Safety First!

- Talk to children about not responding to offensive or dangerous e-mail, chat, or other communications. Report any such communications to local law enforcement. Do not delete the offensive or dangerous e-mail; turn off the monitor, and contact local law enforcement.
- Keep the computer in the family room or another open area of your home and be aware of other computers your child may be using.
- Get infomed about computers and the Internet.
- Have children show you what they can do online and visit their favorite sites.

vou chat online?

 Know who your children are exchanging e-mail with, and only let them use chat areas where you can supervise. NetSmartz recommends limiting chatroom access to child-friendly chat sites.

- Limit the use of blogs and web pages.
- Internet accounts should be in the parent's name with parents having the primary screen name, controlling passwords, and using blocking and/or filtering devices.
- Children should not complete a profile for a service provider and children's screen names should be nondescript so as not to identify that the user is a child.

Project Safe Childhood is an initiative aimed at preventing the abuse and exploitation of children though the Internet.

Why should we be alarmed?

As pedophiles become desensitized to the horrors contained in the images, the images are increasingly becoming more violent and graphic and often with extremely young children. The internet has provided a source of validation and encouragement for collectors of child pornography. This trend is also increasing an offender's interest into the production of child pornography and child molestation. With digital cameras, computers and the internet, this has become an easy industry in which to participate. The measures taken to this point have not done enough to lessen this form of child molestation. It is now nothing short of an epidemic.

Did you know?

According to a study done at Butner Federal Correction Complex, 79.6% of 54 offenders convicted of child pornography offenses admitted that they had molested significant numbers of children without detection. On average, the offenders had 26.37 child victims and offenders admitted to

over 1,424+ sexual crimes. Only 53 crimes were detected or known at sentencing.*
