

STAFF ANALYSIS LICENSE AMENDMENT

REGULAR BOARD MEETING OCTOBER 6, 2005

Background:

At the August 2005 Board meeting the license application for the upcoming Pacific Racing Association meet was approved. Prior to the completion of the race dates process for 2006, the license contained the dates October 19, 2005 through January 29, 2006. However, during the 2006 dates allocation and approval process, the 2006 race dates for Bay Meadows and Pacific Racing were reversed causing Bay Meadows to commence their 2006 racing year on December 26, 2005 thus overlapping the dates in the prior Pacific Racing application.

Therefore, in order to adjust for the recently approved dates schedule, the license approved in August must be revisited so that Pacific Racing's race dates for the upcoming meet can be amended to October 19, 2005 through December 19, 2005.

Recommendation:

STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED ADDITION OF EMERGENCY RULE 1920.1 HEIGHTENED SURVEILLANCE

Regular Board Meeting October 6, 2005

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19440 states The Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of Horse Racing Law. Responsibilities of the Board shall include, but not be limited to, adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19580 provides that the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in California. The ad hoc medication committee (committee) has concluded that abnormal changes in some horses' winning patterns, unusually high winning percentages, and routine drug test results near a prohibited level, were resulting in at least the perception that some horses are receiving medications or other treatments that are prohibited by California Horse Racing Law. However, such horses often do not test positive in post-race blood or urine tests. committee felt the unusual patterns were causing the perception of an uneven playing field, and were contributing to the decline in attendance and wagering on horse racing. To immediately address the perception of unfairness and halt the decline in on-track attendance and wagering on horse races the committee proposed to add, as an emergency regulation, Rule 1920.1, Heightened Surveillance.

ANALYSIS

Rule 1920.1 provides that any horse, stable or trainer that is on the premises, as defined by Rule 1420(q), shall, in the sole and absolute discretion of the Board, be subject to heightened surveillance during the period of ten days immediately preceding, and during any race meeting. Heightened surveillance may include, but is not limited to: observation by Board staff, stewards or persons affiliated with or retained by the racing association; requiring any horse to be stabled in a stall that is better situated for monitoring by enforcement staff; requiring any horse to be stabled in a stall that has within it monitoring device(s), including, but not limited to, audio, video, or any other means determined by the Board, and any or all persons or devices utilized for the purposes may use recording devices in connection with such surveillance; having the horse stabled in a stall which has on-premises security; or requiring a horse to be placed in a detention area designated by the Board. An owner, trainer, or any person having control of a horse, who refuses to permit the horse to be placed under

heightened surveillance may be barred from the premises, fined, suspended, or otherwise disciplined by the Board.

The committee determined that Rule 1920.1 should be submitted to the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) as an emergency regulation. This requires that the Board adopt the regulation as an emergency, and reduces the OAL review period from 30 working days to 10 calendar days. If OAL agrees with the Finding of Emergency the regulation becomes effective upon filing with the Secretary of State, but must be followed within 120 days of the effective date by a "certificate of compliance" that certifies the Board completed the regular rulemaking process for Rule 1920.1. The emergency regulation is no longer effective if the regular rulemaking process is not completed within 120 days.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board adopt the emergency regulation as presented.

detention area designated by the Board.

(b) Any owner, or trainer, or other person responsible for a horse who refuses to

subject any horse under his ownership or care to such heightened surveillance may be barred

from the premises, fined, suspended, or otherwise disciplined by the Board as the Board deems

appropriate.

STAFF ANALYSIS PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1977. PICK THREE

Regular Board Meeting October 6, 2005

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to adopt rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing. B&P Code Section 19590 provides that the Board shall adopt rules governing, permitting, and regulating pari-mutuel wagering on horse races under the system known as the pari-mutuel method of wagering. At the February 2005 Pari-Mutuel Operations Committee meeting a proposal to amend Rule 1977, Pick Three, was heard. The proposed amendment was based on recommendations made by the National Thoroughbred Racing Association (NTRA) Players Panel (Panel), an advisory body charged with making policy recommendations of importance to bettors. The NTRA Panel recommended the Pick Three be amended to eliminate the practice of substituting the off-time favorite for a horse that is scratched, excused or determined by the stewards to be a nonstarter in a race constituting the Pick Three wager. The Panel argued substituting the off-time favorite was unfair to persons placing wagers, as such persons were often wagering against the favorite. The proposed amendment of Rule 1977 was heard for adoption at the September 2005 Regular Board Meeting, but was continued to another meeting.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment of Rule 1977 eliminates the practice of substituting the off-time favorite for a horse scratched from any leg of the Pick Three prior to the running of the first leg. Instead, all wagers containing such horse(s) shall be refunded. If a horse is scratched from the second leg after the start of the first leg, or from the third leg, after the start of the second leg, a consolation payout is paid to holders of tickets that combine the winners of the completed legs and the scratched wagering interest(s). In addition, a consolation payout is provided if wagering interests are scratched from the second and third leg of the Pick Three after the start of the first leg.

RECOMMENDATION

No comments were received during the 45-day public comment period. Staff recommends the Board adopt the proposed amendment to Rule 1977 as presented.

CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD TITLE 4. CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS ARTICLE 18. PARI-MUTUEL WAGERING PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF RULE 1977. PICK THREE

1977. Pick Three.

- (a) The Pick Three is a separate pari-mutuel pool established on three (3) consecutive races. The pool consists of amounts wagered on the winning horse in each of the races. It is not a parlay and has no connection with or relation to other pools conducted by the association, except for the provisions in subsection (h), or to rules governing the distribution of other pools.
- (b) A valid Pick Three ticket shall be evidence of a binding contract between the holder of the ticket and the association and shall constitute an acceptance of Pick Three provisions and rules contained in this Aarticle.
- (c) A wager on a coupled entry or field is considered a wager on the remaining part of the coupled entry or field if any part of such entry starts for pari_mutuel purposes in accordance with Rule 1974.
- (d) The association shall distribute the net pool to holders of valid tickets that correctly selected the winners in all three (3) races.
- (e) In a dead heat for win between two (2) or more horses in any of the Pick Three races, all such horses shall be considered winning horses in that race for calculating the pool. The payout shall reflect the proportionate amount of money wagered on each winning combination.

- (f) If no ticket selected the winner in all three (3) races, the net pool shall be paid for tickets that selected the winner in any two (2) races; and if no ticket selected two (2) winners the net pool shall be paid for tickets that selected the winner of any one (1) race. The association shall refund the entire pool if no ticket selected the winner of any one (1) race.
- (g) If one (1) of the races is cancelled, the net pool shall be distributed as provided in subsection (f). If more than one (1) race is cancelled the association shall refund the entire pool.
- (h) A ticket designating a selection that was scratched, excused or determined by the Stewards to be a nonstarter in the race, shall have the favorite, which is determined by the amounts wagered in the win pool at the time of the start of the race, substituted for the nonstarting selection for all purposes. If a wagering interest is scratched (which hereinafter includes being declared a non-starter) from any leg of the Pick Three prior to the running of the first leg, all wagers containing such scratched wagering interests shall be refunded.
- (i) If a wagering interest is scratched from the second leg after the start of the first leg, a consolation payout shall be computed for those wagers combining the winners of the first and third legs with such scratched horse(s) as follows: The amount represented by wagers on combinations involving horse(s) scratched from the second leg shall be deducted from the gross pool. The resulting pool, net of takeout, shall be distributed as a win pool among tickets combining the winners of the first and third legs with horse(s) scratched from the second leg.
- (j) If a wagering interest is scratched from the third leg after the start of the second leg, a consolation payout shall be computed for those wagers combining the winners of the first and second legs with such scratched horse(s) as follows: The amount represented by wagers on

combinations involving horse(s) scratched from the third leg shall be deducted from the gross

pool. The resulting pool, net of takeout, shall be distributed as a win pool among tickets

combining the winners of the first and second legs with horse(s) scratched from the third leg.

(k) If wagering interests are scratched from both the second and third legs after the start of

the first leg, a consolation payout shall be computed for those wagers combining the winner of

the first leg with horse(s) scratched from both the second and third legs as follows: The

amount wagered on the winner of the first leg combined with all other horse(s) scratched from

the second and third legs shall be deducted from the gross pool. The resulting pool, net of

takeout, shall be distributed as a win pool among tickets combining the winner of the first leg

with horse(s) scratched from both the second and third legs.

(l) After wagering closes on the first race of the Pick Three no ticket shall be sold,

exchanged or cancelled. No person shall disclose the number of tickets sold in the Pick Three

races or the number or amount of tickets that selected winners of Pick Three races until the

Sstewards declare the last race official. After the second of the three (3) races, the association

may display potential distributions dependent upon the outcome of the third race.

STAFF ANALYSIS REPORT BY SCIENTIFIC GAMES ON NET POOL PRICING

REGULAR BOARD MEETING OCTOBER 6, 2005

Background:

When California racing associations conduct their race meets they are currently using two takeout rates: one for WPS and one for Exotic wagers (by law, each breed of racing has different takeout rates, but only two rates: WPS and Exotics). Jurisdictions outside of California that wish to participate in our pools by commingling their wagers into the California pools use our takeout rates (not theirs) when commingling in our pools. Similarly, when California associations offer wagers on out-of-state races to their patrons, those wagers are subject to the takeout rates in the out-of-state jurisdiction. Generally speaking, California takeout rates are some of the lowest in North America thus making our pools attractive to some big bettors who are sensitive about such differences.

Paragraph "c" of Section 19602 of the Business and Professions Code is included with this item. It requires out-of-state jurisdictions to use the California takeout when commingling into our pools. However, paragraph "c" does permit the Board to allow the out of state jurisdiction to use their particular takeout rates if their law does not allow it to use ours AND the Board "determines it to be in the public interest of this state to do so".

For several years now, some out-of-state wagering networks have been offering Net Pool Pricing (NPP). This simply means that the totalizator system uses software that allows the system to operate with multiple takeout rates. Thus a commingled pool with several jurisdictions placing wagers into the pool can allow each jurisdiction to use their own unique takeout rates thereby increasing the complexity of the pari-mutuel calculation. The first and most obvious result is that jurisdictions with higher takeouts contribute less to the net pool and therefore winning wagers from that jurisdiction are paid less when the pool is calculated.

Also noteworthy is that NPP can allow for the use of different currencies. Thus the considerable interest by Canadian tracks and Magna tracks to have their tote supplier (Scientific Games Racing - SGR) implement NPP in California so that they can commingle wagers and adjust not only for the multiple takeout rates in Canada but also the currency exchange rate. Of course, once the Canadian tracks have been digested into the California system it is only a matter of time before other states and countries can also request to be included in our pools using their own takeout rates and/or unique currency exchange rates.

Included with this item is information regarding many aspects of NPP provided by Magna and their Canadian partner, Woodbine. Of note is a page of "Frequently Asked Questions" about NPP and also a rather hair-raising example of a NPP calculation.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board hear from Scientific Games Racing regarding this matter.

- (2) A thoroughbred association that hosts the series of races known as the "Breeder's Cup" shall not be required to pay to the state the license fees required pursuant to paragraph (1). Amounts received by the association from out-of-state betting systems as wagers on Breeder's Cup races shall distributed as follows: 50 percent as commissions to the association that conducts the racing meeting, and 50 percent as purses to the horsemen participating in the meeting.
- (c) With the permission of the board, wagers accepted by betting systems located outside of this state may be, but are not required to be, included in the parimutuel pool of the association that conducts the racing meeting in this state. If the wagers accepted by betting systems located outside of this state are included in the parimutuel pool of the association that conducts the racing meeting in this state, the betting system located outside of this state shall, if permissible under applicable law, deduct from the total amount handled in each conventional and exotic parimutuel pool the same total percentages deducted pursuant to Article 9.5 (commencing with Section 19610) by the association that conducts the racing meeting in this state. Net Pool Pricing

Introduction

The 30% withholding tax on foreign winning pari-mutuel wagers was eliminated by the U.S. to enable the large amount of money wagered outside the country to be commingled. For further expansion to occur, one of the requirements is to change to the tote calculating package that is most commonly used in the United States. This upgrade to NPP (Net Pool Pricing) enables U.S. tracks to deal with foreign tax rates and currency values.

This pricing package accomplishes this by commingling Net Pools (subtracting association retention and taxes from the gross pool) as opposed to commingling the Gross Pools. This not only overcomes the barriers indicated with the standard pricing calculation, but it is arguably a more accurate method of calculation. This may result in slightly different pricing results for the Place and Show pools particularly in situations where one of the horses on the board has been bet down significantly.

Net Pool Pricing allows each jurisdiction participating in the pool to offer different retention rates (also known as takeout rates) than the host track should they choose or be regulated to do so. For example, if a participant chooses to use a higher takeout than the host track, they will have proportionately less weighting in the commingled pool than wagers with a lower takeout rate. Therefore, jurisdictions using a higher retention offer a lower payout to their customers and the remainder of the network is not affected. This also would work the other way should the participant use a lower takeout, and their respective prices would be higher than the host track. Any changes to these takeout rates would likely be subject to the host track and possibly regulatory approvals.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why do I need to change to Net Pool Pricing in order to commingle wagers from Canada?

Since some countries such as Canada have different legal deductions, takeouts, breaks and currency, Net Pool Pricing is needed to combine their wagers and accurately calculate prices throughout the network.

❖ Will changing to Net Pool Pricing affect the way prices are calculated?

Yes, the algorithm used to calculate the prices is different under Net Pool Pricing. You should see little to no changes in prices under single priced pools such as Win, Ex,& Tri. Long shots tend to pay a little more and favourites tend to pay a little less in multi-priced pools such as Place and Show. However, amount paid out to the public is relatively the same.

❖ Why can't I hand calculate the prices from the pool values on the tote board?

> Since Net Pool Pricing uses a complex algorithm to calculate the prices there are many other variables that affect the calculation of the price which are not displayed on the tote board.

Why do some jurisdictions display different prices than the host track?

➤ If a jurisdiction chooses to or is required to use different takeout rates and or breakage, prices at that jurisdiction will vary from the host. Jurisdictions using a higher takeout rate, will be displaying lower prices than the host.

Has Net Pool Pricing Been Proven to Work?

Yes, Canadian racetracks have been using Net Pool Pricing since the Breeder's Cup was hosted by Woodbine in 1996. Customers betting on Woodbine in the U.S. have already been exposed to this calculation method. Many states have since adopted Net Pool Pricing in their regulations including the RCI Model Rules.

Is Net Pool Pricing more susceptible to minus pools?

Due to the nature of the algorithm used in Net Pool Pricing on a split pool such as Place or Show, a heavy favourite will not drive the value down on the remaining runners as much as it does using the standard pricing method. This may result in the favourite paying \$2.10 and the other horses paying more which is more favourable to the betting public. The negative break is then attributed to the wager and that association who bet down the favourite.

How can pools from two different currencies be merged together?

Net Pool Pricing allows for pools in different currencies to be merged together by applying a daily exchange rate before the foreign currency enters the pools and again to the prices before being paid to the public.

RCI Model Rules of Racing

Net Pool Pricing is also defined in the RCI model rules and gives the following examples of how Net Pool Pricing differs from Gross Pool Pricing on the Win pool and Show pool. Note that the SHW pool's prices differ slightly from the two calculation methods. Spreadsheets illustrating how NPP is used in a multi-commission environment are also available upon request:

Arlington Park has adopted the **net pool method** of pricing to allow race fans in Canada and, prospectively, other countries to wager into Arlington Park mutuel pools. As international wagering becomes more prevalent, other racetracks will move to net pool pricing, and Arlington Park is proud to be one of the first Thoroughbred tracks to do so.

While allowing for potentially larger pools, prices on pools with multiple winners (place and show, or any pool with a dead-heat) may calculate to a slightly different payout than under standard pricing. The favorites may pay a little less, and the long shots a little more, but in all cases the total amount of monies paid out to the wagering public remains the same.

An Explanation of Net-Pool Pricing:

Historically, prices on pari-mutuel races have been calculated by dividing the GROSS amount of winning bets by the net pool. The net pool is the total amount of wagers reduced by the commission rate, or take-out. This process returns a fair price provided all wagers were made using the same take out. Not all international jurisdictions, however, are allowed by local law to wager into U.S. pools using the local take-out rates, and must use the standard take-out rate for their locality. They have, therefore, been forbidden from wagering into our pools.

To accommodate multiple take-out rates, the Net-Pool pricing model was established in approximately 1995. Under the Net-Pool pricing model, the payouts are calculated by dividing NET amount of winning bets, (rather than the GROSS amount as in Standard Pricing) by the net pool. Each locality then multiplies the payout by the compliment of the commission rate (1-commission rate) to arrive at the local payout.

This process weights each wager according to the local commission rate, as the higher the local commission rate (take-out), the lower the local price. For example, \$100 bet at 17-percent commission is worth \$83, and \$100 bet at 18-percent commission is worth \$82. The payout at the locality with a 17-percent commission rate will therefore be slightly higher than the payout at the locality with an 18-percent commission rate.

Place and Show Pools:

For most pools and payouts, if all localities were using the same take-out rate, the prices would be identical under both the Standard and Net-Pool pricing models. But in any multiple winning runner pool (Place and Show and any other pool in which a dead-heat creates two or more different payouts), the Net-Pool model distributes the same amount of winnings slightly differently. This is a function of allocating the profits to the different winners based on their NET winnings rather than their GROSS winnings. The total amount of monies paid out will not change, but the

net effect, in these cases, is that the favorites will pay a little less, while long shots will pay a little more.


\$2.10 Payouts and Minus Pools:

Fans will notice that show pools with a heavy favorite that you would expect to return \$2.10 for all three runners, now may now pay significantly higher on the two non-favorite horses. This is because that even though the payout on the favorite is reduced to a number even farther below the minimum \$2.10 payout, it still must return \$2.10. But the other horses are not participating in the minus pool as they were under the Standard Pricing model.


Calculating Projected Payouts using Tote Board Information:


One of the results of the Net Pool pricing model is that one can no longer accurately calculate the payouts using only the information available on the tote board. This is true for all pools, including the Win pool. The reason for this is one needs to know the commission rate of the wagers on each runner in each pool to determine the true NET pool and NET winning wagers. (The tote odds continue to be accurate, as the tote has all of the necessary information to properly calculate and display the current odds / payouts.

Introduction

Woodbine Entertainment Group on behalf of Racetracks of Canada proposes to wager on Santa Anita and the other Southern California tracks on a commingled pool basis. In order for Canada to join these pools, the host track must operate using Net Pool Pricing (NPP). This is a requirement primarily to facilitate the different tax structures currently in place throughout the provinces in Canada.

Common Pool Experience

Common pool with US tracks has gone over quite well so far from both an operation standpoint as well as a business volume standpoint. We have seen a \$900,000 increase in handle on the Chicago harness tracks since we have gone to US common pool wagering with them. This is from increases in year over year handle, races we can offer per card, and number of cards taken.

Arlington Park, our largest thoroughbred racetrack operating in a commingled environment thus far has seen a handle increase of 17% or \$1.3 million over last year since we started on August 10. It is even more impressive because we were down about 4% prior to August 10. We are prepared to start with Keeneland on October 7 and anticipate similar results.


