





► The Tribal Ecological Knowledge perspective is meaningful at the level of the US Environmental Protection Agency's Lake Michigan Lake-wide Management Plan (LaMP). The Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians has obtained funding through the "Tribal capacity for lake-wide basin programs" grant program. The Grand Traverse Band will participate and have an active role in the design and oversight of the Management Plan. The Tribe seeks to incorporate many of the aligned goals entrusted to them as a signatory of the 2000 Consent Decree, between the Federal government, State of Michigan, and five northern Michigan Indian Tribes.

Lake-wide Management Plan Deliverables

- Semi-annual reports will detail progress made in participation with the Lake Michigan LaMP.
- Quarterly and grant end reports. Tribal knowledge and data provided to the monitoring and bio-diversity priority workgroups and committees.

2000 Consent Decree Implementation Deliverables

- ► Thorough evaluation of characteristics of current lake trout stocking sites; along with potential changes in stocking locations to improve the likelihood of lake trout rehabilitation in northern Lake Michigan.
- Adequate data collected to populate the appropriate computer models for lake trout and lake whitefish.




