Remarks of Judge Patrick L. Carroll III New Britain Bar Association Thursday, March 20, 2014

I am proud to say that the Judicial Branch has devoted considerable time to collect your input as part of the strategic plan process implemented by the Chief Justice seven years ago.

In fact, collaboration was one of five outcome goals identified in the strategic plan. A very effective tool of achieving this goal has been hundreds of Branchsponsored focus groups, many of which have included attorneys. And I can assure you that we will continue to reach out to the bar as we move into the second phase of the plan.
