

## Staying involved

**G** OV. NIXON this year reappointed Russ Unger to the Missouri Community Service Commission, which works to connect Missourians of all ages and backgrounds to improve unmet community needs through direct and tangible service.

Housed in the Department of Economic Development, the MCSC funds AmeriCorps state programs in Missouri. Like a domestic version of the Peace Corps, AmeriCorps serves communities through volunteer work and other service. Striving to make service and volunteerism a common expectation of all Missourians, with a focus on youth, Russ returns to the board with innovative ideas.

#### **Community service**

Reappointed as the representative of labor organizations, Unger brings with him 30-plus years of experience in the sheet-metal trade. He has been the apprenticeship coordinator for an apprenticeship training center, while serving as an instructor for 12 years. Through the years, Russ has laced community service into his daily roles.

"Community service is really important to me and we try to instill its value into our apprentices," says Russ.

#### **Thousands served**

Over 2,700 AmeriCorps members have served Missourians since 2003, providing needed assistance to thousands, including disaster relief, health care, housing rehabilitation, public safety, tutoring and youth mentoring. Russ continually works for the promotion of AmeriCorps by equipping their programs with necessary resources.

"Each year we review new and existing AmeriCorps programs for funding. Our budget has decreased and we are limited on how many programs we can fund. It is hard to say 'no' to a program and not fund it when you know the AmeriCorps members will be helping people in their community," he says.

Having fulfilled his duties as a labor representative for the Missouri Community Service Commission in the past, Russ returns with the same experience, dedication and passion for service. Carrying the vision of the commission in mind, he hopes to strengthen the spirit of volunteerism and service throughout the state.

**2010 LAW PROVIDES INSURANCE** COVERAGE FOR CHILDREN WITH AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDERS

### New board oversees licensing, regulation of behavior analysts

### **T**OUSE BILL 1311,

signed into law by Gov. Jay Nixon on June 10, 2010, was a monumental bill for families touched by autism. The new law provides for coverage of the diagnosis and treatment of children with autism spectrum disorders (ASD), as well as other populations.

HB1311 established licensure for individuals who provide these vital treatments and therapies, which have shown to make a major and lasting difference in the lives of children with ASD.

Recognizing the urgency and importance of HB1311, the State Committee of Psychologists formed a subcommittee to begin working on a draft to implement the licensure component of the bill. The subcommittee included members of the Committee of Psychologists and department and division representatives.

The subcommittee met four times between August and October 2010 to promulgate rules relating to licensing and regulation of behavior analysts and assistant behavior analysts.

Members of the Behavior Analyst Advisory Board were appointed and confirmed by Feb. 16, 2011. Since then, they have met seven times to review applications for licensure, complaints and legislation affecting licensure.

of the subcommittee and the Committee of Psychologists, rules were filed on Nov. 30 to allow the licensing of BAs and aBAs – to begin on Dec. 10, 2010 – prior to the effective date of the insurance mandate, which was Jan. 1. 2011.

Within six months of being signed into law, the first behavior analyst was licensed in the state on Dec. 20, 2010.

#### Missouri leading U.S. in licensure, regulation

Missouri was one of the first states in the nation to require and implement licensure of BAs and aBAs and Missouri is looked to nationally for the work that has been done with licensure and regulation.


