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TOPIC OF THE MONTH: Suicide Prevention Month

Suicide is a potentially preventable tragedy that profoundly impacts the Army Family. The Army and DOD continue to bring behavioral wellness and eliminating stigma to the forefront of Soldier, Veteran, and Family care. Seeking help shows strength, not weakness. If you or someone you know is contemplating suicide, seek help from any resource. Here are some resources to keep in mind:

- National Suicide Prevention Lifeline: 1-800-273-TALK
- <u>Veterans Chat</u>: Enables Veterans, their Families, and friends to go online where they can anonymously chat with a trained VA counselor
- <u>TRICARE Assistance Program (TRIAP)</u>: TRICARE beneficiaries may speak with a licensed counselor 24/7 through computer, internet, and webcam
- <u>Veterans Affairs</u>: Each VA Medical Center has a suicide prevention coordinator for Veterans to receive needed counseling and services

WHAT'S NEW: AW2's New Director, COL Greg Gadson

LTC (P) Greg Gadson became the new AW2 Director on July 13, 2010. As he served in every major conflict in the last two decades, his career focused on serving Soldiers. "At AW2, I will continue to measure success through Soldiers, as they transition back to active duty or to a productive civilian life," said Gadson. "I am ready to start putting in the hard work that will ensure AW2 continues to be an umbrella of expertise for all AW2 Soldiers, Veterans, and Families." During his service in Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2007, Gadson was severely wounded by an improvised explosive device (IED), resulting in the amputation of both legs above the knee and severe damage to his right arm. He emphasizes that his injuries are not the important part of his story; instead, he focuses on what he has done since. Gadson was promoted to colonel on August 26, 2010. AW2 SYMPOSIUM: Your Voice is Making a Difference

AW2 Soldiers, Veterans, Families, and Caregivers have been doing a great job of "telling the Army what they really think" over the past five years—especially through AW2 Symposiums. AW2 Symposium issues that are within the Department of the Army (DA) purview to resolve are forwarded to the annual Headquarters Department of the Army (HQDA) Army Family Action Plan (AFAP) World Wide Conference. To date, 20 AW2 Symposium issues have been selected by HQDA AFAP Conference Delegates as top tier priorities for the government to work. The top five issues from the HQDA AFAP Conference—and previous issues recommended for closure—are forwarded to the AFAP General Officer Steering Committee (GOSC) meeting. This year, GEN Peter W. Chiarelli, Vice Chief of Staff, Army, chaired the June 30 meeting. Three of the top five 2010 HQDA AFAP Conference issues originated AW2 Soldiers, Veterans, Families, and Caregivers at the 2009 AW2 Symposium. These issues are:

- Issue 654 Monthly Stipend to III/Injured Soldiers for Non-Medical Caregivers
- Issue 653 Funding Service Dogs for Wounded Warriors
- Issue 648 Behavioral Health Services Shortages

Of the 40 previous issues recommended for closure at the AFAP GOSC, 27 were closed/complete, six were closed/unattainable, and seven will remain active. An issue is closed when it has been completed to the satisfaction of the VCSA or has been deemed unfeasible. Three of the issues considered for closure at this GOSC originated from AW2 Symposiums:

- Issue 627: TRICARE Network Provider Access to Military Medical Records was closed/complete
- Issue 604: Retroactive Traumatic Service Members' Group Life Insurance (TSGLI) Compensation was closed/unattainable
- Issue 621: Minimum Disability Retirement Pay for Medically Retired Wounded Warriors will remain active

BENEFITS: Behavioral Health Options for Military Couples

Marital therapy or counseling can be covered by TRICARE Prime when it is based on a behavioral health diagnostic evaluation by a TRICARE provider. TRICARE Prime-enrolled spouses of active duty service members can seek marital therapy or counseling in the United States or overseas as part of the first eight outpatient behavioral health care visits allowed per fiscal year. This can be done without a referral from a primary care manager or prior authorization from their regional health care contractor. BENEFITS: Find Medication Information Fast with the New TRICARE Formulary Search Tool

Beneficiaries and providers can use the new TRICARE formulary tool to find the most up-to-date information about prescription medications. The new formulary search tool, located at <u>http://pec.ha.osd.mil/formulary search.php</u>, allows beneficiaries to easily find which medicines are in the uniform formulary. These are available at all full-service military treatment facilities and covered by TRICARE. MONEY MATTERS: Retroactive Stop Loss Special Pay

Soldiers and Veterans who were extended beyond their normal Expiration Term of Service (ETS) could be paid \$500 for every month or partial month served in stop loss status from September 11, 2001, to September 30, 2009. A Soldier or Veteran who believes they are entitled to stop loss special pay can submit a claim before October 21, 2010. MONEY MATTERS: Ensuring Correct Entitlement Calculations

Combat Related Special Compensation (CRSC) and Concurrent Receipt Disability Payment (CRDP) are now incorporated within the Estimated Disability Calculator (EDC). However, the EDC may provide reserve Soldiers with misleading information concerning CRSC and CRDP entitlements. CRSC calculations require active federal service years to include the VA pay scale and the Army disability rating. If correct dates are unknown, the amount calculated will be incorrect. CRSC is based upon Pay Entry Basic Date (PEBD) and Basic Active Service Date (BASD) for all Soldiers, therefore, a DA Form 1506 should be completed prior to separation, this will ensure the Soldier PEBD and BASD is correct. Therefore, reserve Soldiers must have 20 active federal service years to qualify for CRDP. Reserve Soldiers who completed 20 years of service as a reservist, do not qualify for CRDP until they are 60 years old. Please work with your AW2 Advocate and AW2 Finance Specialists to ensure you are receiving the appropriate entitlements.

VA UPDATE: Simplifying the Process For a Veteran to Claim Service Connection For PTSD

VA announced a critical step forward in providing an easier process for Veterans seeking health care and disability compensation for post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), with the publication of a final regulation in the Federal Register. By publishing a final regulation in the Federal Register to simplify the process for a Veteran to claim service connection for PTSD, VA reduces the evidence needed if the trauma claimed by a Veteran is related to fear of hostile military or terrorist activity and is consistent with the places, types, and circumstances of the Veteran's service.

This science-based regulation relies on evidence that concluded that a Veteran's deployment to a war zone is linked to an increased risk of PTSD. Under the new rule, VA would not require corroboration of a stressor related to fear of hostile military or terrorist activity if a VA doctor confirms that the stressful experience recalled by a Veteran adequately supports a diagnosis of PTSD and the Veteran's symptoms are related to the claimed stressor. VA expects this rulemaking to decrease the time it takes VA to decide access to care and claims falling under the revised criteria.
