(Swanton, Ohio) - Col. Steven S. Nordhaus, 180th Fighter Wing Commander, has been selected to serve as executive assistant to the Chief of the National Guard Bureau, Gen. Frank Grass. Maj. Gen. Deborah A. Ashenhurst, Ohio adjutant general, said that "Col. Nordhaus' selection gives the Ohio National Guard an excellent opportunity to showcase its leaders to the Department of Defense, the Air Force and National Guard Bureau. His strength in leadership and his experience with the Ohio Air National Guard will be invaluable in his new role at NGB."

Nordhaus is a seasoned F-16 Fighting Falcon command pilot, with more than 3,000 flying hours, including 83 combat missions in support of Operations Southern Watch, Northern Watch, Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom.

Nordhaus knew at an early age that he wanted to fly. "Growing up, I flew with my father and uncles regu-

larly," Nordhaus said . "Each time we took off, I knew I wanted to fly for a living."

"He has the natural ability to link many disparate agencies across the wing and community into a single goal," said Maj.

Gen. Mark Bartman, Ohio assistant adjutant general for Air. 'Successfully moving the mission from Selfridge Air National Guard Base, Mich., to Toledo ANGB, Ohio in approximately 18 months was a Herculean effort that he embraced wholeheartedly." haus," Bartman said. "He has cultivated relationships at the national level that will serve him well as he transitions to the new job. From the time he served on active duty, he either served with or for many of the other active duty officers who serve in similar positions for other senior leaders in the Department of Defense. Where can Veterans go for assistance?

Since 1886, Ohio has provided help to care for Veterans, their spouses and children, and the surviving Family members of a deceased Veteran. These services are provided through the County Veterans Service Office in each county, normally located in the county seat. Each office is funded by a portion of the assessed local property taxes to ensure this ability is available to Veterans and Families.

The offices are staffed by certified and accredited service officers able to help Ohio's Veterans apply for all benefits earned by active military service. These benefits include:

FEDERAL – disability compensation, pension, healthcare, education, home loans, burial, and survivor benefits.

STATE – Ohio Veterans Bonus, education, employment, healthcare, home loans, Ohio Veterans Homes and Military Injury Relief Fund.

LOCAL – claim preparation and assistance, financial assistance, transportation to VA medical appointments, indigent burials and inter-agency benefits.

Each County Veterans Service Office has certain requirements to help Veterans, or their Families experiencing a financial emergency. This short-term assistance varies with the individual abilities of each county. Such assistance may include payment of rent, mortgage, food, utilities, car payment or insurance. An application process is required in all counties.

Grassbaugh Project offers free legal assistance to Veterans

The Captain Jonathan D. Grassbaugh Veterans Project at The Ohio State University Moritz College of Law is currently helping Veterans who may find themselves in need of legal assistance in the areas of housing and consumer issues. Housing matters that the Project may handle include landlord-tenant issues, evictions and foreclosure. Consumer issues that the Project may handle include creditor/debtor and credit agency disputes, as well as assisting in cases involving relief from default judgments. Assistance will be provided to Veterans at no cost by volunteer lawyers and Moritz students selected and trained to work with Veterans on these issues. There is no income requirement to qualify for services.

The Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor began at 7:55 a.m. on Dec. 7, 1941. Japanese naval forces compiled for the raid included 4 heavy aircraft carriers, 2 heavy cruisers, 35 submarines, 2 light cruisers, 9 oilers, 2 battleships and 11 destroyers.



A day that still lives in infamy

The Dec. 7, 1941, Japanese raid on Pearl Harbor was one of the defining moments in U.S. history. A single carefully-planned and well-executed stroke removed the United States Navy's battleship force as a possible threat to the Japanese Empire's southward expansion. America, unprepared and now considerably weakened, was abruptly brought into the Second World War as a full combatant.
