THE CLERK: All rise. Hear ye, hear ye, hear ye. The United States District Court for the District of Wyoming is now in session, the Honorable Judge Scott W. Skavdahl presiding.

God save the United States and our Honorable Court.

THE COURT: Thank you. Please be seated.

Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Ewing T. Kerr Federal Courthouse for this Naturalization Ceremony. The Court will suspend the local rules on cameras and recording devices. I would ask, however, that any cell phones be turned to "silent."

It has been a tradition in these ceremonies granting citizenship to new citizens to recognize those citizens and families of those citizens who have paid the ultimate price in defending what so many in this world seek: The freedom and benefits of being a United States citizen. It is particularly appropriate, given that tomorrow marks the Eleventh Anniversary of September 11, 2001, a catastrophic event which forever changed our world.

Since then and predating that event, as of today's date, 6,594 American men and women have been killed in action while involved in military operations in Afghanistan, Operation Enduring Freedom; and Iraq, Operation Iraqi Freedom. In addition, 49,746 United States citizens have been wounded in action in these military operations. Let us take a moment of

silence and recognize these American heros and their families whose sacrifice cannot be measured and whose loss will never be recovered.

(Silent tribute)

THE COURT: U.S. District Court for the District of Wyoming is in special session for the naturalization of foreign nationals to be United States citizens. It is with great honor, pride and privilege that I am able to conduct this ceremony on behalf of 20 new United States citizens originating from nine different countries throughout the world.

The Federal District Court of Wyoming, including
Chief Judge Freudenthal, Judge Johnson and Judge Brimmer,
extend their congratulations to you, your families and friends.

At this time, I would recognize the St. Anthony

Tri-Parish Catholic School Choir to entertain us with songs of

America and America the Beautiful.

Thank you for being here.

(St. Anthony Tri-Parish Catholic School Choir sings

My Country, 'Tis of Thee, also known as "America"; and America

the Beautiful.)

we have applause in a courtroom. It's usually not the place 1 for it, but today is a fitting occasion that there is applause 2 3 that should be given. I would, at this time, recognize Colonel Schmotzer 4 5 with the Natrona County High School Color Guard for the posting 6 of the Color Guard. 7 Ladies and gentlemen, would you please stand. (Presentation of colors by NCHS JROTC Color Guard.) 8 THE COURT: Fellow citizens, it is your obligation and 9 ours to show allegiance to this country at this time by making 10 our pledge of allegiance. Then I'd ask you to remain standing 11 12 for the singing of the national anthem by the St. Anthony 13 Choir. 14 (Pledge of Allegiance recited; Star-Spangled Banner sung by St. Anthony Tri-Parish Catholic School Choir.) 15 16 THE COURT: Thank you. 17 Colonel Schmotzer, will you please retire the colors. (Colors retired.) 18 19 Thank you, Colonel Schmotzer. THE COURT: 20 Thank you. Please be seated. 21 At this time, I would ask our newest United States 22 citizens if you could please face me and raise your right hand 23 and repeat after me. Please rise.

TINSLEY: Thank you. 5 THE COURT: And I would also note the presence of 6 Mr. McConnaughey on behalf of Senator Lummis -- or 7 Congresswoman Lummis and Ms. Schlup on behalf of Senator Barrasso's office as well as Mr. Palner; and Mr. Phillips, and 8 9 I'm -- oh, USCIS. Good to have you here today. 10 I believe that the congressional delegation has some 11 letters that they wish to hand out at this time, and I would invite you to do so. 12 13 Thank you. MS. TINSLEY: 14 THE COURT: Thank you. 15 (Letters and packets handed to the new citizens by the 16 congressional delegation.) 17 Thank you. At this time, I would THE COURT: recognize Mr. Stan Lowe. 18 (Mr. Lowe salutes the American Flag.) 19 20 MR. LOWE: May it please the Court. 21 THE COURT: Counsel. 22 Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, and MR. LOWE: 23 welcome. On behalf of the Veterans of Casper and Natrona 24 County and Wyoming and the United States of America, we welcome 25 you to our country as citizens. We congratulate you on your

wise choice. You had a choice the rest of us didn't but you chose wisely. You have now become part of the citizenry of the greatest nation in the history of the world. It is so, so great that many others in other lands are jealous, and they want to either destroy us or take over our country and that we have been standing steadfast against that; and we ask you now, as fellow citizens, to join us in this stand that we take with increasing frequency.

Eleven years ago tomorrow, at 8:46 a.m. Eastern

Standard Time, airplanes operated by fanatics, who sought to
justify their action by their religion, chose to crash into the
two towers of the World Trade Center in New York, the Pentagon
in Washington and were seeking another target in Washington
when the passengers took charge and took over that plane, but
ultimately it crashed.

Nearly 3,000 of us Americans died. Those people in the Twin Towers had gone to work that morning. That's all they did was go to work to do their job, to raise their families, to do the things that make the economy and this nation operate efficiently and effectively. They did nothing to harm these people who killed them.

The same can be said of those who got on the airplanes that day. Some got on there to tend to business, probably most of them, because that's the way we carry on our commerce in this country is through efficient transportation and

face-to-face negotiations and transactions. They did nothing unusual except to do their job. Others got on their airplane, going to see relatives or going on vacation to enjoy themselves, to have a happy time and to have the benefits of some restful relaxation. They did nothing to those who killed them, nothing whatsoever, and this is the kind of enemy we fight today. They don't even wear uniforms. They don't hesitate to violate all of the international rules regarding warfare. They will get in crowds of women and children so as to keep our troops from killing them. They will do everything they can to avoid the orderly conduct of war that governs the rest of us because they think their religion gives them an exemption.

This is most unfortunate but it is something for us to do every year in order to show our support of this country and those who have died in this fashion for it because it is the right thing for Americans to do. No one can kill any American without it affecting all of us. We are a family. Regardless of race, creed or color, regardless of background, we are Americans. We don't talk about being green Americans or purple Americans or anything like that. We are Americans and we stand together and we support each other, and that's what we do, and that's what we veterans have done.

My name is Stan Lowe. I'm the past chairman and now chairman emeritus of the Wyoming Veterans Commission. In

World War II, I served in both the Pacific and the Atlantic. I saw the damage; I saw the destruction; I saw the bodies, but this is all part of warfare. I'm pleased to be here in order to relate this to you because I was part of the invasion fleet for Japan, but President Truman spared us that honor when he dropped the bomb at Hiroshima that saved not only our lives but literally thousands upon thousands and thousands of Japanese lives because it brought to an end a war that should have ended before that except the war-makers of Japan were unwilling to seek peace before that.

So getting back to our subject at hand of the day that we are observing tomorrow, I want to tell you that the veterans of Natrona County every year put on a program to observe this event tomorrow. At eleven o'clock tomorrow at the Veterans Cemetery in the chapel, the Natrona County Veterans Council will conduct a service. Our Chief of Police, who happens to be a veteran himself, having served over in the Middle East in the Iraq, in the war on terror, will be the speaker.

I urge all of you to attend this. One of your duties and responsibilities as citizens is to observe and support the events that honor the people who have served our country in one form or fashion, whether it be the firemen and police that were on the job in New York, trying to help those people in the tower or whether it's the troops out in the battlefield that are representing you, that are defending you and each of you.

By the way, how many veterans are there here today? 1 Would the veterans -- well, we have a good number today. 2 3 we're well represented. Thank you for your service, all of 4 you. God bless you. So I would urge you, all of you, to attend the 5 6 function tomorrow, eleven o'clock at the Veterans Cemetery in 7 the chapel, and you'll hear Chris Wallace, our Chief of Police, a fine gentleman, deliver, I know, an excellent presentation. 8 9 With that, I close my comments and again congratulate 10 you on being one of us. We're glad to have you, and we are 11 especially glad to be here to participate with you in this 12 very, very important occasion. 13 (Mr. Lowe salutes the American Flag.) 14 (Applause) 15 THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Lowe. 16 Ms. Margaret Everett on behalf of the Daughters of American Revolution who you're joined with, I believe you have 17 a presentation you wish to make? 18 19 MS. EVERETT: You want me to -- can I speak about it? THE COURT: Wherever you want, you can go to any 20 21 microphone that you see. 22 The Daughters of the American Revolution MS. EVERETT:

truly appreciate being able to welcome you to our great nation.

We got here the easy way because we trace all of our -- all of

us can trace our background back to the formation of the

Today we admire you, the 1 time and effort that you have taken to become part of us; and 2 3 today, in our little envelopes, you will find a number of 4 patriotic pamphlets, including the story of our National Anthem, our Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, some writings by 5 Patrick Henry, a pamphlet on knowing your rights under the 6 7 Constitution and the current Flag Code plus some others. Welcome. 8 9 THE COURT: Thank you. (Packets presented to the new citizens by the Daughters of 10 11 the American Revolution.) 12 THE COURT: While they're handing that out, I want to confess my appreciation and thankfulness for St. Anthony's 13 14 Choir to come here today. They were called last week by my 15 judicial assistant. I'm known as a very "forward looking and planning person," not --16 17 (Laughter) **THE COURT:** -- and so they were kind enough to agree 18 and excited to agree, and I'm just very grateful that they 19 20 joined us today. 21 Thank you, Ms. Everett. Mr. Gary Cohee, on behalf of United Veterans Council 22 23 of Natrona County. 24 (Mr. Gary Cohee salutes the American Flag.) 25 THE COURT: Mr. Cohee.

(Pins presented to the new citizens by Mr. Cohee.) 1 2 Mr. Cohee salutes the American Flag.) 3 THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Cohee. I also note the presence of Mr. Ron Akin and Mr. David 4 Stortz on behalf of the Disabled American Veterans. Also I 5 note Mr. Sanchez on behalf of the Marine Corps League. 6 7 (Mr. Akin, Mr. Stortz and Mr. Sanchez salute the American Flag, and pins are presented to the citizens. 8 Mr. Akin 9 approaches Mr. Sanchez for additional pins.) 10 **THE COURT:** Mr. Sanchez is going to have to empty his 11 pockets. 12 (Laughter) 13 He's our secret stash here. MR. RON AKIN: 14 **THE COURT:** Thank you, gentlemen. 15 I would also recognize Mr. Gary Cohee on behalf of the 16 American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary. 17 MR. GARY COHEE: Your Honor, this is Linda Feezer on behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary. 18 19 THE COURT: Thank you for being here today. (Pins and flags presented to the new citizens by Mr. Cohee 20 21 and Ms. Feezer.) 22 THE COURT: Thank you. 23 Are there any service organizations or other veterans 24 organizations, patriotic organizations, that I have failed to 25 recognize? All right. Thank you very much for your

1 | participation.

Mr. Shugart, on behalf of the Attorney General of the United States, Eric Holder, are there any remarks you wish to make at this time?

MR. SHUGART: Ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of the Attorney General for the United States and on behalf of the United States Attorney for the District of Wyoming, we just congratulate each and every one of you for your accomplishments and wish you all the very best in your future endeavors.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Shugart.

We're running on about an hour here, and it's amazing how much this place warms up when you have this many people in here.

(Laughter)

THE COURT: I'll be brief. This country was forged from the desire to form a more fair and just society and government, a government by the people and for the people. Its formation came at a great and, for many, an ultimate cost. However, that was but a down payment. As noted at the beginning of this ceremony, the price of our freedom continues to be paid, and tomorrow will mark a day 11 years ago when 2,977 Americans lost their lives simply because they were Americans.

I hope that all of us recognize and appreciate we are united as Americans, and the freedoms we enjoy are not because

of our individuality but, rather, because of the commitment to one another as fellow citizens of the United States of America. Moreover, citizenship does not come without obligations. are obligated and committed to one another to support and defend what we have, not our individual interests. We have a duty to serve, from military service to jury service; and we have a duty to participate in our government. After all, it is a government by the people. That is you. Citizens of many other countries see these duties as opportunities. always take the opportunity so that we continue to have the opportunity.

To our newest United States citizens, thank you for wanting to be a part of that collective commitment, and may those of us who have already made it or have been gifted with it be reminded what we have is cherished and sought after by others throughout the world. May that always be the case. May God continue to bless the United States of America.

We shall stand in recess. Congratulations. (Applause)
