VA Program Expands VLER Pilot

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is expanding its pilot for the Virtual Lifetime Electronic Record (VLER), which enables sharing of Veterans' health records. The expansion of the VLER pilot program will allow more Veterans and facilities to participate in this exciting new technology. It will keep health care providers informed, improve continuity and timeliness of care, and eliminate gaps in health care information. Veterans are invited to sign up for the program.

VLER is a multi-faceted business and technology initiative that includes a portfolio of health, benefits, personnel, and administrative information-sharing capabilities. This pilot expansion is designed to share Veterans' health information electronically, safely, and privately between VA, Department of Defense (DOD), and selected private health care facilities that are members of the secure Nationwide Health Information Network. VA is on track to implement health information exchange at 11 VA medical centers and to partner with both DOD and private health care entities by later this year.

This expansion will enable authorized users to access health information and will provide seamless service to America's servicemembers and Veterans.

VA's goal is to have 50,000 signed authorizations from Veterans who are VA patients to participate in the pilot by the end of the fiscal year. In addition to other ongoing efforts to share benefits and administrative data, the pilot is an initial step toward a larger capability which will become available throughout VA. VA will expand this pilot to provide these services to ervicemembers and Veterans nationwide.

Current existing sites include:

- San Diego VA Medical Center and Kaiser Permanentane in San Diego, California, operating since winter 2009
- Hampton VA Medical Center in Hampton, Virginia and MedVirginia in Richmond, Virginia, operating since fall 2010
- Spokane VA Medical Center and Inland Northwest Health Services in Spokane, Washington, operating since spring 2011
- Hunter Holmes McGuire VA Medical Center and MedVirginia in Richmond, Virginia, operating since spring 2011
- Richard L. Roudebush VA Medical Center in Indianapolis, Indiana and additional hospitals in Indiana, operating since summer 2011

Expansion sites for VLER include:

- Grand Junction VA Medical Center in Grand Junction, Colorado, in addition to Utah hospitals, first in Moab through the Utah Health Information Network, by fall 2011
- Asheville VA Medical Center and Western North Carolina Health Network in Asheville, North Carolina, by fall 2011
- VA Western New York Healthcare System in Buffalo, New York and Buffalo area hospitals through the HEALTHeLINK Health Information Exchange, by fall 2011
- Ralph H. Johnson VA Medical Center in Charleston, South Carolina and Charleston area hospitals through the South Carolina Health Information Exchange, by fall 2011
- Minneapolis VA Health Care System in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and Minnesota hospitals through the Community Health Information Collaborative Health Information Exchange, by fall 2011
- VA Puget Sound Health Care System in Seattle, Washington, and MultiCare sites, by fall 2011

AW2 Symposium Highlights

Army's Wounded Recommend Five Areas for Improvement and Leaders Prepare for Action

Eighty-four wounded, ill, and injured Soldiers, Veterans, and their Family members prioritized the top issues facing the Army's wounded warriors. This year, the delegates at the annual AW2

Symposium selected these issues to be addressed, and forwarded to the appropriate Army leaders for resolution.

- Service-connected surgeries for wounded warriors
- · Customer service at Veteran Affairs medical facilities
- · Advocate for wounded warrior Families and caregivers
- Warrior Transition Unit (WTU) cadre selection
- Concurrent payment of Veteran's Administration (VA) entitlements and Army retirement benefits to medically retired Veterans

"The AW2 Symposium focuses on issues related to the improvement of warrior care—for Soldiers who are recovering today, and for those who will follow," said AW2 Director COL Gregory D. Gadson. "The best way to improve the system is by listening to those who have been through it. That's what this event is all about, and it's just one element of the broader Army effort to support all Soldiers who become wounded, ill or injured throughout their recovery."

Issues raised at previous AW2 Symposiums that have been resolved range from expanded facilities to treat traumatic brain injuries, to a stipend for primary caregivers of severely wounded service members to the creation of the AW2 Community Support Network and a \$10,000 increase in Veterans Affairs (VA) adaptive housing benefits.

The top issues were chosen from more than 50 topics that were discussed in focus groups on topics including medical, Family, Soldier support, Warrior Transition Units (WTUs) and Veteran Affairs.

Leadership on Training, Education, and Employment

Warrior Transition Command (WTC) Commanding General BG Darryl A. Williams and WTC Command Sergeant Major CSM Benjamin H. Scott Jr. spent three days at the AW2 Symposium listening to delegates. They, along with COL Gregory D. Gadson and SGM Robert Gallagher, had lunch with Family members and caregivers on Wednesday and with wounded warriors on Thursday.

"I have to say—this group is passionate about their chance to make a difference," said Williams. "These people are excited to be here and have an opportunity to help shape the future in a positive way. They were especially excited and interested in resiliency training. I let them know that training, education, and employment are my three top priorities for WTU and AW2 Soldiers, Veterans, and Families."

Media Coverage of Symposium Sheds Light on Wounded and Army's Efforts

WTC Stratcom hosted a press conference at the AW2 Symposium to share the importance of Soldier, Veteran, and Family care with the Orlando community. This year, the press conference featured three speakers: AW2 Director COL Gregory D. Gadson, AW2 Veteran Taylor Njagu, and AW2 spouse Sarah Gannaway.

AW2 spouse Sarah Gannaway discussed her husband's recovery and their decision to stay in the Army. "When my husband was found unfit for duty, we never considered taking medical retirement," she said. "If the Army was willing to have us, we wanted to stay in, so we applied for Continuation On Active Duty (COAD) and were approved. Before my Soldier was injured, he was given permission to move to a new career field, and we were amazed at how his new branch management was both willing to accommodate his needs and thoughtful in how they assigned him new jobs. The only part of my husband's Army life that his branch couldn't accommodate was housing."

AW2 Veteran Taylor Njagu discussed his struggle with post-traumatic stress disorder and the assistance AW2 provided in finding a government career for him after his retirement. "When my military career was over, I found myself trying to cope with retirement and the need to find a new job in the civilian workforce," he said. "This transition was challenging and overwhelming, and I desperately needed some assistance. My AW2 Advocate helped me through some psychological challenges and was very proactive. Then, when I was ready to go back to work, I connected with an AW2 career coordinator, who was instrumental in helping me organize and tailor my résumé appropriately for civilian employers."

While the AW2 Symposium delegates engaged in focus groups, AW2 kids participated in Operation Purple®, an urban adventure camp hosted by the National Military Family Association. Kids ages 5 to 17 spent time bonding with each other, discussing their feelings about their parents' injuries, and sharing stories about living with a wounded warrior. In addition, they got to have lots of fun—they went tubing, rock climbing, zip lining, and to Universal Orlando® Resort.

"Talking with other teens that have been in the same position, or gone through the same things I have, has been wonderful," said AW2 kid Victoria Nail. "Keeping in touch with my new friends is going to be fun. I hope that they feel like they can come to me with any Family related issues. I now have a support system of friends that I have never had before."
