Lower Mississippi River Ecosystem Team Full Team Meeting Minutes August 19-20, 2008 THEME: Contributing to the Future: Passing the Passion

Meeting Overview:

The annual meeting of the Lower Mississippi River Ecosystem Team (LMRE) was held at the Southeast Louisiana Refuges Complex on August 19-20, 2008. A list of attendees is attached. A lot of discussion was held on sharing experiences and the work we do on a daily basis that motivates us to continue to be excellent professionals in a changing world. Take Home Points from the Meeting

Commandments of Conservation

1. Thou shall be a **conservationist** (i.e., preserving endangered and threatened natural resources, restoring degraded ones, and using responsibly those sustainable).

2. Thou shall remember that "keeping every cog and wheel is the first precaution in environmental tinkering" (Aldo Leopold).

3. Thou shall **read "bibles"** of nature and conservation to oneself and our children, then practice the bible's teachings.

4. Thou shall purchase hunting, fishing, or other privileged use licenses, as these conserve habitat.

5. Thou shall seek and use **reliable science** to manage wildlife, fisheries, and other natural resources on National Wildlife Refuges and other public and private lands.

6. Though shall be a member of The Wildlife Society, American Fisheries Society, or other **professional** societies and serve your society.

7. Thou shall also be a member of **conservation organizations** of choice with missions to secure and enhance habitats for fish and wildlife.

8. Thou shall purchase Migratory Bird Conservation Stamps ("duck stamps") or other **habitat-securing stamps**.

9. Thou shall promote sale of **Planet Earth Conservation (PEC) stamps**, required by all people driving gaspowered vehicles.

10. Thou shall instill a "land ethic" in human kind, especially in our children – the earth's next generation of conservationists.

11. Thou shall "Go Outside" and take children along to save them from "nature-deficit disorder."

12. Thou shall help our publics understand that **legal hunting and fishing** are cornerstones of conservation and educate all people about the biological legitimacy of hunting and fishing.

13. Thou shall work with all **partners** to conserve fish, wildlife, and plants and their habitats for the continuous benefit of natural and human communities.

14. Thou shall seek opportunities to promote **conservation initiatives** of the Farm Bill – an Ecosystem Management Plan for the United States.

15. Thou shall **grow professionally** through continued education, work experience, certification, conferences, etc.

16. Though shall be **active alumni** of your university alma mater(s) and help recruit students into the natural resources profession.

17. Thou shall appreciate media publicity concerning **climate change**, because it is stimulating earthly conservation by human kind.
