

<u>Background</u>

•Created in 1979, the Federal Emergency Management Agency is part of the United States Department of Homeland Security

•FEMA has more than 2,600 full time employees and nearly 4,000 standby disaster assistance employees (reservists) who are available for deployment after disasters.

•FEMA is organized into a Headquarters (located in Washington, DC), ten regional offices, and three field offices

<u>Approach</u>

The disaster life cycle describes the process through which emergency managers **prepare** for emergencies and disasters, **respond** to them when they occur, help people and institutions **recover** from them, **mitigate** their effects, **reduce the risk** of loss, and **prevent** disasters from occurring.

Next Generation Emergency Response

Incident Management Assistance Teams (IMAT)


- Rapidly deployable emergency response "strike" teams
- Meet multi-disciplinary needs of emergency management
- Liaison to State/local emergency managers
- Support command & control if State/local capabilities hindered
- Provide situational awareness and needs assessments
- Arrive within 12-hours of notice; self-sufficient for 48hours
- Permanent team members:
 - 3 National IMAT
 - 10 Regional IMAT and 1 Alaska IMAT Level III Team


