

He believed in right and wrong, doing his best and loving his Lord. He enjoyed reading while listening to music and liked playing his accordion. He had passion for flying, drag racing and hydroplane racing. His was a life well lived. Joe was a beloved husband, brother, father, uncle, grandfather and friend.



Robert Brown, 59, Refrigeration Engineer

Bob was an incredible man with a lot of compassion and zest for life. He was a very sensitive, loving father and son who cared deeply for his family. Bob was blessed with a creative mind and the ability to remember almost everything that he read or learned; some would call it a photographic memory. He was passionate about learning, constantly reading and talking with people about any subject. He loved to build, cook, ride motorcycles, camp and spend time with his family. Bob worked as an engineer for 41 years and loved his job because it allowed him to use his creative side, always figuring out a way to build or fix something. He is survived by a daughter, two sons and many family and friends who miss him dearly.



Paul J. Gustafson, 84, Drywall Contractor

Paul was a drywall contractor for many years, a profession he truly enjoyed. I always called him an "artist," not a drywaller. For example, when we were missionaries stationed in Zaire, Africa, Paul erected a cross for the local church made of drywall materials. It looked exactly like wood when he finished, and it was beautiful. The drywall cross is still there, having survived a rebellion in the 90s and nearly 30 years of ants and termites. Paul loved the outdoors, hiking, gardening, horses and especially camping. He loved to travel, especially to Sweden and Alaska. Paul was a gentle quiet man who lived his faith. He and our dog Bitsy were inseparable for over 16 years. I lost both of them in the same year. I will always miss him.



Nicholas E. Hall, 33, National Park Service Climbing Ranger

Nick died June 21, 2012, during a valiant and icy rescue effort of four stranded climbers near the summit of Mt. Rainier. Nick was an experienced climbing ranger who participated in numerous rescue operations on the mountain. Nick's enthusiasm for the outdoors and mountaineering was matched by few. Nick left this world much too soon and his family is overwhelmed from his loss. However, they are comforted in knowing he died doing the work he loved while performing heroic, selfless efforts in order to rescue people in need. He displayed integrity and personal courage beyond all expectation.

He lost his life doing what he enjoyed best when the fishing boat Lady Cecelia sank in the Pacific Ocean on March 10, 2012. Luke is greatly missed by his family and friends.


John L. Oster, 57, Lead Telecommunications Technician


Dr. Mark Radezky, 55, Chiropractor


Christopher S. Rudolph, 30, Marketing Director

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
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Today we honor those individuals who worked tirelessly to better the lives of their families and our community but tragically died as a result of doing their job.

The Worker Memorial Garden on the grounds of the Department of Labor & Industries' headquarters in Tumwater, Washington, serves as a year-round remembrance of fallen workers. In 2007, a brass bell sculpture by artist Tom Torrens was donated by the Washington State Building and Construction Trades Council and installed in the garden.

The garden and bell are dedicated to all Washington workers who die from a workplace injury or illness. Each year at the annual Worker Memorial Day ceremony relatives ring this bell in honor of their loved one.
