

BRAVO COMPANY BADGERS -SET THE STANDARD-



Welcome to the phase IV/V program, Bravo Company, 229th MI BN and the Presidio of Monterey (PoM) home of the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center (DLIFLC). Upon arrival you will spend approximately 17 days in Phase IV status, followed by approximately 30 days in phase V status. In accordance with TR 350-6, if you are at 13 weeks in the Army upon your arrival to PoM you are considered a phase V Soldier; however, IAW 229th MI BN policy you will remain on phase IV privileges and be considered a phase IV Soldier until you complete the 17 day Phase IV Program. The phase IV/V program will further prepare you to accept the individual responsibility necessary to be successful not only here at DLIFLC, but as a Soldier. The phase IV/V program is focused on intense standards of discipline, team work, camaraderie, and increased Soldier responsibility.

Many questions you may have about travel reimbursement, transporting your dependents to PoM, and off-post housing will be answered during the Joint Service In-Processing Brief (JSIB) which will take place your first Tuesday at PoM. Upon arrival, you will have the following Phase IV limitations: No civilian clothing, you must be in uniform at all times to include sleeping in IPFUs, no off-post privileges, no possession, use, purchasing, or storage of alcohol or tobacco products, you must sign in and out of the company area at all times, no electronics such as iPods, TVs, PSPs, computers, headphones etc., no possession of or consuming junk food, candy, or protein products (with some exceptions), no visitation in the barracks room by anyone of the opposite sex, and no Privately Owned Vehicle (POV) privileges unless you are being driven by a parent or spouse, either as an operator or as a passenger. Your curfew is 2100 hours, seven days a week. You can bring electronic devices and civilian clothing; however, these items will be placed in secured storage and given back to you upon completion of the Phase IV program. You are allowed to use your cell phone during non-duty hours.

If you are married and your spouse is in route, or already at PoM waiting for you, you must understand that you will be living in the barracks until you are allowed to move off post. Ensure that your spouse has means of safe transportation and a secure place to reside in the area such as a hotel if he/she is coming to the PoM while you are on the Phase IV/V Program.

You will participate in Physical Readiness Training (PRT) five-six days a week while you are here in phase IV/V. You will complete three hours of Drill and Ceremonies (D&C) training and practical exercises. You will complete one hour of Army Values Training, research, and discussion. You will complete 14 hours combined of Commitment, Suicide Prevention, Sexual Harassment / Assault Response and Prevention Program (SHARP), Stress Management, Operational Security (OPSEC), Computer Security (COMPUSEC), Army Substance and Control Abuse Program (ASCAP), Financial Management, Sexually Transmitted Disease (STDs), Safety, Nutrition, and Physical Fitness. Upon completion of training, you will clean your equipment, conduct out-processing and will be re-assigned to your gaining company.



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Soldier Trainee Lifestyle:

Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center trainees attend class in military uniform of their corresponding branch of service and conduct physical training to meet the standards of their services. The military service commanders ensure their service members both Active, Reserve, and National Guard components, learn the Warrior Tasks and Drills necessary to complete their military mission. Because the core mission is language acquisition, DLIFLC trainees spend five days a week, seven hours per day in class learning their target language, with two to three hours of homework each night.

As a joint-service institute, DLIFLC strives to balance the demands of military training with the requirements of language education. While the service commanders ensure their service members, Active, Reserve, and National Guard components learn the warrior ethos, values, discipline, and necessary skills, the Institute is obligated to support their efforts through resourcing, planning, and coordination. Special events and command ceremonies are enriched through the involvement of all the services represented.

Though trainees spend five days a week, seven hours per day in class, with two to three hours of homework each evening, they still find time to volunteer. DLIFLC is proud of its trainees' community involvement, ranging from giving blood to the local community Hospital, cleaning up local beaches, taking part in the Monterey Special Olympics, and helping disabled veterans partake in the annual Wheelchair Salmon Derby. DLIFLC does the utmost to prepare its emerging warrior-linguists, Soldiers, with confidence in the contemporary operating environment. While the faculty ensures they are capable and relevant in their linguistic abilities, the cadre of the service units makes certain they are combat ready.

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<u>Direction from Monterey Peninsula Airport to 229th MI BN/Bravo Company</u>

- 1. Head northwest on Olmsted Rd (243 ft)
- 2. Slight right to stay on Olmsted Rd (394 ft)
- 3. Slight left onto Henderson Way (0.1 mi)
- 4. Turn right onto Garden Rd (0.1 mi)
- 5. Turn left onto Fairground Rd/Mark Thomas Dr Continue to follow Mark Thomas Dr (0.6 mi)
- 6. Take the 1st right onto Old Golf Course Rd/Sloat Ave Continue to follow Sloat Ave (0.5 mi)
- 7. Turn left onto Del Monte Ave (0.7 mi)
- 8. Continue onto Lighthouse Ave (0.6 mi)
- 9. Slight right onto Foam St (0.2 mi)
- 19. Take the 1st left onto Reeside Ave (292 ft)
- 11. Take the 1st left onto Lighthouse Ave (0.1 mi)
- 12. Take the 1st right onto Pvt Bolio Rd (Be ready to show Military Identification Card at Entry Point)
- 13. Head west on Pvt Bolio Rd toward Lawton Rd (0.8 mi)
- 14. Turn left onto Lawton Rd (0.2 mi)
- 15. Turn Right on Rifle Range Road
- 16. BLD 622 (B Co 229th MI) will be immediately on the Left. Secure your Bags and Report to CQ Desk Located on the 3rd Floor.



Monterey County Maps




California's central coast, is about two and a half hours south of San Francisco and five hours north of Los Angeles.
