


John Ashbery Collection

John Ashbery is recognized as one of the greatest twentieth-century American poets. He has won nearly every major American award for poetry, including the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award, the Yale Younger Poets Prize, the Bollingen Prize, the Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize, the Griffin International Award, and a MacArthur "Genius" Grant. Ashbery's first book, *Some Trees* (1956) won the Yale Younger Poets Prize. *Self-Portrait in a Convex Mirror* (1975), considered by many to be Ashbery's masterpiece, won the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award, and the National Book Critics Circle Award, an unprecedented triple-crown in the literary world. The Rare Book and Special Collections Division acquired this collection in 2015. The collection includes most of Ashbery's first editions, along with presentation copies, advance reader review copies, broadsides, and a limited amount of manuscript material.





Ashbery, John. *Some Trees*. New Haven: Yale University Press, 1956. First edition of Ashbery's first regularly published book, winner of the Yale Younger Poets prize. One of only 817 copies printed.






Body, N. O. [Baer, Karl M.]. Aus Eines Mannes Mädchenjahren [Memoirs of a Man's Maiden Years]. Berlin: Gustav Rieckes Buchhandlung, 1907. Foreword by Rudolf Presber. Afterword by Magnus Hirschfeld. "Karl M. Baer (20 May 1885, Arolsen, Germany - 26 June 1956, Bat Yam, Israel) was a German-Israeli author, social worker, reformer, suffragette and Zionist. Born female and named Martha Baer he became, in December 1906, one of the first people to undergo sex-change surgery, and one of the first, in January 1907, to gain full legal recognition of his gender identity and to have a new birth certificate issued reflecting his new gender.



Cavafy, C. P. *Poiimata*. Alexandria, Egypt: Ekdosis Alexandrines, 1935. First edition. One of 1,800 numbered copies, from a total edition of 2,030, printed after a design by the influential Greek artist, Takis Kalmouchos. Text edited by Rika Sengopoulou. The posthumously published first collective edition of Cavafy's poems, preceded by the scarce privately printed booklets and broadsides undertaken by the author for distribution to friends.



One of 65 numbered copies on Arches Velin signed by William Brice who illustrated these 11 Cavafy poems with four original etchings. Translations by Alan Boegehold.







Text of ten poems, each with a corresponding lithograph printed on nine sheets (on one particular sheet there are two lithographs-one printed on the recto and the other on the verso). Although the colophon states that 100 copies (plus the one proof copy) were printed, no copies can be located anywhere.

Jean Cocteau & the Illustrated Book. Northridge: Santa Susana Press, 1990. Cocteau, Jean (illustrator). Copy 61 of a total edition of 226. 125 of which contain an original leaf of the 1923 first issue of Cocteau's illustrated book Dessins. This copy is one of these. Numbered and signed by Editor Norman Tanis and William Emboden. Narrative account of Cocteau and the illustrated book with a number of unpublished illustrations by Cocteau. Printed on French mold-made Arches paper by Patrick Reagh, color illustrations tipped-in. Bound in quarter leather, gilt stamped in slipcase.






Sixteen pages printed by letterpress on mould-made archival Somerset. Eight color plates tipped onto seven accordion-panels. Hand-bound in quarter leather with cloth sides. One of 26 lettered copies accompanied by an original monoprint signed by Hogan. Signed by Gunn and Hogan.



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
James Ingram Merrill Collection

Merrill began writing poetry as a child. When Merrill was 16 years old, his father collected his poems and stories and published them under the title Jim's Book. Merrill would go on to receive many awards including the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry (1977) and the first Bobbitt Prize for Poetry (1990). His poetry falls into two distinct bodies: the lyric poetry of his early career and the epic narrative of occult communication supposedly obtained through a Ouija board. In addition to poetry, he also wrote essays, fiction, and plays. The Rare Book and Special Collections Division acquired this Merrill Collection in 2015. The collection contains an astonishing number of important association copies, including Merrill's first five books inscribed to Kimon Friar, the Greek poet who was important in Merrill's professional and personal life. Among those are Merrill's rare first book, Jim's Book (1942), and the dedication copy of his second and rarest book, The Black Swan (1946). In addition to the many dedication and presentation copies, the collection also contains many of his major works, broadsides, a small number of manuscripts, and photographs.



















