner Amerman motioned to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting of PRA at GGF. Commissioner Moss seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE HOLLYWOOD PARK RACING ASSOCIATION, LLC (T) AT HOLLYWOOD PARK, COMMENCING NOVEMBER 7, 2007, THROUGH DECEMBER 22, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Hollywood Park Racing Association (HPRA) proposed to race 32 days, four days less than in 2006, for a total of 275 races. The first post time would be 12:30 p.m., daily, and 11:00 a.m. on Thanksgiving Day. Ms. Wagner stated

the advance deposit wagering (ADW) providers had not been determined; there was no horseshoe inspector and the concessionaire license renewal was not completed. She said the application was presented for the Board's consideration. Chairman Shapiro stated there were two critical issues that would determine if the Board would act on the application. The issues were an agreement with the horsemen's organization and an agreement with ADW providers. Eual Wyatt of HPRA said his organization had an agreement in principal with TVG, but it did not have a horsemen's agreement. Chairman Shapiro suggested that the Board might wish to put the item over until the items were in place. Mr. Wyatt said there was only one issue outstanding with the horsemen's agreement, and that issue was the TCO2 language. HPRA believed the Board was in a position to take any actions regarding a high TCO2 test, so the TCO2 language in the contract was no longer appropriate. Mr. Wyatt added if the Board determined such language should be in its agreement as a condition of license, HPRA would Vice-Chairman Harris asked if the horsemen wanted the TCO2 language in the contract. Mr. Wyatt said they did. Chairman Shapiro stated current horsemen's agreements required the use of a protection barn in instances of high TCO2 tests. The trainer could have his horses placed in the barn prior to the hearing. Vice-Chairman Harris said when the protection barns were instituted the Board did not have rules addressing TCO2. The horsemen's agreements provided a method wherein the industry could act on high TCO2 tests when the Board could not. Vice-Chairman Harris added that since the Board had regulations governing TCO2 perhaps the industry no longer needed to intervene. Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight said the Board's regulations did not address protection barns. The horsemen's agreements were the only reason such barns were used. The Board could make protection barns part of its requirements, but it would have to amend its regulations. He added the law did not address the issue. Vice-Chairman Harris said the Board had adequate regulations regarding TCO2 testing, and violations should be treated no differently than any other medication violation. Chairman Shapiro asked if HPRA was trying to shift the burden of potential liability for putting a trainer in a protection barn. Mr. Wyatt said HPRA was simply saying it was not its business to be placing trainers in protection barns. HPRA believed the Board was the entity to take action regarding medication violations. Chairman Shapiro stated the problem was the considerable amount of time before a medication violation was adjudicated. The current scheme regarding protection barns was working. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said the Board's regulations provided for adjudication of disputes between the parties. TOC wanted the continuation of protection barns because many of the trainers with high TCO2 asserted they had no idea why the level was so high, and it was a possibility that their horses were tampered with. So, to protect the horses, the protection barn system was devised and had been in place over two years. The protection barns, in addition to the Board's rules, proved to be effective in dramatically reducing the rate of high TCO2 levels. Mr. Couto said TOC would ask the Board to conduct a hearing to determine the issue. Commissioner Choper asked if the barns were a condition in all of TOC's Mr. Couto stated they were with every racing fair and thoroughbred racing agreements. Commissioner Choper asked why TCO2 was the only drug subject to the association. procedure. Mr. Couto said three years ago there were a high number of elevated TCO2 levels. It was determined bicarbonate milkshakes had to be administered within 24 hours, and it could be done by anyone. The best way to prevent recurring positives was to place horses from the

barns of trainers with high TCO2 levels in protection barns. Mr. Wyatt stated when the procedure was instituted the Board had no regulations regarding testing for TCO2. That had since changed, and that was why HPRA believed it was not obligated to provide for protection barns. Chairman Shapiro said the incidents of high TCO2 were a serious issue. While there was not a specific drug involved the milkshakes administered to horses did appear to have some performance enhancing effect. The racing associations and horsemen devised a mechanism to allow for swift action. The Board enacted TCO2 regulations, but it was still not able to quickly take action. Every association instituted a protection barn, and if a trainer had a high TCO2 level his horses were placed in the barn, which resulted in a decrease in TCO2 violations. Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, reviewed the background regarding the current TCO2 program. He concluded by stating if there were no protection barns the Board would have to impose more onerous penalties. Commissioner Choper asked what distinguished bicarbonates from other substances. Dr. Arthur said the major difference was that it had to be administered in a relatively short period of time, and it could be administered quickly by virtually anyone. He added it was a different type of performance enhancing product than typically dealt with by the Board. Commissioner Choper asked if Dr. Arthur felt there was a distinction that justified protection barns for bicarbonates as opposed to other substances. Dr. Arthur said that was true. The use of protection barns was an effective program. Chairman Shapiro asked if Dr. Arthur thought it was in the best interest of the industry to maintain protection barns at every racetrack in California. Dr. Arthur stated he would like to see the program continue, but if it was not administered rapidly, the Board should take it over. Ed Halpern of California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) said his organization removed the protection barn requirement from its agreement with HPRA. He stated CTT did not believe its involvement in the program was fruitful and the barns raised Mr. Halpern stated CTT believed the subject needed fuller questions of due process. discussion. Jack Liebau said HPRA was sued because of the protection barn. The current procedure provided no due process, as the trainer's horses were moved to the barn without He stated it was difficult to understand why TCO2 violations were treated differently from any other Class III or Class III violation. The only positive aspect of the barns was that they were quick. Vice-Chairman Harris said the manner in which TCO2 violations were handled was a good stopgap system, but it was not needed now that the Board could act. The deterrent was the loss of purse and the progressive discipline in the Board's regulations. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the HPRA application. Drew Couto said the TOC would request a special hearing on the issue under Rule 2043. Chairman Shapiro stated he tended to agree with TOC, as the issue was complex, and he did not want to see the industry back away from the program's success. He said the other issue with the HPRA application was ADW. There were ongoing negotiations between the parties, which were not complete. The Board's policy was to hear applications for license to conduct a horse racing meetings only when they were in order. HPRA's application was not in order, so the item would be deferred.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE ADOPTION OF THE **PROPOSED ADDITION OF CHRB RULE 1843.3, PENALTIES FOR MEDICATION VIOLATIONS** AND THE **PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1843.2, CLASSIFICATION OF DRUG SUBSTANCES**.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said in April 2007 the Board adopted a proposal to add Rule 1843.3, Penalties for Medication Violations, and to amend Rule 1843.2, Classification of Drug Substances. Questions were raised during the 30-day Office of Administrative Law (OAL) review. The file was withdrawn to address the OAL's concerns, and a new 15-day public comment period was initiated. Ms. Wagner stated no comments were received during the 15-day public comment period and staff recommended the Board adopt the regulations as presented. Vice-Chairman Harris motioned to adopt the proposed addition of Rule 1843.3 and the amendment to Rule 1843.2. Commissioner Moss seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROPOSED ADDITION OF: ARTICLE 10.5, MULE RACING, TO PROVIDE AN ARTICLE UNIQUE TO MULE RACING; CHRB RULE 1747, MULE RACING RULES, TO SPECIFY THAT MULE RACES MUST ADHERE TO BOARD RULES IN GENERAL, BUT RULES UNIQUE TO MULES WILL E PLACED UNDER ARTICLE 10.5; AND CHRB RULE 1748, SHOEING MULES, TO PROVIDE THAT MULES MAY RUN UNSHOD.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the addition of Article 10.5, Mule Racing, would add an article to the Board's regulations that would specifically address mule racing rules. The proposed addition of Rule 1747, Mule Racing Rules, would make it clear that mule racing rules would fall under Article 10.5, and the proposed addition of Rule 1748, Shoeing Mules, would allow mules to run unshod. The item was heard by the Board at the July 2007 Regular Meeting. At that time modifications to the language of Rule 1748 were suggested. The

regulation was renoticed for a 15-day public comment period. No comments were received during the 15-day public comment period, and staff recommended the Board adopt Article 10.5, Rule 1747 and Rule 1748 as presented. Vice-Chairman Harris **motioned** to adopt Article 10.5, Rule 1747 and Rule 1748. Chairman Shapiro **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE **PROPOSED ADOPTION OF THE CHRB CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND ETHICS CODE**.

Richard "Bon" Smith, Assistant Executive Director, said a discussion regarding a Board conflict of interest and ethics code had been ongoing since June 2007. He stated a final draft of the code was included in the Board package, and staff recommended the Board adopt it as presented. Commissioner Shapiro asked if the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA) provided input regarding the conflict of interest and ethics code. Mr. Smith said the DCA had commented. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke regarding his concerns about the proposed conflict of interest and ethics code. Vice-Chairman Harris motioned to adopt the CHRB conflict of interest and ethics code. Commissioner Amerman seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE ADOPTION OF THE 2008, 2009 AND 2010 RACE DATES CALENDAR.

Chairman Shapiro said he would include agenda item 15, report on the Strategic Planning Committee (committee), in the item. He stated the committee met on a variety of occasions

and discussed and approved calendars for the night industry and the Southern California racing Chairman Shapiro said the committee recommended the Board approve the calendar. calendars. The night harness industry would run Wednesday through Saturday from December 27, 2007, through July 31, 2008. Night harness racing would recommence on September 10, 2008, and run continuously through December 20, 2008. Chairman Shapiro stated the night quarter horse industry would run from December 27, 2007, through December 21, 2008. He said the committee recommended the Board provide the night industry latitude to alter race days during the specific weeks of their applications. For the Southern California thoroughbred meetings: Santa Anita would run 85 days from December 26, 2007, through April 20, 2008. Hollywood Park would race from April 23, 2008, through July 13, 2008. Del Mar would start July 16, 2008, through September 3, 2008. Fairplex Park Pomona would run September 5, 2008, through September 22, 2008. Oak Tree would start September 24, 2008, through October 26, 2008. The Hollywood Park fall meeting would commence October 29, 2008, through December 21, 2008. Chairman Shapiro motioned to approve the proposed 2008 racing calendars for the night harness, night quarter horse and Southern California thoroughbred race meetings. Vice-Chairman Harris seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried. Chairman Shapiro said the Northern California schedule still needed resolution. The stakeholders submitted a calendar that was acceptable to the committee, but there was one outstanding issue: would Bay Meadows allow the use of its facility through the end of 2008 after the San Mateo County Fair meeting? When the Northern California racing calendar was considered the committee understood Bay Meadows would make its barn area, track and housing facilities available for the remainder of 2008. Jack Liebau of Bay Meadows

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said his organization talked with the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) and arrived at an agreement regarding the availability of the backside at Bay Meadows. Mr. Liebau stated it was in the best interest of horseracing for Bay Meadows to continue operating as long as possible to allow time for development of alternate plans. The future of Bay Meadows hinged on an Appellate Court case that should be determined in 60 to 90 days. Bay Meadows would continue to operate and the barn areas would be available at least through the end of the San Mateo County Fair meeting. The facility should be available thereafter, but if an unsafe condition arose there had to be an alternative plan. Mr. Liebau added the San Mateo County Fair would have the right to operate satellite wagering when Bay Meadows ceased to operate. He stated the satellite facility generated more handle than any other satellite in Northern California, so it was important that a seamless transition occurred. Chairman Shapiro said Bay Meadows would inevitably close, and the Board was only looking at how the industry could have suitable stabling and training alternatives in place. Mr. Liebau said he understood. He did not think the industry was ready, so it was better off having as much time as possible. Chairman Shapiro stated he agreed, but as the development of Bay Meadows moved forward what assurances did the industry have that an effort would be made to keep the barn areas open? Mr. Liebau said Bay Meadows could not give ironclad assurances, but there had to be trust and the industry needed to work together. Commissioner Moss asked if there was any way to suspend work on Bay Meadows until 2009. Mr. Liebau said there were investors who had money in the project, and given its size, any delays would be cost prohibitive. Bay Meadows did not think there were going to be any problems, and it would do its best to stay open through 2008 as a training facility. Commissioner Choper said it appeared Bay Meadows gave the CTT most everything it wanted in its memorandum. He added Mr. Liebau was correct in stating there was no way an agreement would cover everything that might occur. However, if Bay Meadows would make reasonable accommodations in light of the needs of the horsemen, the Board would be given some assurance. Mr. Liebau said he would give his personal assurance he would try to make the situation work. Chairman Shapiro stated the Board did have a guarantee that Bay Meadows would run the dates that were on the proposed 2008 Northern California racing calendar. Mr. Liebau said Bay Meadows would run through the San Mateo County Fair. He added during 2008 Bay Meadows did not plan to touch the infield where there were over 700 stalls. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated Bay Meadows indicated it would give ten days notice if it decided to shut down the backstretch due to safety concerns. He said TOC believed ten days was not quite enough time, and it asked that if an issue did arise, additional time could be given so trainers could find accommodations. Mr. Liebau stated Bay Meadows would work with TOC and CTT to provide ample notice. Chairman Shapiro motioned to adopt the 2008 Northern California racing calendar as reviewed and approved by the committee. Racing would start at Golden Gate Fields December 26, 2007, through February 3, 2008. Bay Meadows would run from February 6, 2008, through May 11, 2008. Golden Gate Fields would run from May 14, 2008, through June 22, 2008. The racing fairs would run: Pleasanton from June 25, 2008, through July 6, 2008; Vallejo from July 9, 2008, through July 20, 2008; Santa Rosa, from July 23, 2008, through August 4, 2008; San Mateo from August 6, 2008, through August 18, 2008; Ferndale from August 7, 2008, through August 17, 2008; Cal Expo from August 20, 2008, through September 1, 2008; Stockton from September 3, 2008, through September 15, 2008;

Fresno from October 1, 2008, through October 13, 2008. Chairman Shapiro added that Fresno would run overlapped, except for October 1, 2, 8 and 9, 2008. The committee also recommended that Fresno run without overlap in 2009 and 2010. Chairman Shapiro stated Golden Gate Fields would continue racing from October 3, 2008, until December 21, 2008. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the proposed 2008 Northern California racing calendar. Chairman Shapiro stated as a condition of the 2008 racing fair calendar the committee put a limit of 43 thoroughbred races per week. The motion was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING PENALTIES AND OR PROCEDURES CONCERNING LATE AND/OR NON-REPORTING OF FIRST TIME GELDINGS.

Mike Martin, CHRB staff, said Board Rule 1865, Altering of Sex of Horse, required the owner or trainer of a horse that was previously entered to race and that was gelded or castrated, to report the change of sex of the horse by the time the horse was next entered to race. Mr. Martin stated the regulation was violated approximately 44 times during the 2006/2007 fiscal year. The issue was discussed at the July 2007 Pari-Mutuel/Simulcast and ADW Committee (committee) meeting. One of the suggestions regarding late reporting was to scratch a horse, or to levy a more sever fine on the trainer. Vice-Chairman Harris said from the wagering public's point of view it would be better to scratch the horse. The public did not have access to the correct information, and it would be impossible to correct the error. Commissioner Moss said the committee wanted to examine the issue more closely before it made a recommendation. The California Thoroughbred Trainers representative wanted to

discuss increased fines with the trainers and the committee wanted to see if the Encompass system for reporting geldings was fully operable and more effective. Vice-Chairman Harris said the Board could direct staff to initiate the rulemaking process, which would then require Rick Hammerly, Santa Anita Racing Secretary, said additional discussion of the issue. scratching a horse because a gelding was not reported in a timely manner was a drastic solution. He stated the owner who paid the bills to get the horse ready to run would lose, and the wagering public would also be affected. Many persons who wagered got their information from the Daily Racing Form, which did not report recent geldings. A fan that countered his Pick Six wager around a horse might not care if it was a colt, gelding, filly or mare. There were too many ways for a horse that was gelded or castrated to enter a race without the change in sex being reported. Santa Anita approached the problem by dedicating a person in the racing office to literally find when each horse last started, and when its gelding was reported. In addition, Santa Anita cut out two middlemen in the reporting process. If the entry card stated first time gelding, a feed was initiated that sent the information immediately to the overnight and the program without anyone having to take action. In addition, there were early morning race-day inspections, and if a gelding were found it was put on the board and announced so the public would be informed. Chairman Shapiro said he appreciated the racing office's efforts, but the issue was ongoing, and he thought the rulemaking process should be initiated so the industry could be put on notice. Vice-Chairman Harris motioned to instruct staff to draft an amendment to Rule 1865 to provide for a scratch - by scratch time - in cases of late reporting of a change of the sex of a horse. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE FEASIBILITY OF ALLOWING A HORSE, THAT HAS NOT STARTED FOR A MINIMUM OF 180 DAYS SINCE ITS LAST RACE TO BE ENTERED IN A CLAIMING RACE AND DECLARED INELIGIBLE TO BE CLAIMED.

Chairman Shapiro stated the item was deferred.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE RENEWAL OF LICENSES FOR EXISTING ADVANCED DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) PROVIDERS.

Chairman Shapiro stated that during this tenure on the Board advance deposit wagering (ADW) in California had been the object of many disputes. He said all of the ADW licenses or approvals were due for renewal, and it was time for the Board to step up and work for the fans and the industry by looking for ways to enhance it. Chairman Shapiro stated Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 granted the Board jurisdiction and supervision over race meetings conducted in California and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings. Section 19440 of the B&P Code stated the Board had the authority to adopt rules and regulations for the protection of the public and control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. It also gave the Board authority to license all participants in California horse racing, including racing associations, racing fairs and ADW providers. B&P Code Section 19480 provided the Board authority to issue licenses to racing associations and racing fairs to conduct race meetings provided the Board determined the issuance of such licenses would be in the public interest and serve the purposes of horse racing law. B&P Code Section 19460 stated that all licenses granted by the Board should contain such conditions as deemed necessary or desirable for the purposes of horse racing law. Chairman Shapiro said the law gave the Board the ability to establish conditions for licensing or approving ADW providers.

He stated the Board should consider requiring all racing associations to offer their product to all licensed/authorized ADW providers for wagering purposes, only. He added he did not believe that requirement would be the same as broadcasting, as the providers who broadcasted were entitled to, and should receive remuneration for their broadcasts. The market would decide which provider was better than another, but it was in the public interest to offer every opportunity to wager on California's horse racing product. Commissioner Amerman stated there was no question the wagering public was confused, and it was in the interest of the industry to be open to all ADW providers. Commissioner Moss said the industry was ill served by exclusive agreements that did not mean anything to anyone but the stakeholders. The Board needed to make it easier for the public to enjoy California horse racing. Vice-Chairman Harris stated he would like to see all ADW providers carry all California races, but could the Board compel a track to do business with every provider? Chairman Shapiro stated the Board was making it part of the requirements for license by establishing that providing the product to all ADW providers was in the best interest of the public. Scott Daruty, on behalf of Twinspires.com and XpressBet said the Board was correct. All content needed to be available to all reputable, licensed ADW providers. Horse racing fans were absolutely clear in their direction: they wanted to have the ability to pick their ADW platform and wager on all content through that platform. Mr. Daruty stated he hoped the Board's goal could be accomplished without regulatory direction and that the parties could work together for a resolution. Chairman Shapiro said he wanted to be clear that broadcasting was a different issue. TVG and HRTV produced wonderful content and they deserved to be compensated for their effort. However, it was time wagering rights were opened to all providers. He stated it was no

different from simulcasting. Under the law the simulcast signal was made available to all parties, and he did not see how ADW was different. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding ADW. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said his organization did not favor exclusivity at the wagering level. TOC would support the Board in its efforts to move the industry towards opening ADW wagering. Cathy Christian, representing TVG, asked if the Board intended to put the issue up for a regulation to take public comment and evidence on whether it was in the best interest of the industry. Chairman Shapiro said a subcommittee of the Board would meet with the various stakeholders to implement a new ADW model to provide service to the public and the industry. Christian asked if it was the Board's intention to take public comment prior to acting on the ADW renewal applications. Chairman Shapiro said the Board would first determine how it could achieve its goals, and then craft the proposed conditions of licensure, which would be promulgated. When the ADW providers submitted their applications they would be asked to keep the conditions in mind. Vice-Chairman Harris said he was not clear if the Board's decision point would be on the ADW applications or with each track's application. Chairman Shapiro stated it could be both, or the Board might need to tell the associations that to have ADW they needed to offer their product to all ADW providers. Ms. Christian said she was concerned with the process, and if there was a way of going forward with the ADW renewal applications. There were currently regulations regarding ADW applications, and TVG wanted the greatest possible amount of notice if the Board was going to change those requirements. Chairman Shapiro said if the Board needed to change its regulations it might decide to renew ADW providers for a limited amount of time - until the new regulations could be in place. The Board did not want to stop ADW or put any ADW providers out of business, but if the process took six months, perhaps it needed to limit the renewals. Chuck Champion of YouBet.com said his organization supported the Board's position. The Board had the right and the obligation to protect the public and the industry, and to act in the best interest of horse racing. YouBet.com was ready to work with any ADW provider and any association to resolve the issues that were harming the entire industry. Chairman Shapiro said an ad-hoc committee would be formed to study the issues.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCED DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF CHURCHILL DOWNS TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVES COMPANY DBA TWINSPIRES.COM FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FROM JANUARY 1, 2008, TO DECEMBER 31, 2010.

Chairman Shapiro asked if Twinspires.com (Twinspires) would accept an approval for the remainder of 2007 rather than a multi-year approval. Brad Blackwell of Twinspires said his organization would accept such an approval. Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, stated Churchill Downs, doing business as Twinspires, filed an application to conduct out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering as an advance deposit wagering (ADW) provider. Twinspires would provide ADW services 24 hours a day, year-round, with the exception of December 25. Ms. Wagner noted Twinspires had agreements pending with Bay Meadows and Golden Gate Fields. The horsemen's agreement and contracts with racing associations were missing from the application. She added the licensing of Twinspires management personnel was in process. Scott Daruty, on behalf of Twinspires, said Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and Twinspires were still negotiating a hub fee. He stated the current ADW statute did not

expressly provide for TOC approval. Although Twinspires understood the Board's position regarding the need for a horsemen's agreement, it also believed the Board had the ability to limit that right if it believed it was being imposed unreasonably. Mr. Blackwell said Churchill Downs launched Twinspires in May 2007. He described Twinspires business model and discussed its investment in California. Drew Couto of TOC said Churchill Downs had a history in California that was of concern to TOC. That history impacted TOC's view as to what would be an appropriate hub fee. When TOC dealt with other ADW providers they started with lower hub fees. That was the case because TOC asked them to prove themselves over a period of a year. Following the "probationary" period, TOC would evaluate the ADW providers' performance and adjust their fees appropriately. Mr. Couto stated TOC offered Twinspires a hub fee that was substantially higher than that at which other ADW providers started; however, Twinspires indicated the fees were unacceptable, so there was an impasse. Mr. Couto said TOC would not have a problem if Twinspires was licensed as of January 1, 2008, but under current conditions the Board had required every California ADW provider to have a horsemen's agreement. Chairman Shapiro said the proposed approval was only for three months. He asked if there was not a middle ground the parties could agree on so Twinspires could be approved. Mr. Daruty said Twinspires would accept TOC's proposal for the remainder of 2007 if it preserved Twinspires right to move forward under the new ADW Chairman Shapiro stated the item would be deferred to the November 2007 Regular Meeting. He stated the November hearing would only be for the remainder of 2007, and he asked the parties to negotiate an acceptable hub rate for that period.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING ESTABLISHING A UNIFORM POLICY FOR CRITERIA TO BE USED IN DETERMINING RACES THAT ARE EXEMPT OR CONSIDERED DESIGNATED RACES FROM JOCKEY SUSPENSION.

Chairman Shapiro stated the item was deferred.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING JOCKEYS BEING NAMED TO MORE THAN ONE HORSE IN ANY RACE, AND MULTIPLE HORSES THAT ARE ENTERED BY ONE TRAINER OR OWNER IN A STAKES RACE WHEREIN THEY AGREE TO ONLY RUN ONE HORSE IN SUCH RACE.

Chairman Shapiro stated the item was deferred.

- C. ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR AT PLEASANTON FROM JUNE 27, 2007 THROUGH JULY 8, 2007.
- D. **SONOMA SOLANO WINE COUNTRY RACING** AT SOLANO COUNTY FAIR FROM JULY 11, 2007 THROUGH JULY 25, 2007 CONTINUING AT SANTA ROSA COUNTY FAIR FROM JULY 18, 2007 THROUGH AUGUST 6, 2007.

Roberto Zavala, CHRB staff, said the numbers presented show a good average increase over 2006. Vice-Chairman Harris said he thought numbers would be up for the Santa Rosa County Fair due to the extended meeting. Joe Barkett of Solano County Fair spoke about the Sonoma Solano Wine Country Racing meeting, which was an experimental combined meeting. He stated that four-week combined meeting there were actually 5.4 percent fewer race events, but the handle per start was up 3.3 percent. Mr. Barkett discussed how the fairs arrived at their final numbers. He stated the disappointing aspect of the meeting was that the two weeks at Santa Rosa were down 20 percent on track. Although there was a lot of speculation regarding the drop

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in numbers, the entities believed the major reason for the decline was the overall drop in fair attendance for those two weeks. The fairs were currently exploring ways to improve the numbers if they conducted the same experiment in 2008. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if the fairs wanted to run the same meeting in 2008. Mr. Barkett said the fairs were open to repeating the combined meeting. Commissioner Choper asked what caused the enormous increase in Stockton. Forest White of San Joaquin County Fair said the big difference was the lack of overlap. In 2006 the fair was overlapped the first and second week. Mr. White added other factors in 2006 were the tremendous heat and the length of the meeting. In 2007 there was better weather and the meeting was shorter. He cautioned the fair was being moved to September in 2008, which could cause a drop in numbers. Mr. White stated San Joaquin County Fair was looking at ways to adapt to the change and to promote its 2008 meeting.

REPORT OF THE STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

Chairman Shapiro said the Strategic Planning Committee report was presented in combination with item 7 of the agenda.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Lee Hall of Service Employee's International Union Local 1877 thanked the Board for its assistance in a matter involving the Los Angeles County Fair. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding horse racing related issues.

Los Angeles Turf Club filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Santa Anita:

- December 26, 2007 through April 20, 2008, or 85 days, the same as 2007. The association proposes to race a total of 720 races, or 8.47 per day. In 2007 they raced 8.71 races per day with an average of 8.62 runners per race. The (actual) average daily purse for the spring 2007 meet was \$495,529. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$496,482.
- Los Angeles Turf was allocated 85 race days for 2008. Race week Wednesday through Sunday. The proposed race dates deletes Wednesdays January 9, 16, 30th; February 6, 13, 27th; March 5, 12, 19, 26th; April 2, 9, and 16th racing dates. Adding Mondays; January 7, 14, 28th; February 4, 11, 25th; March 3, 10, 17, 24, 31st; April 7 and 14th.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

"FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, LATC Trackside Human Ambulance "Unit 41T" which is manned by LATC-contracted EMTs and is following the horses and jockeys in the race will respond immediately to the site of the accident. The attending EMT's shall arrive equipped with basic cardiac life support (BCLS), AED, and full C-spine equipment
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by Unit 41T.



"ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the EMT's "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to transport to Methodist Hospital Emergency Room.
 - o If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, Unit 41T shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the First Aid Office where the Track Physician will be primary care provider or,
 - o If off-site treatment is deemed necessary Unit 41 will have the Security Department (channel 1) contact the emergency room and advised them of the situation. Unit 41 will then transport jockey(s) to Methodist Hospital Emergency Room.



"INJURY TREATMENT"

An ambulance licensed to operate on public highways provided by the track shall be available at all times during live racing and shall be staffed by two emergency medical technicians licensed in accordance with Division 2.5 (commencing with Section 1797) of the Health

and Safety Code, one of whom may be an Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, as defined in Section 1797.84 of the Health and Safety Code. (b) Each racing association and racing fair shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical plan detailing the procedures that shall be used in the event of an on-track injury. The plan shall be posted in each jockey room in English and Spanish. (c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.

ANALYSIS and RATIONALE

The undeniable truth about gambling is that there are only so many people on the planet who will ever gamble. Whether because of nature or nurture, gambling is an activity of varying interest to many consumers living in California, but not most.

When betting on live horseracing was the only legal gambling opportunity in the state, racetrack business thrived in Los Angeles and large daily crowds were the norm at Santa Anita and Hollywood Park. Horse racing was the gateway to gambling and betting on thoroughbreds was most often the maiden voyage for gaming novices. That's no longer the case. Now, at least one generation of Californians, who might have had their first taste of gambling at a California horse track, has been intercepted at the gate by easily accessible casino action, a myriad of lottery games and gaming venues on the Internet.

We've also done a pretty good job of utilizing technology to compete with ourselves, but at least we're keeping (a good deal of) that wagering in the family.

Convenience is an overwhelming factor in the success of most businesses, certainly ours. Customers we have developed on track can also bet by phone, online or at a nearby satellite. That's not so great for the live business, but at least these fans are still in the game. We believe that convenience can work to the advantage of live racing, too and that is reflected in our 2008 marketing plans.

In addition to convenience, it is clear that visiting somewhere that appears to be "in" or "hot" definitely appeals to some Angelinos when they decide how to spend their free time and discretionary dollars. For 2008, we will continue our extremely successful marketing and advertising efforts to create awareness of Santa Anita. Our goal is to place it high in the consciousness of locals as a cool place to go and a hot spot to be, for established fans and newcomers, for young and old, for individuals and families. Additionally, our plans include a focus for the first

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time on jockeys and the humans who make horse racing so fascinating and interesting.

<u>PRINCIPLES AND PROCEDURES</u> ~advertising and the convenience factor~

Much of Santa Anita's advertising program is designed around the purchase of media rings which support a theory that (outside of our biggest stakes and promotional days), those people most eligible, and, therefore most likely, to attend racing at Santa Anita reside within a 15 to 20 mile ring encircling the city of Arcadia. They would be prime candidates to benefit from the convenience factor.

Our advertising partners, Winner and Associates and Target Enterprises, are buying cable companies (not cable stations) within these rings that provide us heavy ad rotations on major broadcast channels in the neighborhoods from which we expect to get most of our midweek and weekend players. If you reside within these rings, you will be inundated with spots—usually on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays—on high profile programming pumping Santa Anita. These targeted buys allow us to be a prominent television presence every week of the meet all the way through April. As with our 2006 and 2007 advertising program, the long-range goal, including the incentives, is to bring back long-time fans, and establish a much larger, solid base of new racing fans for years to come.

When it comes to promoting our biggest days, our media buy grows exponentially to cover Los Angeles County and sometimes beyond. These major buys are planned for Opening Day, Sunshine Millions, Big 'Cap Day, Santa Anita Derby Day and to a lesser extent Strub Day, St. Patrick's Day, President's Day and Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. For the major days, the spots run for most of the preceding week.

In essence, there will be television advertising of Santa Anita Racetrack every week that live racing is held. This is an extraordinary effort to mainstream thoroughbred racing into much of the L.A. marketplace and make Santa Anita a cool place to go again and to showcase the young and interesting talent we have in our jockey community.

Additionally, print advertising will reflect that Santa Anita is both convenient and "a homoning place" It will be purchased from the Los Angeles Newspaper Grow

"a happening place." It will be purchased from the Los Angeles Newspaper Group, whose publications cover Arcadia and neighboring towns. Also, we will buy space in *La Opinion* and a number of Asian dailies and weeklies in our area (still to be determined) as well as the *L.A. Times*, the *Daily Racing Form* and several specialty publications. Radio partnerships, such as those with KROQ and KBIG are dedicated to promoting special events such as microbrews, carnivals and chili cook offs.

Santa Anita is the proud developer of THOROUGHBREDS, a membership club that provides real value and rewards for players who come to the track frequently. It is not based on handle; it is based only on their willingness to leave the convenience of their home to visit Santa Anita Park. This is the model that is used by the rest of the industry when attempting to communicate with fans... no matter how much they wager.

The popular *Day On Us* will return in 2008. This is the day each month where we provide a mailing that offers free clubhouse admission, free parking and a free program all on the same day with coupons provided through direct mail.

Over the course of the four month meet, SA will send out a myriad of offers and notices of events and upcoming races and promotions to fans whose names we have secured. These will include free passes, mystery mutuel vouchers, handicapping challenges and contest entries. Add to this a growing number of e-mail blasts featuring special offers and immediate pick six carryover notices. A major direct mail newsletter is sent to over 160,000

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fans each month with exclusive offers specifically for them.

Additionally, the revamped and improved Santa Anita website offers everything a serious player AND a new visitor to the game needs to know to get started.

We plan to continue a program that we continue to nurture. Use a big day to get your next big day off on the right foot. This is a Pass Program that thanks you for coming on a big day (such as Sunshine Millions) by providing you a free clubhouse admission pass or \$1 BuckPass for the next big day on our stakes calendar (such as the Strub Stakes Day).

Santa Anita stays closely in touch with all the major promotional companies that create and provide high quality premium giveaway items. Our research told us that our fans will come to the track more often on days when they can take something home. Already purchased or on the drawing board for 2008 are innovative and popular premium items as well traditional giveaways such as the opening day calendar and the Santa Anita Derby day t-shirt

~ what makes Santa Anita special~

To begin with, nature has provided Santa Anita with the most beautiful backdrop of any racetrack in the world. There's nothing like it in all of sports. More and more, we use the infield for special events to take advantage of our unique location.

Santa Anita is the home of Seabiscuit and every Saturday and Sunday two tram loads of tourists take the spectacular Seabiscuit guided tour through the backstretch, to his stall, into the jocks room and finally to a face-to-face meeting with Fighting Ferrari, the horse who played Seabiscuit in the film.

Santa Anita Park has an ongoing fun and informative Speakers Bureau featuring Hall of Fame jockeys Laffit Pincay, Jr., Eddie Delahoussaye, bugler Jay Cohen and a variety of others. They will be appearing at fraternal organizations, business meetings and fundraisers singing the praises of thoroughbred racing.

The Microbrew festivals offered at Santa Anita and partnered with KROQ-FM are the envy of the racing world. At the 2007 Santa Anita meet microbrews, between 8,000 and 11,000 prime young prospects came out to drink a brew, make a bet and have some fun in the sun. Three are planned this year during L.A.T. C.: Sunshine Millions Day, Big 'Cap Day and Santa Anita Derby Day. This has developed into one of the best media partnerships in all of sports. KROQ delivers for Santa Anita. Carnival Days is a scaled down version of the L.A. County Fair all inside the Santa Anita infield.

Our Group Events business, under new leadership, is growing with leaps and bounds. The number of groups is up, the number of individuals in the groups is up and bookings for 2008 are ahead of last year's pace at this time.

The Handicapping Education Programs are prevalent all weekend long near the Santa Anita walking ring highlighted by veteran handicapper Jim Quinn's special sessions.



SECURITY CONTROLS

Graded Stakes and Races of \$100,000 or more

The following procedures have been put in place at Golden Gate Fields to ensure that proper security surveillance guidelines for races of \$100,000 or more are followed:

- Carrie Fawcett, Stable Superintendent, provides a list of starters to T. W. Johnson, Director of Security which includes the following information:
 - 1. Name of horse
 - 2. Name of trainer
 - 3. Barn number
 - 4. Stall number
- Supplemental security staff, provided by a licensed security contractor and licensed by the CHRB, are called in the morning of the race to meet with the Director of Security for the following instruction:
 - A. An overview of the race track operating procedures
 - B. A briefing of their duties throughout the day
 - C. All guards are asked to sign out for their specific video camera
 - D. A form is provided by the CHRB to each guard which is to be signed by the attending veterinarian when administering medication to bleeders.
 - E. Each guard is given a video camera to record ALL activities involving individuals entering and exiting their assigned stall. Instruction is given to first record the posted number on the stall to confirm that the camera is directed at the assigned horse.
 - F. Instruction is given to monitor any and all suspicious activity and to contact the Director of Security if and when suspicious activity occurs.
 - G. Guards are instructed to position themselves as close to the horse's stall without jeopardizing safety.
 - H. The horse and handler will be followed on foot by each guard to the receiving barn before the race.
 - After all horses are safely in the receiving barn, the guards are instructed to meet in the Security office with the Director of Security. The guards sign that they have returned their video camera and participate in a discussion of the day's surveillance activities.
- Surveillance videotapes are saved until all test results have received a negative result.

Attachment to PRA License Application 12B (2) and 12C (1):

Detention Barn Surveillance:

Barn #44 contains 27 stalls and is utilized as our Transit and Detention Barn. The surveillance system in place contains cameras strategically placed to monitor entrances and exits along with a camera monitoring each stall.

The camera equipment is connected to a digital recording system which is kept in a secured area with a power back-up in place.

Stable Gate Surveillance:

Cameras are strategically placed to monitor all activities at the Main Stable Gate and the Horsemen Walk-In Gate.

EXHIBIT A

Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered in races to be conducted at the 2008 race meets. It is the understanding of the parties that such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, and owners' horses within their control, will be subject to the following:

- 1st Incidence For the first test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, subject to surveillance for a period of 45 days from the date set by the TCO₂ Committee. Such surveillance may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that TRACK deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 30 days from the date set by the TCO₂ Committee, will be quarantined to a Protection Barn beginning at noon on the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. The costs of such quarantine/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant for stall renovation, per day, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.
- B. 2nd Incidence For the second test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, which occurs within three years of a prior incidence, the registered trainer of such horse shall have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, under surveillance for a period of 75 days from the date set by the TCO₂ Committee. surveillance may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that TRACK deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 60 days from the date set by the TCO₂ Committee, will be quarantined to a Protection Barn beginning at noon the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. The costs of such quarantine/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant for stall renovation, per day, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.

C. 3rd Incidence - For the third test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, which occurs within three years of a prior incidence, the registered trainer of such horse shall have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, under surveillance for a period of 105 days from the date set by the TCO₂ Committee. Such surveillance may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that TRACK deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 90 days from the date set by the TCO₂ Committee, will be quarantined to a Protection Barn beginning at noon the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. The costs of such quarantine/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant for stall renovation, per day, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.

Track further agrees that it shall enforce these penalties when imposed as a result of similar contract provisions with other racing associations in California. By way of example only, Track agrees that should any horse running at its meet be subject to detention barn confinement as the result of a positive at another association, Track will continue to require detention barn confinement for the remainder of said 30 day period. Also by way of example, should a trainer have a TCO₂ positive or positives at a race meet other than its own and a subsequent positive at Track's race meet or at another associations meet, Track will enforce paragraph B, and may, at its discretion, enforce paragraph C above as though the original positive(s) had taken place at its meet.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES

FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

"FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, the Stewards and/or Outriders shall immediately contact the Track Physician ("Jockey Down") using Radio Channel #7 (or the accident may very well be witnessed directly by the Track Physician);
- The on-track GGF Human Ambulance (manned by GGF-contracted EMTs) and the Track Physician (transported via the GGF "chase" or "Vet" truck) shall respond immediately to the site of the accident;
- The attending medical professionals shall arrive equipped with advanced cardiac life support (ACLS) and other necessary acute medical treatment equipment & supplies;
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by the Track Physician.



"ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the Track Physician's "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to request emergency medical transport for off-site treatment at a hospital trauma center;
 - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, the GGF Human Ambulance shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the GGF Medical Clinic; or,
 - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary, "911" shall be used to summon a City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance (a Fire Dept. truck shall also respond).



"INJURY TREATMENT"

- If the injured jockey(s) is treated at the GGF Medical Clinic, the Track Physician shall be the primary care provider unless (or until) the Track Physician surrenders custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;
- If the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance is summoned to respond, the injured jockey(s) shall be transferred to this ambulance (accompanied by the Track Physician) at either of the two following locations for transport to a local hospital;
 - If the injuries are deemed less severe, the jockey will be transported by the GGF Human Ambulance to an off-track location for pick-up by the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance; or,
 - If the injuries are deemed severe and the jockey(s) cannot be moved, the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance will be escorted by GGF security personnel directly onto the track for patient pickup.

"PRIMERA RESPUESTA"

EXCEPTIONS: During Del Mar and Fairplex meets our Sunday first live post will be determined by the number of races run at Del Mar or Fairplex. It is the intention of LAQHRA to conduct simulcast wagering on no more than six to twelve out of state races per racing program, and to adjust our post times to avoid "triple overlap" situations.



This program rewards its members with cash vouchers for playing the nighttime Los Alamitos racing program with a 1 percent return on their money wagered. Six Handicapping contests are scheduled for 2008, which are exclusive to Racing Rewards members.
- 3. Los Alamitos' senior citizen admission prices are \$2 every single day. Los Alamitos also offers free grandstand admission and free general parking every Thursday night. More than 60% of the Los Alamitos parking lot is available at no charge as part of its free general parking area.
- 4. Los Alamitos continues to maintain the lowest concession prizes of any sporting venue in Orange County. Low prices include \$3 beers every day and night; \$3 hot dogs every day and night; \$1.50 soda every day and night, etc.
- 5. Los Alamitos provides Ed Burgart's tipsheep free on its website at www.losalamitos.com.
- 6. Los Alamitos offers a free nighttime pocket program, which can be downloaded at www.losalamitos.com.
- 7. Los Alamitos offers a free past performance lines for major Grade 1 races, which can be downloaded at www.losalamitos.com.
- 8. Los Alamitos markets its night program via the Mike Willman weekly radio shows.
- 9. Los Alamitos markets the night program on TVG with a 24-week advertising campaign throughout the year. Los Alamitos will continue to work closely with TVG to promote and encourage viewers to visit the racetrack. Vessels Club and general concession menu items are often promoted on TVG to show fans what's available at the racetrack. Los Alamitos will continue to sponsor trivia and handicapping contest on TVGs with "Night At The Track" packages offered as prizes.

- 10. The Replay Show is available on TVG mornings on a Friday through Monday basis.
- 11. Los Alamitos, in conjuction with the AQHA, have made available online video of morning workouts of 2-year-olds. Horseplayers find this a useful tool, as they're able to dissect workouts of horses that have yet to make an official start.
- 12. Los Alamitos will conduct two statewide mailers featuring mystery mutuel vouchers. Each voucher is worth at least \$5. Vouchers in denominations of \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000 are also mailed. In addition two \$10,000 vouchers are mailed. The mailers are held on California Breeders Champions Night and Champion of Champions weekend.
- 13. Latin Festival Day at Los Alamitos will be held in the Spring. Live music, horseracing and great family atmosphere.
- 14. Family days at Los Alamitos will be held on Saturday, June 29 with the running of the popular Wienerschnitzel Wiener National. Eighty dachshunds compete for prize money and trophies. The annual event receives great pre and post event publicity on the television newscasts. The event annually attracts over 12,000 people, most of which get exposed to the excitement of horseracing for the first time.
- 15. The Los Alamitos annual Halloween Carnival will be conducted in late fall. This event benefits a local charity, as well as the Los Alamitos Race Track Chaplaincy. A costume contest for kids and adults as well as a ton of carnival games are held in a safe, fun, and family oriented environment. This event provided first-time exposure of horseracing to thousands of families each year.
- 16. Wall Calendar Giveaway Night on Champion of Champions Night to all statewide patrons.
- 17. Los Alamitos will continue its DVD Scrapbook program designed to reward racehorse owners at Los Alamitos. Every time a horse wins a race at Los Alamitos, the owner will receive one DVD completely free featuring the horse's winning performance. The DVD includes the post parade, warm-ups, race analysis, actual race, and winner's circle. This has received rave reviews across the board from owners and Los Alamitos Race Course sees it a nice goodwill gesture.
- 18. In addition to the on-track marketing, Los Alamitos is conducting the strongest marketing program of any southern California for the benefit of its simulcast facilities. In 2007, Los Alamitos is scheduled to conduct over 30 handicapping contest for cash prizes worth approximately \$12,000. Each handicapping contest is held in conjunction with a premium item giveaway, such as cap, t-shirt, long

sleeve polo, or sweatshirt. Sites that hosted events included Hollywood Park, Santa Anita, Fairplex Park, Surfside, Monterey, Santa Maria, Santa Barbara, Victorville, Lancaster, San Bernardino, Santa Clara, Fresno Club One, Ventura. Chris Wade serves as the racing analyst on the Los Alamitos racing broadcast. Wade provides expert handicapping information prior to each race. He provides racing fans with his Pick 4 suggestions, plus tips and hints on how to play the races at Los Alamitos. A groups director works closely with parties to ensure a fun night at the races. Group parties have race named in their honor and the opportunity to visit the winner's circle for their race.

Two information windows are open day and night at Los Alamitos Race Course to answer any questions or inquiries about the track or horseracing in general. Fans can also pick up general information and pamphlets at the Racing Rewards Center and Vessels Club absolutely free.

Starting in 2007, the Los Alamitos Public Relations Department has started writing personality profiles on racing fans. The profiles are published in the nightly program. Over 65 profiles on a variety of fans will be featured in 2007 with another 200 planned for 2008. The profiles, which include a fan photo, inform readers on how other fans became interested in horse racing; how they approach handicapping the races; their most successful nights at the track; what they like about the experience at the track. The profiles have been well received.

- 1. The Finish Line Grill offers casual dining with Mexican food and Hamburgers cooked on an outdoor grill facing the finish line. New picnic tables have been set up outdoors, which are nightly advertised as the perfect place for new fans.
- D. Describe any improvements to the physical facility in advance of the meeting that directly benefit horsemen and fans:
 - 1. For horsemen, more specifically jockeys, Los Alamitos completed a major expansion and renovation program to significantly upgrade its jockey's room facilities. The improvement project added about 1,700 square feet to the existing 4,050 square foot facility. In addition to increasing the overall size of the jockey's room, upgrades include; a new Jacuzzi and whirlpool tub; a new, private sleeping room; new recreation room facilities; expanded locker and valet areas; and the addition of an Equicisor.

- 2. Both the east side general parking area and the horsemen's parking lot were repaved in 2007.

Cal Expo Police Department

The Cal Expo Police Department is headed up by Chief Robert Craft. Chief Craft is a retired captain of the Sacramento Sheriffs Department and is one of the highest decorated officers in the history of the department. The Cal Expo police department enjoys a great working and professional relationship with the CHRB staff.

The grandstand and backstretch areas of the Cal Expo facility will be served by our police department. A minimum of 6 police officers, 2 mobile patrol units, 1 armed officer in the detention barn and 4 gatemen will be assigned exclusively to the racetrack, grandstand, and backstretch areas. Our backstretch and detention barn will also be served by unarmed Cal Expo Security Guards.

An organizational chart of our police department is attached and the contact phone numbers are: 916-263-3050 and 916-263-3120

2. Detention Barn-

Sacramento Harness has constructed a new detention barn. All California Sire Stake races and Overnight Stake races with purse of \$15,000 will be a detention barn race. All horses in those races must report for detention by 12 noon. Those horses will be in detention from then until race time.

Each horse in the detention barn will be limited to two caretakers (one groom and trainer) at a time and each person will be identified by CHRB license, checked, and all equipment will be checked. All functions in the detention barn will be documented and the documentation will be securely filed.

In addition, trainers having high TCO2 test(s) will be required to race all of their horses out of the detention barn for thirty days. Those horses must also report by 12 noon.

3. TCO2 Testing

Sacramento Harness will adhere to all CHRB guidelines in conjunction with TCO2 testing. In addition, horses that have previously tested high will be detained and placed under surveillance cameras each race day for no less than 30 days. The number of security personnel assigned to the TCO2 program will be determined on a day-to-day basis.

Sacramento Harness Association will employ the use of four generators that will be strategically placed in locations around the racetrack and be turned on continuously while night racing is occurring. In the event of a racetrack light failure, the generators will provide enough light to ensure the safety of all participants. Also, the patrol judge in the starter's car that tracks each race will illuminate the racetrack with their headlights.

Detention Barn Policies & Procedures

- i. All horses must report to the detention barn by 12:00 noon race day. Horses late for detention will be requested to be scratched by the Stewards and CHRB.
- 2. A valid CHRB license is required for detention barn admission. License must be displayed to detention barn security prior to admittance.
- 3. Only the licensed trainer and the assigned licensed groom are permitted in the detention barn enclosure.
- 4. CHRB licensed veterinarians will be permitted within the enclosure for lasix administration. Vet must be accompanied by trainer or assigned groom for lasix administration.
- 5. No therapeutic aids are permitted in the detention barn enclosure.
- 6. Warmups are permitted on both the front and back track. Horses must return directly to the detention barn or to the paddock following warmup. Horses warming up on back track must use main road <u>only</u>. Violation of any of the above will result in request for scratch.

These policies have been agreed to by contract between the Sacramento Harness Association & California Harness Horseman Association.

STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1865. ALTERING OF SEX OF HORSE

Regular Board Meeting November 29, 2007

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19440 states responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering, and the administration and enforcement of all laws, rules, and regulations affecting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19460 provides that all licenses issued by the Board are subject to all rules, regulations, and conditions from time to time prescribed by the Board. B&P Code Section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions, consistent with the provisions of B&P Code Chapter 4, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. Board Rule 1865, Altering of Sex of Horse, states that any alteration of the sex of a horse from the sex recorded on the certificate of foal registration or the eligibility certificate or other official registration certificate of the horse shall be reported to the racing secretary and the official horse identifier if the horse is entered to race at any race meeting.

During the 06/07 fiscal year the stewards issued 44 rulings against trainers who did not report the gelding of a horse by time of entry. The typical fine for each of those violations was \$300. The issue of failure to report, or untimely reporting of a first time gelding was discussed at the February 2007 Pari-Mutuel/ADW and Simulcast Committee (committee) meeting. The committee revisited the issue in July 2007 and considered possible sanctions for first time gelding reporting violations, including increasing the typical fine to \$1,000. At the Board's September 2007 Regular Meeting the issue of late or non-reporting of first time geldings was discussed. After hearing from interested parties, the Board directed staff to draft a regulation that would provide for scratching a horse entered to race if the trainer failed to report a first time gelding in a timely manner.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Board Rule 1865 adds a new Subsection 1865(d), which would make the trainer responsible for reporting the true sex of a horse he entered, or caused to be entered, if the true sex was different from that listed on the certificate of registration on file in the racing office. Under a new Subsection 1865(d)(1), if the trainer fails to report the true sex of the horse by the scratch time for the race in which it is entered, the stewards shall declare

the horse from the race. This sanction does not preclude the stewards from fining the trainer for a violation of first time gelding reporting requirements.

At the September 2007 Regular Meeting of the Board the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) objected to scratching a horse whose true sex was not reported in a timely manner. The CTT representative stated scratching the horse would punish the fans by reducing the field; the owner who paid to prepare the horse for the race; and ultimately the state in less income.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.

(d) Any trainer who enters a horse, or who causes a horse to be entered on his behalf, is responsible for ensuring that the true sex of the entered horse is listed on its certificate of registration on file in the racing office.

(1) If the true sex of a horse entered to race is not listed on its certificate of registration by the "scratch time" designated for the race in which the horse is entered, the stewards shall declare the horse from the race.

STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1844. AUTHORIZED MEDICATION

Regular Board Meeting November 29, 2007

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. B&P Code Section 19580 requires the Board to adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in B&P Code Section 19581 provides that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. Board Rule 1844, Authorized Medication, names drug substances and medications authorized by the Board that may be administered to safeguard the health of the horse entered to race. The rule lists the drug substances that may be found in official test samples and the level at which such drugs may occur. The Board's Equine Medical Director, Dr. Rick Arthur, has proposed an amendment to Rule 1844 that would provide levels for anabolic steroids.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1844 would establish levels at which certain anabolic steroids may be in the official urine test sample. The anabolic steroids and permitted levels are: Stanozolol at 1 nanograms per milliliter; Nandrolone at 1 nanograms per milliliter for geldings, fillies and mares, 45 nanograms for males other than geldings; Boldenone at 15 nanograms per milliliter in males other than geldings; Testosterone at 20 nanograms per milliliter in geldings and Testosterone at 55 nanograms per milliliter in fillies or mares. Testosterone would be permitted at any level in males. The proposed levels are based on the Racing Medication Testing Consortium and the Racing Commissioner International anabolic steroid model rules.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for committee discussion and action.

CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD TITLE 4. CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS ARTICLE 15. VETERINARY PRACTICES PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1844. AUTHORIZED MEDICATION

Regular Board Meeting November 29, 2007

1844. Authorized Medication.

Consistent with the intent of these rules, drug substances and medications authorized by the Board for use may be administered to safeguard the health of the horse entered to race provided that:

- (a) No person shall administer a drug substance to any horse entered to race except upon authorization of the official veterinarian in conformance with these rules.
- (b) No drug substance, other than authorized bleeder medication, shall be administered to a horse entered to race within 24 hours of the race in which entered.
- (c) Not more than one approved non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug substance (NSAID) may be administered to a horse that is entered to race and shall be only one of the following authorized drug substances:
- (1) Phenylbutazone in a dosage amount that the test sample shall contain not more than 5 micrograms of the drug substance per milliliter of blood plasma or serum.
- (2) Flunixin in a dosage amount that the test sample shall contain not more than 50 nanograms of the drug substance per milliliter of blood plasma or serum.
- (3) Ketoprofen in a dosage amount that the test sample shall contain not more than 10 nanograms of the drug substance per milliliter of blood plasma or serum.
- (4) Metabolites or analogues of approved NSAIDs may be present in post race test samples.
- (d) If the official chemist reports that a blood test sample contains an authorized NSAID in excess of the limit for that drug substance under this rule, the official

veterinarian shall, in conjunction with the veterinarian who administered or prescribed the authorized drug substance, establish a dosage amount or time of administration of the drug substance that will comply with the limits under this rule; or the official veterinarian may, if in his/her judgment no such reduced dosage amount or amendment to time of administration will result in a test sample level within the limits of this rule, withdraw authorization for the use of any one NSAID.

- (e) Official urine test samples may contain one of the following drug substances, their metabolites or analogs, in an amount that does not exceed the specified levels:
 - (1) Acepromazine; 25 nanograms per milliliter
 - (2) Mepivacaine; 10 nanograms per milliliter
 - (3) Promazine; 25 nanograms per milliliter
 - (4) Albuterol; 1 nanograms per milliliter
 - (5) Atropine; 10 nanograms per milliliter.
 - (6) Benzocaine; 50 nanograms per milliliter
 - (7) Procaine; 10 nanograms per milliliter
 - (8) Salicylates; 750 micrograms per milliliter
 - (9) Clenbuterol; 5 nanograms per milliliter
 - (10) Stanozolol; 1 nanograms per milliliter
- (11) Nandrolone; 1 nanograms per milliliter for geldings, fillies and mares; 45 nanogrms for males other than geldings.
 - (12) Boldenone; 15 nanograms per milliliter in males other than geldings
- (13) Testosterone; 20 nanograms per milliliter in geldings, 55 nanograms per milliliter in fillies or mares.
 - (A) Testosterone at any level in males other than geldings is not a violation of this regulation.

(f) Official blood test samples may contain clenbuterol in an amount not to exceed 25 picograms per milliliter of serum or plasma.

(g) Official blood test samples shall not contain any of the drug substances, or their metabolites or analogs listed in subsection (e)(1)-(8).

STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1632. JOCKEY'S RIDING FEE

Regular Board Meeting November 29, 2007

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 states jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 provides that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions, consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. Assembly Bill (AB) 649, Chapter 605, Statutes of 2007, added Section 19501 to the B&P Code. Section 19501 provides that effective January 1, 2008, the minimum amount awarded to a jockey who finishes second or third in a horse race, and the scale of minimum jockey riding fees for losing mounts, shall be increased by ten dollars. Board Rule 1632, Jockey's Riding Fee, provides a scale of jockey riding fees to be used in the absence of a contract or special agreement.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Board Rule 1632 is a response to AB 649. The amendment increases by ten dollars jockey riding fees for jockeys who finish second or third in a horse race, and for jockeys who ride losing mounts. For jockeys who ride in races with a gross purse of \$600 and under the winning mount fee was also increased, as the mandated increase to the second and third place mount fee, and losing mount fee, made those fees higher than the winning mount fee.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment to Board Rule 1632.

AB 649 dictates that the new jockey riding fees are effective January 1, 2008. However, the regulatory process is such that the proposed amendment to Rule 1632 may not be in effect until March 2008. Staff recommends that a directive outlining the new jockey riding fees be distributed to the racing associations for use until such time as the proposed amendment is approved.

- (b) The purpose of this rule is not to set a minimum or maximum fee. It provides a fee if the parties have not made a written agreement to the contrary.
- (c) All fees are payable in the lower purse range until the next higher purse range is reached, unless there is a written agreement to the contrary.
- (d) A jockey's fee is considered earned when the jockey is weighed out by the clerk of scales. The fee shall not be considered earned if the jockey elects to take himself off of his mount. If there is a substitution of jockeys, no additional jockey fee or double jockey fee need be paid except when ordered by the stewards.

(e) In this rule "Win Purse" means the amount paid the winning horse less the fees paid

by the owner to enter the horse in the race.

(f) If the parties agree on the fee to be paid the jockey, a contract or agreement in

writing signed by the jockey or his agent and the owner or his authorized agent specifying the

agreed upon fee if a winning mount, second place mount, third place mount and losing mount

shall be delivered to the paymaster of purses before the running of the race in question. The

paymaster of purses shall debit the owner's purse account under the contract or written

agreement. If no contract or written agreement is submitted before the running of the race in

question, the paymaster of purses shall debit the owner's purse account under the fee scale set

forth in this rule.

(g) A jockey may not share in the fees of another jockey.

Assembly Bill No. 649

CHAPTER 605 .

An act to add Sections 19501 and 19619.7 to the Business and Professions Code, relating to horse racing.

[Approved by Governor October 13, 2007. Filed with Secretary of State October 13, 2007.]

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 649, Ma. Horse racing: jockeys.

Existing law establishes the California Horse Racing Board, which generally regulates horse racing in the state, including setting riding fees for jockeys that apply in the absence of an agreement regarding riding fees to the contrary.

This bill would require the scale of minimum jockey riding fees for losing mounts to be increased, effective January 1, 2008, when the state minimum wage is increased, as specified. The bill would provide that the new fees are minimum jockey riding fees. The bill would also require, effective January 1, 2008, the minimum amount awarded to a jockey who finishes 2nd or 3rd in a thoroughbred horse race to be increased. The bill would further charge the board, no later than July 1, 2008, with establishing that a jockey who rides a horse finishing in 4th place in a thoroughbred horse race receive a reasonable riding fee, as specified.

The bill would state findings and declarations of the Legislature relative to jockey riding fees.

Because this bill would impose requirements, the violation of which would be a misdemeanor, pursuant to existing provisions of law, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 19501 is added to the Business and Professions Code, to read:

19501. (a) The Legislature finds and declares the following:

(1) Professional jockeys are vital to the horse racing industry and the work they perform is very dangerous.

(2) The minimum wage that jockeys receive in a horse race is established by the California Horse Racing Board as a minimum jockey riding fee. Jockeys may earn additional compensation if the horse they are racing is a winning mount, a second place mount, or a third place mount.

(3) The minimum jockey riding fee has not kept up with inflation or the cost of living. Since 1970, the state minimum wage has increased at more than twice the rate that the average jockey riding fee increased over the

same period.

(4) The riding fee should be increased at least as much on a percentage basis as the state minimum wage, so that the average full-time jockey can earn an income sufficient to provide for the basic necessities of life.

- (b) (1) Effective January 1, 2008, the scale of minimum jockey riding fees for losing mounts established by the board shall be increased by ten dollars (\$10) per mount from the rate in effect on December 31, 2007, except that this increase shall not be applicable to the two highest fees on the scale. Effective January 1, 2010, the scale of minimum jockey riding fees for losing mounts established by the board shall be increased by ten dollars (\$10) per mount from the rate in effect on December 31, 2009. Effective January 1, 2012, the scale of minimum jockey riding fees for losing mounts established by the board shall be increased by ten dollars (\$10) per mount from the rate in effect on December 31, 2011, except the three lowest fees on the scale shall be increased by five dollars (\$5) per mount. Thereafter the scale of minimum jockey riding fees for losing mounts shall be increased whenever the state minimum wage is increased by the percentage of that increase.
- (2) Effective January 1, 2008, the minimum amount awarded to the jockey who finishes second or third in a race shall be increased by ten dollars (\$10) per race over the amount required to be paid on December 31, 2007. Effective January 1, 2010, the minimum amount awarded to the jockey who finishes second or third in a race shall be increased by ten dollars (\$10) over the amount required to be paid on December 31, 2009. Effective January 1, 2012, the minimum amount awarded to the jockey who finishes second or third in a race shall be increased by five dollars (\$5) over the amount required to be paid on December 31, 2011. This subdivision shall apply to races in which the purse is nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$9,999) or less.
- (c) No jockey shall be paid less than the minimum jockey riding fees established pursuant to this section.
- (d) Nothing in this section prohibits the board from increasing the minimum jockey riding fee above the minimum level required by this section.
- SEC. 2. Section 19619.7 is added to the Business and Professions Code, to read:
- 19619.7. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, no later than July 1, 2008, the board shall provide that the jockey who rides the horse that finishes in fourth place in a thoroughbred horse race shall be entitled to a reasonable riding fee, not to exceed 2 percent of the owner's share of

the purse, provided that the riding fee is no greater than that earned by the jockeys whose horses finish second and third in the same race.

SEC. 3. No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution because the only costs that may be incurred by a local agency or school district will be incurred because this act creates a new crime or infraction, eliminates a crime or infraction, or changes the penalty for a crime or infraction, within the meaning of Section 17556 of the Government Code, or changes the definition of a crime within the meaning of Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution.

STAFF ANALYSIS November 29, 2007

ISSUE: APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF CHURCHILL DOWNS TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVES COMPANY DBA TWINSPIRES.COM, BRISBET.COM, TSNBET.COM AND WINTICKET.COM JANUARY 1, 2008 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2009 AS AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB.

Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company dba Twinspires.com, Brisbet.com, Tsnbet.com and Winticket.com filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide ADW: January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009, 7 days a week, twenty-four hours per day with the exception of December 25th. Assembly Bill 765 (Evans) approved by the Governor on October 13, 2007 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

These include: (Excerpts taken from AB 765)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- 3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licused by the Board.
- 2. There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

Under AB 765

"The board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization . . . "

AB 765 defines

"Hub agreement" as a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. In the event a hub agreement exceeds a term of two years, then an ADW provider, one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing for the breed covered by the hub agreement, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed covered by the hub agreement shall be signatories to the hub agreement. A hub agreement is required for an ADW provider to receive contractual compensation for races conducted outside of California."

Pursuant to an agreement reached involving all ADW applicants and the TOC, an eight-month experiment that opens up thoroughbred racing to all ADW providers has been completed. The agreement began Wednesday November 7, 2007 with the opening of the Hollywood Park and Golden Gate Fields fall race meetings and continues through the closing day of the Hollywood Park spring-summer race meeting.

- CDI dba Twinspires.com, Brisbet.com, Tsnbet.com and Winticket.com will provide advance deposit wagering services, under the eight-month agreement, for the following:
 - Hollywood Park
 - Bay Meadows Racing Association
 - Golden Gate Fields
 - Santa Anita Park

Twinspires.com, Brisbet.com, Tsnbet.com and Winticket.com will also provide advance deposit wagering services for the following:

- Sacramento Harness Association at Cal Expo
- Del Mar Thoroughbred Club at Del Mar
- Los Alamitos Racing Association at Los Alamitos Race Course

The following items have not been submitted:

• Eight-Month Experiment Agreement between: TVG, Xpressbet, Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company dba TwinSpires.com Brisbet.com Twinbet.com, Winticket.com, and Youbet; Thoroughbred Owners of California and Hollywood Park, Bay Meadows, Golden Gate Fields, Santa Anita Park.

The following matters remain unsolved and will need to be completed before ADW wagers can be accepted:

- 1. Contractual Agreement with Labor Organization.
- 2. Hub Agreement.

In considering this application, it should be noted that Twinspires.com is a newly licensed Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) provider for the State of California that began taking ADW wagers from California residents on October 20, 2007. Staff has become aware of an issue concerning Twinspires.com. The California Horse Racing Information Management System (CHRIMS) has not reported Twinpisres.com ADW since CDI began accepting wagers. It should be noted that under Twinspires. Com's approval, Brisbet.com, Tsnbet.com and Winticket.com are also accepting ADW wagers. Subsequently CHRIMS information regarding wagers places on these platforms is missing as well. After contacting CHRIMS and Twinspires.com, the Board was informed that CHRIMS and Twinspires com representatives are working to resolve this issue. CHRIMS has informed staff that Twinspires.com has committed to sending CHRIMS required files. However, no data have been received. As a result, CHRIMS is unable to verify ADW activity on CDI's ADW platforms. B&P Code 19604 (b) provides in part, that ADW providers shall provide a full accounting and verification of the source of wagers thereby made, including the zone and breed, in the form of a daily download to pari-mutuel data to a database designed by the Board. CHRB Rule 2072, Approval to Conduct Advance Deposit Wagering by an Out-of-State Applicant also specifies that applicants that accept wagers from California residents shall provide a full accounting and verification of the source of the wagers, and a detailed wagering information file that includes, but is not limited to, dollar amount wagered, pool on which the wager was placed, race number and racing venue, zone, breed, zip code of the Account Holder, time wagering stopped, and time of the wager in the form of a daily download of pari-mutuel data to the Board designated database, California Horse Racing Information Management System, that is compatible with a Comma Delimited Text File.

Currently, CHRIMS is providing ADW wagering information only for XpressBet, YouBet.com and TVG.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board hear from the applicant concerning the status of unresolved matters.

Application is made to the CHRB for approval to conduct Advance Deposit Wagering in accordance with the California Business and Professions (B&P) Code and CHRB Rules and Regulations (Rule) and the provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act, 15 U.S.C. 3001 to 3007.

NOTICE – By submitting the Application the out-of-state Applicant consents to the jurisdiction of California courts and the application of California law as to all California wagers and operations.

Application must be filed not later than 90 days in advance of the date scheduled to conduct Advance Deposit Wagering and must be accompanied by a bond from a surety company admitted in the state of California or other form of financial security in the amount of \$500,000.

STAFF ANALYSIS November 29, 2007

ISSUE: APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING OF ODS TECHNOLOGIES, L.P. D/B/A/ TVG JANUARY 1, 2008 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2009.

TVG filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering.

January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009, 364 days a year, approximately twenty-four hours a day. They have applied for a two-year license. Assembly Bill 765 (Evans) approved by the Governor on October 13, 2007 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

These include: (Excerpts taken from AB 765)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- 3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

Under AB 765

"The board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization . . . "

AB 765 Defines

""Hub agreement" as a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. In the event a hub agreement exceeds a term of two years, then an ADW provider, one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing for the breed covered by the hub agreement, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed covered by the hub agreement shall be signatories to the hub agreement. A hub agreement is required for an ADW provider to receive contractual compensation for races conducted outside of California."

Pursuant to an agreement reached involving all ADW applicants and the TOC an eight-month experiment that opens up thoroughbred racing to all ADW providers has been completed. The agreement began Wednesday November 7, 2007 with the opening of the Hollywood Park and Golden Gate Fields fall race meetings and continues through the closing day of the Hollywood Park spring-summer race meeting.

 - Hollywood Park
 - Bay Meadows Racing Association
 - Golden Gate Fields
 - Santa Anita Park

TVG will also provide advance deposit wagering services for the following:

- Del Mar Thoroughbred Club at Del Mar
- Los Angeles County Fair at Fairplex
- Los Alamitos Racing Association at Los Alamitos Race Course
- Oak Tree Racing Association at Santa Anita Park

The following items have not been submitted:

• Eight-Month Experiment Agreement between: TVG, Xpressbet, Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company dba TwinSpires.com Brisbet.com Twinbet.com, Winticket.com, and Youbet; Thoroughbred Owners of California and Hollywood Park, Bay Meadows, Golden Gate Fields, Santa Anita Park.

The following matters remain unsolved and will need to be completed before ADW wagers can be accepted:

- 1. Contractual Agreement with Labor Organization.
- 2. Hub Agreement.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board hear from the applicant concerning the status of unresolved matters.

APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADW OF YOUBET JANUARY 1, 2008 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2009 AS AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB.

Youbet filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering.

January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009, 7 days a week, approximately 8:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Pacific Time. They have applied for a two-year license. Assembly Bill 765 (Evans) approved by the Governor on October 13, 2007 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

These include: (Excerpts taken from AB 765)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- 3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

Under AB 765

"The board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization . . . "

AB 765 Defines

"Hub agreement" as a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. In the event a hub agreement exceeds a term of two years, then an ADW provider, one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing for the breed covered by the hub agreement, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed covered by the hub agreement shall be signatories to the hub agreement. A hub agreement is required for an ADW provider to receive contractual compensation for races conducted outside of California."

Pursuant to an agreement reached involving all ADW applicants and the TOC an eight-month experiment that opens up thoroughbred racing to all ADW providers has been completed. STAFF ANALYSIS November 29, 2007

ISSUE: APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING FOR XPRESSBET, INC., JANUARY 1, 2008 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2009.

XpressBet filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering. They are currently licensed through December 31, 2007 as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering.

• January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009, during all times races are run which could be up to twenty-four hours a day. They have applied for a two-year license. Assembly Bill 765 (Evans) approved by the Governor on October 13, 2007 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

These include: (Excerpts taken from AB 765)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- 3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.

No ADW provider may accept wagers on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- 2. There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

Under AB 765

"The board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization . . . "

AB 765 Defines

""Hub agreement" as a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. In the event a hub agreement exceeds a term of two years, then an ADW provider, one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing for the breed covered by the hub agreement, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed covered by the hub agreement shall be signatories to the hub agreement. A hub agreement is required for an ADW provider to receive contractual compensation for races conducted outside of California."

Pursuant to an agreement reached involving all ADW applicants and the TOC an eight-month experiment that opens up thoroughbred racing to all ADW providers has been completed. The agreement began Wednesday November 7, 2007 with the opening of the Hollywood Park and Golden Gate Fields fall race meetings and continues through the closing day of the Hollywood Park spring-summer race meeting.

 In respect of internet and telephone account wagering, the Applicant will accept the following types of deposits: cash deposits made directly, personal checks, cashier's checks, money orders made directly or mailed, debits to an Account Holder's credit card or debit card, and wire and other electronic transfers from a monetary account controlled by Account Holder.

In respect of accounts opened in connection with wagers placed through the Applicant's SWMs, the Applicant will accept cash, cashiers checks, money orders and any other certified forms of funds for deposit in person at Santa Anita or Golden Gate Fields. Personal checks, wire transfers and credit cards may not be used for deposits to SWM accounts.

For purposes of internet and telephone account wagering, customers will not be charged a monthly membership or wagering fee or a per-call or wager

transaction fee. However, customers may be charged a value added transaction fee of \$0.25 per telephone call when dealing with a live teller. Processing fees may be charged in respect of deposits made pursuant to Item 5B above, via credit card cash advance or wire transfers.

To the extent credit cards are used/permitted to be used in connection with internet and telephone account wagering, processing fees for credit card cash advances will be no greater than 6%. High value customers may not be subject to credit card cash advance processing fees.

A wire transfer of less than \$250.00 is subject to a \$5 processing fee. A wire transfer of greater than \$250.00 is not subject to any charge.

Customers requesting special delivery (e.g. courier) may be charged the cost of those services.

None of the aforementioned fees and/or charges will be charged in respect of accounts opened in connection with wagers placed through the Applicant's SWMs because none of the services set forth above will be offered for funding an account opened in connection with wagering through the Applicant's SWMs.

As the distribution platforms evolve and future enhancements deliver increased functionality to customers, monthly fees or surcharges may be implemented for added value services.
