INFORMATION:

The Roseville Police Department was inspected by the Placer County Juvenile Justice/Delinquency Prevention Commission on August 3, 2011. The purpose of the inspection is to insure that the Roseville Police Department is in compliance with the policies outlines in Title 15, Article 14 of the California Code of Regulations. The team was met by Carter Christiansen, Corrections Supervisor. Mr. Christiansen was very polite and accommodating to the needs of the commission as to the inspection of the jail and department.

Juveniles who are detained by Roseville PD are taken to the Roseville Jail located at the Roseville Police Department. If a juvenile is booked by the Roseville Police Department they are detained only until cited and released to a parent or guardian. If a juvenile is going to be booked into the Juvenile Detention Facility they are taken straight to the Detention Facility and do not go to the Roseville Jail.

When a juvenile is taken into the Roseville Jail they are given an orientation upon arrival. Depending on the circumstances, juveniles are rarely handcuffed or in a locked cell. The booking process takes approximately ten to fifteen minutes and juveniles are never out of visual contact with the booking officer. Juveniles are kept secluded from adult inmates at all times. Upon request, juveniles have access to restroom facilities and water and food when requested.

After the juvenile is booked the officer escorts him or her to the Report Writing Room or the Community Service Officer facility located in the police department to wait to be released to a parent or guardian. Juveniles are under constant supervision while in all parts of the facility.

All records were readily available to the commission. Roseville Police Department Booked 200 juveniles from July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011.

The facility was found to be clean, safe and secure.

The Placer County Juvenile Justice/Delinquency Prevention Commission finds that Roseville Police Department is in compliance with Title 15, Article 14 of the California Code of Regulations.
