### TRANSFORMATION STUDY HITS FULL SPEED

Transformation study results on the Army communities that closed in Germany in 2013 were briefed by LTC Thomas and MAI Wood (study lead) to Ms. Marin, Director, Installation Management Command, Europe (26 JUN 2014). The closing communities included Heidelberg/Mannheim, Schweinfurt, and Bamberg. Findings included actions leaders could take to help community members adapt to transformation challenges. Specifically, actions such as providing information about closure and actively demonstrating concern for community members were associated with fewer sleep and psychological problems in community members. In addition, community cohesion and support from local Army services were also associat-

ed with fewer sleep and depression problems, less anxiety and anger reported by Soldiers, Family members and Army civilians.

The Transformation study focus has now shifted to military communities increasing in size, including Kaiserslautern and Wiesbaden. These gaining communities potentially experience issues such as lack of

space or lack of medical appointment availability. Numerous data collections took place in the Kaiserslautern area throughout the quarter, with over 80 surveys collected from Soldiers and more than 100 surveys distributed to Spouses at the Military Child Fair (see photo above) at Pulaski Barracks (Ms. Salvi, SPC Lee; 26 APR 14).

In June, MAJ Wood, along with Ms. Salvi, Ms. Eckford, and Mr. Rahey, proctored surveys with various units in the Wiesbaden community, yielding 345 Soldier, 9 Spouse and 92 Civilian surveys collected. Key leader and focus groups were also conducted. Data collection with this community is ongoing.



# WRAIR FORWARD



### **Data Collection Timeline**



The post-deployment phase of the 2CR Behavioral Health Leadership study progressed this quarter. In April, Dr. Adler (study lead) and LTC Thomas, along with the USAMUR-E team (Ms. Eckford, Ms. Kreilein, Ms. Stephens, SPC Thomas, and SPC Lee), returned to Vilseck (21-25 APR 14), and collected reintegration survey data (Time 3) from nearly 3,000 Soldiers returning from deployment to Afghanistan. Dr. Adler and LTC Thomas met with COL Sims, 2CR Commander, to update him on the study (24 APR 14). Additional assistance with survey processing was provided by Mr. Kim and Mr. Kok from the Military Psychiatry Branch at WRAIR (26 APR-10 MAY 14).

The 4-month post-deployment phase of the study (T4) kicked off when Dr. Adler, LTC Thomas, Ms. Kreilein, Ms. Stephens, and SPC Thomas, returned to administer the final survey with one of the Squadrons that had returned early from deployment (2-5 JUN 14; Vilseck). More than 550 surveys were collected during this final iteration. The team will conduct the final survey with the remainder of the brigade in July.

Dr. Adler provided COL Sims with a brief on T1 and T2 findings (22 MAY 14) and discussed these results with him on 18 JUN 14; CPT Saboe, Military Psychiatry Branch, served as lead data analyst.

### **NATO CONFERENCE**



Dr. Adler delivered a keynote/invited address at the NATO Force Health Protection conference (23-24 JUN 14; Budapest, Hungary). The presentation was entitled "Promoting Psychological Resilience in the Military: An Occupational Health

Perspective." The presentation highlighted the importance of considering the military cultural context for understanding and improving Service Member behavioral health.

## INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH DOWN UNDER



Dr. Adler served as the US representative at The Technical Cooperation Panel (TTCP), Technical Panel 13, Mental Health and Operational Effectiveness, annual meeting (7-11 APR 14; Sydney, Australia). During the meeting, Dr. Adler and other TP-13 members addressed a meeting of senior Australian Defence Force policy mak-

ers, researchers, and clinicians regarding emerging priorities and findings.
