970 people honored for more than five years of volunteer Election Day service

Secretary of the State Susan Bysiewicz today honored 970 Election Day poll workers with five or more years of experience with Public Service Awards in a ceremony at Central Connecticut State University in New Britain. Today's ceremony honored those poll workers who reside in the Fifth Congressional District.
