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COMMANDER'S CORNER

From a research perspective, USAMRU-E is currently in transition. In the nearly two-and-one-half years that I have been in command, our focus has been on developing tools to effectively screen Soldiers for psychological symptoms. The hard work of our team coupled with the excellent support from the Europe Regional Medical Command has produced screening research products that have impacted the entire Department of Defense. In terms of research, however, our unit is now focusing on evaluating the efficacy of interventions to assist Soldiers in their transition from combat to home. These interventions include critical incident stress debriefing, reintegration education, and combat-event disclosure through writing. Intervention studies are difficult and typically require large teams (see the Fort Carson writeup in this report); nonetheless, we owe it to Soldiers to find scientifically-based ways to help with the reintegration. USAMRU-E looks forward to the new research challenges.

Study Assesses Combat-to-Home Transition Training

Study Design

Scientists from the USAMRU-E and Department of Military Psychiatry, WRAIR, joined forces to find out what kinds of reintegration training combat Soldiers find useful. Platoons from a Brigade Combat Team that spent a year in Iraq were randomly assigned to one of three different kinds of training during their first week home at a large military base in the U.S. The hour-long training sessions included one of the following:

- (1) a traditional medical brief about symptoms related to postdeployment stress;
- (2) a brief about adapting combat skills to the home environment; or
- (3) a debriefing session in which Soldiers were guided through an interactive discussion of their combat experiences with a focus on identifying transition issues.

More than 50 platoons were included in the training, and more than 2,500 Soldiers were surveyed both before and after the transition training session. Surveys to be administered this Fall will assess which kinds of training were most effective.

The study is a follow-up to a deployment transition study conducted with a Brigade deployed on a six-month peacekeeping mission to Kosovo in 2002. Results from that study demonstrated that Soldiers preferred interactive training but the level of exposure to potentially traumatic events was negligible in comparison to the level encountered by Soldiers deployed to Iraq.

Combined Effort Across Labs

The data collection was conducted at Fort Carson in Colorado Springs, Colorado, from 20 JUL to 10 AUG 05 (see photo of research team below). USAMRU-E team members

WRAIR, also conducted an on-site visit to review the study. The entire study was conducted under WRAIR protocol #862 and amendments covering changes related to this data collection (10 JUN 05, 27 JUN 05, 8 JUL 05, 19 JUL 05) were approved by the WRAIR Office of Research Management.

Future Research on Transition Training

Initial results from the study were briefed back to COL (P) Terry A. Wolff, Deputy Commander, 7th ID, and MAJ Joel Tanaka, Division Surgeon, 7th ID, where approval for follow-up transition training and surveys was obtained. This Fall, the same study will be conducted with another Battalion returning from a year in Iraq at Fort Riley, Kansas. The transition training study initiated this summer assures that Soldiers provide feedback into the development of what may become a standardized method of reintegration training.

Psychological Screening Update


Consulting with the US Army, Europe
