1. INTRODUCTION

The NOAA/NESDIS Center for Satellite Applications and Research (STAR) develops a diverse spectrum of complex, often interrelated, environmental algorithms and software systems. These systems are developed through extensive research programs, and transitioned from research to operations when a sufficient level of maturity and end-user acceptance is achieved. Progress is often iterative, with subsequent deliveries providing additional robustness and functionality. Development and deployment is distributed, involving STAR, the Cooperative Institutes (CICS, CIMSS, CIOSS, CIRA, CREST) distributed throughout the US, multiple support contractors, and NESDIS Operations.

NESDIS/STAR is implementing an increased level of process maturity to support the exchange of these software systems from one location or platform to another. The Software Architecture Document (SWA) is one component of this process.

1.1. Objective

The objective of this Document Guideline (DG) is to provide STAR standards for the SWA. The intended users of this DG are the personnel assigned by the Project Lead to the task of creating an SWA for the project.

1.2. The Software Architecture Document

The STAR Enterprise Product Lifecycle (EPL)¹ provides for two SWA versions (v1 and v2). SWA version 1 has one planned revision. SWA version 2 has one planned revision.

SWA v1.0 is produced during the Basic Research phase of the STAR EPL as an artifact for the Gate 1 Review ². At this phase, the algorithm is at a "concept" stage and its operational potential has not been assessed. The SWA complements the Algorithm Theoretical Basis Document (ATBD) by providing the software architecture for the processing code that will implement the algorithm. The purpose of SWA v1.0 is to assist in demonstrating to the Gate 1 reviewers that the algorithm has operational potential and should be further developed. The intended target audience is other scientists and managers at the algorithm developer's agency.

SWA v1.1 is produced during the Exploratory phase of the STAR EPL as an artifact for the Gate 2 Review. At this phase, the algorithm's operational potential has been demonstrated to the satisfaction of the developer's agency and is now being further developed into a STAR research project proposal. The purpose of SWA v1.1 is to assist in demonstrating to the Gate 2 reviewers that the algorithm should be developed as a STAR research project. The intended target audience is STAR scientists and managers.

SWA v2.0 is produced during the Design phase of the STAR EPL as an artifact for the Preliminary Design Review (PDR). At this phase, the algorithm has been approved by STAR and is being further developed as a pre-operational product with oversight from STAR. The purpose of SWA v2.0 is to demonstrate to the PDR reviewers that the algorithm preliminary design satisfies STAR EPL design requirements. The intended target audience includes STAR scientists and the PDR reviewers

SWA v2.1 is is produced during the Design phase of the STAR EPL as an artifact for the Critical Design Review (CDR). At this phase, the algorithm has been approved by STAR and is being further developed as a pre-operational product with oversight from STAR. The purpose of SWA v2.1 is to help demonstrate to the CDR reviewers that the software detailed design provides for an implementation that is consistent with the theoretical basis and meets requirements. The intended target audience includes STAR scientists and the CDR reviewers.

SWA v2.2 is produced during the Build phase of the STAR EPL as an artifact for the Test Readiness Review (TRR). SWA v2.2 is typically updated from the CDR version (v2.1), to document revisions to the software architecture that occur during pre-operational code development. The intended target audience includes STAR scientists and the TRR Reviewers.

SWA v2.3 is the final planned SWA version. It is produced during the Build phase of the STAR EPL as an artifact for the Code Test Review (CTR). SWA v2.3 is typically updated from the TRR version (v2.2), to document revisions to the software architecture that occur as a result of unit testing. The intended target audience includes STAR scientists and the CTR Reviewers.

The SWA is prepared by the lead algorithm developer, with assistance from other scientists and development programmers as assigned by the developers' agency (v1) or the Project Lead (v2).

The SWA should be developed as a Microsoft Word document. Upon approval, the approved version of the SWA may be converted to an Adobe pdf file for storage in the project artifact repository.

1.3. Background

This DG defines guidelines for producing an SWA. This DG has been adapted from Capability Maturity Model Integrated (CMMI) for Development V1.2 guidelines and practices (<u>http://www.sei.cmu.edu/publications/documents/06.reports/06tr008.html</u>) and from Raytheon practices. It has been tailored to fit the STAR EPL process.

1.4. Benefits

An SWA developed in accordance with the standards in this DG assists the research team to write prototype code that demonstrates the algorithm's operational potential. It also assists the development team to write pre-operational code that implements the product preliminary and detailed design. It is therefore a requirement that an SWA be developed in accordance with the guidelines in this document before pre-operational code is approved for transition to operations.

4. SECTION GUIDELINES

This section contains the STAR guidelines for each section of the SWA.

The SWA should follow the STAR standard for style and appearance, as stated in DG-0.1.

4.1. Table of Contents

The Table of Contents can be inserted by using Word's Insert \rightarrow Reference \rightarrow Index and Tables \rightarrow Table of Contents function or by pasting the Table of Contents from this DG into your document and updating it for the section headers you make for your document. Use a page break if necessary to ensure that the Table of Contents appears at the top of a page.

4.2. List of Figures

A List of Figures should be provided after the Table of Contents. A page break should be used if necessary to ensure that the List of Figures appears at the top of a page. To create a List of Figures, use Word's Insert \rightarrow Reference \rightarrow Index and Tables \rightarrow Table of Figures function, selecting the "Table of Figures" Style. Alternatively, the List of Figures can be created by pasting the List of Figures for this DG into your document.

Figures should be created by using Word's Insert \rightarrow Picture \rightarrow From File function or Word's Insert \rightarrow Object function. Figures should be numbered X.Y, where X is the main section number where the figure resides and Y = 1,N is the ordered number of the figure in the section. Figure captions should have Arial bold 12 point font, should be center justified, and should have a "Table of Figures" Style. A Figure Caption template is provided in Appendix B of this DG.

4.3. List of Tables

A List of Tables should be provided after the List of Figures. The List of Tables can appear on the same page as the List of Figures, with three blank lines separating them, provided both lists can fit on the same page. If both lists cannot fit on the same page, a page break should be used to ensure that the List of Tables appears at the top of a page.

To create a List of Tables, use Word's Insert \rightarrow Reference \rightarrow Index and Tables \rightarrow Table of Figures function, selecting the "Table - Header" Style. Alternatively, the List of Tables can be created by pasting the List of Tables for this DG into your document.

Tables should be created with the Table \rightarrow Insert \rightarrow Table function. Tables should be numbered X.Y, where X is the main section number where the table resides and Y = 1,N is the ordered number of the table in the section. Table titles should have Arial bold 12 point font, should be center justified, and should have a "Table - Header" Style. A Table Title template is provided in Appendix B of this DG. Table text should have Arial regular 10 point font.

4.4. List of Acronyms

The use of acronyms is encouraged. A two word or longer name for an item (e.g., Research Project Plan) should be given an acronym (e.g., RPP) if the name is used more than once in the document. A List of Acronyms should be provided after the List of Tables. The List of Acronyms should be in alphanumeric order. Use the List of Acronyms in this DG as a template. A page break should be used if necessary to ensure that the List of Acronyms appears at the top of a page.

4.5. Section 1 – Introduction

The SWA shall include an Introduction Section. This section shall include

- A well-defined purpose and function for the document
- Specific intended user(s) and how they should use the document
- A brief overview of the contents of each main section
- A revision/change history, focusing on updates since the previous revision

The standard purpose and function of the SWA version 1, as described in the Focused R&D Task Guideline (TG-2.3), is to provide a description of the Focused R&D algorithm data flows in sufficient detail to guide the writing of research grade code to test the algorithm. At this stage, there is no requirements allocation.

The standard purpose and function of the SWA version 2, as described in the Pre-Operational Algorithm Task Guideline (TG-9.3), is to demonstrate that the algorithm process flow provides for an implementation that is consistent with the theoretical basis and will satisfy the requirements allocation.

Specific intended users of SWA version 1 are the research grade code programmers and test reviewers. The programmers should use SWA version 1 as a guide for writing the research grade code. Gate 1 and Gate 2 reviewers should use SWA version 1 as a reference to help them verify the functionality of the research grade code.

Specific intended users of SWA version 2 are the pre-operational code programmers and the pre-operational requirements and design reviewers. The programmers should use SWA version 2 as a guide for writing the pre-operational code. Requirements reviewers should use SWA version 2 as a reference to help them verify that requirements have been satisfactorily allocated to product components. Design reviewers should use SWA version 2 as a reference to help them verify implements the algorithm in a way that ensures the requirements allocation will be satisfied.

4.6. Section 2 – Architecture Description

The software system is an integrated collection of software elements, or code, which produce well-defined output products from a well-defined set of input data. The system layer architecture describes the structure of the system and the external and internal data flows between software elements.

List all software elements of the system. Provide a description of each element at a level of detail sufficient for programmers and reviewers to understand the function and data flows for each software element from the external interfaces down to the subprograms. Subsections should include Interfaces, System Layer Data Flow, and Unit Layer Data Flow.

The subsection for Interfaces should show all external inputs and outputs to and from the software system. An external input is defined as a data source needed by the system that is produced or made available by a process external to the system. Examples are raw sensor data, ancillary data, etc. External output is defined as a data sink that is produced by the system for an external user; for example, archived environmental products (e.g. Sea Surface Temperature). It is recommended that the interfaces be shown as a data flow diagram and as a table.




Figure 5.1 – Example of a Context-Layer Data Flow Diagram

The data flow diagram should be at a "Context" layer (Layer-0), as shown in Figure 5.1.



The subsection System Layer Data Flow expands upon the context-layer diagram shown in Figure 5.1, showing the first layer of decomposition. In addition to the system-layer inputs and outputs, the major processing units are shown along with their inputs and outputs. Each unit is designed as a stand-alone program for ease of testing and integration into a system-layer scheduler. Each second-layer processing element should be described (e.g., **"9.1 Snow Cover.** Derives the binary snow map at imagery pixel resolution and snow fraction at moderate pixel resolution. Produces the VIIRS Snow Cover EDR, consisting of Snow Binary Map and Snow Fraction."). It is recommended that the interfaces be shown as a data flow diagram and as a table.




Figure 5.3 – Example of a Unit-Layer Data Flow Diagram




Figure 5.4 – Example of a Sub-Unit-Layer Data Flow Diagram


