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WHAT'S NEW?: AW2 Symposium 2009

The 2009 AW2 Symposium is quickly approaching. The Symposium is scheduled to be held in San Antonio, Texas, July 8-14, at the Grand Hyatt. AW2 conducts annual symposiums to identify and develop recommendations regarding issues which impact the health, recovery, rehabilitation, transition, and welfare of AW2 Soldiers, Family members, and caregivers. The Army has learned over the years that supporting the Family is essential to a Soldier's recovery and is illustrated in the Army's "Family Covenant."

AW2 is now accepting issue submissions and delegate applications from all AW2 Soldiers, Family members, and caregivers. This is your opportunity to influence and change policies, planning, and procedures related to warrior care and transition for severely wounded, injured, and ill Soldiers and their Families. Issues selected at previous symposiums have been brought to the attention of government, Army, and veterans' organizations resulting in positive changes and ongoing dialogue. There are many exciting events planned for this year's symposium. There will be opportunities to meet with veterans' service organizations and nonprofits that can help you and your family. Also, AW2 is teaming up with the National Military Family Association (NMFA) to host Operation Purple©—an urban adventure camp for children ages 6-17. Daycare will be provided for children under the age of six. Both daycare and Operation Purple© are provided at no cost and children's airfare will be paid by NMFA.

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WHAT'S NEW?: TRICARE Beneficiaries Have Access to DoD Self-Service Logon

The Department of Defense (DoD) Family member account to access the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) has a new name and the Web site has a new look. It is now called "DS Logon." A DoD Self-Service Logon—or "DS Logon"—is a secure credential issued to uniformed service members, spouses, and other family members 18 and older who are eligible for benefits in the DEERS system. It allows access to secure DoD web applications. A DS Logon electronically links a TRICARE beneficiary's identity to their medical records, pay and human resource systems, and allows them to access different web applications, such as the beneficiary web enrollment Web site at https://www.dmdc.osd.mil/appj/bwe/.

To create a DS Logon, sponsors may use their CAC or MyPay personal identification number (PIN) in the DS Logon Access Manager at https://www.dmdc.osd.mil/dsaccess. Sponsors may request a DS Logon for themselves or a Family member. A PIN will be mailed along with

instructions on how to activate the DS Logon. Family members can also request a DS Logon for themselves at a RAPIDS station when they are getting an identification card and the one-time PIN will be mailed to them. AW2 Soldiers and Family members have an advantage that the average job seeker does not—the AW2 Career and Education Section working on their behalf. Created in May 2008, the Career and Education Section works to expedite career and education opportunities for AW2 Soldiers and Families by removing the roadblocks. To date, nearly 400 AW2 Soldiers and Family members have been assisted by the Career and Education Section. AW2 Soldiers and Families now work for federal and private agencies, and many AW2 Soldiers have gone back to school to enhance their current or future careers.

Obtaining assistance from the AW2 Career and Education Section is easy. AW2 Soldiers and Family members may give their Advocate a copy of their resume and ask them to contact the Career and Education Section. An AW2 Career Coordinator will contact the AW2 Soldier and/or Family to start the process. The length of time it takes to obtain employment varies depending on the qualifications of the AW2 Soldier or Family Member, agencies' vacancies, and the economy—the right Soldier, the right time, and the right location. 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CAREERS: Ways to Explain Why You Haven't Worked in Years

One of the challenges for AW2 Soldiers and Family members wanting to return to work is explaining the time spent away from the job market. Recovering from wounds, injuries, and illness; or caring for someone with wounds, injuries, or illness takes longer than expected, sometimes years. But all is not lost. The best approach is to handle the employers' concerns upfront and honestly. The following tips from JobShop, Inc. will help Soldiers and Family members prepare for an interview.

- Don't dodge any issues. A potential employer has the right to be concerned about any lapse in employment. Most want to hire veterans.
- Don't be defensive. Even if a question seems insulting, don't get emotional. Answer the question truthfully and in a way that puts the employers' anxiety at ease.
- Don't apologize. If you were a stay-at-home mom or stayed at home to care for your Soldier, discuss your time away as a choice, not something you were forced into.
- Do be positive. Talk about the value of your time off as it relates to your job. Remember, you were learning a skill while you worked at home or pursued a personal goal while you cared for your Soldier.
- Do show commitment to working. Don't leave the impression you are testing the job market or this is a temporary lark for you. Be very open about your desire to work and your long-term goals.

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EDUCATION: Harvard University Financial Aid

Through the Harvard Financial Aid Initiative (HFAI), students from Families with less than \$60,000 who are accepted into Harvard under the regular application and admissions process will have no expected parent contribution for their education over four years. Additionally, Families that make less than \$80,000 will see their expected parent contributions significantly reduced. In order to benefit from the initiative, a student must apply to Harvard and for financial aid; if accepted, he or she will receive a financial aid package that meets the demonstrated need. Harvard does not look at whether or not a student can pay for college when they determine whether or not the student is accepted.

Harvard Financial Aid meets 100% of all Families' demonstrated need; for the 2008-2009 school year, need-based scholarships are expected to total over \$120 million. 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EDUCATION: Supportive Education for the Returning Veteran (SERV)

SERV is a new program at Cleveland State University (CSU) that is designed to assist military veterans with their transition from Soldier to civilian to student. Classes have been designed specifically for veterans to help them in that very important first year of college. 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EDUCATION: Crane Learning & Employment Center (CLEC)

The Crane Learning and Employment Center for Veterans with Disabilities has created a pilot program in association with the Naval Surface Warfare Center at Crane, IN. The pilot utilizes the Student Education Employment Program—a year-round program in which students may work full-time, part-time, or alternate work time with school time. The program provides work experience that is directly related to the student's academic program and career goals.

AW2 Soldiers interested in becoming part of the pilot must be an honorably discharged veteran or an active duty servicemember awaiting discharge; eligible for Chapter 31 VA Vocational Rehabilitation; willing to be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a degree-seeking student in an accredited two or four year college or university, graduate or professional school; and be willing to relocate to Southern Indiana, near Bloomington to start a new career.

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EDUCATION: Yellow Ribbon GI Education Enhancement Program

The Yellow Ribbon GI Education Enhancement Program (Yellow Ribbon Program) is a provision of the Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008. This program allows institutions of higher learning (degree granting institutions) in the United States to voluntarily enter into an agreement with VA to fund tuition expenses that exceed the highest public in-state undergraduate tuition rate. The institution can waive up to 50 percent of those expenses, and VA will match the same amount as the institution.

A college participating in the Yellow Ribbon Program, Robert Morris University (RMU) in Moon Township, PA, announced that it will give veterans free tuition for graduate and undergraduate degrees. With its newly created RMU Military Service Award, the private university will cover the difference between its full-time tuition and a federal tuition subsidy offered to veterans under the Post- 9/11 GI Bill. The offer is open to all veterans, not just Pennsylvania residents. The university is also opening a Veterans Education and Training Center to help veterans and their Families with transition services and to assist with enrollment. 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MONEY MATTERS: The Economic Recovery Payment

The new American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 included a one-time Economic Recovery Payment of \$250 to be made in 2009. If you are a retiree, disabled individual or a Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipient, you will receive your Economic Recovery Payment directly from the Social Security Administration. If you receive disabled veterans benefits, you will receive your Economic Recovery Payment from the Department of Veterans Affairs. If you receive Railroad Retirement benefits, you will receive your Economic Recovery Payment from the Railroad Retirement Board. VA estimates issue of payment should begin in

June 2009. You do not have to file a tax return to get your Economic Recovery Payment. For further information on this one-time Economic Recovery Payments please contact the agency that pays your benefit.

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MONEY MATTERS: Introduction to the Veterans' Aid and Attendance Special Pension By Dexter B. Friday Donations Program/Finance Support Specialist

The Veterans' Administration offers a Special Pension with Aid and Attendance (A&A) benefit that is largely unknown. This special pension (part of the VA Improved Pension program) allows for veterans and surviving spouses who require the regular attendance of another person to assist in eating, bathing, dressing, undressing, or using the restroom to receive additional monetary benefits. It also includes individuals who are blind or a patient in a nursing home because of mental or physical incapacity. Assisted care in an assisted living facility also qualifies.

This most important benefit is overlooked by many Families with veterans or surviving spouses who need additional monies to help care for ailing parents or loved ones. This is a "pension benefit" and is not dependent upon service-related injuries for compensation. Most veterans who are in need of assistance qualify for this pension. A&A can help pay for care in the home, nursing home or assisted living facility. A veteran is eligible for up to \$1,632 per month, while a surviving spouse is eligible for up to \$1,055 per month. A couple is eligible for up to \$1,949 per month.*

The A&A is considered to be the third tier of a VA Improved Pension program. The other two tiers are basic and housebound. Each tier has its own level of benefits and qualifications. While the objective of this site is to disseminate information about the A&A, we urge you to read an important document prepared by the American Veterans Institute that clearly explains the Improved Pension program, its levels of benefits and the qualifications for each. 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FAMILY: Sesame Street Helps Military Families Cope with Change

Talk, Listen, Connect™ aims to provide support and significant resources for military Families with children between the ages of two and five who are experiencing the effects of deployment, multiple deployments, and combat-related injuries. In 2006, Sesame Workshop launched a groundbreaking, bilingual (English/Spanish), multi-phase, multimedia initiative for young children and their military Families called Talk, Listen, Connect™: Helping Military Families During Deployment. In 2009, Talk, Listen, Connect's™ second phase, Deployments, Homecomings, Changes, was launched to bolster the overall project and provide further resources for Families on the path to discovering a "new normal" in their daily lives. The second television special called, "Coming Home: Military Families Cope With Change" was a primetime special that allowed Families to share their stories not only with other military Families, but also with the general public. This new installment featured AW2 Soldier Michael Martin and his Family and will be available on DVD in the summer.

The Sesame Workshop also created an informative kit in both English and Spanish to help parents talk to their children about the issues their Families are facing because of repeated deployments and injuries. These kits are available to military Families through Military OneSource and various military organizations. The Sesame Workshop Web site also offers a variety of resources, including printed material, videos, and music to help military Families communicate about issues affecting them.
